The event played host to a dozen local robotics teams including members from FLL, FTC and FRC levels. The Steel Eagles known as FIRST Tech Challenge Team #5290 shared their robots inside The Henry Ford Museum. The Steel Eagle spent two days working with the public. Their goal was to teach young people about our Hartland community and our involvement in the high tech sport of robotics. Members Miles Bednarski, Domenic Portuesi, Jordan Wallick and Mitchell Bednarski shared their three custom robots known as A.R.C, Billet and Hammer. The team spent this last summer building the two new robots and teaching classes at the Community Education Center.

Hartland School District Robotics was founded to help the community learn more about the potential of our students and grow the program. The young members work to raise public awareness of the generous support given by companies and organizations in our community. This program is ever growing and hopes to field teams in Jr. FLL, FLL, FTC and FRC in the 2012-2013 season. Teen Center Coming to Hartland Next Door opens this fall

We are excited to recognize a group of volunteers that have formed a non-profit organization, named Hartland Enrichment and Recreation Organization (HERO). This organization, with a non-profit umbrella, will be leading its first project, a Teen Center named "Next Door." Slated to open by October 2012, Next Door will serve 7th-12th graders from 2:30-6:00pm on school days and will be housed in the old Township Hall, located on Hartland Road, right next to the fire station.

Hartland Township Trustee Joe Petrucci stated, "We are excited to be in a position to repurpose our old Township Hall. The Township's original plan was to sell the property, but due to current economic conditions the Board looked at other options. Every organization we spoke with agreed that there is a need for a place for our teens to enrich their lives. Our old hall offers a perfect location for a teen center. The Township Board is also considering moving our Sheriff Substation to that site and also offering meeting space for other non profit organizations that continue to make our community a special place."

The need in our community for teenagers to have somewhere to go after school has been identified for several years. This venue offers an ideal place where students can hang out with friends in a positive, safe, supervised place, and stay on the right path toward adulthood. The Township has supported the Senior Center for years, and this opportunity for our youth strengthens the community's efforts to reach out to citizens of all ages. What makes this location perfect is that that it is across the street from the Junior and Senior High School Campus.

The north end of the building will be a recreation area for the teens, with billiards, ping pong, couches and TVs. The south side of the building will have office space and a meeting area that can serve as a study and tutoring space for the teens and a meeting area for other community groups. Again, one of the offices may also house the Livingston Sherriff's substation, which is currently located at the Township Hall on Clark Road.

Open houses for Next Door Teen Center will be held in late August and in September. Students will need to have proper paperwork filled out to attend, but will be of no cost to the teens.

Ceci Marlow, Director of Cromaine Library agrees. "Cromaine is excited to work with the Next Door Hartland Teen Center, bringing supervised after school activities, especially outdoor ones, for our community's teens."

Next Door is currently seeking and accepting donations. Monetary donations will be accepted at the Cromaine Library until the center completes its makeover. HERO will be working with local business and organizations to assist in the cost of running the center. 

Armed Forces Recruiting

Important Notice to Parents

Armed Forces Recruiter Access to Students & Student Recruiting Info

The "No Child Left Behind Act of 2001" passed certain new requirements with respect to Armed Forces Recruiter Access to Students and Student Recruiting Information:

• Duty to Provide Information to Military Recruiters. Unless the parent otherwise request, the District must provide upon request by military recruiters access to high school student's names, addresses and telephone listings.

• Consent. Either the high school student or the parent of the student may request that the student's name, address and telephone listing not be released without the prior parental consent. Schools are required to notify parents of this option to make a request and shall comply with the request.

• Access to Students. Each district shall provide military recruiters the same access to high school students as is provided generally to higher education institutions, community colleges, and prospective employers.

If you do not want your student's name, address and telephone listing released to Armed Forces recruiters, YOU MUST SIGN AND RETURN THIS FORM, or YOU CAN WRITE A LETTER TO THIS EFFECT:

Notification of Rights under FERPA

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) affords parents and students over 18 years of age ("eligible students") certain rights with respect to the student's education records. They are:

- 1) The right to inspect and review the student's education records within 45 days of the day the District receives a request for access.
 - a. Parents or eligible students should submit to the school principal [or appropriate school official] a written request that identifies the record(s) they wish to inspect. The principal will make arrangements for access and notify the parent or eligible student of the time and place where the records may be inspected.
- The right to request the amendment of the student's education records that the parent or eligible student believes are inaccurate or misleading.
 - a. Parents or eligible students may ask Hartland Consolidated School District to amend a record that they believe is inaccurate or misleading. They should write the school principal, clearly identify the part of the record they want changed, and specify why it is inaccurate or misleading.
 - b. If the District decides not to amend the record as requested by the parent or eligible student, the District will notify the parent or eligible student of the decision and advise them of their right to a hearing regarding the request for amendment. Additional information regarding the hearing procedures will be provided to the parent or eligible student when notified of the right to a hearing.
- 3) The right to consent to disclosures of personally identifiable information contained in the student's education records, except to the extent that FERPA authorizes disclosure without consent.
 - a. One exception which permits disclosure without consent is disclosure to school officials with legitimate educational interests. A school official is a person employed by the District as an administrator, supervisor, instructor, or support staff member (including health or medical staff and law enforcement unit personnel); a person serving on the School Board; a person or company with whom the District has contracted to perform a special task (such as an attorney, auditor, medical consultant, or therapist); or a parent or student serving on an official committee, such as a disciplinary or grievance committee, or assisting another school official in performing his or her tasks.
 - b. A school official has a legitimate educational interest if the official needs to review an education record in order to fulfill his or her professional responsibility.
 - c. Upon request, the District discloses education records without consent to officials of another school district in which a student seeks or intends to enroll. [NOTE: FERPA requires a school district to make a reasonable attempt to notify the student of the records request unless it states in its annual notification that it intends to forward records on request.]
- 4. The right to file a complaint with the U.S. Department of Education concerning alleged failures by the District to comply with the requirements of FERPA. The name and address of the Office that administers FERPA is: Family Policy Compliance Office, U.S. Department of Education, 600 Independence Avenue, SW Washington, DC 20202-4605

