May 8, 2018 Operating Millage Renewal Proposal. Please mark your calendar to vote on Tuesday, May 8, 2018. See the center spread in this edition of Community Life for complete details.

Three Key Questions:

Q: How does the non-homestead tax levy affect my taxes?

A: For a principal residence, this tax does not apply. This tax only applies to non-homestead property and is not new.

Q: What will happen if this proposal does not pass?

A: Because the State of Michigan expects school districts to collect the full 18 mills, the district would lose 4.7 million dollars in operating funds.

Q: Do I vote if I only own homestead property?

A: Yes, all registered voters vote on this proposal.

This is an important ballot proposal for our community to consider. Please get out and vote.

Social Emotional Learning and Life Skills:

The educators in Hartland work hard to ensure that learning goes beyond the core subject areas. Teaching students everyday life skills is necessary as they learn to engage with the world around them. Our Social Emotional Learning Instructional Coach, Mr. Scott Storey, developed the EAGLES program to support teachers with this work. We believe that every person needs to understand how having empathy, striving for achievement, having grit or perseverance, being able to link action to impact, understanding empowerment, and serving the community, impacts them and those around them. It is this work, along with our foundational belief in promoting REASON, RESPECT, and RESPONSIBILITY, that makes Hartland a Premier School of Choice.



I am proud to be the superintendent in a community that understands the importance of helping young people develop life strategies that influence achievement and success.

School Safety:

The National Association of School Psychologists points to research that supports social emotional and mental health support for students. In a recent article (School-Based Mental Health Services: Improving Student Learning and Well-Being), they suggest that "left unmet, mental health problems are linked to costly negative outcomes such as academic and behavior problems, dropping out, and delinquency." The article states that "School mental health supports that encompass social-emotional learning, mental wellness, resilience, and positive connections between students and adults are essential to creating a school culture in which students feel safe and empowered to report safety concerns, which is proven to be among the most effective school safety strategies."

In recent conversations with parents and community members due to the school violence we are seeing, I continue to bring the conversation back to this aspect of school safety. In my opinion, we can put all of the safety features we can think of into our schools; however, unless we focus on building positive relationships among students and between students and adults, all of our efforts may still result in something unimaginable happening. Being a part of the solution to school violence requires all stakeholders to embrace the effort to build a culture where we all feel comfortable sharing what we see and hear. Using social media to bully and spread false rumors does not support this effort. Please continue to emphasize with our youth the power of reaching out to trusted adults when safety concerns arise.

Hartland Schools Person of the Month: Kathi Letovsky

Kathi Letovsky is the Choir Director at Hartland High School. She earned her Bachelor's Degree in Music Education, as well as her Master's Degree in Educational Leadership from Eastern Michigan University. The following is Kathi's "Hartland Story" in her own words. This is my 19th year at Hartland High School and 20th year teaching. At the old high school my husband, Mike Letovsky, was the band/choir director. As his program began to grow, they concluded that they needed to hire a second director. I was split between the middle school and high school. I taught choir and band at the



high school and then went to the middle school and taught two choirs. As my choir program grew, they allowed me to add more choirs, which had me staying at the high school teaching five hours of choir. When we moved to the new school, between the two of us, we had 17 performing groups. Over 200 of those kids were in my program spread out over 6 choirs, one of which being an all men's choir.

My life in Hartland began over 40 Years ago, when my parents, Bill and Judy Shook, and sister Jodi moved here when I was 2 years old. My sister Jodi graduated from Hartland in 1990 (she now lives in Oklahoma with her husband) and I graduated in 1993. Later my dad (Mr. Bill) was custodian at Village elementary and loved every minute of it. My mom and dad still live up the road from the Parshallville Cider Mill and are doing well.

Mike and I will be celebrating our 20th wedding anniversary in June. I met him through connections in music. When he was hired as the new band director at Hartland High School, I went to meet him. We realized that we had met before at Concordia College. We do not have kids of our own as we have over 300 between the two of us! We have followed college careers, attended many concerts and recitals, and many other life events.



