In order to complete your enrollment, please upload the following items:

- ☐ Birth certificate: copy for school records
- ☐ Immunization Records: proof of DTP, Polio, MMR, Hepatitis B, Chicken Pox (or proof of illness) and vision screening; plus a copy for school records
- □ Proof of residency (one of the following): certificate of occupancy, purchase agreement, builder's permit, rent receipt or agreement, mortgage statement/ receipt, voter registration card, utility bill or driver's license

A full-day Junior Kindergarten program may be offered. A minimum number of students are required for the program to be made available. Parents may need to provide transportation in order to participate. The age requirement of Junior Kindergarten is the same a for the regular Kindergarten program.

Transportation Information for the Upcoming School Year

It's time to start thinking about busing for the new school year. For your convenience, forms are now being accepted to ensure room on every bus to accommodate your transportation needs for the first day of school.

All transportation forms (Alternate Destination, Joint Custody, School of Choice and Legacy forms) will expire at the end of the 20/21 school year. If new forms are not submitted, in-district students will automatically be assigned to the closest bus stop to their home address and non-resident students will not receive a bus assignment.

The deadline for submitting forms to the Transportation Office to request a bus assignment other than the home address is June 15, 2021. Late transportation requests will not be considered until after the first 2 weeks of school.

The Transportation and Central Office staff will be available throughout the summer months if you should have any questions or need assistance. Post cards with your student's bus information should arrive a week before the first day of school.

Student Council members delivered the candy grams while varsity choir students members sang a few lines from famous love songs to the class. It was a great way to celebrate the holiday!





Dr. Matt Assenmacher welcomed Bekah and Adam Saltsman into his CAD Engineering and Design class as virtual speakers! Behak is the CEO of the game development studio, FINJI, in Grand Rapids. Her husband, Adam, is a co-founder of FINJI, and currently acts as the company director. Together, they work to publish, write, and develop award winning independent games, including Night in the Woods and Canabalt. Bekah and Adam shared their path into the gaming business as well as highlighted several projects that are under development. Thank you to the Saltsmans and Dr. Assenmacher for giving our students an example of how CAD can lead to amazing employment!









Mr. Paul Butzier and his Algebra 2/Trigonometry students learned about parabolas and trajectory in class. To show the learning in and everyday scenario, students teamed up to build a catapult that met specifications and had to launch a soft ball of their choice. After many calculations and test runs, groups competed for accuracy (hitting a pyramid of cups) and distance. Students had to use their math calculations to find the best distance to crash the cups as well as what materials to build their catapult out of to ensure the best distance. Mr. Jamie Riley's Marketing class did classroom skits that had students giving a sales pitch to another student. Students developed a new, innovative product which they had to write a skit for and include price, product characteristics and answer customer questions about the product. This is not only great practice for public speaking, it readies students for DECA competitions in the future!





Science teacher, Ms. Katie Boog, and her Earth Science students investigated wind powered turbines during a renewable energy unit. Students folded different sized and styled windmills, hooked them to a voltmeter, and placed them in front of a fan to measure the amount of energy produced from the fan's movement. Data was collected to draw conclusions about the best size and design for windmills!



HHS has a Materials Science course taught by Mrs. Laura Moore. This class is a semester-long class that highlights the amazing science behind metals, non-metals, and the development of materials in everyday life. This lab-based class allows students to use physics, chemistry, and engineering practices to investigate properties of materials, as well as explain why certain materials are used to build bridges, cars, coins, and more. In the photos, students ran a four-day investigation station lab. Students collected data to about pennies that were made pre and post 1982 (materials changed!), the effects of acid on pennies, silver tarnish, steel wool erosion and casting tin.



Suessabration was a big hit!



Gearing Up for State Testing

M-Step testing is just around the corner. We are anxiously awaiting word from the federal government regarding our request for a state-wide waiver. If a waiver is provided to the State of Michigan, we will not take the M-Step this year, but students in grades K-2 will still take the Early Literacy Benchmark Assessment at the end of the year and our students in grades 3-4 will complete the Smarter-Balanced assessment by the end of this month.

As we move forward, we are going to plan as if we are taking the M-Step test. That said, I wanted to provide some simple testing suggestions to help your student do the best they possibly can.

Prior to Test Day...

- 1. Get your students reading. Every day students should read for at least 30 minutes. The M-Step test is steeped in reading. The more the students can read the easier the test will be for them.
- 2. Talk with your student about how they are feeling about the test. Explain that this is simply a test of what the student learned thus far in school. Students need to know that this test is about their growth, not about a score. Trying their best and taking their time is what matters.
- 3. Have your student eat healthy meals and sleep well leading up to the test. It is not just the night before the test, but it is a few weeks in advance. Our bodies cannot "catch up" on sleep. We need to make sure that our kiddos are sleeping well and eating healthy so that they have optimal brain power.







A discount of 10% is applied to the lowest tuition payment. On days when the center is closed, and/ or vacation days are taken, and the attendance is less than five days, the discount does not apply and the charge will be by the daily rate.

Before and after school care is \$10 per session for full time enrollment (5 days a week).

Part time enrollment is \$15 a session (2-3 days a week).

