

How are public K-12 schools funded in Michigan?

During the lead up to the passing of the August 2020 Bond, I regularly updated the community on school funding issues. To the right you will find a School Aid Fund chart showing where dollars come from that support schools.

Often, I am asked the question from community members, "I don't know why you need money when you get all that lottery revenue." The reality is that the lottery only accounts for about 7% of the overall School Aid Fund. You will note that there is a property tax portion which comes from the 6 mills that every property owner pays to the State of Michigan. Local districts then ask for additional mills as we did in August to pay for building enhancements, buses, technology upgrades, etc. Here is a great link to explore if you have additional questions about school funding: www.michigan.gov/budget/0,9357,7-379-88601 _91413_91645-139075--,00.html.

Unfortunately, the State of Michigan has been using this fund to support colleges and universities and other programs. In 2020-21 the amount used to support these programs is budgeted at \$978,080,500 of the School Aid Fund. A frustration that I continue to feel is that the State of Michigan often changes the allocation components of this fund, which usually results in less dollars flowing into the local districts.



Transportation Information for the Upcoming School Year

It's time to start thinking about busing for the new school year. For your convenience, forms are now being accepted to ensure room on every bus to accommodate your transportation needs for the first day of school.

All transportation forms (Alternate Destination, Joint Custody, School of Choice and Legacy forms) will expire at the end of the 20/21 school year. If new forms are not submitted, in-district students will automatically be assigned to the closest bus stop to their home address and non-resident students will not receive a bus assignment.

The deadline for submitting forms to the Transportation Office to request a bus assignment other than the home address is June 15, 2021. Late transportation requests will not be considered until after the first 2 weeks of school.

The Transportation and Central Office staff will be available throughout the summer months if you should have any questions or need assistance. Post cards with your student's bus information should arrive a week before the first day of school.

Hartland Schools Student Nutrition Team: Keeping Our Students Fed



The HCS Student Nutrition Department is committed to meeting the needs of ALL Hartland students. Our district wants to ensure that every student has access to school meals, regardless of how they are learning this year. We are providing meals to students in three different

ALL meals-breakfast and lunch-are FREE to ALL students this year due to a waiver from the USDA.

Our in-person students continue to be offered breakfast and lunch every in-person school day. We have served over 93,000 in-person lunch meals this year and over 22,000 in-person breakfasts. To help reduce the spread of COVID, our students are served all components of their meals. We have suspended all self-service areas, including condiments and utensils, to maintain a low-contact environment for our students.

ANY of our in-person students can receive meals to be eaten on their remote school days and weekends. We prepare meal packages every Thursday for our students to take home to be eaten on Friday, Saturday and Sunday. These packages are FREE to ALL students. We have served over 13,000 of these remote meals. If you are interested in having meals sent home with your student on Thursdays, please sign up on the student nutrition website.

Virtual students can have meals too! Our department has weekly curbside meal pickup for virtual students and any child ages 0-18 without access to school meals. Anyone in Livingston county can pick up a meal package for any child ages 0-18 that doesn't have access to meals, they do not need to be receiving services through Hartland Schools and they do not have to qualify for free meals. These meal pickups are scheduled every Friday at 1 PM (except in the case of a holiday break), at the High School pool parking loop. The weekly pick-up package includes 7 days of breakfast and lunch meals and is FREE. No need to sign-up, just show up at the scheduled pick up time. The schedule is updated monthly on the student nutrition website. Our district has served over 36,000 meals in this curbside meal program since August. We have received feedback from parents that this package also helps students to feel connected to school as these are some of the same foods that they are used to eating while in-person. We hope to see more families take advantage of this wonderful program; either to supplement current food options, fill a hunger gap, make a connection to in-person school, or just for extra food to feed hungry, growing children.

Food safety is a top priority for Student Nutrition. The department follows all of the federal, state and local food safety regulations. We also follow the MDE, CDC and FDA procedures to ensure that our kitchens and serving areas are safe and healthy. During these times of COVID, we continue to go above and beyond the health department minimums to maintain safety and sanitation in our kitchens and serving areas. This includes the use of PPE, plexiglass guards and additional cleaning and sanitation.

From the Counseling Office:

Going On College Campus Tours

Q: Is the fall of junior year too early to look at a few colleges?

A: We encourage parents and students to visit several college campuses during the sophomore and junior years primarily to gain a sense of the different types of colleges and environments that are available. You can select a group of colleges that represent different sizes and types of schools within easy travel distance from home. Students should get a note from the admissions office with the date they attended the tour. Documented campus visits do not count toward Hartland's attendance policy.

Q: What should I bring to a visit to a school?

