On May 5 residents of Hartland Consolidated Schools will vote on a \$45 million bond proposal. The bond proposal was designed to keep Hartland Consolidated Schools' facilities and instructional spaces up-to-date by addressing needs in four major categories: 1) renovating, upgrading, and constructing school facilities, including safety and security improvements, 2) upgrading technology and technology infrastructure, 3) upgrading athletic facilities, and 4) replacing school buses as they reach the end of their useful life

April 2020 Person of the Month: Margaret Bandkau



I have been the Title I intervention teacher at Farms Intermediate School for the past ten years. Prior to that I taught both 5th and 6th grades and was a long-term substitute teacher in the district for 6 years. I earned a Bachelor's degree in Secondary Education/English Language Arts and my Elementary Education certification from Eastern Michigan University. Additionally I have a Master's in Reading from Oakland University and have been Reading Recovery trained through the Genesee Intermediate School District (GISD)/Oakland University.

When my family decided to move to Livingston County 35 years ago, we only knew that whatever house we chose, it had to be in a premier school district. Although my college roommate, who graduated from Hartland Schools, had always insisted it was the best district "in the state," I felt the need to do my own research. Needless to say, we moved into the Hartland School District, from which my two sons began kindergarten and graduated from high school.

I am the product of twelve years of parochial education, so for me, sending my first-born to a public school was an enormous leap of faith, but I have never regretted my decision to do so. From the time they started at Lakes, through their time at Farms, then Ore Creek and finally the "new" high school, I have been amazed at the dedication, compassion, insight, knowledge and spirit of the teachers and administrators whose instruction my sons have had the privilege of experiencing. I am proud to say that they are both successful professionals. One is a Lawrence Technological University graduate and the other a Michigan State University

Spartan for Life. I feel strongly that much of their success is due to their teachers and Hartland Schools.

Before I began teaching in Hartland, I often volunteered to work with students in classrooms in order to support teachers. One of my favorite "assignments" was when each of my sons was in first grade and I had the pleasure of running a "Writer's Workshop" in their classrooms. As my kids got older, I decided that I really wanted to be back in the classroom, so I started guest teaching in the district and taught at every level, from kindergarten through twelfth grade.

After several long-term assignments at Farms, I made the decision to go back to school to get an elementary endorsement and have been teaching at Farms, full time, ever since.

Although every grade level is uniquely special, I really love working with 5th and 6th graders. This is the time period when they begin to become a little more responsible and a lot more independent. As the Title I teacher, I am honored to work with small groups of students, to provide additional support in either math or reading, or both, and, more importantly, to hopefully instill in them a love of reading and the self-confidence needed to tackle our sometimes-grueling math curriculum. Working on the Instructional Consultation Team (ICT) in an effort to "Make the Match" and ensure success for all students at Farms, as well as my training in Reading Recovery, have greatly aided me in my teaching.

I feel extremely fortunate to be able to teach at Farms alongside such a great group of dedicated teachers and administrators who both challenge and inspire us to be the best we can be and make coming to school enjoyable.

It is difficult to put into words what the Hartland School District has meant to me and my family. Essentially, it is HOME and everything that entails. I wouldn't trade it for anyplace else.

Hartland Bond Proposal on May 5th Ballot

Dear Hartland Community,

On May 5th residents will vote on a \$45 million bond proposal designed to fund improvements at all Hartland Consolidated Schools' facilities.

The district worked for over a year with construction and architectural specialists to conduct an in-depth facility study while the district administrative team developed a list of potential bond proposal projects. The final list of projects was developed after obtaining feedback from parent-teacher organizations, senior citizen voters, HAYAA representatives, archery, music, and robotics advocates, school administrators, teachers, and school district coaches. In addition, the proposed list of projects was presented to a series of focus panels composed of various school district constituents.

Every project in the bond proposal was reviewed and approved

by the Michigan Department of Treasury. If approved by voters, the bond proposal will affect every Hartland student and every Hartland school facility.

The \$45 million bond proposal will require a 1.44 mill increase in the current tax rate. This increase would cost \$169.20 per year, or about 46¢ per day for the average Hartland Township homeowner. Many Hartland Township homeowners may pay less than that.

The bond proposal is designed to support the school district's plan to provide even more educational opportunities for students and benefits to the community. I believe that voter approval of the bond proposal will reflect positively on homeowner property values.

Communicating about the bond proposal has been a primary focus over the past few months and will continue to be a

primary focus. We want to make sure residents understand the impact of a successful bond for our students and our community.

Kindergarten Enrollment 2020-2021

Kindergarten enrollment packets are now available online at hartlandschools.us. Parents may begin the enrollment process online and complete the enrollment when visiting their respective elementary school or the HESSC and providing the following documents:

- Birth certificate—a copy for school records.
- Immunization records with proof of DTP, Polio, MMR, Hepatitis B, Chicken Pox vaccines (or proof of having illness), and vision screening, plus copy of same for school records.
- Proof of residency using one of the following: certificate of occupancy, purchase agreement, builder's permit, rent receipt or agreement, mortgage statement/receipt, voter registration card, utility bill, driver's license.

