S ome true "winter weather" has finally made its way to Michigan, but hopefully its stay will be short! Regardless of the weather, the district is in full swing, planning for the 2015/2016 school year. There are a couple of important dates and activities that are happening soon. Please be aware that, as the district does offer transportation to all students residing within Hartland Consolidated Schools, our road checkers are determining whether our buses can safely navigate their routes and it is this information that is used when determining whether to cancel school due to road conditions. I also communicate with the other county superintendents as well as the superintendents in neighboring districts in Genesee County, who have similar protocols in place, before making a final determination. Obviously it is always a difficult call, and regardless of the decision, there are those who disagree. Ultimately, it is parents who make the final call regarding their family's circumstances and what is best for their children. Thank you for your patience and understanding as we head full steam into another Michigan winter.

Kindergeräen Round OP

Mark your calendar for Hartland Consolidated School's Kindergarten Round-Up for the 2015-2016 school year.

Children are eligible for enrollment in kindergarten in September 2015 if they will have their fifth (5th) birthday on or before **September 1, 2015**. A child who turns 5 after September 1 and before December 1, 2015, may enroll if parent/legal guardian notifies the school district in writing no later than August 1, 2015.

A Junior Kindergarten program (half day and/or full day) may be offered on a limited basis. A minimum number of students is required for the program to be made available. Parents may need to provide transportation in order to participate. You may contact Scott VanEpps at 810.626.2111 or scottvanepps@hartlandschools.us for more information.

A 20-minute orientation will begin at 5:30 pm in the Board Room located in the Hartland Educational Support Service Center, 9525 E. Highland Rd, followed by registration in the Performing Arts Center lobby on:

Feb. 17 (Tues)6- 8 pmLast names starting with the letters A-LFeb. 18 (Wed)6- 8 pmLast names starting with the letters M-Z*Please make every effort to enroll your child on the dates provided.

Please bring the following:

- Original birth certificate with seal, plus copy of same certificate
- Immunization records with proof of DTP, Polio, MMR, Hepatitis B, Chicken Pox shots (or proof of having illness), and vision screening, plus copy of record
- Proof of residency-copy of one of the following: certificate of occupancy, purchase agreement, builder's permit, rent receipt or agreement, mortgage statement/payment receipt, voter registration card, utility bill, driver's license

While we need to see the originals, it will expedite the enrollment process if you also bring copies of the originals.

Kindergarten registration packets are now available at the Board of Education office, the Community Education office, each elementary school office and the Hartland Child Care Center (51 Building). You can also download them from our website at **www.hartlandschools.us.**







Supportive, Safe & Consistent

F or nine years, the Hartland Preschool team of Dawn Lukeski and Laura Messner have effortlessly created a classroom which surrounds their students in a caring,

compassionate and consistent learning environment.

It's a place, according to the two teachers, where children and parents both feel safe, supported and nurtured, important factors when considering the beginning stages of their child's education.

"Not only do we provide a consistent and structured environment for our students, but our parents as well," teacher Laura Messner said.



The strength of their classroom dynamic comes from the blending of the two teachers personalities and their ability to mesh and work well together. It's also their commitment to not only their students, but the parents that helps make their classroom special.

"We understand what it is to leave your baby with us," Messner said. "So we always tell parents, we will love your child the way you love your child."

Born and raised in Hartland, Lubeski and Messner are both Hartland alumni and now enjoy the fact that they are teaching many of the children and grandchildren of families they went to school with.

"It's just gives us such a sense of community," Messner said. "We really enjoy it."

While starting the transition of leaving their parents and having fun at school are priorities in their classroom, preparing their young students to be successful in Kindergarten and beyond is the basis of their classroom education.

"We use tools that are fun and functional," Dawn Lubeski said.

Programs such as LEAPS, Handwriting without Tears and Zoo-Phonics are used on a daily basis in Lubeski's classroom, along with one of her favorites, as well as her students, Letter Detectives.

Using a magnifying glass, students become "detectives" as they search the room for letters, writing down their "clues" in their books through the year. It's perfect, yet simple way to subtly teach children that learning is fun.

"The kids love it," Lubeski said. "They think it's a game, but they learn so much!"



Highlights of Dawn Lubeski/Laura Messner Classroom:

Letter Detective: Letter Detective is a fun way to reinforce letters and sounds in our classroom. Students are asked to search for letters in words around the room using their magnifying glass and recording their findings in their books.