9 Emotional Wellness Activities

- 1. **Be positive.** While occasionally being in a bad mood is normal, constantly having a negative attitude undermines your internal happiness. To develop a more positive mindset give yourself credit for the good things you do each day. Surround yourself with positive, healthy people.
- 2. **Get connected.** Scientists are finding that our social connections can have a powerful effect on our emotional and physical health. To strengthen your social circle, reach out to friends and loved ones by phone and through social media. Your grandchildren and younger family members can also show you how to connect virtually through FaceTime or Zoom. Other options include taking an online class to learn something new. Volunteer for things you care about.
- 3. **Relieve stress.** Stress is normal, and its energy rush can help us get things done. Chronic stress is being on "high alert" for a long time and does more harm than good. Here are some healthy ways to cope with stress and boost your resilience: Get enough sleep. Thirty minutes a day of walking can boost your mood and reduce stress. Note what you've accomplished at the end of the day, not what you've failed to do, Mindfulness, meditation, yoga or tai chi may help you relax.
- 4. **Quality sleep.** Vital to our well-being, sleep affects both our mental and physical health. To get better-quality sleep, go to bed the same time each night and get up the same time each morning, exercise daily (but not right before bedtime), Limit the use of electronics before bed and relax before bedtime with a warm bath or by reading.
- 5. **Establish boundaries.** The feeling of having too much to do can cause frustration, anxiety and stress. Some important ways to establish boundaries include, having clear priorities. This will help you figure out what you're actually willing to spend your time and energy on. Let people know what you will and will not tolerate and don't feel like you need to say yes to avoid hurting someone's feelings. Make sure you spend time doing things that bring you joy and help you feel better about yourself.
- 6. Be mindful. Mindfulness is about being completely aware of what's happening in the present. It means not living your life on "autopilot." To be more mindful, breathe in through your nose to a count of 4, hold for 1 second and then exhale through the mouth to a count of 5. Go for a walk, and notice your breath and the sights and sounds around you. Find mindfulness resources in your local community, including yoga and meditation classes, mindfulness-based stress-reduction programs and books.

- 7. **Cope with loss.** The death of a loved one can feel overwhelming. But most people can make it through the grieving process with the support of family and friends. Healthy ways to cope with loss include, taking care of yourself, trying to eat right, exercising and getting enough sleep. Avoiding bad habits that can put your health at risk so talk to caring friends or find a grief support group. Wait a while before making big decisions like moving. Talk with your doctor if you're having trouble with everyday activities, sometimes short-term talk therapy can help. Finally, mourning takes time.
- 8. Accept yourself. We are usually our own harshest critic and set expectations for our life and behavior that we wouldn't set for others. Everyone has self-judgment and self-doubt. Learning to accept yourself is a gateway to a happier, healthier life. Start accepting yourself by surrounding yourself with positive affirmations and things that inspire you. Let go of what you think perfection looks like and forgive others for things they didn't mean to do or didn't know they did. Forgive yourself for mistakes you think you've made and believe that you can do anything, because you can.
- 9. Ask for help. If you are suffering from emotional distress, it's OK to ask others for help. Everyone has moments of stress and you are not alone. A friend or family member you trust and who'll be a good listener is a good place to get support. Get the perspective of others to hear how they would handle a situation. Seek the advice of a mental health professional.



What Is More Important-Self-Esteem, Confidence or Courage? The answer just might surprise you.

I think most parent would agree children need a high healthy level of all three but...what if you could only choose one? Does one stick out more than the others?

As we work together at this dojo to raise your child, I thought it might be helpful and valuable to share the difference between <u>self-esteem</u>, <u>confidence</u> and <u>courage</u>, how they develop and the role you play. Developing all three are crucial for raising a successful and happy child. Each is different but definitely interrelated.

Your self-esteem was mostly set as a child. Simply put, self-esteem is how you view your "value," or your self-worth. While we can help improve your child's self-esteem, most of is set well before they come to our karate school. You do this with the message and feeling you give your child, from the time they are born, as to how "safe, loved and accepted" they are by you. If they do feel valued; they will be more likely to try new things, not give up, not fear failure or rejection, be resilient and have a growth mindset.

The initial foundation of your child's self-esteem is pretty much on you. Here are some simple tips:

- Show your child they are valued with consistent unconditional love and acceptance. (Resist criticizing. Reprimand the action, not the child while emotionally calm.)
- Let them do things for themselves. (Teach, then let them do new things. "I am capable and independent.")
- **Do not over praise them.** (The "everybody gets a trophy." They can tell when

praise is exaggerated or fake. Do not make them the center of your family.)

- Make them do chores. (The feeling they are a part of and contribute to the household.)
- *Above all, one of the most powerful things you can do is <u>show</u>
 <u>them you value being with them</u> by giving them your time (and
 do so with your undivided attention (put down the smartphone), and
 one-on-one time if they have siblings)

"Do not over praise" is an interesting tip. Well intended parents may praise everything their child does, telling them they are the best, the smartest, the prettiest, thinking it builds their self-esteem. This will tend to have the opposite effect.

Just remember, before 7th grade the number one motivation of a child is "pleasing their parents." Instead of verbal praise or trophies/rewards, try this—just give them a big smile and say nothing. Just show them you are proud of them without telling them. Or, use this tip from grandparents, just say "I loved watching you do karate (or play soccer) today!" Learn to substitute encouragement in place of praise. This also uses one of the most powerful parenting techniques—praise their effort, not the results.

I hate to do this to you but I am running out of room so you will have to wait until next month to read the rest of this article and learn about confidence and courage. (Or you can visit our website where this entire piece is on our blog page.)




