#### First Day of School 2019-20:

The intent is to complete the first semester by the start of the Holiday Break and second semester around June 1, 2020. #### **Could There Be A School Bond Proposal Coming To Hartland?**

A task that the Board of Education asked me to complete during this school year was to engage our stakeholders in conversations regarding program and facility upgrades that the district needs to be considering in order to remain a "Premiere School of Choice" district in the State of Michigan. I have been busy visiting with all of our Parent Teacher Organizations, the District Parent Advisory Committee, the Senior Center Advisory Committee, HAYAA & HUFC Youth Board and Coaches, representatives from other youth recreational activities, District Athletic Coaches, and District Staff. At each of these meetings, I have shared a presentation outlining the state of the district and asking the same question, what programs or facilities do we need to be working on in order to remain a Premiere School of Choice district?

I feel it is important that the community knows that the district is currently discussing options for increasing our revenue stream. In past Community Life issues, I have shared how schools continue to be under funded and how the State of Michigan continues to draw funds from the School Aid Fund that are not directly supporting the K-12 public

It is important that we all understand that whenever the district creates new programming, we have to figure out how to pay for it out of the general fund which continues to be stretched to pay for things that past bonds paid for such as technology upgrades and large ticket facility upgrades. What does this mean for the Hartland community? This means that the community may be asked to consider a bond proposal to address long-term facility, technology, and transportation needs. The goal is always to ensure that the district provides relevant and essential programming for student learning, while creating a safe and challenging learning environment. While I am not sure now what this proposal might look like, it is my responsibility to keep the Board of Education and citizens of Hartland current on potential future needs.

#### Kindergarten Enrollment 2019-2020

Kindergarten enrollment packets will be available on February 1, 2019



#### **Kindergarten Orientation**

A Kindergarten Orientation will be held on Saturday, February 16, 2019, from 10 AM to 11:30 AM at the Hartland Educational Support Service Center, 9525 E. Highland Road (M-59).

The orientation will provide parents an opportunity to hear from kindergarten teachers about a "typical" school day and the kindergarten curriculum. In addition, administrators will be on hand to talk about school safety, transportation, school attendance areas, student nutrition, and answer questions. This will be a family-oriented event and you are encouraged to bring your kindergarten child(ren).

Hartland Consolidated Schools will be accepting kindergarten enrollment packets beginning February 1, 2019 at the Board of Education office and each elementary school office during office hours. Enrollment packets can also be downloaded from our website at www.hartlandschools.us.

In addition to the enrollment packet, the following documents must be presented when registering:

- Original birth certificate with seal, plus a copy for school records
- Immunization records with proof of DTP, Polio, MMR, Hepatitis B, Chicken Pox vaccines (or proof of having illness), and vision screening, plus copy of same for school records
- Proof of residency using one of the following: certificate of occupancy, purchase agreement, builder's permit, rent receipt or agreement, mortgage statement/receipt, voter registration cared, utility bill, driver's license

Children are eligible for enrollment in kindergarten in September 2019 if they will have their fifth (5th) birthday on or before September 1, 2019. A child who turns 5 after September 1st and before December 1, 2019 may enroll if parent/legal guardian signs a waiver and it is supported by the school district.

A full-day Junior Kindergarten program may be offered. A minimum number of students are required for the program to be made available. Parent may need to provide transportation in order to participate. The age requirements for Junior Kindergarten are the same as for the regular Kindergarten program. #### School Bus Safety: Running Late to the Bus

Should my students cross the road before the bus arrives: All students loading/unloading the bus are required to wait on the same side of the road that they reside on, a minimum of 10 feet off the roadway, and be clearly visible to the bus driver through their front windshield. The bus driver needs to see the student and the student needs to see the bus driver. Students crossing the road must cross in front of the bus and wait for the bus driver to display the safety signal.


