However the district will continue to run its annual 18-mill Non-Homestead Millage election in May to ensure the district continues to receive its full distribution of state aid for the coming year. More information will be forthcoming on this ballot proposal over the next couple of months. As always, Hartland Consolidated Schools is extremely fortunate to have fantastic support from our parents and the community. Thank you!

Kindergarten Registration 2014-2015

Officials of the Hartland Consolidated Schools have announced that they will be accepting registration for kindergarten enrollments for the 2014/2015 school year. Children are eligible for enrollment in kindergarten in September of 2014 if they will have their fifth (5th) birthday on or before October 1, 2014. A child who turns 5 after October 1 and before December 1, 2014 may enroll if parent/legal guardian notifies the school district in writing no later than August 1, 2014.

A Junior Kindergarten program may be offered on a limited basis. A minimum number of students is required for the program to be made available. Parents must agree to provide transportation in order to participate. You may contact Scott VanEpps at 810.626.2111 for more information.

A twenty-minute Orientation will begin at 5:30 p.m. in the Board Room located at the Hartland Educational Support Service Center, 9525 Highland Road, followed by **Registration** in the Performing Arts Center lobby on:

6:00-8:00 p.m. Last names starting with the letters A-L March 4 (Tuesday) March 5 (Wednesday) 6:00-8:00 p.m. Last names starting with the letters M-Z Please bring the following:

- Original birth certificate with seal, plus a copy of same certificate
- **Original** immunization records with proof of DTP, Polio, MMR, Hepatitis B, Chicken Pox Shots (or proof of having had illness), and vision screening, plus a **copy** of the record
- Proof of residency-copy of one of the following: certificate of occupancy, purchase agreement, builder's permit, rent receipt or agreement, mortgage statement/ payment receipt, voter registration card, utility bill, driver's license

While we need to see the originals, it will expedite the enrollment process if you also bring copies of the originals.

Kindergarten registration packets will be available beginning February 7, 2014 at the Board of Education office, the Community Education office, each elementary school office and the Hartland Child Care Center (51 Building). You can also download the packet from our web site: hartlandschools.us.

My Hartland teaching career started at Round Elementary School where I taught for three years. I have spent the past 12 years at Farms Intermediate School. I have been involved with Community Education for almost as long as I have taught in Hartland. I have taught summer programs and after-school programs. Subjects and activities include many different math programs, flag football, basketball, and afterschool Stock Market Clubs. My involvement in after-school Stock Market Clubs led to my role as a Stock Market Game Coordinator for the Securities Industry Financial Markets Association (SIFMA). Through online workshops I register, teach, and support over five hundred teachers each year in Michigan, Iowa and West Virginia.

I have lots of memorable moments, but one of my favorites takes me back to my first year of teaching. About four or five weeks into the school year, I was giving one of those inspirational talks to my third graders. Their eyes were all glued on me and they were focused on every word. These kids were getting it, I thought to myself! Jack, who sat in the front row, raised his hand with such purpose. He obviously wanted to share with us how inspired he was or maybe he had a great life experience to add to my important life lesson. Eager to hear what he had to say, I called on him. All eyes turned toward Jack. With such command he said, "Mr. Anderson, can we please get back to the math lesson?"

I am still in Hartland for many reasons. Most importantly, it is because of the wonderful students at Farms. Each morning when all of the 6th graders walk through the hallways and go to their homerooms, I try to greet as many of them as I can. I continue that spirit when I walk into my classroom. It is guaranteed that at the end of the day at least a half-dozen or so will make me laugh. My students make it easy for me to want to come to school each and every day.

Hartland is a great place to teach. It begins with the community, which I think is a special place. They support our schools, which is evident with each and every bond that is passed to support our district. We have some awesome parents who answer the bell every time I need something for the classroom. I have met some great families in Hartland and I appreciate having the opportunity to be their children's teacher.








Holiday Hallway Decorating During the last week of school before winter break, the high school participated in





UNDERSTANDING YOUR ASSESSMENT: A QUICK GUIDE TO ASSESSING TERMS

True Cash Value (aka Market Value) – The value of the property as determined by the assessor.

Assessed Value - 50 percent of the True Cash Value/ Market Value.

State Equalized Value - The final value calculated by multiplying the Assessed Value by the equalization factor, if warranted. This is typically the same as the Assessed Value.

Capped Value - The prior year's Taxable Value minus any losses (demolition of a structure, etc.) multiplied by the Consumer Price Index (CPI) for the current year, plus any additions (new construction, etc.).

Taxable Value - The value on which property taxes will be computed. This will be the Assessed Value or Capped Value, whichever is less.

When is the Right Time to Place a Loved One Suffering from Alzheimer's Disease in a Nursing Facility

There is no right or wrong answer to this question. However, there are times when it would be more appropriate to explore nursing home placement for your loved one who has Alzheimer's disease.

We know of a case where both the husband and wife suffered from Alzheimer's disease. They lived out of state, and their children were scattered around the country so none of them could assist with their parents' care. During the early stages, they lived together in an assisted living facility, the wife's disease progressing more quickly than the husband's. As the wife's Alzheimer's progressed, she started wandering out of the facility and through the streets of town. The children got calls at all hours of the day and night, and felt helpless as they were hundreds of miles away. Eventually the children had to make the difficult decision to place their mother in a skilled nursing facility. It was a hard decision, and even more difficult for the father as he remained in the assisted living facility. Often a spouse, as a caregiver for their partner, is able to hide the reality that he or she has Alzheimer's disease.

If you fear that your loved one may have Alzheimer's disease, you need to remember that detection, treatment, and stimulation are vital tools to prolonging your loved one/s memory. Isolation and depression are common effects of someone who has symptoms of Alzheimer's dis-ease. Some of the easiest and most important things you can do to help a loved one with this disease involve stimulating your loved one's memory. This could include having them join a senior center to participate in their daily activities, moving them to an elderly apartment complex that provides daily activities, engage them in puzzles and other mind teasers, and reading the newspaper.

The single most important asset for an individual who has been diagnosed with Alzheimer's dis-ease is his or her primary care-giver. This person will provide a broad array of support, based on the amount of care his or her loved one requires.

There are times that we see the personal struggle of the caregivers, and we feel it is time to dis-cuss the possibility of placement in a nursing facility. Now, don't get me wrong, our goal is for each and every individual to be able to remain in his or her home;

however there is a point when it would be more beneficial for the individual suffering from Alzheimer's disease, as well as the caregiver, to make the move into a nursing facility. We understand how difficult it is for children to get the phone calls about their parents and realizing that it was time for a higher level of care to provide a safe environment. As the disease progresses, the caregiver's health becomes a critical concern. What would happen if the care-giver were no longer able to help care for his or her loved one? Would someone else be able to step into the same role and pro-vide the care? Is he or she safe to remain in the home? After careful consideration of these issues, this may be the time it is necessary to consider nursing facility placement for your loved one.


Hartland Audubon Club



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


