May 5, 2020 Bond Proposal Changes Made After Listening to Focus Group Members:

Last month I shared that the district hosted six focus groups to review the administrative draft of a May 2020 bond proposal, which was prepared after many community and internal conversations throughout the 2018-19 school year. The purpose of the focus groups was to determine if the needs, wants and concerns of the community should cause a change to the draft bond proposal. The district sent out 251 invitations for community members to participate in these meetings and had 32% (81 individuals) attend.

After listening and considering the effect that changes would have on what the district can borrow, while keeping a 1.44 mill increase, some changes were made. These changes include finishing the high school athletic facilities including the main stadium (a new home team locker room, storage and home stand concession building along with adding an artificial playing field), adding space for our robotics teams to practice and increasing the dollars available to purchase furniture and equipment for the new elementary STEM Collaboration Centers.

Many community members have contacted me to find out what the final bond proposal includes as a result of the focus group process. The current proposal includes necessary components to ensure that Hartland Schools remains a "premier school of choice" district. The categories include:

- Instructional Technology and Infrastructure:** The district must maintain a replacement schedule to ensure current technology devices (chrome books, desktops, printers, projection devices, etc.), servers and network gear are available to support instruction for students and staff.
- Instructional Improvements:** Add Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math (STEM) centers to modernize the media centers in each elementary school K-6, converting media centers to collaboration centers in the middle school and high school (books remain a relevant component in these spaces). Refurbish all three theater spaces with new fire code approved curtains, lighting and technology that has worn out.
- Facility Improvements:** Replacement of select parking lots, driveways and roofs which have exceeded their life span. Replacement of select Heating, Ventilation and Air Conditioning (HVAC) controls and telephone systems—as we can no longer get parts for these systems, and in many cases, the systems are no longer supported by the manufacturer. Update the baseball, softball, tennis, football and field hockey facilities to modern standards. Create an archery and robotics home. Build a new artificial turf auxiliary stadium next to the middle school to accommodate program growth such as high school marching band, middle school track, middle school physical education, girls field hockey, scheduled access for additional high school athletic teams, and some highly popular youth programs such as HAYAA Football, HAYAA Baseball/Softball, Hartland United FC Soccer and Hartland Lacrosse. Replace aged carpet, windows, doors (safety glass where appropriate) and lighting in some facilities to improve energy consumption and aesthetics. Increase security with the addition of a secure entrance at Creekside Elementary and the installation of cameras in all K-4 buildings and adding cameras throughout the district.
- Furniture and Equipment:** Replace some of the aged instructional furniture and equipment in our buildings. Purchase band instruments for the high school, middle and intermediate schools. Add, STEM center equipment, tables and chairs to each STEM/Collaboration center. Add dishwashers to our kitchens (stop using Styrofoam plates/green friendly).
- Busses:** Purchase up to 41 new buses over the first five years.

The focus groups seemed to support this proposal stating that it addresses the needs of the district. If passed, the bond dollars would allow the district to shift some of our current general fund expenditures to support instructional improvements such as providing a fourth elective teacher in each elementary school (a STEM/Collaboration teacher). We might also be able to increase supply budgets for science instruction throughout the district as consumables are expensive for engaging students in lab work. All of this can be accomplished by borrowing \$45,000,000 with a 1.44 mill increase to the current district tax levy at a reasonable cost of 46¢ a day for the average Hartland Township homeowner.

I will be recommending that the Board of Education adopt a resolution in January to move forward with a May 2020 bond proposal. I feel it is in the best interest of the district, at a reasonable cost to the community. If passed, the district would be in a position to improve facilities, enhance programming, free up general fund dollars to add personnel where needed and borrow money in the future without a millage rate increase. The passage of this bond proposal ensures that Hartland Schools remain a "premier school of choice" district.

Winter Bus Safety Tips

With the winter months upon us it is always good to review bus stop safety tips to ensure a safe and pleasant trip to school.

At the Bus Stop:

- Allow extra time in the morning to get to your bus on time.
- Wear bright clothing so the bus driver and other motorists can see you in the early morning and late evening.
- Stand a minimum of 10' away from the roadway at the bus stops. Buses and vehicles need extra room to stop when there is snow and ice.
- Dress properly. Winter clothing, hats, mittens and boots will help keep you warm.

Waiting at the Bus Stop:

- Don't play in the snow/ice, or throw snowballs while waiting for the bus.
- Don't push or shove while loading the bus, and always use the handrail.

Boarding and Exiting:

- Accompany your student whenever possible.
- The area at the bus stop may not be maintained for the weather. Icy conditions increase the risk of sliding into the street or getting hurt.

Running Late in the Morning:

- Never try to catch the bus at another stop with your vehicle if your students miss their pick-up. Take them all the way to school or call the Transportation office. Communication with the bus driver is critical in this situation. The bus driver may not see late students running to board while in the danger zone.