LEAPS: LEAPS is a literacy program where students are introduced to a letter through a song followed by activities that go with that letter. There is also a homework piece that students complete and then return to display in the classroom. The students love to see their work displayed!

Zoo-Phonics is one of many ways to teach children phonemic awareness, the building block for literacy. Through active and engaging ways of introducing our letters, children will learn letter sounds and blending. Each letter has an animal, action and a sound associated with it. Our goal is for your children to learn and enjoy our Zoo-Phonics friends.

Handwriting Without Tears: Research supports the active teaching of handwriting. Recent findings demonstrate that writing by hand improves creative writing skills and fine motor skills. Each child has to manipulate tools to create Upper and Lowercase letters.

MEDICARE AND MEDICAID MYTHS

MYTH # 1 Medicare will cover my nursing home expenses.

While Medicare provides some coverage for nursing home expenses, the coverage is quite limited and is not long-term. Medicare covers only up to 100 days of "skilled nursing care" per spell of illness, of which only 80 days are fully covered. The patient must start paying a copayment of up to \$152 per day (as of 2014) from the 21^{st} day to the 100th day unless he or she has supplemental insurance that will cover the copayment. To qualify for Medicare, the patient must enter a Medicare approved "skilled nursing facility" or nursing home within thirty (30) days of a hospital stay that lasted at least three days, and the care in the nursing home must be for the same condition.

MYTH #2 You need to be poor to qualify for Medicaid.

Medicaid helps needy individuals pay for long term care, but you do not need to be completely destitute to qualify. Generally, as of 2014 an individual is allows to have only \$2,000 in assets (excluding a home, one car, and certain life insurances. However, eligibility for Medicaid is not that cut and dried and often depends on the facts of each case. The rules vary depending on whether an individual is looking for "Community Medicaid," which covers some home care costs or "Institutional Medicaid," which covers nursing home costs. Eligibility is also different when the applicant has a spouse. Potential applicants or caregivers are strongly encouraged to explore with an elder law attorney the possibility of qualifying for Medicaid in order to help defray the cost of long-term care.

MYTH #3 A Prenuptial Agreement will protect my assets from being counted if my spouse needs Medicaid.

A Prenuptial agreement only works to keep property separate in the event of death or divorce. It does not keep property separate for purposes of Medicaid eligibility. However, a "sick spouse" may still be eligible for Medicaid even if the "well spouse" has assets. A "well spouse" should explore the eligibility rules with an elder laws attorney.

MYTH #4 I can give away up to \$14,000 a year under Medicaid rules.

The rule that allows gifting up to \$14,000 per year is an Internal Revenue Service (IRS) rule, NOT a Medicaid rule. The IRS allows an individual to gift up to \$14,000 a year without incurring any gift tax liability. However, under Medicaid rules, a gift of \$14,000 or any other significant amount will trigger a penalty period. This means that for approximately every \$14,000 gifted within the 5 year period before a nursing home Medicaid application is filed a penalty (noncoverage) will occur prior to qualification. It is important to note that there is no penalty period on transfers of assets between spouses.

Dispelling the myths should encourage individuals or their caregivers to explore Medicaid as an option to paying for longterm care. Medicaid is definitely a viable alternative for many of us and is commonly used. However, the rules are complex and it is critical to consult with your elder law attorney to ensure no stone is left unturned.

Fire Safety During the Winter Tips from Hartland Fire Marshal Mike Bernardin

This is a quick reminder of the dangers winter can bring in regards to fire safety, and just a few minutes of prevention, can save you or a family members life! Here are my top 5 winter fire safety tips:



1) Test your smoke alarms and carbon monoxide alarms weekly! If you have hardwired / interconnected alarms, test a different one each week!

2) Open your windows! – That's right, take a few seconds every few days or at least once a week, to operate bedroom windows! Make sure that your windows don't get stuck due to the extreme cold temps.

3) Shovel snow outside your doors. Take a few minutes to ensure that all exits from your home are clear of snow. As we begin the last half of winter this month, make sure frost heaving isn't affecting your ability to get out of your home!

4) Do you use a small portion of your roof right outside a second story window? If so, you should have the screens removed (Don't need them anyway) and use a push broom to push the snow away from the window and off the roof from the inside of your house. Even creating a 3-4' spot that is free of snow and ice will prevent you from falling!

5) If you use space heaters, fireplace, or wood stove, be sure to keep combustibles free of the heating source! Start shopping around now for a professional to sweep your chimney once the heating season is over!
