### Superintendent's Message

### Janet Sifferman, Superintendent

In March of 1994 Michigan voters approved Proposal A, an action that changed how public schools in the State of Michigan would be financially supported. Proposal A set a fixed tax rate on primary homesteads – 6 mills - and this, in addition to other taxes such as sales, income, liquor, and cigarette, as well as lotto revenues are funneled into the school aid fund. Additionally, an 18-mill non-homestead tax for commercial, industrial, non-primary residences and non-qualified agricultural land also



goes into the school aid fund. Each public school district in the state is then given a per-pupil foundation allowance from this fund. The state assumes that each district collects the full 18 mills for non-homestead property but requires that the collection of this millage renewal come before the voters as a ballot proposal for their approval. Should the renewal proposal fail, the state does not make up the difference in the district's per-pupil foundation allowance allotment.

This important election will take place on Tuesday, May 7, 2013. Voters in the Hartland Consolidated School district will be asked to maintain the full 18-mill Non-Homestead millage for the district's operating budget. Essentially, the ballot question asks voters to keep the same non-homestead millage rate (18 mills) that has been in effect since 1994 and costs residential homeowners in Hartland nothing more than their time to vote. The revenue from this proposal represents approximately \$4.3 million for Hartland Schools' operating fund.

## Kindergarten Registration 2013-2014



Officials of the Hartland Consolidated Schools have announced that they will be accepting registration for kindergarten enrollments for the 2013/2014 school year. Children are eligible for enrollment in kindergarten in September of 2013 if they will have their fifth (5th) birthday on or before November 1, 2013. A child who turns 5 after November 1 and before December 1, 2013 may enroll if parent/legal guardian notifies the school district in writing not later than August 1, 2013.

A Junior Kindergarten program may be offered on a limited basis. A minimum number of students is required for the program to be made available. Parents must agree to provide transportation in order to participate. You may contact Scott Van Epps at 810.626.2111 for more information.

A twenty-minute Orientation will begin at 5:30 p.m. in the Board Room located at the Hartland Educational Support Service Center, 9525 Highland Road, followed by Registration in the Performing Arts Center lobby on:

March 5 (Tuesday) 6:00-8:00 p.m. Last names starting with the letters A-L March 6 (Wednesday) 6:00-8:00 p.m. Last names starting with the letters M-Z Please bring the following:

- Original birth certificate with seal, plus a copy of same certificate
- Original immunization records with proof of DTP, Polio, MMR, Hepatitis B, Chicken Pox Shots (or proof of having had illness), and vision screening, plus a copy of the record
- Proof of residency—copy of one of the following: certificate of occupancy, purchase agreement, builder's permit, rent receipt or agreement, mortgage statement/payment receipt, voter registration card, utility bill, driver's license

While we need to see the originals, it will expedite the enrollment process if you also bring copies of the originals.

Kindergarten registration packets will be available beginning February 8, 2012 at the Board of Education office, the Community Education office, each elementary school office and the Hartland Child Care Center (51 Building). You can also download the packet from our web site: hartlandschools.us.

### **Person of the Month**

### Linda Hartley - February 2013

Linda Hartley is currently serving her 36th year as a teacher in Hartland Consolidated Schools, and she has spent all 36 at Lakes Elementary School! She was hired immediately prior to the 1977/78 school year – the year Lakes opened – for a 1st/2nd grade combination class. She taught the split class for a few years and 1st grade for a couple of years before moving on to a 2nd grade classroom and she's never looked back.

Linda received both her Bachelor's and Master's degrees from the University of Michigan (so it was an easy transition to Hartland's "Blue & Gold".) She married Scott Hartley in 1976, a freelance artist and musician, and together they raised two daughters – Meghan, a music therapist, and Jennifer, a preschool



teacher – who both have found success in New York City

in their chosen professions. Linda and her husband reside in a rural community north of Ann Arbor with their two cats – Sophia and Woody.

### **Most memorable moments: ("G" rated)**

"Kirk's story about his student who was moved to remark on his shoes rather than one of the big ideas that he had so passionately lectured about, reminds me of a similar story. Many years ago I was re-teaching Joey to add two-digit numbers. He was a high-energy little boy who often needed extra help to learn new concepts. So I gathered the base ten blocks and settled in with him in a spot where I hoped to minimize distractions. I patiently and methodically explained the process, moving the blocks on the mat in order to provide a good hands-on lesson. Joey listened and watched my every move with rapt attention. I really thought he was (finally!) beginning to understand this time. When I was finished, I asked him if he had any questions. Yes, he said, he had just one: Why is that one fingernail shorter than all the others?"

