

Superintendent's Message Janet Sifferman, Superintendent

Twenty years ago, Proposal Awas passed by the voters of Michigan. Proposal A stipulated how public schools in Michigan are to be funded, and in fact, dramatically changed what had been in place before 1994. Funding for public schools switched from a heavy reliance on local property tax to a combination of sales and property taxes plus additional revenue sources. Proposal A took control of funding from the local level and moved it to the state level. The proponents of Proposal A said it would address the issues of adequate and predictable funding for public schools (which remains questionable today), as well as establish equity in funding among all public school districts. Unfortunately, the equity issue was never realized.

A number of years ago, early in this ongoing economic crisis, there was some effort made by the legislature to address the inequity in funding among Michigan's school districts. Unfortunately, the state-wide economic crisis took the focus away from the equity issue. In these bad economic

ECR WSS OSTAL CUSTOME times, as school funding was cut, itwasunilaterally cut across the boardratherthan being calibrated based on each district's current



funding level. Thus, here we are today; Hartland and the other school districts in Livingston County are among some of the lowest funded districts in the state. In fact, if all of the state's districts' funding were averaged, Hartland would still fall below the average. As we see and hear more dialogue regarding public schools and their funding, we still need to remind our legislators that equity in school funding IS a priority. Hartland and other Livingston County students should be valued equitably with other students in the state. Please pay attention to discussion about school funding and remind our legislators of the promise of fair and equitable funding as set forth in Proposal A for Hartland students and students across the state of Michigan.

I have worked in the maintenance department for Hartland Consolidated Schools for 30 years. During this time I have earned a 2-year certificate in HVAC from Mott Community College, a Universal refrigerant recovery license, and a Certified pool operator's license.

I have lived in Hartland for most of my life. I lived in Fenton for a few years but moved back to Hartland when my daughters became school age, so they could go to Hartland Schools. I have been married to my

wonderful wife, Edie (Miss Edie), for 23 years. Edie is currently an employee at Hartland Community Education's Childcare program and I'm probably better known as Miss Edie's husband. My daughters, Sarah and Holly, are both graduates of Hartland and are attending college at SVSU. Sarah is in her fourth year majoring in occupational therapy and Holly is a freshman, major currently undecided. My family has a long history with Hartland Schools. My grandmother, mother, several aunts, uncles, cousins, nieces and nephews are all graduates of Hartland Schools. I am a fourth generation employee of Hartland. My great grandmother was a teacher at a one-room schoolhouse before the consolidation of Hartland Schools, then taught at the "21" Building. My great grandfather was the caretaker of the school that used to sit where the "51" Building sits today and he used to ring the bell that today is housed in Ore Creek's library. Mrs. Steinacker, my grandmother, was a teacher at the elementary level for many years in Hartland, and my mother spent her whole career as a secretary here and retired from the high school. Teenagers were her favorite. My niece, Mandy Mach, is a high school teacher, which makes her a fifth generation "Devitt" employee of Hartland.

One of the memories that I still enjoy today is working at the elementary schools and watching the kindergartners coming in to school on their first day all wide-eyed and excited, yet a little fearful, with their backpacks that seem to be as big as they are! It's the feeling you get when one of them recognizes you and they realize everything is going to be alright.

I'm still here because the job is so diverse that everyday there is always something different to work on. I can come to work with a plan and the next thing I know there's a boiler down, a flood in a room, a rooftop unit not working, or any of a number of things that can go wrong in a day, and there goes the plan. I also enjoy my interactions with the kids – like when I'm working at day care and all the kids yell out "Mr. Marty" or one will say "Miss Edie, your Dad's here." She gets a kick out of that! I'm currently assiged to the HESSC building where I can be working in the preschool room and the kids will ask what I am doing, and then go to the senior center and a senior will share their experience working on what I'm working on. I could also be working around the Legacy students when sometimes they can have "bad days" but then watch them police themselves when they are around the seniors and the preschool students. Where else can you work and have that kind of diversity in the work you do and the people you work for?

Hartland Schools is an excellent school district. The staff at Hartland Schools helped take my daughters from that frightened little kindergartner to the young adults who are excelling in college today.






Students making a change





Safer Roads and Pathways

Hartland Township has no official jurisdiction over any roads within our Township – they are responsibility of either the State, the County or, in the case of private roads, the landowners.

While the County roads within our Township are the responsibility of Livingston County, budget challenges continue to make it difficult for the County to maintain many of the roads in Hartland. Based on the funding model, which has been in place for many years, the expectation is that these challenges will grow.

"The Livingston County Road Commission maintains local roads, including those in Hartland Township. Significant revenue constraints, however, make it impossible to give county roads the full attention that residents, the Township and County officials agree is warranted. This will be the situation for the foreseeable future."

If, as a community, it is decided that safer roads and pathways are a priority – as was clear in the recent resident survey – then the Township will need to partner with the County for maintenance and improvements.

In the coming months, the Township will reach out to residents to determine which maintenance issues are the most pressing and where we can increase safety, both for drivers and pedestrians.

Hartland History Trivia

Do you know which historical building in Hartland was bought for \$1 from Hartland Township?

