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Superintendent's Corner

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District staff continue to work above and beyond normal expectations to meet the needs of our students. From daycare to high school, everyone is providing the best service that they possibly can in these trying times. Our teachers are trying to manage in class instruction, remote instruction, students changing from one mode or the other and more. Our high school teachers are managing all of this on top of being anxious that some students are not engaging in the remote learning that they signed up for and therefore putting themselves in a position to not graduate on time. We simply want every child to be successful. I need to ask that parents who chose to receive remote learning, continue to monitor the engagement of their children and if it is not working out, to discuss returning to face-to-face instruction as soon as possible with the school administration. No matter what option is chosen for instructional and safety purposes, engagement through zoom meetings,

completing assignments and assessments, and simply communicating regularly with the teacher is required in order to earn a grade.

COVID and its effect on the learning environment continues to create many challenges for the district. While we currently have not had an outbreak through in-school transmission, we want to remain diligent in requiring cloth masks that cover the mouth and nose by all students and staff. We continue teaching our students to wash their hands regularly, keep socially distant when possible, and not to come to school if sick. If there is someone in the household being tested due to COVID symptoms, please keep the student at home. The student should stay at home until a negative virus (not an antigen) test is returned or if positive, until the Livingston County Health Department provides a letter to return. We have had many students who were required to be quarantined due to exposure or contact with positive cases. This is an essential strategy in reducing the chances of an in-school outbreak or transmission.

Like many of you, I cannot wait for the day when we are all back in school full time. A former colleague of mine regularly reminded me that "normalcy" is essential to maximizing each of our potential. I cannot agree more with this advice. Hang in there, we will get back to normalcy. Someday, we will look back with astonishment on all that we have conquered.

District Snow Day Procedures

Step 1: Superintendent and Director of Operations pay attention to weather condition predictions for the following morning. If bad weather is not predicted, end process and sleep well. If bad weather is predicted go to Step 2.

Step 2: The Superintendent and Director of Operations arrange for bus and vehicle drivers to drive the roads around Hartland starting at about 3:30 AM to assess conditions. The Superintendent and Director of Operations start communicating with each other, surrounding district transportation directors and superintendents, possibly the County Road Commission, and local law enforcement to assess road conditions with safety in mind. There is an effort to decide by 5:30 AM If roads are deemed too poor to travel, go to Step 3. If roads are deemed okay to travel, go to Step 6.

Step 3: Superintendent makes the call to have a "Snow Day" and communicates with the Director of Community Education to determine if the Child Care Center should remain open for business. Go to Step 4.

Step 4: Once a snow day has been called and the question of child

care operations has been agreed upon, the Superintendent will contact the administrative team to inform the local radio station (WHMI), Detroit area television stations, Twitter (join @Hartlandschools to get the fastest notice) Facebook, (@hartlandconsolidatedschools), the district website www.hartlandschools.us, send out phone calls and text messages to announce that the district has called a snow day. All district events are canceled and buildings are closed for the morning.

Step 5: Between 11 AM and 12 PM on the snow day, the Superintendent, Director of Operations, Athletic Director, Director of Community Education, and High School Principal determine what, if any, events will be open for the afternoon at the High School and Educational Support Service Center. All other buildings (not including the 51 Building) are shut down until the following morning without exception to give our employees an opportunity to clear sidewalks, driveways, and parking lots in preparation to reopen the following day.

Step 6: The Superintendent and other staff listen patiently to those who disagree with the decision to open or close schools.

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

School Bus Safety

DANGER ZONES AROUND THE SCHOOL BUS



- The "Danger Zone" is the area surrounding the bus where it's difficult to see children in the bus mirrors
- 20 feet in front, 10 feet behind and 10 feet on each side of the school bus
- LOADING / UNLOADING SAFELY
- STAY on your own side of the road 10 feet from the roadway, in a single row
- WAIT until the bus has come to a complete stop, the red overhead lights are activated, and the DRIVER DISPLAYS THE YELLOW SAFETY SIGNAL
- When crossing the road, CHECK traffic both ways then check again and walk 10 feet in front of the bus
- NEVER stop to pick-up anything on the ground

