

Superintendent's Message Janet Sifferman, Superintendent

In addition to congratulating Hartland's 2014 graduating class, I would like to thank the entire Hartland community for their continued support of our school district during these trying financial times. The successful passage of the 18-mill Non-Homestead Millage will help us to continue to provide the programming and services for our students that the community has come to expect. It would be impossible for Hartland Schools to do what we do without



your continued support. This is a wonderful place to live and work! Thank you. On a separate note, I also wanted to inform the community that next year, for the 2014/15 school year, Hartland Schools will be initiating a calendar that includes an "Early Release Friday" schedule. Every building in the district will release students one hour earlier than the rest of the weekdays' dismissal times. The district has decided to incorporate this schedule for several reasons.

Our teachers are being required to incorporate more and more federal and state requirements into their instruction and student achievement. This requires regular professional development opportunities that these early release Fridays will afford. Ultimately this will benefit our students.

Our students need the consistency of a regular full 5-day school week. The combination of monthly full-day professional development days and bad weather/"Act of God" days this year resulted in too much disruption to the regular "school week".

The state is requiring us to move toward more instructional days and hours. This new calendar achieves this.

A copy of next year's calendar and bell times is on the district web site. Bell time schedule can be found in this issue of Community Life.

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Karen Condra, Teacher of the Year

Passion and Commitment Leads to "Teacher of the Year" Selection

The 2014 Hartland Consolidated Schools' teacher of the year says it's the teachers and administrators of her youth that helped fuel her passion for teaching. "They empowered me in middle and high school to take on student leadership roles and be an active part of the school," Condra said. "It was their belief in me that fostered my love for education and the power that teachers have for changing lives."

Condra, a special education teacher who has been with the district since 2002, taught English, US History and intensive writing at Hartland



Middle School during the 2013-14 school year and said her job continues to change with the needs of the students Hartland Schools service. "As a special education teacher, I have an ever changing role in the education of all students," Condra said. "This full array of educational implementation settings has allowed me to see a variety of systems of delivery and given me extensive background in the pros and cons of each. "Bottom line is every student, no matter their ability or disability, deserves a "special education" in a mode that fits their individual needs," she said.

Completing her education at Michigan State University for undergraduate and graduate school and graduating with a Master's Degree in Deaf-Blind Education, Condra also holds a K-8 teaching certificate and endorsements in various disability specialties. Condra completed her student teaching experiences at the Michigan School for the Blind in Lansing, Minnesota School for the Blind in Fairbault, Minnesota and The Helen Keller School for the Deaf Blind in Talladega, Alabama. "All these experiences taught me how to reach students from a variety of socio economic situations with multiple sensory and learning needs. My goal exiting MSU was to be able to do what I love (work with kids), and be gainfully employed. My degree has afforded me that opportunity throughout my life. I am a true Spartan and bleed green."

Calling it a privilege to be able to work with the students she does, Condra says she loves the challenge of "educating those that may need things done in a 'different way.'

"I have learned so much about life, responsibility and overcoming obstacles from the families and staff I have met along the way. It is these people that truly deserve the award I am being recognized for. It is each of their handprints upon my style of teaching or my way of working with people, that have made me the teacher and person I am today."

Besides teaching, Condra's greatest passion in life is her family, who she calls her greatest source of pride and accomplishment. Married to her "soul mate" and the man who simply "gets her" for 24 years, Condra and her husband, John, have raised four children together. The center of their lives, the Condra children include Colleen, Austin, Bryan and Sara. "Words cannot adequately describe our admiration and love for them," Condra said. "We enjoy spending time out of doors -- especially on the water-being active, working and playing hard. For me, family is everything.'

Thankful and humbled by her Teacher of the Year honor, Condra stresses that while it's in her nature to put her "heart and soul" into everything she is passionate about, it is also the people who surround her, the ones she lives with, works with and interacts with throughout her life that have shaped the person she is today. "I am privileged to work closely with the staff at Ore Creek and realize what an incredible group they truly are," Condra said. "They have a passion and willingness to go the extra mile that is far reaching.

"It is that legacy that celebrates this honor and helps us all realize that how you act and what you do, does affect others," she said. "Perhaps someone whom you have

Archers Hit Their Marks Yet Again

The Hartland High, Middle and Elementary School Archery Teams competed at the National Archery in the Schools Program's (NASP) National Tournament this past weekend in Louisville, KY after qualifying for Nationals by winning all three State Championships earlier this year at CMU. There were nearly 11,000 archers at this year's event, making it the largest archery event in world history (setting a new World Record with the Guinness Book of World Records.

The Hartland Middle School Team competed against 4,501 archers. Hartland Middle School finished in 11th place tying their best National finish ever and shooting a 3317, which is their best tournament score ever! They had four in the Top 100 and 2 in the Top 25! Colin Pajot led the way with an 18th place finish out of 2,477 MS male archers. Congratulations to all of the Archers from the State Season and National Season, along with all of the Coaches and Parents! The Program would not be what it is today without all of YOU!