Safe Town Enrollment

Safe Town is an early childhood safety education program and is designed for children entering pre-Kindergarten, Kindergarten or First Grade in the fall of 2018. Children learn all aspects of safety through projects, songs, games and presentations and plays.

Part of each day is spent "In the Town" with some of the children being pedestrians and some as the drivers (of 14" or 16" two wheel bikes with training wheels). PLEASE HAVE YOUR CHILD BRING IN THEIR HELMET WITH THEIR NAME ON IT.

This program teaches bus safety, electricity and water safety, dog safety, stranger safety, bike safety and much more. Presenters come each day, crafts supporting the daily theme are completed and children get important information about starting school.

The sessions meet for one week for 4 hours per day. Children should bring their own lunch (nut-free) with a beverage each day.

Transportation Information For the Upcoming School Year!

It's time to starting thinking about busing for the new school year. For your convenience, forms are now being accepted to insure room on every bus to accommodate your transportation needs for the first day of school.

All Transportation Forms (Alternate Destination, Joint Custody, School of Choice, and Legacy forms) will expire at the end of the 17/18 school year. If new forms are not submitted, in-district students will automatically be assigned to the closest bus stop to their home address and non-resident students will not receive a bus assignment.

The deadline for submitting forms to the Transportation Office to request a bus assignment other than the home address is July 1, 2018. Late transportation requests will not be considered until after the first 2 weeks of school.

The Transportation and Central Office staff will be available throughout the summer months if you should have any questions or need assistance. Post cards with your students bus information should arrive a week before the first day of school.

Hartland Consolidated Schools Special School Election



From the Superintendent...

May 8, 2018 - Special School Election

On Tuesday, May 8, 2018, voters in the Hartland Consolidated School District will be asked to renew and restore the full 18 Non-Homestead mills for the schools' operating budget for five years (2019 - 2023). The ballot question asks district voters to keep the same millage rate for non-homestead property, 18 mills, that has existed since Proposal A went into effect in 1994. For residential homestead property owners and qualified agricultural property owners, the renewal and restoration of the 18 non-homestead mills will cost you nothing except the time and energy you expend to go to the polls.

In March of 1994, Michigan voters approved Proposal A. That action completely changed how Michigan public schools would be financially supported in the future. The success of that vote significantly reduced tax millages for people who owned one home (called your homestead). For example, the Hartland Consolidated Schools operating tax millage on homestead property was 37 mills before Proposal A. After the 1994 vote, it was reduced to six mills and remains this amount. The 6 mills are sent directly to Lansing. This and other taxes, such as sales tax, income tax, liquor and cigarette taxes, and lottery revenues all go into making up the dollars for the state School Aid Fund. From these collected monies, the State reimburses school districts with a foundation allowance.

In Hartland our foundation allowance for the 2017/2018 school year is \$7,631 per pupil. Please keep in mind that this is the basic foundation grant promised under Proposal A. The 18-mill Non-Homestead Tax portion of school funding is extremely important for Hartland Schools, equating to approximately 4.7 million dollars in revenue annually. Non-Homestead property is defined as commercial, industrial and second homes such as vacation cottages. Non-qualified agricultural land that is not farmed by the owner is also subject to the 18-mill tax levy. The crux of Proposal A is based on the assumption that each district would collect the full 18 mills on **non-homestead** properties. The law states that the full 18 mills cannot be collected unless it comes before the voters in an election, and the state assumes that school districts are collecting the full 18 mills and does not compensate them for a shortfall if the renewal fails. Those of us that own our homes as our primary residence (our homestead) would continue to pay 6 mills - no more and no less.

If the Non-Homestead millage on non-residential property is not renewed and restored to the full 18 mills allowed by Proposal A, an annual loss in revenue for the school district of approximately 4.7 million dollars will result. The last Non-Homestead Tax millage election was held in May of 2014 for a period of five years. Please remember the 18 mills is what the district needs to be made whole regarding state funding and that this will cost residential homeowners in Hartland nothing more than their time to vote.

Why is a non-homestead renewal important to Hartland Schools?