A: The Counseling Office can provide your student with a list of questions to consider while on a campus tour, in addition students should bring a notebook to take notes during information sessions, write down immediate reactions to the campus and list key additional questions you'll need to answer about the institution. After five (or fifteen!) visits, you'll be glad you took the extra time to track your feelings about each school. Your notes will remind you about what you liked and disliked.

Q: What is one of the main things you need to know or do when you go to visit a college a campus?

A: First, you need to know why you're there. Spend time browsing a college's website to gain an initial sense of a place before you visit. Then develop an understanding of why you're visiting this college. How could it fit for you? What kind of college model is it (large, small, urban, rural, competitive, arts-oriented, etc.)? Second, consider a few questions related to your own interests that you would like to make sure you have answered. The most important criteria are the teachers, the academic program and the match you feel with the students on campus. So, don't focus too much on the food or the brand new student activities center. Consider what academic programs could be of interest to you, how the classes are run, and how students feel in general about their institution and their professors.

Q: Should parents/guardians attend college visits with their child?


A: Yes, at least one parent or guardian should try to accompany a student on the visits he or she makes to colleges. Having a parent along can help a student to bounce reactions and reflections off someone he or she knows and trusts. Parents are the number one influence on a student's choice of school. The key is to allow students to take the lead in campus visits, and to let them offer the first responses to any given place. It's OK to disagree about colleges, and to discuss varying viewpoints. The ensuing conversation can help a student continue to define what the best environment will be for him or herself.

Students in Mrs. Simpson's honors chemistry class explored periodic trends with an alien activity! Groups of students were given a population of aliens on paper, all of which had different number of eyes, fingers and expressions on their face. Using their knowledge of how trends in atoms evolve across the periodic table, students had to build their periodic table of aliens. They then had to make connections between what those different number of fingers, eyes and facial expressions on the aliens and the actual period table of element had in common! A fun way to find patterns in chemistry!





Students in Mr. Ben Jackson's physics class investigated Newton's 3rd Law of Motion using carts, weights and a "friction-less" track. Students graphed their findings, made observations and wrote conclusions as the weighted cart raced down the track with a sensor. Students saw and predicted the law based on their lab data. The next day in class, they derived the equation to show that for every action, there is an equal and opposite reaction!



Sociology students in Mrs. Teri Wozny's class participated in a team-building activity of "Cultural Heads up, 7-up!" As most of the class put their heads down, a group of students walked around the room gently pushing another student's thumb down. Before the student had to guess who pushed their thumb down, they had to reveal something about their own culture. Some students shared about their heritage, their family traditions, even what is served at holiday times! Mrs. Wozny builds a class relationship based on respect and safety before teaching the structure of human society and behavior.





New this year is the Cadet Teaching Program. Students signed up for a two-hour block class that allows them to investigate the teaching profession. Lessons cover how to present material, the importance of lesson planning, classroom management tips and how to make meaningful connections with students. Although our cadet teachers cannot get into actual classrooms yet, they are preparing virtual lessons and activities that will be shared and presented to all four Hartland elementary schools via the Cadet Teaching YouTube channel. One such project is an elementary book project about Valentine's Day, Black History Month or character building! Cadets will practice and record reading aloud, making personal comments and connections to the text as they read, as well as the art of asking questions to check for understanding. All elementary teachers in Hartland will have access to this. A BIG thank you to Mr. Dan Aldred and Mrs. Teri Wozny for heading the Cadet program at HHS! They are doing a spectacular job with out future educators!





- Our Scholastic Book Fair this year will be in April! More details to come.



Toni Scherer is an amazing social worker in the Hartland Consolidated School District. She works with a variety of secondary age students and provides a layer of support for navigating the emotional, social and behavioral hurdles that come with navigating adolescent transitions.

HVA students know that some transitions are more difficult than others! Going from face-to-face learning to the virtual classroom can be difficult for some students. A few students try to use online learning as a way to escape more systematic problems like anxiety or bullying. Yet even for the most adept students, the impacts of virtual studying can be real. Finding the best fit environment for all students is the goal of everyone.

Toni shares that lonely, isolated students may struggle to complete their work on time, fail to connect with other students or withdraw entirely from the learning community—virtual or face-to-face.

- Connecting with other students should be a top priority for online students. It is for HVA! Making connections helps students meet participation requirements, complete group assignments and study for tests.
- Connecting with their instructors is also a great way to get involved. Many
 online instructors offer virtual office hours and HVA instructors do too. Students
 can use these meetings to ask questions, receive guidance on projects or get
 extra help outside of class.
- Looking to the FUTURE: Online students are not limited to virtual connections.
 HVA has a lab that we welcome students daily to study or simply connect.
 Moreover we look forward to returning to pre-Covid programmings such as offering field trip opportunities and internships where online students connect.





