#### **Dear Hartland Community:**

Hartland Consolidated Schools Board of Education has placed a bond proposal on the May 5th ballot. Developed over the past two years, this proposal will impact our school district in many ways during the coming years. For example, it will:

- address building facility needs such as selected roof, window, door, flooring and furniture replacement; enhanced security; and, upgraded control systems for heating, cooling, and lighting;
- upgrade academic areas, including theatre, athletics facilities, and technology;
- create space for programs that are expanding, such as robotics, archery, band, and athletics;
- replace items when they reach the end of their useful life, such as school buses; and control systems;
- provide relief to the operating budget by supporting the items listed above. This, in turn, should enable the school district to improve programming across the district in areas such as STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math), literacy, and teacher support.

The bond proposal was put together with input from community stakeholders in the fall of 2018, and from six focus groups in the fall of 2019 before being finalized by the Board of Education.

As the Superintendent of Hartland Consolidated Schools, it is my job to look forward to the needs of the district and to make recommendations that are financially viable, beneficial to our students and staff, and position the school district for the future.

I believe a successful bond election will enable us to continue providing quality educational opportunities to our students and other members of the community.

What will this proposal cost the average homeowner? The simple answer is roughly 46¢ a day based on the average home value in Hartland Township.

The long answer means sharing the formula that residents can use to calculate their actual cost. To do this you should locate your **Taxable Value** on your most recent tax bill. (It is likely one-half or slightly less than one-half of your home's market value.) Multiply the **Taxable Value** by 0.00144. This will give you the yearly cost. Divide the yearly cost by 365 to get the daily cost.

**An example:** The taxable value is \$117,500. Multiply \$117,500 by 0.00144 to get your annual cost (\$169.20). Divide \$169.20 by 365 to get your daily cost (46¢).



Parents may begin the enrollment process online and complete the enrollment when visiting their respective elementary school or the HESSC and providing the following documents:

- Birth certificate-a copy for school records.
- Immunization records with proof of DTP, Polio, MMR, Hepatitis B, Chicken Pox vaccines (or proof of having illness), and vision screening, plus copy of same for school records.
- Proof of residency using one of the following: certificate of occupancy, purchase agreement, builder's permit, rent receipt or agreement, mortgage statement/receipt, voter registration card, utility bill, driver's license.

Children are eligible for enrollment in kindergarten in August 2020 if they will have their fifth (5th) birthday on or before September 1, 2020. A child who turns five after September 1st and before December 1, 2020 may enroll if parent/legal guardian signs a waiver that is supported by the school district.

A full-day Junior Kindergarten program may be offered. A minimum number of students are required for the program to be made available. Parent may need to provide transportation in order to participate. The age requirements for Junior Kindergarten are the same as for the regular Kindergarten program. other than the home address is June 15, 2020. Late transportation requests will not be considered until after the first two weeks of school.



#### **Going On College Campus Tours**

Is the fall of junior year too early to look at a few colleges? We encourage parents and students to visit several college campuses during the sophomore and junior years primarily to gain a sense of the different types of colleges and environments that are available. You can select a group of colleges that represent different sizes and types of schools within easy travel distance from home. Students should get a note from the admissions office with the date they attended the tour. Documented campus visits do not count toward Hartland's attendance policy.

#### What should I bring to a visit to a school?

The Hartland High School Counseling Office can provide your student with a list of questions to consider while on a campus tour, in addition students should bring a notebook or journal in order to take notes during information sessions, write down immediate reactions to the campus and list key additional questions you'll need to answer about the institution. After five (or fifteen!) visits, you'll be glad you took the extra time to track your feelings about each school, and your notes will remind you about what you liked and disliked.

# What is one of the main things you need to know or do when you go to visit a college a campus?

First, you need to know why you're there. Spend time browsing a college's website to gain an initial sense of a place before you

visit. Then develop an understanding of why you're visiting this college. How could it fit for you? What kind of college model is it (large, small, urban, rural, competitive, arts-oriented, etc.)? Second, consider a few questions related to your own interests that you would like to make sure you have answered. The most important criteria are the teachers, the academic program, and the match you feel with the students on campus. So, don't focus too much on the food or the brand new student activities center. Consider what academic programs could be of interest to you, how the classes are run and how students feel in general about their institution and their professors.

Should parents/guardians attend college visits with their child? Yes, at least one parent or guardian, should try to accompany a student on the visits he or she makes to colleges. Having a parent along can help a student to bounce reactions and reflections off someone he or she knows and trusts. Parents are the number one influence on a student's choice of school. The key is to allow students to take the lead in campus visits, and to let them offer the first responses to any given place. It's OK to disagree about colleges and to discuss varying viewpoints. The ensuing conversation can help a student continue to define what the best environment will be for him or herself.



# Stress in Preschoolers

"My tummy hurts." As parents and teachers, this is a common statement we hear from our children and students. Many times, the ever-common tummy ache is not accompanied by any other symptoms indicating the child is ill. So, what is the likely cause of the belly ache? It's simple. Stress.

As adults, we tend to see the lives of our children as being carefree and easy – after all, they do not have the responsibilities we face of work, home life, paying bills, etc. What many times we do not realize is that children, even preschoolers experience anxiety, ranging from just a speck of uncertainty to a debilitating state. While it's not always easy to recognize when children are stressed out, behavioral changes — such as mood swings, acting out, changes in sleep patterns, or bed wetting — can be indications. A child who is stressed also may overreact to minor problems, defy authority, suck their thumb, have nightmares or become clingy.

For preschoolers, the most common stress factor is separation from parents. For many, attending preschool is the first experience they have in a large group setting (many classes have up to 18 students), without the comfort and safety of Mom or Dad. So not only are they being placed in a brand-new environment, they are surrounded by many other children whom they do not know, with one or two adults whom they've only met perhaps one or two times. Even for adults, experiencing this level of newness can be very scary!

Here at Hartland Consolidated Schools Preschool, it is our goal and mission to provide a loving and caring environment in which your child feels safe. Establishing relationships and trust with students is the number one factor in student success. If a child feels anxious or afraid, the lessons being taught will most likely not be absorbed, and the experience a negative one. Preschool is a vital step in building the foundation of student's educational careers, and as teachers we strive to make their experience one they walk away from feeling successful and proud!

Getting down to their level, taking the time to listen and help students work through their feelings, giving them time to complete tasks at their own individual pace, and parent communication via phone, in person, email or Seesaw (an application used school wide for parent communication) are just a few ways Hartland Preschool Teachers strive to alleviate stress in students.

Additionally, using positive language can be highly beneficial in alleviating stress, especially when it comes to parental separation. Avoiding phrases such as "There's nothing to be afraid of," "Don't be scared," etc. is key in assisting children to handle stress. Using positive terms such as "You will have so much fun," "Your teachers and friends are so excited to see you," etc. can completely change the narrative and direction of your child's feelings.

In this day and age of over scheduling, rushing around and ever-changing technology, the best thing we can give our children is Love, Positive Attention, and Security. As Theodore Roosevelt said, "Nobody cares how much you know, until they know how much you care."

At Hartland Consolidated Schools Preschool, your child's overall care is our number one priority.