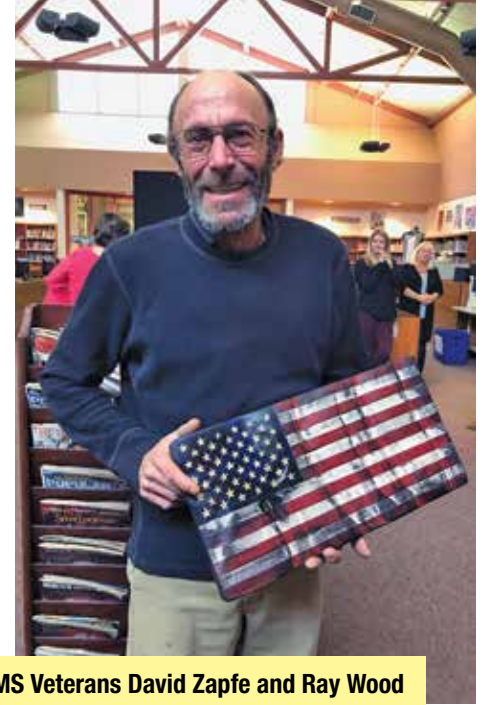

Taking a Closer Look..

Definition of Alternative Education: *A school that does not provide a completely traditional learning experience.*

The all encompassing definition of alternative education allows a variety of hosting options, public, private, charter, etc and multitude of delivery methods at physical locations, online or hybrid options. The broad spectrum of educational opportunities exists because there are no mandated requirements to earn the designation of alternative school.

It is true that the first alternative schools were started for troubled teens, but that could not be farther from the truth today! The reasons for seeking non-traditional paths are as unique as the students enrolled in the curriculum.

How the alternative education structure may differ:

- Usually alternative education classrooms have smaller class sizes allowing for more individualized attention.
- A wider variety of teaching methods are encouraged, especially lessons including hands-on interaction and creativity.
- Non-traditional evaluation methods are usually the norm including a largely accepted practice of no/very little homework.
- Flexible daily schedules.
- Alternative education programs often incorporate social, mental and emotional learning into weekly routines.

- Social, emotional or behavioral difficulties that make traditional high school seem overwhelming.
- Difficult life circumstances.
- Flexibility for the pursuit of interests or talents like sports, theater, dance at a state or national competitive level.
- Lack of success with traditional teaching methods resulting in low or failing grades and/or a feeling of inferiority in the classroom.

Social emotional learning (SEL) is a key developmental process for children. Social emotional learning incorporates understanding and managing emotions, developing empathy, goal-setting, forming and maintaining positive relationships and decision making. One of the first steps to foster SEL in children, is helping them to identify their emotions, accepting emotions as a natural human characteristic and how to manage them. Once children learn to understand their own emotions, they can begin to identify these emotions in others. The beginning teachings of empathy leads to building

relationships with peers and adults. Hartland Consolidated Schools Preschool begins teaching SEL from day one. A child's relational and academic success is dependent upon their ability to self-regulate. Children can simultaneously learn about goal-setting and decision making. WHY GRADES ARE IMPORTANT (Find out why grades are an indicator of your child's future)

As parents we all want our kids to get good grades in school, right?

But why?

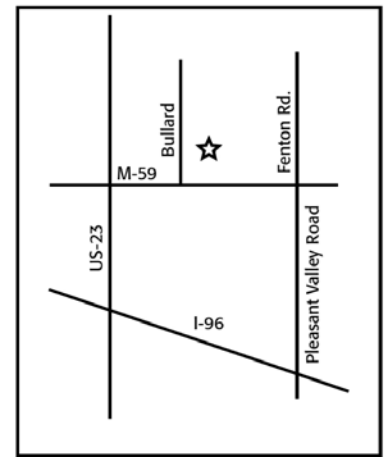

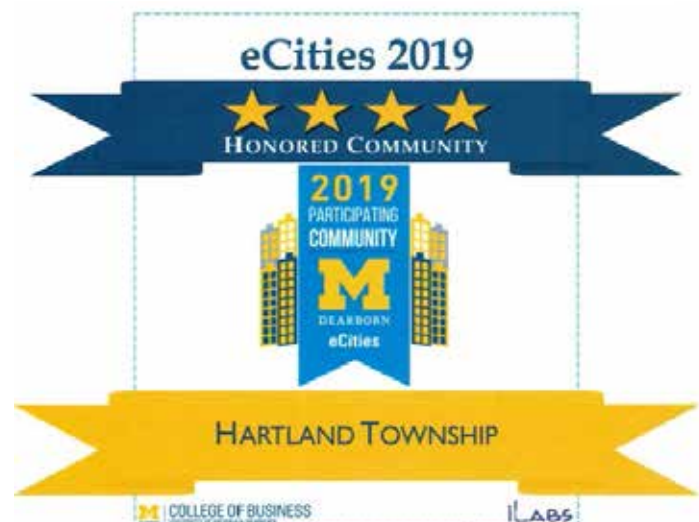