- The 18-mill tax will equate to approximately **4.7 million dollars in revenue** each year.
- State assumes 100% of the non-homestead tax is collected based on a levy of 18 mills.
- Funds not collected **ARE NOT** made up by the state when allocating monies to our schools for educational purposes.

Is the Non-Homestead renewal something new?

- NO! This tax levy has been in place since 1995.
- Businesses, vacant property and second homes are expected to pay this tax as part of Michigan's school funding program.
- This is a renewal and restoration of the 18 mills last passed in 2014.

If the only property I own in the Hartland district is my home, does this proposal cost me anything?

- **NO!** As stated in the ballot proposal, principal residences and other qualified property are exempt.
- Keep in mind if the proposal is defeated, it will cost Hartland Schools approximately 4.7 million dollars.

The ballot language mentions an increase in the rate. Why?

Because of the requirements in the Michigan Constitution related to annual property tax value increases, the 18 mills were rolled back to 17.9784 in 2016. The district could not levy the full tax rate the voters had approved in 2014 and was not able to collect the expected amount would amount to an increase of \$4.32. of non-homestead tax revenue. This proposal is

to renew the 17.9784 mills and restore the balance of the .0216 mill, bringing the district back to the 18 mills the state assumes the district will levy. For a non-homestead parcel with a taxable value of \$200,000, this restoration



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

What I Have Learned Working with Struggling Teens You Cannot Punish a Child into Good Behavior



I was reminded of this again just last week as a mother came to me in desperation with a teen who was getting in trouble at school, struggling academically, constantly fighting with siblings at home, and most of all, openly defying /rebelling against her. In her frustration, she said: "Sensei, I have taken everything away. Nothing is working!"

Now before you start thinking "my child is not a teen yet" or "my teen is doing fine," read on. I want to share three things I have learned for over the last 14 years working with teens.

- Gift...or Nightmare: As a parent of a teen, this can either be a wonderful time and your reward for being a present and involved parent or, your worst nightmare. I have seen many teens at both extremes. Teens that shine and are a true source of pride. Teens who are unbelievably horrible and difficult or impossible to live with. Either way, they will always be your child. The good and bad news about being a parent is we get clear feedback on how we do. The time and effort you put into your child early when they are young will definitely show up when they are teens.
- You have a limited amount of time: As you raise your child you need to understand and take full advantage of what motivates children. Normally the primary motivator of a child between the age 0 to about 12 is "pleasing their parents" however from about 7th grade on it changes. Be ready for this shift because it is significant. It may vary but in middle school their primary motivator begins to change to "pleasing their peers". Two things to note here. If your teen is not on track and thriving by now your attempts to influence and help them will become much more difficult because you have lost your leverage. Also, if your teen is struggling now they will tend to drift toward peers who are like them, further deepening the downward spiral.

3. You cannot punish a child into good behavior: This is the big one. Punishment rarely works in the long run. And, the more you use punishment the quicker it loses its effect. But we cannot blame you. As a parent, you are very limited in punishments. You can send them to their room, put them on restriction from playing with friends, you can take away privileges or activities, you can take away toys, computers, TV or videos games. What else can you really do? (And corporal punishment does not work.) So, what else can you do? They get smart. They know that you cannot really throw them out of the house.

Now, there should be "consequences" for every wrong or inappropriate behavior. This is different from punishment. For example, if a child bullies or is mean to another child they should have to spend recess inside to protect the bullied child. If a child lies, they should lose your trust and be questioned or doubted the next time. If they cheat or steal they should have a consequence because later it could be a crime. But when we use a punishment such as taking away their video game this is really unrelated to the action, it is a punishment not a consequence linked to the misbehavior. To be very clear consequences and punishments are two completely different things.

In closing, when a teen is constantly being punished they just become frustrated, then angry, then bitter. They begin to give up. This downward spiral is best characterized by something which breaks my heart every time I hear it. It happens when a teen says to me "Sensei, everybody is always yelling at me?!"

So, what can you do? I will write on this in my next article but it is learning the simple parenting skills of "Catching them doing right" and rewarding "Approximations of Success."
