Superintendent's Message

For the past several years, public schools have been chronically underfunded. For the current 2015/16 school year, the legislature approved a school aid budget that, on the surface, appeared would provide a substantial funding increase. However, when all was said and done and several other sources of state revenue for public schools were eliminated, Hartland Consolidated Schools received an increase of roughly \$20.00 per pupil, which amounted to a little over \$100,000 toward an approximate \$51 million budget.



Needless to say, this increase did not keep up with the "cost of living" for Hartland Schools.

Because of this continued underfunding and in order for the district to remain financially solvent, most employees for Hartland Schools saw a net reduction in their pay of 2.5% for the 2015/16 school year. If our state revenue source remains at this level, the projection is that our employees will see an even larger pay reduction for 2016/17. While the state School Aid Fund is expected to increase by \$350 million, there are several issues facing the state, such as the Detroit Public Schools situation, the Flint water crisis, bad roads, and increases in retirement costs, which could ultimately drain monies from the School Aid Fund. There is a past history of the legislature shifting school funds into its general fund to take care of other commitments. As it appears right now, we fear there is not much chance of a substantial increase in revenue for public schools overall, and Hartland Consolidated Schools in particular.

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Hartland Schools Person of the Month

In August of this year I will be 66 years old and I will complete my 30th year at Hartland Consolidated Schools as Assistant Superintendent for Business and Operations. That is a long title that simply means I have the responsibility for a number of departments that fall within the parameters of Business and Operations – finance and budgets, transportation, Student Nutrition, main-



tenance, custodial, and facilities. As a member of the Central Office leadership team I also am involved in strategic planning and negotiations. My educational background includes a Bachelor's Degree from Olivet College in 1972 and a Master's Degree from Eastern Michigan in 1987. To maintain the designation as a Chief School Business Official, I am required to meet specific continuing educations units within each five-year period.

My wife Donna and I moved into the Hartland School District in 1986 and have four children who have graduated from Hartland High School; Erin (1993), Tony (1995), Rob (1998), and Kelly (2007). They have each benefited from the education and experiences they had in Hartland Schools and have each found their own unique levels of success. We are very proud of each of them. We also have ten grandchildren; two of them currently attend Lakes Elementary.

In our free time Donna and I particularly enjoy seeing our grandchildren and taking in sporting events. We also spend a fair amount of time during the year at our home in Empire (a small village on Lake Michigan in Leelanau County, pretty much surrounded by the Sleeping Bear Dunes National Lakeshore). Anything outside, whether it is hiking, swimming, hanging at the beach, kayaking, etc., is what we like to do whenever we can.

As I look back over the past 30 years I have many memorable moments as a member of the Hartland Schools' "team". One that still has significant impact to me was from 1989 when the school administration, the school board, and our employee groups made a conscious decision to move away from adversarial contract bargaining to a process that involved mutual respect and achievement of common goals; a process that still exists today. That was the beginning of Hartland Schools becoming the "Premier School of Choice" it is today. The early 1990s through 2004 saw the district grow significantly in enrollment. We purchased 200 acres that eventually became the site for a new middle school, a new elementary school, and a new high school with state-of-the-art athletic facilities and a community pool. In 2006 and 2010 our community once again voted to approve two more bond issues that have enabled the district to maintain excellent facilities for our students, staff, and community. I am proud to be part of a community that continually supports its school district, and proud to have personally been able to play a role in the success.

Finally, I should note that there is one day every year I particularly enjoy and always remember – that is graduation day. It is an opportunity to appreciate the outstanding young men and women who graduate from Hartland Consolidated Schools, and also a chance to reflect and appreciate the efforts of all who were part of those students' success: parents, family, friends, and the "school team" of teachers, the Board of Education, administrators, as well as the many support staff employees who contribute each and every day.



(Please remember, early registration increases the likelihood of placement in your home school.)



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IS YOUR CHILD A PERFECTIONIST?

Instead...teach them how to be perfect

"I am always PERFECT...at the END!"

You might be a little shocked by this but - <u>Don't turn them into</u> <u>perfectionists!</u>

This is very difficult to do. It is all our fault. In today's world we push our kids too hard too early and expect them to be perfect. We tell them we do not expect them to be perfect but yet we do not let them make mistakes or get things wrong. It may age me a little but when I was a kindergartener all I had to do was drink milk, take naps and play. Today if a kindergartener does not already know how to read, spell their name and count, they are behind. Not too long ago child development experts called the ages seven and below the "pre-academic" stage of life.

Too early in children's lives they cease being allowed to make mistakes. When they are in school their score or grade is docked with each mistake. When they miss the ball when batting in T-ball or miss catching a ball everyone goes "oh" and "ah", or worse yet, laughs. **Wanting to be perfect is good**, but being a perfectionist is not. This is where the roots of shyness can be found.

What are some signs that your child is developing into a perfectionist? If your child hesitates before doing most things. If they say "I can't" even before they try. If your child wants to quit the first time something gets hard. If they do not want to turn in their homework because they are afraid it is not perfect. If they say "I am not ready yet" or "Can I watch first?" If they want to quit something when they feel they do not get good enough fast enough. As they get older they typically suffer from high levels of anxiety and fear. The key at this stage is to reward "effort"

and not "results".

Action Tip: Again the first thing to do is just NOTICE. Just become much more aware of their behaviors that reinforce perfectionism. Then initially start by recognizing, praising and rewarding effort over results. Here is one of the most powerful concepts I have learned about success - "Do not expect to be perfect at the start...spend your time and energy being perfect at the END!"

Did you know that when the Apollo spacecraft headed for the moon they were off course almost the entire time? They would have to change course and correct all along the way. But in the end they would land within a few hundred yards from the targeted landing spot! That would be like us throw a rock 50 yards and getting it in a small bucket! If NASA and the Astronauts were perfectionists they would have never left the ground. They only concentrated on being perfect at the end. Perfectionists rarely start anything and quit at the first sign of failure. So teach and reward your child for being a quick, strong starter and that the only thing that really counts is their success at the "end!" The best way is to model it for them.

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