 The LEGACY program is an alternative high school completion program, established in 1982, and is housed at the Hartland Educational Support Services

 Center. This program accommodates 120 plus students. Students enter this

program through an interview process to gain insight into the issues that have made it difficult to be successful in the traditional school setting. The program provides a smaller, more supportive environment with a great deal of structure. Many students find this more compatible with their needs.

The LEGACY program boasts a fully accredited and rigorous curriculum completely aligned with local, state, and federal standards and benchmarks. All staff members are certified and highly qualified in their respective subjects of expertise. All students are challenged daily in preparation for participation in the State MME assessment and the ACT college entrance exam.

The LEGACY school offers extremely small class sizes, affording students an atmosphere conducive to academic success. Success is possible because of the caring, nurturing staff, which allows the students to become "connected" to school and the work therein. The staff creates a safe environment where all students can learn and grow.

As a work readiness program, approximately 70% of the students are employed and earning additional credits, preparing them for life after high school. With an average graduation rate of 85% and over 60% moving on to college, career training or the military, LEGACY is extremely proud of the end product.





As the number of family members providing care for aging parents increases, the solutions to find help with loss of income be-cause of time off from employment for caregiving has become a major concern for many.

The demands on both the time and energy needed to provide the needed care can make it impossible to maintain both a full time job with full time caregiving.

Seeing a need to give support to family caregivers the federal government Administration on Aging created the National Family Caregiver Support Program.

State Area on Aging division manages this program on the state and community level to offer support services that include:

Information to caregivers about available services;
Assistance to caregivers in gaining access to supportive services;

 Individual counseling, organization of support groups, and caregiver training to assist caregivers in making decisions and solving problems relating to their roles;

Respite care to enable caregivers to be temporarily relieved from their care giving responsibilities; and
Supplemental services, on a limited basis, to

complement the care provided by care-givers.

A Medicaid approved assistance program called

Cash & Counseling may be used to provide funds to hire personal care aides as well as purchase items or services, including home modifications that help them live in-dependently.

The PayingForSeniorCare.com website gives the following information about the program:

"For Medicaid eligible seniors, the process begins with an assessment in the home to determine the senior's home care needs; this includes interviews with caregivers and possibly the senior's physicians. A determination of how many monthly care hours are required is made. The benefit amount is calculated using that determination and cost of care for that geographic area. This amount can be increased or decreased as the senior's needs change. A family care giver may need to qualify as a home health aid by the state to receive these funds."

This program is executed by each individual state Area on Aging Services division. It is a relatively new program and is not yet avail-able in all States. Check with your state Area on Aging Services department for availability.

A totally overlooked source of money to pay family caregivers to provide care at home is the Aid and Attendance Pension Benefit. This money is available to veterans who served during a period of war. Pension money is also available to the widows of these veterans. This benefit, under the right circumstances, can provide

up to \$2,054 a month in additional income to pay family members to provide care at home.

Getting the aid and attendance benefit to pay for family caregivers is not an easy task. This is because there must be a caregiver contract in place, a physician medical evaluation done, income and asset qualifications met and proof of medical expenses provided. Submitting the correct forms and documentation can easily be completed with the help of a VA Accredited Consultant who understands the process.

If the senior being cared for has a long term care insurance policy that covers home care, payment to the care giver from this source could be arranged. Some policies require the care provider to be through a licensed home car agency, but others will pay for individual aides certified as such. This would require some training by the family member to be-come certified. There are policies that pay a daily benefit amount to the insured to use as they want to pay for their care. Check with a long term care insurance professional about types of policies.

In some cases the senior parent has the funds to pay for care. If a family member is giving care it is very important that a caregiver contract be in place. A signed and dated agreement will outline the services provided as well as the amount of pay for these services. The contract will eliminate questions about what is expected from both parent and caregiver as well as providing a legitimate contract and payment record of services to qualify for Medicaid.

Attorney John L Roberts, in his article titled "Caregiver Contracts that Protect Elders and Their Family Members" states:

"A written Caregiver Contract is a good idea for every family that wants to protect family harmony, and make sure everyone in the family understands how care is being provided to an elder.

The family member who provides care can save an elder from needing nursing home services, and may also protect assets if nur-ing home care is needed in the future. Elders who want to cover all of these bases must have a written Caregiver Contract. When-ever adult children and other family members are providing valuable care, only a written agreement will protect assets from nursing home care costs and qualify the elder for Medicaid."

In having the parent pay a family member for caregiving, it will be an employer/employee situation and payroll re-cords must be kept with payroll taxes paid.

This can also be set up by an elder law attorney at the time the contract is done.

Taking the time to create the caregiver con-tract, research the government and state services that are available to caregivers and using community resources will make the family caregiving experience less stressful.