What to do if your student misses the bus: Parents should never try to catch up with the bus. Never assume that the bus driver knows that you are following the bus. Your student approaching from the rear of bus puts your student inside the Danger Zone without the driver knowing. You really only have 2 options at that point: drive your student to school, or call transportation to make possible arrangements to take your student to another bus stop. Communication and keeping your student out of the Danger Zone are most important things we can do.

#### From the Counseling Office: All Seniors Are Encouraged To File For Financial Aid

Hartland High School is aiming for the senior class to have a 100% completion rate of the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). It has been proven that students who fill out the FAFSA are more likely to follow through on their post-secondary plans, and many schools no longer give out merit scholarships to students who do not apply for financial aid through the FAFSA.

If you have not yet applied for financial assistance, it's not too late. Students/parents should go to www.fafsa.gov to complete their application. The process is free and can make a tremendous difference in your child's ability to pay for their postsecondary education. In order to encourage FAFSA completion, the high school Counseling Office has partnered with Buffalo Wild Wings. Any senior who has completed their FAFSA is eligible for free wings! Seniors should stop by the Counseling Office for more information.

Parents who are looking for additional resources to help pay for their child's post-secondary education should know that the HS Counseling Office publishes a monthly scholarship newsletter called <a href="The Scholarship Gazette">The Scholarship Gazette</a>. The newsletter contains all of our current scholarship applications and contains a list of sites that will help you conduct scholarship searches. #### Three Hartland Middle School Students And Teacher Hit The Woods

As a teacher and avid outdoorsman, I was honored to take three of my students, who have life challenges, on a whitetail deer hunt of their dreams. This was made possible by The Foundation for Hope, Cedar Creek Ranch and the Hartland Youth Outdoors Club. Each year the foundation looks for children with life challenging or life threatening issues who love the outdoors. They look for kids who want to enjoy outdoor activities like fishing and hunting, but due to their circumstances feel they may never truly get a chance to do these things. These students want to forget about the things that make them struggle and simply feel the enjoyment of being outdoors with others.

Luckily, three of my students from Hartland Middle School were selected to fill 10 of the open spots for this year. Aiden Steven and his father were able to go the first weekend of October and Charlie Flynn, along with his father and Evan Bretsik, along with his father all attended the second camp on the second week of November – and I was able to be there with all of them!

The first weekend on October found Aiden Stevens in a blind with his father and a full TV camera crew. No pressure there—but Aiden, who is a cancer survivor, was able to harvest a huge 11-point whitetail. The footage was all caught on tape and will be aired on a TV show called "Dreampoint Outdoors — Game of

Inches." I was there with Aiden and his father and can truly say there were many tears of joys shed as Aiden walked up to his deer. We were all so excited to see him with his dream whitetail.

The second weekend in November would not disappoint. Charlie and Evan had a great time at camp. I taught them how to play billiards and they played pool almost non-stop when at camp and not in the blind. Charlie filled his tag first when he harvested a magnificent 9 point. Charlie has medical conditions, which has him confined to a wheelchair most of the time. Watching him use the guardian shooting system to shoot his deer, wheeling himself (with a little help) out to his downed buck and literally jumping out of his chair to hold up the buck for photos was priceless! Evan Bretsik battles several medical conditions and struggles to get around at times as well. Evan held out to the last day and was the last hunter to tag out. You know the old saying, "Patience pays off." Well it did for Evan. He harvested a gigantic 10 point! He moved to a new blind the last night and sat in very cold conditions, but the deer of his dreams finally came in and he was able to make a great shot on his deer.

Being there with my students and their parents was awesome and we shared memories that will last a lifetime. I cannot thank the Foundation for Hope enough for making this possible for these youngsters!

