## Superintendent's Message

### Janet Sifferman, Superintendent

On Tuesday, May 6, Hartland Consolidated Schools will hold a special election asking to renew the 18-mill non-homestead millage for the schools' operating budget for five years (through 2018). Election law changes have moved School Board elections to November, leaving the non-homestead issue the only item on the May ballot. We believe the non-homestead millage election should be held in May because it impacts the district budget that begins July 1. However, in



an attempt to save an annual election cost of approximately \$20,000, the Board has decided to extend the renewal over five years. This non-homestead issue has existed since Proposal A went into effect in 1994. The non-homestead renewal is part of the funding for public schools allocated by the State of Michigan and directly impacts the district's general fund.

The non-homestead ballot for this May generates an estimated \$4.3 million in revenue for the district, so it is obviously extremely important that we levy the full amount of 18 mills as dictated by the state. It is also important to note that the state assumes school districts are collecting the full 18 mills, so should this proposal not pass, the shortfall will not be covered by the state.

This millage is not assessed against residential homestead property or qualified agricultural property. For residential homestead property owners and qualified agricultural property owners, passage of the Non-Homestead Tax costs you nothing except your time to vote.

Local business or other non-homestead property owners will only be taxed at the rate (18 mills total) that was planned when state voters passed Proposal A in 1994. The individual parcels have been limited to increases no greater than the cost of living just as homestead property has been limited.

# PARENT, TEACHER, EMPLOYEE NOTIFICATION OF THE AVAILABILITY OF THE MANAGEMENT PLAN FOR ASBESTOS

According to AHERA 763.93 (g) (4) "...at least once each school year, the LEA shall notify in writing, parent, teacher, and employee organizations of the availability of the management plans and shall include in the management plan a description of the steps taken to notify such organizations, and a dated copy of the notification. In the absence of any such organization...the LEA shall give written notice..."

The procedure and plan that the LEA has adopted for the notification listed above is as follows:

- \* In writing, notify the presidents of each of the three above organizations of the availability of the asbestos management plan.
- \* In the event that there is no organization representing any of the above three groups, individual letters will be sent out, or notice will be given in a newsletter of the availability of the management plan.
- \* The Designated Person will be responsible to update the management plan as needed, and annually by March 30th of each school year.
- \* The Designated Person will be responsible to ensure that a copy of the following or similar notification will be sent to the above organizations and/ or individuals by April 30th of each school year and copies of the notices are filed in the management plan.

Our legacy grows; as the staff and students of LEGACYHS continue to shine in our 30+ years of educational success. Hundreds of successful Hartland alumni have earned their diploma at Legacy HS over the past three decades.

The faces and the names have changed but the core philosophy has held true from 1982 until now. Connecting with students in a small, caring environment with tons of support was the recipe for success back then and still is today.

In 1982, Hartland HS counselor, Jo DelVero started a small program to help atrisk students stay in school and graduate. The following spring the first Class of LEGACY HS graduated in 1983. Ms. Del Vero knew that a need existed and she was



able to convince then HS Principal, Jack Poley, to launch her idea as an Alternative HS.

Thirty years later the students of Hartland and over a dozen surrounding communities have LEGACY HS as an educational option for at-risk students to find success. The Hartland Board of Education and Administration continue to fully support this educational option as a county gem.

In recent years the program has quickly grown to over 150 students with the new Hartland Virtual Academy running parallel to LEGACY HS. The climate of education is ever-changing and we are able to keep stride with the demands of our customers here in Alternative Ed.


Do you need Childcare for your School Age Child?

# "Your Vote Counts and Costs You Only Your Time to Vote"

On Tuesday, May 6, 2014, voters in the Hartland Consolidated School District will be asked to maintain the full 18 Non-Homestead mills for the schools' operating budget for five years (through 2018). Over the past few years there have been election law changes that have moved Board member elections to November, leaving the Non-Homestead election alone on the May ballot. We still believe it is important to run this election in May as it impacts the district budget that begins July 1st. However in an attempt to save approximately \$20,000 per election, we are comfortable following the practice of many school districts and running this election less often. Essentially, the ballot question asks district voters to keep the same millage rate, 18 mills, that has existed since Proposal A went into effect in 1994. For residential homestead property owners and qualified agricultural property owners, the maintaining of the 18 non-homestead mills will cost you nothing except the time and energy you expend to go to the polls.

In March of 1994, Michigan voters approved Proposal A. That action completely changed how Michigan public schools would be financially supported in the future. The success of that vote significantly reduced tax millages for people who owned one home (called your homestead). For example, the Hartland Consolidated Schools operating tax millage was 37 mills before Proposal A. After the 1994 vote, it was reduced to six mills and remains this amount. The 6 mills are sent directly to Lansing. This and other taxes, such as sales tax, income tax, liquor and cigarette taxes, and lotto revenues all go into making up the dollars for the state school aid fund. From these collected monies, the State reimburses school districts with a foundation allowance.