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974 provides that the following information may be released upon request: student's name, date of birth, phone number, address, parent name(s); school of attendance, picture(s), video(s), publication of student picture(s) with name(s) attached, artwork and school activity group(s). In order to comply with this legislation, the district requests that parents, emancipated minors, and those students 18 years of age and over, who **do NOT** wish release of this information, mail written notice by **September 30, 2012**, to: Hartland Consolidated Schools, 9525 E. Dress Code Reminder – School Shopping

A complete policy can be found in the Student Handbook online, here are a couple brief points to consider when buying clothes this year:

- Clothing that is not the proper size or length including but not limited to tube skirts, short athletic shorts or skirts, halter tops, tube tops, half t-shirts, bare midriffs, cutoffs, tank tops (with narrow straps), pants that sag and expose undergarments, and other similar clothing pieces will not be permitted in school.
- Clothing that is see-through including articles of clothing that have excessive amounts of holes where skin is exposed (i.e. jeans with rips, tears, and holes above the knee) are not permitted in school.

Students who violate the dress code policy will not be able to attend class until their appearance is appropriate for school. Please avoid any unnecessary dress code violations by purchasing clothing that meets the school standard.



Many elderly people rely entirely on family or other trusted individuals to help them. Whether it is for physical needs or emotional needs, as people grow older they tend to need more and more help from others. This dependence on caregivers or family members makes an older person more vulnerable for abuse.

For example, an older person relying on her children to provide meals and transportation and help her with financial decisions finds it difficult to complain when one of her children takes advantage of her. If, for instance, the child takes her money, hits her or neglects her care, the parent may be threatened with loss of support from the child if the parent complains. The child may also use threats of violence to keep the parent in line. It is estimated that 5% to 10% of elderly Americans are suffering abuse. According to the National Committee for the Prevention of Elder Abuse,

"Spiraling rates of elder mistreatment are reported by both practitioners and researchers. In a recent national study of Adult Protective Services (APS), typically the agency of first report concerning elder abuse, there were 253,421 reports of abuse of adults age 60+ or 832.6 reports for every 100,000 people over the age of 60 (Teaster, Dugar, Otto, Mendiondo, Abner, & Cecil, 2006). The National Elder Abuse Incidence Study (National Center on Elder Abuse, 1998) found that more than 500,000 persons aged 60+ were victims of domestic abuse and that an estimated 84% of incidents are not reported to authorities, denying victims the protection and support they need."

Much attention has been focused on abuse in nursing homes but most of the elder abuse in this country is at the hands of family members or other caregivers in the home.

There are a number of reasons why incidents of abuse, neglect, or exploitation are not reported to Adult Protective Services or other authorities. One of the most common reasons is the victim's fear of losing support. Many of the perpetrators are family members and the victim fears that reporting the crime will result in removal of the caregiver, as the perpetrator may face incarceration or may discontinue relations with the victim once accused, charged, or convicted. Many of these victims fear that by reporting abuse they will be left alone and expected to care for themselves or they will be forced to live in a nursing home.

Many states have implemented mandatory reporting laws to assist in the prevention of abuse, neglect or exploitation of vulnerable adults. Utah is one of the many states to have a mandatory reporting law (U.C.A. § 76-5-111). Utah law states that any person who has reason to believe that a vulnerable adult has been the subject of abuse, neglect, or exploitation shall immediately notify Adult Protective Services or the nearest law enforcement agency. Anyone who makes the report in good faith is immune from civil liability in connection with the report; however, any person who willfully fails to report is guilty of a class B misdemeanor.

It is important to note that the anonymity of the person or persons making the initial report and any other persons involved in the subsequent investigation shall be preserved and may only be released in accordance with the rules of the division (U.C.A. § 62A-3-311). In addition, all investigation information is confidential.

The following is a list of indicators of abuse, neglect or exploitation. It is important to note that the following lists are merely indicators and may not always be violations.

Signs of Abuse:

- Unexplained bruises, welts, fractures, abrasions or lacerations
- Multiple bruises in various stages of healing
- Multiple/repeat injuries
- Low self-esteem or loss of self determinationWithdrawn, passive
- Fearful
- Depressed, hopeless
- Soiled linen or clothing
- Social Isolation

Signs of Neglect/Self-Neglect:

- Dehydration
- Malnourishment
- Inappropriate or soiled clothing
- Odorous
- Over/under medicated
 - Deserted, abandoned or unattended
- Lack of medical necessities or assistive devices
- Unclean environment
- Social Isolation

Signs of Exploitation:

- Missing/"disappearing" property
- Inadequate living environment
- Frequent/recent property title changes or will changes
- Excessive home repair bills
- Forced to sign over control of finances
 No/limited money for food, clothes and other amenities

Prevention can only occur if there is awareness, the statutes are adhered to, and any suspicions of abuse, neglect or exploitation of vulnerable adults are immediately reported to Adult Protective Services and/or law enforcement.

All states have agencies that receive complaints of abuse. In some states failure to report abuse of the elderly is a crime. To contact an abuse complaint department, call your local area agency on aging.

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