#### Parenting 101: How did you learn to be parent?

Parenting is not easy but the payoff can be huge. We hold a "Parent Orientation" where we share some simple yet powerful tips with our parents. Here are a few of them:

- 1. Boredom is a good word. Stop trying so hard to keep your children from being bored. Boredom is GOOD for them. Only through boredom can they develop the critical success skills of mastering the repetitious and mundane and delaying gratification. Let them "just sit" in a car. Let them "just sit" at a restaurant. Let then "just sit" in a doctor's office. Let them "just sit" at karate/sports. Let them figure out what to do. I read a very good article recently—kids today are not entitled, they are really just impatient!
- 2. Role Shift. This one is huge. If you just do one, do this one! Make sure you shift roles from caregiver/teacher to manager/coach to consultant/mentor as your child ages. Many parents stay in the caregiver/teacher mode. This will develop weak, dependent kids who will struggle with the slightest challenge, failure or stress. They will also not be able to take any risks. They will be perfectionists and fear failure. At what ages should you make the shifts? Use this—the number one motivator of normal kids before about seventh grade is "pleasing their parents." After seventh grade it shifts to "pleasing their peers."
- 3. Do not over-protect. They used to be called Helicopter Parents. Now the term is Lawnmower or Bulldozer Parents. Boredom, fear, hardship, failure, problems and stress are good for your child. Kids need to skin their knees and eat dirt. This is how they get stronger and more courageous. You want your child to live a good life NOT an easy life. The key? See #2 above—just make sure to shift your roles!

- Make them do things they do not want to do. Here is the secret—
  the only way to develop the ability to work hard is to make them
  do things they do not want to do! I often get a parent who asks
  "Sensei, should I make my child do something they do not want to
  do?" My answer is "YES, and as often as you can!" This is what
  develops discipline. Just remember discipline is simply the ability
  to do things you do not want to do. When they say they do not want
  to do something, try not to pass up that learning opportunity.
- 5. Make them wait. The two best indicators of future success of a child is their ability to delay gratification and use resourcefulness. Just notice every time you give your child something quickly and easily. For instance, when they interrupt you for something or they want something. The most powerful words you can learn to use are "Oh, can you wait just a second?" Then about a minute or two later say "Thank you for waiting. Okay, now what was it you wanted?"
- 6. Punishing a child into good behavior does not work. It may work in the short run. But here is what almost always happens. I get a parent of a teen saying in frustration "I have taken everything away!" Just remember the #1 motivator of children before 7th grade is pleasing their parents. Use this by "catching them doing something right." Positive reinforcement takes more work and patience but the payoff is huge.

I hope these tips help. Even using just one can change you as a parent!

#### Greenhouse to Be Built at the Hartland Teen Center!

The HERO (Hartland Enrichment & Recreation Organization) Teen Center is excited to announce Livingston County and Hartland Township approval of plans to build a 20 x 28 foot hoop house as a "temporary accessory structure" on the Hartland Township property where HERO Teen Center is located (3191 Hartland Road, next to Hartland Fire Department). The structure's funding is provided by a \$7,500 grant from The Livingston County Farm Bureau (LCFB) and additional funds from H.E.R.O. The hoop house, commonly known as a greenhouse, will be used to provide educational experiences for the teens in healthy eating, growing your own food, and giving to others who need healthy produce in their diets. Mr. Matt Germane, HERO Vice President and LCFB Board Member, wrote the grant application last summer. He said, "This is an important way to teach students the value of farming and agriculture; the grant aligns with the LCFB's objectives to educate the public on agriculture's importance to non-farmers and the overall state economy." Kay Fountain, President of the HERO, said, "The Teen Center Directors and teens are excited to see this project move forward. With our summer hours likely to increase in 2019, the teens will have more hands-on, real experiences helping themselves and others."

The HERO Teen Center won a Hartland SOUP proposal grant in January 2018 which will be used to put raised beds in the hoop house. (More about Hartland SOUP on Facebook and at www.cromaine.org). More funds are needed to fully outfit the hoop house for year-round growing. The hoop house framing will be up by the end of December 2018. Vent fans, misters, drip lines, plus cultivation tools--all are equipment to be added in 2019. Donations to H.E.R.O. may be tax deductible, as it is a 501(c)3 nonprofit. More community helpers are welcome, too, to assist the teens in choosing crops, planning the beds, caring for, and harvesting, as well as what to do with the harvest--cooking, preserving, and sharing the produce.