In Hartland our foundation allowance for the 2013/2014 school year is \$7,026.00 per pupil. Please keep in mind that this is the basic foundation grant promised under Proposal A. The 18-mill Non-Homestead Tax portion of school funding is extremely important for Hartland Schools, equating to approximately \$4,369,607.00 in revenue next year. Non-Homestead property is defined as commercial, industrial and second homes such as vacation cottages. Non-qualified agricultural land that is not farmed by the owner is also subject to the 18-mill tax levy. The crux of Proposal A is based on the assumption that each district would collect the full 18 mills on **non-homestead properties.** The law states that the full 18 mills cannot be collected unless it comes before the voters in an election, and the state assumes that school districts are collecting the full 18 mills and does not compensate them for a shortfall if the renewal fails. Those of us that own our homes as our primary residence (our homestead) would continue to pay 6 mills - no more and no less.

If the Non-Homestead millage on non-residential property is not renewed at the full 18 mills allowed by Proposal A, this will create a loss in revenue for the school district of approximately \$4.3 million for the 2014/2015 school year. The last Non-Homestead Tax millage election was held in May of 2013 for a period of one year. Please remember the 18 mills is what the district needs to be made whole regarding state funding and that this will cost residential homeowners in Hartland nothing more than their time to vote.

### Why is a non-homestead renewal important to Hartland Schools?

- → The 18-mill tax equates to approximately \$4.3 million in revenue for the district each year
- ➤ State assumes 100% of the non-homestead tax is collected based on a levy of 18 mills
- → Funds not collected **ARE NOT** made up by the state when allocating monies to our schools for educational purposes

### Is the Non-Homestead renewal something new?

- → NO! This tax levy has been in place since 1995
- → Businesses, vacant property and second homes are expected to pay this tax as part of Michigan's school funding program
- → This is a renewal of the 18 mills passed for one year in 2013

### Does this renewal mean a tax increase for area businesses?

→ NO! This same 18 mills has been levied on businesses, vacant land and 2nd homes since 1995 and the passage of Proposal A

### If the only property I own in the Hartland district is my home, does this proposal cost me anything

- → NO! As stated in the ballot proposal, principal residences and other qualified property are exempt.
- **▶ NO!** But keep in mind if the proposal is defeated, it will cost Hartland Schools approximately \$4,369,607.

# **Ballot Language**

# HARTLAND CONSOLIDATED SCHOOLS OPERATING MILLAGE RENEWAL PROPOSAL

This proposal will allow the school district to continue to levy the statutory rate of 18 mills on all property, except principal residence and other property exempted by law, required for the school district to receive its revenue per pupil foundation allowance.

Shall the limitation on the amount of taxes which may be assessed against all property, except principal residence and other property exempted by law, in Hartland Consolidated Schools, Livingston County, Michigan, be increased by 18 mills (\$18.00 on each \$1,000 of taxable valuation) for a period of 5 years, 2014 to 2018, inclusive, to provide funds for operating purposes; the estimate of the revenue the school district will collect if the millage is approved and levied in 2014 is approximately \$4,369,607(this is a renewal of millage which expired with the 2013 tax levy)?



# Where to Vote

Residents of the Hartland Consolidated Schools district will vote in the same local township polling location for the school election as when voting in the general election.



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### **Leaving This World Alone (Loneliness among the Elderly)**

James A. Froude said, "We enter the world alone, we leave the world alone." There is no feeling more horrible than the loneliness one feels in the unsettling quiet of an empty house. For many elderly, it seems that aging accompanies loneliness as children leave and spouses pass on. Though many children devote years of their lives to care for their elderly parents, others abandon them to solitude.

A French article translates to read, "Elderly people who are deprived of the warmth of human contact are at the risk of turning inward. For the very old, an atmosphere such as this can become psychologically  $cat a strophic \, and \, lead \, to \, depressive \, syndromes \, such \, as \,$  $extreme \, sadness, a \, desire \, to \, do \, nothing, sleep \, problems$ and even dementia.

It is easier to care for our parents when their health is deteriorating, but what about those who retain their health well into their fifties or sixties? Just as a teenager becomes preoccupied with high school social life and can often forget about the family dinner or activity, adults can become preoccupied with their jobs and families of their own and neglect their elderly parents.

Even if your parent is healthy, they may not remain so when subject to consistent loneliness. Ask yourself: How many times have I given my mother a call this past month? How often have I visited my parents this past year? How long did I stay? Long enough to have a real

conversation, enjoy a dinner, or take a walk through the park?

