## Kindergarten Enrollment 2019-2020

Hartland Consolidated Schools is now accepting kindergarten enrollment packets at the Board of Education office and each elementary school office during office hours. Enrollment packets can also be downloaded from our website at www.hartlandschools.us.

In addition to the enrollment packet, the following documents must be presented when registering:

- Original birth certificate with seal, plus a copy for school records.
- Immunization records with proof of DTP, Polio, MMR, Hepatitis B, Chicken Pox vaccines (or proof of having illness), and vision screening, plus copy of same for school records.
- Proof of residency using one of the following: certificate of occupancy, purchase agreement, builder's permit, rent receipt or agreement, mortgage statement/receipt, voter registration card, utility bill or driver's license.

Children are eligible for enrollment in kindergarten in September 2019 if they will have their fifth (5th) birthday on or before September 1, 2019. A child who turns 5 after September 1st but before December 1, 2019 may enroll if parent/legal guardian signs a waiver and it is supported by the school district.

A full-day Junior Kindergarten program may be offered. A minimum number of students are required for the program to be made available. Parents may need to provide transportation in order to participate. The age requirements for Junior Kindergarten are the same as for the regular Kindergarten program. ## Did you know the Transportation office is open throughout the summer?

Just as one school year ends, Transportation begins working on the next. Our office is open and staff will be available to accept forms and answer any questions you may have throughout the summer.

Efficient routes are created based on current busing forms (School of Choice, Joint Custody, and Alternate Destination) and enrolled student addresses. All busing forms are destroyed at the end of each school year, and new forms are required annually by July 1st to be assured of a seat on the proper bus. As we cannot assume anything, every year your student will be assigned to your home address unless a new form is submitted. All forms can be found at www.hartlandschools.us/Departments/Transportation/Forms.

Busing forms are required for:

- Students who are using a stop other than their home stop for morning or afternoon, or both morning and afternoon (Alternate Destination form)
- School of Choice students (School of Choice form)
- Students whose parents live in separate homes within the district (Joint Custody form)

Postcards will be mailed home a week before school starts with each student's bus information. If you have any questions, please give our office a call.

#### The admission essay is an important part of any college application. Some schools give more weight to the essay than others, but if an essay is required, you can bet it's going to be used in school to work with first

#### Don't:

- Don't choose offensive topics. Topics that maybe offensive are those that surround religion, racism and even personal opinions on world issues. You won't be doing yourself any favors if your essay leaves the admissions officer offended.
- Don't let anyone else dictate the topic of your essay. You can get help brainstorming if you want, but don't write about someone else's chosen topic.
- Don't write a negative essay. The more positive you are with the topic, the more enjoyable the essay will be to read.
- Don't be arrogant or pedantic in your writing. Admissions officers will see it, and arrogance will work against you in the admissions process.

The Community Council meets the first Monday of the month, starting in September and wrapping up with the June meeting. The meeting begins at 6:30 PM and adjourns promptly no later than 7:30 PM. New faces are always welcome, along with new ideas. # **Essential Instructional Practices in Early Literacy**

Here, at Hartland Preschool, we have adopted the ten recommended instructional practices as developed by the Early Literacy Task Force. Each month we will be exploring the practices that we perform in our classrooms. These important tips not only demonstrate what we practice in the preschool classrooms but are also important to nurture a well-rounded child as they enter elementary school and beyond.

The Instructional practices were developed by the *Michigan Association of Intermediate School Administrators General Education Leadership Network (GELN) Early Literacy Task Force (2016). Essential instructional practices in early literacy: Prekindergarten, Lansing, MI: Authors.* 

# Highlighting the 5th essential practice—Brief, clear, explicit instruction in letter names, the sound(s) associated with the letters, and how letters are shaped and formed.

There are many ways we incorporate letters and their sound in the classroom. Each week we study a different letter of the alphabet, the sound it makes and then we practice writing that letter. In preschool the children write their own name on their projects. To help form the letter correctly we use the Handwriting without Tears curriculum. It breaks down the letter into lines and curves and it helps the children see the formation of the letters. When writing the letter Xx we tell the students to start at the top and slide down (diagonally), jump to the top and slide down to the other side, while demonstrating it at the same time. Along with letter formation we use Zoo-Phonics to help the students with the letter sound, i.e. X is for Xavier Fox: cross fingers and give the letter sound /ks/. This is a great way to incorporate letter sounds with a letter while the children have fun. Throughout the week we have fun games and activities to go along with each letter. In our literacy center we provide a wide range of books all with a focus on the letter of the week. During group time the books we choose allow us to demonstrate the letter and its sound. Throughout the day we are always working on letters and their sounds and it is great to see them begin to notice all the letters around the room and the sound they make.



# Highlighting the 8th and 10th essential practices—Abundant reading materials and collaborating with families to promote literacy.

Consistent exposure to literacy is a very important piece to helping children learn about our language and begin to learn the skills needed to begin reading. All of our classrooms have age appropriate texts available for children to explore at all times of the day. Read-alouds are a part of our daily routines, and sometimes even incorporate the use of technology. Our rooms are filled with students' names, labels of objects around the room, color words, the alphabet, and other pieces of written text in play areas. For example, in the dramatic play area, we have recipes and menus for children to play and become familiar with seeing text in different aspects. As we read different stories together and learn new letters and concepts, children notice the similarities in their play and are able to connect their new knowledge. It is a goal of all of our teachers to extend the learning we do in the classroom to the children at home. We explain to parents when they pick up at the end of the class all that we learned about during class and things they can do at home with their child to continue the topic. We continually recommend building book exposure for reading and learning at home through class book orders, recommendations from what we learn in class, and even sending books home for children to borrow and read with their families. Literacy throughout our daily routine is crucial to the development of our young learners, and as teachers, we strive to provide the best opportunities for our students.