Financial Planning and Medicare

Not sure which Medicare plan to choose? After looking at the income you will have coming in when you retire—social security, pension, investments, etc.—you also need to look at some of the other expenses you will have when you no longer have health insurance covered by an employer. At 65, you become eligible for Medicare. Often, people may neglect to consider the importance of what they will have to pay for their supplemental health insurance to Medicare. Medicare claims they pay 80% of the charge but Medicare pays 80% of what they consider reasonable, therefore, it is important to know what type of coverage will fit your budget and your health status. There is also a Part B deductible that Is taken out of your Social Security every month.

There are two basic types of Medicare plans available: Medigap (which typically covers more of the cost but only covers health care, you purchase a prescription plan separately) and Medicare Advantage (that has co-pays, but includes prescriptions with co-pays and some amount of assistance with dental, hearing aids, etc.) Because each plan has different coverage, it is important to look at all the plans closely. There are many factors to consider before making a choice, such as cost—what can you afford according to your budget—and your health status, including any pre-existing conditions. It is important to also note that supplemental plans to Medicare can increase in price every year. Medicare supplemental plans can also be changed during the open enrollment period (Oct. thru Dec.) as your health status changes or you feel a different plan would better meet your needs.

If you are turning 65, and need help understanding Medicare, call Carol Ringle, Certified Medicare Counselor, at 810-626-2139. I am not a salesperson but trained and certified by Medicare and am unbiased in reviewing the different options available. I am also available to review any questions or concerns you have with your current plan. Due to COVID-19, call to arrange an appointment, please no walk-ins.



Are we overprotecting our children? Are we really asking the right question?

Instead of writing in generalities or concepts, I feel it's much more powerful and valuable to share actual situations or questions I encounter from our parents. Here is part of a recent email from a mother with a very common question. (I have changed the names.)

...My daughter Kreslyn is very shy and reserved around other people and I'd like her to build some confidence before starting kindergarten in the fall. She was born with hearing and speech problems and is also an only child so I suppose she's always been a bit overprotected. Sometimes I don't feel like

I'm challenging her enough. But since she's so sensitive it can be hard to know when is the right time to push and when to let things go. I guess I want to make sure I do everything I can to help her reach her potential and teach her that the best things in life come from doing things that are difficult..."

Here is part of my response back: "...You can tell Kreslyn I was also very shy when I was young. Shyness is near and dear to my heart. I wish someone had taught me when I was young that shyness is just a fear. I love to teach children and parents the phrase "Every time I back away from a fear the FEAR gets bigger, but every time I power through a fear I get bigger!" Being sensitive is a very good thing in all children, but it should never be allowed to be an excuse or crutch for backing away from anything."

Here is the key to how you (and we) can help Kreslyn. Make Kreslyn face discomfort often and help her power through it. Then make her do things she does not want to do often. Both have to be done consistently and frequently. The intensity of these emotions need to be increased with success and time. This builds "strong" children. Doing the opposite develops weak children. Tell Kreslyn karate is hard work. Kids need to skin their knees and eat dirt!

Don't worry it is very natural for parents to protect their children. Parents have to work hard to stand back. I am sure you have seen this on the internet recently: "First child eats dirt, parent calls the doctor. Second child eats dirt, parent cleans out his mouth. Three child eats dirt, parent wonders if she really needs to feed him lunch."

So, "Are we overprotecting our child?" Let's start by backing up a little. When human babies are born they need someone 24/7 to care and do almost everything for them in order to survive. Thank goodness mothers are hard wired to do this! But this can work against us as our children grow up. Add to this the excessive and counterproductive fear and paranoia we have for everything from abductions, to the flu, to school shootings, to bad

weather. No wonder we never let them play outside on their own. We solve all their problems and we cover them in anti-bacterial soap.

I believe the question is not "Are we overprotecting our children?" but instead "Are we SHIFTING our roles as parents as our children grow and develop?"

If we treat and care for our children like we did in their first six months of life they will become weak. The four good stresses of fear, hardship, failure and boredom makes us stronger! You need to shift your role as a parent so your children get the progressively higher levels of the good stress they need in order to grow strong.

Here is the key, you need to make these role shifts as a parent to raise strong, independent and successful children. You must go from Caregiver/Teacher to Manager/ Coach to Consultant/Mentor. When the shift occurs may be different for each child but I think if you are perceptive it will be easy to tell.

So, the real question is: Are you shifting your role as a parent? Are you still treating your 8 year old more like a six month old? How about your 13 year old? Now about your 18