"This next story is about my daughter, Meghan. When she was 4 or 5 years old she came to school with me to spend the day in my classroom for Take Our Daughters to Work Day. After school had been dismissed for the day, I was tidying up and Meg was coloring, and I asked her how she had liked being in my class that day. She answered that she had liked it, had had fun with the kids, and then she added, "I didn't know you could act... so... so... sensible". Ha! My family still loves to tell that story and tease me relentlessly."

Why are you are still here?

"People sometimes wonder at the fact that I have remained in the same building and in the same position for my entire career. But it truly feels fresh and exciting to me year after year. I always find new opportunities for fine-tuning my teaching:

Also, most importantly, I think, I have been extremely fortunate to work with incredibly smart, dedicated colleagues who share my passion and have added so much enrichment (and fun!) to my professional life."

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
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## Below you will find a letter that I just could not resist publishing here. I am not the author, Martha J. Hartney, Esq., deserves full credit. Its content is just so pertinent for our times.

Dear Ex.

Though we're not married (cohabitating, procreating) anymore, there are a few things I'd like to say about how you set up your affairs for our kids. You're about to go on vacation and I know you worry about being away from them and having an emergency or tragedy happen. I know I don't have ANY say in how you set up your estate plan, but there are things that I'd like you to consider about the well-being and care of our beautiful children.

So please:

- Make sure your life insurance is up-to date and your beneficiaries are listed properly. Don't name our kids as direct beneficiaries! That will put them straight into a conservatorship where a judge will supervise their financial lives until 18, then they'll get the assets outright in one fell swoop.
- Instead, leave your assets to them in trust, which will sidestep probate, keep the management of your assets private and in your control, and prevent the loss of those assets to our kids' future creditors and predators and reduce the estate taxes that can take valuable resources away from our kids.

### Letter to an "EX"

- Name a trustee that I can work with—someone you trust with your life—because your trustee will have to deal with me. If I were the only parent left, I would be legally responsible for ensuring the assets left to our children are properly managed. I would be looking at the annual accountings. I would be the one asking for court intervention if they are mismanaged or embezzled.
- Don't leave your assets to our kids outright and don't leave too much. There is nothing more damaging to a kid's life purpose than having too much money at their fingertips. There's a saying, "Leave them with enough to do something, but not enough to do nothing." If you have a lot of assets, consider giving some to your favorite charity in-stead of the kids.
- Don't cheap out on an estate plan. Whitney Houston did that. She bought a schlocky will that didn't protect her assets from her daughter's creditors, estate taxes, and probate. Please spend the money to get it done right. It's really not that much in the scheme of things.
- Plan for a very long life. I know you want to leave our kids your accumulated wealth, but think of yourself first. We're all living longer lives and, even though we're not "in love" anymore, I do care about you and your welfare. Create a wealth plan that will give you a lifelong passive income.
- Makesureyou have disability insurance. Your ability to earn is your greatest asset. Nothing will diminish

- your wealth and put you in poverty quicker than not being able to earn money anymore. Even if you don't need care, if you couldn't work, you would run through savings quickly and may have to cheap out on things like your lifestyle, vacations, and even necessities like good, wholesome food or the roof over your head. Please don't let that happen to our kids or to you.
- Get long term care insurance. The person who is going to live to 150 is believed to have already been born! People will routinely live to be over 100, and that could be you. Long term care is EXPENSIVE and it's only going to get more so. Since you're over 50 and in good health, consider buying a LTC –policy on you or a rider on your life insurance policy.
- Name a guardian for our kids and ask me who I named. We might be able to agree still on that. Of course, I've taken care of my guardianship nomination, but if I didn't, our kids would be subject to a guardianship proceeding and you and I both know that would be bad because our families would duke it out.
- When you decide to remarry, get guidance from an attorney in advance be-cause remarriage can cause complications to your planning. I'm sure you've heard of assets going to a spouse instead of to the kids, and while you may eventually want that, don't let that happen by accident or oversight.
- •Make sure you have your own healthcare documents in place, naming your agent for medical decision-

**making.** Don't name the kids as your agents until they are legally capable, over 18 and emotionally able to handle the job.

- Check with your attorney and your retirement account custodian to see if I need to sign any waiver to your retirement accounts. In some cases, if you haven't remarried, as your previous spouse, I may retain some rights in a 401k or similar account that you may have had when we were married. I know that's not what you want and that's okay.
- Most importantly, shoot a video of yourself telling the kids your life story. Tell them about how we met and what you liked about me. Tell them it's not their fault that we didn't work out, but we did have some awesome times together. Tell them what a terrific businessperson you are and how you learned to be that. Tell them about your favorite hobbies and what you're good at. Then tell them what you love about them and how blessed you are that we brought them into the world.

So, dear Ex, I do want the bet for our kids and I hope you consider may wishes so that if something did happen to you, they'd be okay. I promise that if something did, I would do everything in my power to make sure they're able to heal, to thrive and to honor you every day of their lives.