On her blog, Judith Gelber spoke of her experience with loneliness in old age, "Among the side-effects of aging are loneliness and isolation. Friends and family die or move away. Whatever support system existed before seems in tatters. Life becomes a hard pill to swallow."

The problem of loneliness in aging does not always fall on the children; sometimes the elderly bring loneliness upon themselves. "They've spent their lives looking after others as well as themselves. While they appreciate help, they still want to feel they are capable of taking care of themselves and running their own lives." (Judith Gelber) Neighbors and others seeking to reach out are sometimes turned away for this very reason. The elderly have just as much right to keep their pride as the younger population does. Sometimes, though, the elderly can be a bit more stubborn. They've seen more of life, they've been more weathered by pains and hardships, and now they're facing their last years alone.

Judith Gelber said, "The best help for the elderly is in the doing rather than the asking." It's true that some of the elderly may isolate themselves, but it does not mean that inside they are not reaching out for comfort and companionship. As Gelber said, many times actions do speak louder than words. If you are a nearby neighbor to an elderly person you could mow their lawn, shovel their walk, or bring over a warm, home-cooked meal. As a child you can simply pick up the phone and give your mother or father a call.

If your life is really busy and you find yourself unable to visit your elderly parents as much as you would like, you can seek out other companionship services for your loved ones. Many home care agencies offer companionship services. The elderly do not necessarily need to be in poor health to utilize these services. Companionship services can include providing friendship, conversation, and discussion; visits, outings, and trips; reminders for appointments; care for houseplants; medication reminders and assistance with personal tasks such as selecting clothing to wear, morning and evening routines; writing letters and mailing bills; and various everyday companion and care needs.

Adult day care centers are another option to provide your loved one with meaningful social interaction and stimulation. The costs of adult day care have remained consistently lower than the costs for other types of care such as nursing homes, assisted living, and home care. As described by The National Adult Day Services Association, "Adult day service centers provide a coordinated program of professional and compassionate services for adults in a community-based group setting. Services are designed to provide social and some health services.

During the night, when you or a home health aide are not able to be at home with your elderly loved one, medical alert equipment can be used to provide some peace of mind. Various types of medical alert equipment can easily be used to call for help if your loved one has any medical or physical emergencies while they are home alone.

To explore more companionship options as well as compare pricing and services, consult a care manager for advice. Sometimes in a desire to maintain independence, the elderly may not be willing to admit their loneliness and their need for services such as home care or adult day care. Elder care mediation experts are trained in helping families solve conflicts related to aging and the need for care. If you are having trouble convincing you're loved one to seek out the companionship and/or care they need, elder care mediation is a useful option to consider.

Don't leave those you love confined to the empty loneliness of their own home. Make it a point to visit an elderly loved one or give them a call, and when you can't be there, seek out caring services that can help provide the social interaction and companionship your loved ones deserve. After everything so many of the elderly have contributed to our nation, our communities, and our families, we should at the very least give them the courtesy of friendship. There is no cure for loneliness but companionship and love. No one should have to leave this world alone.

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

## **Hartland LEGO Team Eagle 1**

Local Hartland Robotics team, Eagle 1, invited to FIRST LEGO League North American Open Championship Tournament

Every year, thousands of kids around the world participate in FIRST LEGO League's and the world participate in FIRST Lego League's an(FLL) robotic competition. FLL is a robotics program for 9-14 year olds, which is designed to get children excited about science and technology. Using the LEGO MINDSTORMS robot sets, kids program an autonomous robot to score points while solving "missions." They also create an innovative solution to a problem as part of their project, while being guided by the FLL Core Values. These three elements Robot Game, Project, and FLL Core Values make up the annual Challenge.

This year's theme was "Natural Disasters." The kids had to research a problem and develop an innovative solution to help them prepare, stay safe, or rebuild after a natural disaster. Eagle 1, decided to focus on the problems survivors experience, shortly after being involved in a disaster and the need to get help. We invented the "Rescue Solar Flag." The rescue solar flag is designed to attract rescuers' attention while providing a source of power to survivors who have to wait for help. It contains a first aid kit, survival gear, food and a solar panel with attachments to charge a cell phone, batteries, flashlights, and more.

The Michigan Regional and State Competitions were held in November and December of last year. Eagle 1 did well in both tournaments, winning the Robot -Innovative and Strategy award, Champion's award FINALIST and the Adult Coach/ Mentor Award. We finished 2nd Place in the State tournament. Later, we found out that we were invited to the North American Open Invitational Championship tournament in California. Only 1 team per State is selected for this honor and we are excited to be representing Michigan!