Clue: It was originally built in 1893 for another purpose than what it is used for today. It was slated to be torn down in 1970 because it blocked the views of the school buses. Answer: The Florence B. Dearing Museum at the corner of Crouse and Hartland Rd. (Avon Street). It was the original Town Hall and later the Town Hall and Fire

Hall. When the new Town Hall and Fire Hall were built in 1970, they no longer had any use for it and it blocked the buses view so they decided to tear it down. The Hartland Area Historical Society negotiated with the township to buy it for \$1 and use it for the Florence B. Dearing Museum.

Do you know what US President (then the Secretary of Commerce), and what famous inventor were contemporaries of John Robert Crouse? Clue: After John Robert Crouse won the McGraw award this President (then the Secretary of Commerce) said, "I wish to be numbered among those to congratulate J. Robert Crouse." Answer: Herbert C. Hoover. Clue for famous inventor: John Robert Crouse received The McGraw Award for his work that was created with the National Electric Lamp Association, who he founded. This inventor was his contemporary. Answer: Thomas A. Edison.

Learn more interesting facts about the Hartland Area when you purchase "Weaving the Past with the Present" published in 2005. There are copies still available for \$27 (includes tax). You can pick up a copy at Cromaine Library in the village, the museum or at the Community Ed office. This would make a great graduation or holiday gift.


Vintage Christmas Ornaments - November 7

An article in USA Today reports that on a given night, more than 75,000 veterans (male and female) are living homeless on the streets of their cities. Nearly half (40%) of all home-less males are veterans. The homeless are often looked down upon in American society. They are often seen as lowly beggars, leeching off of the system. The true tragedy is when we see our brave, courageous, strong soldiers fall to homelessness. What we often don't understand is what would cause our protectors, our soldiers, to give up on ambition and dreams to live an unfulfilled life on the corner of Main Street. We don't under-stand this because we will never know, as our soldiers did, the trauma of war.

Veterans have to deal with high rates of Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder and often may have traumatic brain injuries or sexual trauma. Due to their experiences in war, Veterans may often want to be secluded and are more likely to live unsheltered and outdoors. According to the United States Interagency Council on Homelessness, Veterans are also most likely to experience long-term, chronic homelessness.

Generally, a homeless person is expected to have not graduated from high school, but studies show that 85% of homeless veterans have completed high school or received a GED. On the other hand, only 56% of non-veteran homeless have completed high school. Furthermore, our homeless veterans were not necessarily the 'problem soldiers' in the army. Eighty-nine percent of homeless veterans received Honorable Discharges and 67% served in the military for three or more years.

These men and woman risked their lives for our country. They gave of their time and their service honorably and without question. And now, nearly half of them are living alone on the streets, not knowing how to get the help they deserve.

When faced with these statistics, most peoples' attention immediately turns to the government. They ask questions like "Why would the government allow their own veterans to suffer and beg on the streets?" and "Why has our government failed to help our homeless veterans?"

We may not currently see a large impact from government programs, but they are there, and they are helping. Our government cares about our veterans and so does our President. In 2011, President Obama set the goal to end chronic homelessness among veterans by 2015. When he sethis goal, Obama implemented the plan entitled Opening Doors. Opening Doors is a federal strategic plan to prevent and end homelessness within five years.

Opening Doors implements five points. The first is to provide affordable housing to veterans and then second to provide permanent supportive housing. Supportive housing is shown to be a most affective bridge be-tween homelessness and independent housing. A study was conducted as part of the Federal Collaborative Initiative to Help End Chronic Homelessness, and it concluded that 95% of the participants were in independent housing after one year in a permanent supportive housing arrangement. The third point is to increase meaningful and sustainable employment. It is important that the job a veteran receives matches his/her skills so that they feel their work is meaningful and that they are needed to remain in the job for a long period of time. The fourth point is to reduce financial vulnerability by enhancing information, reducing barriers, and improving access to services. This point emphasizes making homeless veterans aware of the government programs available to help them.

The fifth and final point is to transform the homeless crisis response system. This is the point at which the government transfers its burden to the community. There needs to be a quicker response to homeless veterans showing up in a city. People need to take notice and spread the word to these veterans about the help that is available to them. The community also needs to be involved with re-housing. The veteran will feel a greater connection to the community reaching out to them rather than the government.

Government programs are fantastic, and they are helping many veterans, but according to the National Coalition for Homeless Veterans, the VA Department of the United States is only able to serve about 25% of the veterans in need. This would leave approximately 300,000 veterans each year who are left to seek help elsewhere. When the government's reach cannot go any farther, the community has an obligation to step in.

These 300,000 veterans who are not able to receive

help from the VA will turn to local government agencies and volunteer organizations. They will turn to their community for help. The National Coalition for Homeless Veterans states that the most effective pro-grams are "community-based, nonprofit, 'veterans helping veterans' groups."

The community and the individual within that community has a chance to help decrease the amount of homeless veterans. Our veterans gave their all for our country; it's time that we take a moment to give back to them. The largest problem is a lack of information. In this area, community outreach can make a big impact on the amount of homeless veterans that are receiving help. Many veterans seclude themselves. According to a study of homeless veterans, 96% of them are alone rather than part of or near family. They don't have anyone else, and many of them have no idea that there is so much help available for them. Beyond government programs, there are countless volunteer organizations and also local government agencies. It is the responsibility of the individuals within a community to help spread the word of relief to the veterans who are currently without family and without a home.