College Action Plan: Check List

Summer/Fall

- Narrow your list of colleges to between 5-10. Plan to visit as many of the colleges you plan to apply to if you haven't already.
- Create a master list or calendar that includes: SAT/ACT Test dates/deadlines, application deadlines for schools you are planning to apply to, and required financial aid application forms and their deadlines (aid applications may be due before college applications).
- Ask your counselor for a fee waiver if you think you may qualify for financial assistance.
- Take the SAT and/or ACT another time if you would like to try to improve your scores for admissions or scholarship consideration.
- Get a head start on completing as much required information as possible and write your college application essay and have a teacher or other adult proofread it.
- Complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) at www.fafsa.ed.gov to apply for financial aid - available beginning on October 1st. You will need your most recent tax returns.
- Complete the CSS/Financial Aid PROFILE. PROFILE is an online application used by certain colleges and scholarship programs to determine eligibility for their aid
- Ask one or two teachers for recommendations if you need them. (Also ask your counselor if using the Common Application or if you have special circumstances.) Make sure to provide an outline or resume of your academic awards/accomplishments, extracurricular activities, etc.
- Complete and submit one or more college applications by Halloween.
- Create an account on www.parchment.com and request/send transcripts.

Fall/Winter

- Keep track of the colleges you have applied to and the responses you receive.
- Send a copy of your 7th semester (1st semester of 12th grade) grades if the college is asking for it. Request to send your transcript through www.parchment.com.
- Find out each college's actual cost. Use a Net Price Calculator (such as the one available on www.bigfuture.collegeboard.org's website) to find out the potential for financial aid and the true out-of-pocket cost-or net price-for each college.
- Contact the Financial Aid Office or visit the Financial Aid Office website of the colleges in which you are applying to find out what type of aid is available and deadlines, for that particular college.
- Find and apply for scholarships. Make sure to check the HHS Scholarship Gazette that is updated monthly by the Counseling Department. Make sure to submit scholarships applications and/or essays by the deadlines.
- Find additional scholarships on scholarship websites. A suggested list is available on the HHS Counseling web page and on the Scholarship Gazette. Make sure to submit scholarships applications and/or essays by the deadlines.
- Sign up to take the AP exam if you are enrolled in an AP course. Talk with your AP teacher if you have questions regarding whether or not you should take the exam.

Winter/Spring

- If you are wait listed, contact the admissions office to let them know you are still interested and ask how you can strengthen your application.
- Continue applying for scholarships. Review financial aid award offers to figure out which package works best for you. Pay attention to deadlines.
- Make a pros/cons list of the colleges you have been accepted to in order to choose the college that is the best fit for you.
- Visit your final college before accepting, if possible. You should receive acceptance letters and financial aid offers no later than mid-late April if you submitted your applications by the recommended deadlines.
- Inform each college of your acceptance or rejection of their offer and/or financial
- Notify your counselor of your final decision and send in your deposit to the college you have decided to attend.
- Apply for housing and submit the deposit if living on campus.
- Sign up for orientation to become an official student and find out the next steps.
- Register for classes. Send a copy of your final high school transcript to your college through www.parchment.com.
- Contact the college if you have any questions!



HVA: How do I know the "BEST FIT" for my learner?

Q is there really a difference between LEGACY and HVA?

A: YES! All alternative education programs are not the same in that they target, help and align to different learning styles. In fact, the only element that links all alternative education programs is that usually the program has a central focus every other aspect is built from. For example, language immersion schools are alternative education programs with a core centered around a second language. STEM or STEAM schools are alternative education programs with a core centered around Science, Technology, Engineering and Math. Cyber Schools, like HVA, are alternative education programs with a core centered around a virtual learning.

Q. How do I know the best placement for my child?

A: There are many factors to consider when choosing a placement, and no one indicator will determine for certain.

Q. It's COVID, so my student will just have to adapt, but is there anything I could do to make online easier?

A: Yes! The health of you and your student is always one of our top focuses, but believing that your student can "just adapt" may prove difficult without help. Remember while most students have 8-12 years of practice learning in face-to-face settings, most will spend less than 8-12 hours in training before they are expected to succeed in the virtual classroom. Not to mention that in traditional classrooms there are teachers bending lessons to ensure the many ways students learn—audio, visually or tactical kinesthetically are all included. While all methods are possible through virtual learning, the computer lends itself to some methods more than others.






