Superintendent's Corner

With general elections upon us, school funding and legislation may or may not change once voters cast their ballots and the new legislative body begins its work. As part of my job, I must continually ask, what should I be doing as the Superintendent to prepare for the unknown? I must ensure that the Board of Education is current on Federal, State and Local legislation. With this information, the Board of Education provides guidance as to the direction of the district, and sets goals that they feel will put us in the best position to remain a "premier school of choice district."



Some issues that will be decided in the future by our legislators include

analyzing the School Finance Research Collaborative, which was developed by two of the nation's leading school funding research groups. This report strongly suggests that Michigan must get serious about reforming school funding if the state has any chance at meeting its Top 10 in 10 goal. The Collaborative has found that Proposal "A" (1993) created an avenue for equalizing funding for all school districts and children with the thought being that regardless of zip code, all children must have the same educational opportunities. While it has been fairly successful (a much smaller group of school districts receives more than the base allocation), the reality is that schools are clearly not a funding priority according to the School Finance Research Collaborative report.

Did you know that Proposal "A" was approved by Michigan voters to fund Public Education? Did you know that this year approximately \$908,000,000 of the School Aid Fund (SAF) will be directed to colleges and universities. If the State of Michigan funded colleges and universities out of the general fund, it would mean that K-12 school districts would be receiving roughly \$611.00 more per pupil this year, or \$3,360,500 available for Hartland's operational budget. Did you know that larger geographical school districts like Hartland spend a disproportion of their budget on transportation, a built in inequity? This year we will spend just about 3.2 million dollars on transportation alone. Together the citizens of Michigan must insist that K-12 education be a priority within our legislative body.





Danger Zones Around the School Bus

- The "Danger Zone" is the area surrounding the bus where it's difficult to see children in the bus mirrors.
- 20 feet in front, 10 feet behind and 10 feet on each side of the school bus.

Loading and Unloading Safely:

- STAY on your own side of the road -10 feet from the roadway, in a single row.
- WAIT until the bus has come to a complete stop, the red overhead lights are activated, and the driver displays the yellow safety signal.
- When crossing the road, **check** traffic both ways then check again and walk 10 feet in front of the bus.
- **NEVER** stop to pick-up anything on the ground.

From the Counseling Office: What you need to file the FAFSA

- 1. Go to the right website! The Free Application for Financial Student Aid (FAFSA) application can be found at www.fafsa.ed.gov. If you are on a website that tries to charge you, it is a scam. For special circumstances, there is a paper FAFSA that can be printed out and completed; however we do not suggest you file on paper because it takes several weeks to process and is harder to complete.
- 2. Set up your FSA ID before you file. Students and one parent (for dependent students) will need an FSA ID, which includes a user name and password, in order to file a FAFSA. This is used both to log in and as your electronic signature on the FAFSA. Make sure to keep this information in a secure location or choose something that you will easily remember as you will need it to make any changes on the FAFSA, file the FAFSA in the future, and fill out information to receive loans at www.student-loans.gov. It generally takes 1-3 days for the FSA ID to become fully operational, so it is a good idea to do this process at least a few days before starting the FAFSA. Please note the that the FSA ID has replaced the PIN number on all federal websites.
- 3. There are many things you will either need to know or need in-hand in order to fill out the FAFSA and to create your FSA ID. This may include:* social security number (both student and parent[s]); driver's license (if any) or state ID; permanent resident receipt card (if applicable); W-2 forms and other 2016 records of money earned; 2016 income tax return; records of child support paid; records of taxable earning from Federal work study or other need-based work programs; and records of student grant, scholarship and fellowship aid–including AmeriCorps awards that were included in student or parent AGI– along with current stock, bond and other investment records, current business and farm records, and current bank statements.
- * Many students will not need all of these documents. What exactly is needed for each individual student depends on income and other factors, but all students will need social security numbers, W-2s, and tax forms.

- The student must exhibit a positive attitude toward school, self, and others.



Karate is Scary, Hard and Boring

How are we supposed to get parents to put their child in karate with this thinking? This is what I tell every parent, yet we still have so many students. How does that happen? Well, let me back up a little and it may make more sense.

When I started this karate school 16 years ago, I needed to get enough students just to keep the doors open. I thought I had to teach karate and make it FUN. So, we played a lot games and tried to make everything fun. Well, I learned very quickly from our parents this was not what they really wanted. It clearly was not about being "fun" and something their kids "liked." Fun and like were not what parents demanded from us and even more importantly, not what their children needed. This is when I began to discover we had something powerful in our hands. What did we have? First let me go back even further.

The world of a child and the world of raising a child is much different than when we grew up. There are two things that have contributed to the difficulty of raising children today – <u>technol-ogy</u> and parents unknowingly <u>over-protecting</u> their children. To make a long story short, these two things create a completely new and different environment where everything comes so fast and too easy for children. We do want to protect our children and help them live a good life but we do not want them to live an "easy" life. If every child is always told they are the smartest or prettiest, if every child gets a trophy or we step in and handle all of their problems and stresses, they develop into "weak" children.

What do I mean by weak? Well the schools are uncovering a crisis. Children have four areas of development – physical, cognitive, emotional and social. We are doing fairly well in the first two but in the last two our children are falling further and further behind. Physically, because of advances in nutrition and medicine, our children are more advanced than we were. (Except in the area of fitness.) Cognitively they know far more than we did. Our schools are doing a great job. (Just try helping your child with their homework!) But for the last two our children are struggling and falling behind. Emotionally, young children are slow in developing basic self-regulating skills like focusing, listening, following directions and keeping their hands to

themselves. They have difficulty handling frustration and anger. As they get older they cannot handle setbacks or when things get hard. They quit or give up too easily. As they get even older, many are debilitated with anxiety, fear and sometimes anger. What ever happened to work ethic?

I think I don't have to say much about what is happening to our kids socially. Kids struggle to make friends, cannot read social cues and cannot look people in the eye. Remember when teens used to get in trouble at the shopping malls. Do you know where they socialize now? In their bedrooms on their smartphone.

Okay, so now we can get back to the first question. What I learned from our parents is that they wanted help make their children stronger. I don't mean just stronger physically, they desire to make their children stronger emotionally and socially. So, we evolved by listening to our parents and educators in the schools.

Our dojo has naturally developed into a unique and safe place where parents can bring their children to develop into strong thriving young adults. You can only develop strength and courage under four good stresses – **fear, hardship, failure and boredom.** Courage can only be developed in the presence of fear. Hard work, persistence and perseverance can only be developed by doing hard things you want to give up or quit. Boredom develops delayed gratification, creativity and curiosity. Children need these are strong emotional experiences.

There is not enough room here to go into each in detail, but I tell parents that in order to set up your child for success here, you need to be ready for your child to get scared, think this is too hard and get bored. Like working a muscle, they need these four stresses consistently every day to get stronger.

This is why karate is scary, hard and boring.

World Polio Day is October 24th. The Hartland Rotary Club is among millions reaching out to raise awareness, funds and support to end polio – a vaccine preventable disease that still threatens children in parts of the world today.

Since Rotary and its partners launched the Global Polio Eradication Initiative 30 years ago, the incidence of polio has plummeted by more than 99.9 percent, from about 350,000

cases a year to just 22 cases in 2017. To sustain this progress, and protect all children from polio, Rotary has committed to raising US \$50 million per year in support of global polio eradication efforts. The Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation will match Rotary's commitment 2:1. Without full funding and political commitment, this paralyzing disease could return to previously polio-free countries, putting children everywhere at risk. Rotary has contributed more than \$1.8 billion to ending polio since 1985.
