Superintendent's Message

Janet Sifferman, Superintendent



Over the last several months there seems to be a bit of a frenzy regarding the Common Core State Standards. I want to take this opportunity to give some background on this topic and how it affects Hartland Consolidated Schools. For many years the State of Michigan, through the State Board of Education and the Michigan Department of Education, has assessed our students on standards and benchmarks set statewide. Our local curriculum was written to meet Michigan's High School Content Expectations (HSCEs) for grades 9-12 and the Grade Level Content Expectations (GLCEs) for grades K-8. Several years ago Governor Granholm felt the need to align Michigan's high school graduation requirements with those of many other states. At that time Michigan's requirements were far less rigorous than most states. Thus the more rigorous high school curriculum requirements called the Michigan Merit Curriculum were legislated.

A short time later, the National Governors Association and the National Council of Chief State School Officers began conversations about having common standards and benchmarks for students in public schools across the United States. These standards were developed through an intense process involving representatives from various states, researchers, national organizations and community groups across the country. Michigan's State Board of Education adopted the Common Core State Standards on June 15, 2010. The adoption of the Common Core has allowed Hartland Consolidated Schools to take its locally approved curriculum and make alignment adjustments to meet the Common Core, which emphasizes college and career readiness skills. 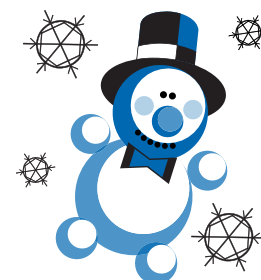

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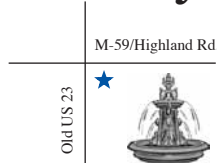

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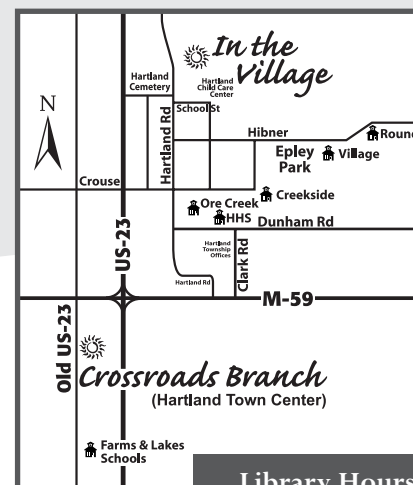

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Making Critical Decisions for your Young Adult Child

If you have any adult high school or college aged children, they are responsible for making their own medical and mental health care decisions.

Children become legal adults at age 18. At age 18, the law says they can make all of their own decisions and have all the rights and benefits of adult citizens of the United States as you and I (with the exception of drinking, which is reserved until the age of 21).

If your young adult child has an accident or is in the hospital and is unable to make medical or mental health care decisions for him or herself, you would legally be unable to get any health care information or make health care decisions for your child, without his or her prior permission. It does not matter if you are the parent or your child is your dependent. If your child is an adult, the privacy rules require all medical and mental health care providers keep all of your child's health care information confidential.

The only way that the health care information can be released to you is if you have been appointed as a patient advocate by your child or as a guardian by the probate court.

You might be informed your young adult child

had an accident and is in the hospital. Without an appointment as patient advocate by your child or as guardian by the probate court, legally you cannot get any information from health care providers regarding your child's condition or treatment.

And if your child remains incapacitated, unable to make health care decisions for him or herself and has not given you prior permission to make those decisions, your only option would be to apply to the probate court for a guardianship of your adult child. Only after you have been appointed guardian would you have access to your child's health care information and be able to make medical and mental health care treatment decisions for him or her.

There is a far simpler way to be able to access your incapacitated child's medical and mental health care records and make treatment decisions for him or her. All that needs to be done is have your child, upon reaching age 18, sign a properly drafted durable power of attorney for health care, also called a designation of patient advocate. In this document, your child could designate you, or someone else, as a patient advocate who would have access to all medical and mental health care information and make medical and mental health care treatment decisions when your child is unable.

There are five key elements that should be included in every durable power of attorney for health care for your child, you or anyone:

- Appointment of patient advocate and backups to make your health care decisions when you are unable.
- Provisions allowing your patient advocate to withhold or withdraw life-sustaining treatment in certain circumstances when you are totally and permanently mentally incapacitated and artificial means are only prolonging the dying process.
- Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (HIPAA) authorizations so your patient advocate can have access to your confidential medical information and can release that information to others.
- Anatomical gift/organ donation powers allowing your patient advocate to make sure your anatomical gift or organ donation happens.
- Mental health care providers providing your patient advocate can make mental health care decisions on your behalf when you are not able, such as those related to Alzheimer's, dementia, depression, anxiety, etc.

With a properly drafted durable power of attorney for health care for your incapacitated adult child, you should have no problem gaining access to your child's

health care information and making medical and mental health care treatment decisions for him or her.

It is also vital that your adult child signs a general durable financial power of attorney. With the financial power of attorney you will be able to handle your adult child's financial affairs if he becomes mentally incapacitated. Without the financial power of attorney no one would have authority to make financial decisions or handle your adult child's financial affairs during his incapacity. In such a case, a parent would have to petition the probate court for a conservatorship for the financial affairs, which is separate from a guardianship. The court would then supervise and approve all expenses.

With both financial and health care powers of attorney in place for your young adult children, you would be able to make decisions for them when they are unable, have access to their medical and mental health care information and handle their financial affairs, all without having the necessity of court involvement.

This is the result that most families desire.

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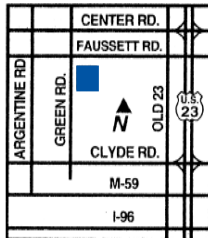

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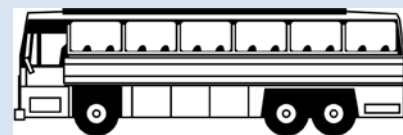

Black Sheep Weavers Fiber Guild



Spinning yarn with a drop spindle

On January 9, the Black Sheep Weavers Guild speaker will be Kathy Moskal, and she will be demonstrating and teaching us how to spin yarn with a drop spindle. Using a spindle is a very economical way to learn hand-spinning for a beginner. Once you have mastered the spindle you will have learned the steps needed for spinning on the spinning wheel: drafting out fibers, twisting the fiber into yarn, plying, winding up and storing the spun yarn. There will be a kit fee of \$5, which will include a drop spindle, and fiber to work with.

Kathy Moskal has been raising llamas, alpacas, angora goats and angora rabbits, as well as poultry on her farm in Chelsea, Michigan since 1998. She uses the fiber her animals produce to create roving, yarn, and household goods. The program will begin after a brief business meeting and Show 'n Tell.

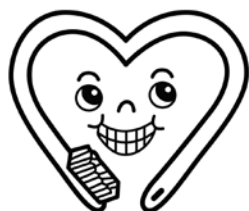
