Superintendent's Message Chuck Hughes, Superintendent

As the superintendent of the Hartland Schools, I am continuously impressed with the instruction going on in the classrooms around the district. I have made classroom visits a priority in my first full year, as I want to make sure that I do not lose touch with what is happening on a day-to-day basis. The Board of Education and I plan to tour our schools at least two times this year so we can observe best practice instruction and caring environments in action.



I am sure that you are aware that the latest state assessment results have been shared with the public at www.mischooldata.org. The results are impressive for our students and educators and I am excited to share them with you. Below you will find a chart that represents the percentage of students showing proficiency on each of the state assessment components.

What is most impressive is that while we are hearing and reading that there is concern with how the state performed overall on the assessments, our students continued to increase the gap between state averages and our own. I am often asked the question, should the state change instructional standards once again or stay the course? I share that, in Hartland, we have worked hard to align the ELA and Math curriculums across the district to address the common core state standards. We are currently working on realigning science with the Michigan Science Standards and are preparing to begin work on social studies when and if the State adopts new standards. I am not in favor of changing standards once again because I know how much time and energy has and continues to go into creating engaging and rigorous instruction for our students.





COMMON FAFSA MYTHS:

s guide for students and parents

"We make too much money— my student won't qualify for aid."

Reality: There is no income cut-off for federal student aid. A student's financial aid eligibility is not strictly based on family income—other factors such as number of people in the household and number of family members currently attending college are taken into account. ALL STUDENTS who file the FAFSA are at least eligible for unsubsidized loans.

"My student will not be taking out loans, so there's no reason to file the ${\sf FAFSA}.$ "

Reality: Filing the FAFSA does not require that students and/or parents take any of the aid offered to them. However, filing the FAFSA can give students access to federal grants (if the student qualifies) which do not need to be repaid. Moreover, many colleges use the information provided on the FAFSA to determine who will receive their grants and need-based scholarships. Without a FAFSA on file, aid is not available to students in the event that their situation changes and the student finds that they need the funds.

"I don't want to give out my personal tax information, so I'm not going to file the FAFSA." $\label{eq:continuous}$

Reality: The information you provide on the FAFSA is highly protected and is not different than filing or accessing your tax information through the IRS online. Fafsa.gov is secure government website. Filing the FAFSA will not increase your chances of getting audited, and the information provided on the FAFSA is almost entirely the same as the information already provided to the IRS through filing taxes.

Reality: A number of scholarships, including many provided by individual colleges and by local community foundations, require students to file a FAFSA to be considered.

Prior-Prior Year:

Due to Federal policy change in 2016, students will be able to submit a 2018-2019 FAFSA starting on October 1, 2017. Students will be able to report income and tax information from the tax year two years prior.





Abduction Safety What do I tell my child?

Here are two common questions I have gotten recently: "How old should I start talking to my child about self-defense/abduction safety?" and "What should I tell them?"

How old? As early as possible. Think of it like teaching a child to "look both ways before crossing a street". These are just safety practices they do every day as a normal part of their lives.

What to say? I think this is a much more important question. What prompted and compelled me to make the Facebook video in the first place was most parents, being scared themselves, were unknowingly scaring their children. My basic message was simply "Do not scare your children!"

Using the crossing the street example, what if right after a horrific car/ pedestrian accident in your neighborhood you told your child "There are crazy drivers all over the place. Watch out, it is like they are all trying to run you over!" How would this change your child's behavior and outlook on the world?

Here are some tips on what and how should you tell your child about self-defense and abduction safety:

- 1. Make sure YOU are not in a highly emotional state of anxiety or fear Children will mirror and magnify your emotions. Do not talk to your child about abduction safety right after being on facebook or talking to another parent about the recent abduction attempts. You may not realize it but when you talk to your child in a highly emotional state they cannot help but absorb it, just ten times stronger.
- 2. Paint the world accurately Most of our beliefs about how we see ourselves and our world initially come from our parents. I heard a very funny line the other day "Some people see a glass as half full, while others see it as half empty . . . but others see the half empty glass as poisoned too!" Do you want your child to see this world as amazing and wonderful with 99.9% of people good? How do you think they would live their life differently if they had the negative, paranoid, pessimistic and scared half poisoned belief?

- 3. Choose your words very carefully My number one tip is try never to use the word "stranger". The world is full of strangers and they are actually more likely to be hurt or abducted by someone who is not a stranger to them. What does a stranger look like anyway? A second powerful phrase to use is, do not let anyone "take you away from your family and home". A third word to use is "trick". Here you can say, "Most people in this world are nice, but there are just a few that might try to 'trick' you." These three words are the best way to teach your child without scaring them.
- 4. Teach them simple, easy self-defense strategies and tactics The number one rule of self-defense is "distance". Both children and adults freeze or panic, allowing someone to get too close. Distance buys you time. It is hard for anyone to hurt or take you if you maintain distance. So, we teach our students to immediately put their hands up, use their voice, AND start backing away IMMEDIATELY. Second is "intuition". While backing away, they must run the instant their intuition tells them something is not right. Always trust your intuition. When they run, they are to yell "No, Stop, You are NOT my father (or mother)!"
- 5. Use the actual tricks Teach them the actual tricks child predators and human traffickers use. The top ones are people that look safe, being asked to help, being threatened, and the use of a weapon.
- 6. Don't just tell them They really either need to see an actual live scenario or better yet role play it with stress.

I hope these tips help you keep your child safe,