Children are eligible for enrollment in kindergarten in August 2020 if they will have their fifth (5th) birthday on or before September 1, 2020. A child who turns five after September 1st and before December 1, 2020 may enroll if parent/legal guardian signs a waiver that is supported by the school district.

A full-day Junior Kindergarten program may be offered. A minimum number of students are required for the program to be made available. Parent may need to provide transportation in order to participate. The age requirements for Junior Kindergarten are the same as for the regular Kindergarten program. 

The 85th Memorial Day event is around the corner—May 24 and May 25! The planners in the Hartland Area Community Council are making every effort to bring another well-organized parade and we are counting on you, and good weather, for it to be well attended.

For print ads in our parade booklet, a table or booth at Eply Park or to be in the parade, fill out the form on our website www.hartlandcommunitycouncil. org. The deadline for the booklet is April 13th and the deadline for tables and booths is May 4th. The deadline to be in the parade is May 15th.

Memorial Day weekend events begin on Sunday, May 24th with The Evening Salute to Our Heroes in the Hartland Burial Ground—the cemetery across from Cromaine District Library on Hartland Road. Hartland High School History Club students will re-enact the heroes who "reside" in the cemetery between 6 and 7 PM. The memorial service begins at 7 PM and Taps will be played to end the service. Do not miss this moving event, an integral part of the Memorial Day commemoration for many years. The Hartland Band Boosters Pancake Breakfast fundraiser at Village Elementary (7:30-10:30 AM) and services in both Parshallville and Hartland cemeteries precede the parade which kicks off at noon on Monday, May 25th from the Hartland Middle School at Ore Creek.

Maps showing road closures and parking lots are available at locations throughout the community. No roadside parking is permitted; entry to the parade staging area (Hartland Road from Dunham to Crouse) is prohibited once the roads close.



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

Are we overprotecting our children? Are we really asking the right question?

Instead of writing in generalities or concepts, I feel it's much more powerful and valuable to share actual situations or questions I encounter from our parents. Here is part of a recent email from a mother with a very common question. (I have changed the names.)

"...My daughter Kreslyn is very shy and reserved around other people and I'd like her to build some confidence before starting kindergarten in the fall. She was born with hearing and speech problems and is also an only child so I suppose she's always been a bit overprotected. Sometimes I don't feel like I'm challenging her enough. But since she's so sensitive it can be hard to know when is the right time to push and when to let things go. I guess I want to make sure I do everything I can to help her reach her potential and teach her that the best things in life come from doing things that are difficult..."

Here is part of my response back: "...You can tell Kreslyn I was also very shy when I was young. Shyness is near and dear to my heart. I wish someone had taught me when I was young that shyness is just a fear. I love to teach children and parents the phrase "Every time I back away from a fear the FEAR gets bigger, but every time I power through a fear I get bigger!" Being sensitive is a very good thing in all children, but it should never be allowed to be an excuse or crutch for backing away from anything."

Here is the key to how you (and we) can help Kreslyn. Make Kreslyn face discomfort often and help her power through it. Then make her do things she does not want to do often. Both have to be done consistently and frequently. The intensity of these emotions need to be increased with success and time. This builds "strong" children. Doing the opposite develops weak children. Tell Kreslyn karate is hard work. Kids need to skin their knees and eat dirt!

Don't worry it is very natural for parents to protect their children. Parents have to work hard to stand back. I am sure you have seen this on the internet recently: "First child eats

dirt, parent calls the doctor. Second child eats dirt, parent cleans out his mouth. Three child eats dirt, parent wonders if she really needs to feed him lunch."

So, "Are we overprotecting our child?" Let's start by backing up a little. When human babies are born they need someone 24/7 to care and do almost everything for them in order to survive. Thank goodness mothers are hard wired to do this! But this can work against us as our children grow up. Add to this the excessive and counterproductive fear and paranoia we have for everything from abductions, to the flu, to school shootings, to bad weather. No wonder we

never let them play outside on their own. We solve all their problems and we cover them in anti-bacterial soap.

I believe the question is not "Are we overprotecting our children?" but instead "Are we SHIFTING our roles as parents as our children grow and develop?"

If we treat and care for our children like we did in their first six months of life they will become weak. The four good stresses of fear, hardship, failure and boredom makes us stronger! You need to shift your role as a parent so your children get the progressively higher levels of the good stress they need in order to grow strong.

Here is the key, you need to make these role shifts as a parent to raise strong, independent and successful children. You must go from Caregiver/Teacher to Manager/Coach to Consultant/Mentor. When the shift occurs may be different for each child but I think if you are perceptive it will be easy to tell.

So, the real question is: Are you shifting your role as a parent? Are you still treating your 8 year old more like a six month old? How about your 13 year old? Now about your 18 year old?



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
