Superintendent's Message Chuck Hughes, Superintendent

I trust that everyone had a wonderful Spring Break and is ready to finish the school year. I am excited for our senior class with graduation day quickly approaching. It will not be long before our community celebrates this momentous occasion with them. I ask that parents take the time to talk to their students about making good decisions over the next few months with many events and celebrations on the horizon. While it may seem that you are saying the same thing over and over, I assure you that it never hurts to reinforce the importance of safety and responsibility.

As Superintendent, I have been sharing information about the upcoming Building and Site Sinking Fund proposal on the May 2, 2017 ballot. During the past three editions of Community Life I have answered the following questions:


- Q: Why is the district in need of a Building and Site Sinking Fund?
- Q: What is a Sinking Fund?
- Q: What can a Building and Site Sinking Fund is used for?
- Q: How much will my taxes increase if approved by voters?
- Q: What is the difference between a sinking fund and a bond?
- Q: Does the district go into debt and pay interest on sinking fund dollars?
- Q: What technology can be purchased with sinking fund dollars?
- Q: When was the last time the district asked the community for additional building & site improvement dollars?

Additional questions you might have about the Building and Site Sinking Fund proposal include:

Q: Will my tax rate increase if approved by voters?

A: No! There will be no increase in the current tax rate if approved by voters. The graph below explains how the tax rate will be implemented to ensure that there is a net zero increase in the overall tax rate.

Building & Site Sinking Fund Proposal May 2, 2017 Why is this a net zero tax rate increase?



If the Building & Site Sinking Fund proposal passes on May 2, 2017, in June 2017 the HCS Board of Education will lower the current Debt Retirement Tax Levy by 0.5 mills to make up the difference for the new 0.5 mills Sinking Fund.

A net zero increase in the current tax rate for the Hartland Schools community!

Our community's Commitment to Educational Excellence!

Q: How does a sinking fund preserve general fund dollars?

A: The Building and Site Sinking Fund Millage will be collected and deposited into a separate account that can be used for repairs and upgrades to our facilities and technology, relieving the General Fund of the responsibility of covering these concerns. While real estate for future construction can be purchased, the district currently has vacant real estate on Clyde Road.

Q: How will the community know if the sinking fund dollars are used for the purpose intended?

A: Each year, expenditures will be audited by the State of Michigan to ensure compliance with the law governing sinking funds. The district will also post all projects completed using sinking fund dollars.







The goal is to provide workers with advanced skillsets that meet the specific needs of employers.







The students at Village worked very hard in the month of March at honing their reading skills and doing lots of reading outside of school! We are very proud of our young readers!



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

May 2, 2017 — Special School Election "Your vote counts and costs you only your time to vote"

On Tuesday, May 2, 2017, voters in the Hartland Consolidated School District will be asked to consider a 0.5 mill Building and Site Sinking Fund Millage for a period of ten (10) years. Beginning with the 2011-2012 school year, a drastic reduction in per pupil funding from the State of Michigan has resulted in school districts having to use their fund balance (i.e. savings account) in an effort to maintain programs.

Since 2012, Hartland's expenses have been exceeding revenues, resulting in continual cost cutting measures. Making expenditures in non-instructional areas has been difficult. The passage of a sinking fund would help take care of repairs and improvements that we have been putting off in the hope per pupil funding from the State would improve. Should this proposal pass, it would result in NO NET INCREASE TO YOUR CURRENT TAX RATE. The district's debt fund levy is currently set at 8.55 mills.

If this proposal passes, the Board of Education will take action in June 2017 to lower the current levy to 8.05 mills creating a net change of zero mills with the 0.5 mill sinking fund.

What is a Sinking Fund?

A building and site sinking fund is a savings account into which a local school district can deposit voter approved local millage revenue in order to fund projects or major repairs as they arise rather than having to borrow through short-term notes or long-term bonds.

What is the difference between a sinking fund and a bond?

A sinking fund is a pay as you go collection of dollars (in our case we are asking for 0.5 mills or approximately \$600,000 a year) to address specific district repairs, construction of buildings, security issues, technology upgrades, and the purchase of real estate if needed. A bond is like a home mortgage which helps the district to do many projects at one time, or major projects such as building a building, replacing all of the buildings roofs or parking lots, etc.

What can you use a sinking fund for?

Funds can be used to increase security, for repair or construction of buildings, to purchase technology, or purchase real estate for future building sites.

If approved, the money raised through the Building and Site Sinking Fund millage will:

- Protect the community's investment in the school district's buildings and facilities
- Help us continue to provide our students a safe, secure and healthy environment
- Reduce pressure on the general fund so more of the school district's limited educational operating funds are available to support student learning
- Maintain learning facilities that represent one part of the district's effort to keep and attract residents

Can sinking fund dollars be used to pay salaries and benefits?

No! Expenses will be audited annually for compliance with Michigan Department of Treasury guidelines.

How does this Sinking Fund proposal compare with other Sinking Funds in Michigan?

As of the 2015-16 school year, 173 Districts in Michigan collect millage dollars for Building and Site Sinking Funds with the average mills collected being 1.367. The 173 districts include Grand Blanc, Fenton, Lake Fenton, Linden, Bloomfield Hills, Novi, West Bloomfield, Huron Valley, Ann Arbor, Saline, and Grosse Pointe schools.

Where to Vote

Residents of the Hartland Consolidated Schools district will vote in the same local township polling location for the school election as when voting in the general election.



Don't Let Your Child Be a Dabbler Is your child good at starting things . . .

In my last article I wrote about the first part of our dojo training theme for this month "I'm not better than anyone else . . ." This week I get to explain the even more powerful second half of this sentence ". . . but no one is better than me" so you can share this with your child – on the ride home!

There are three important aspects to ". . . but no one is better than me!"

- 1. This first one is pretty obvious. A key to success and a characteristic of all black belts is CONFIDENCE. Confidence in the face of self-doubt, fear, failure or hardship. We often use the saying "Fake it until you make it!" It goes without saying, to do anything worthwhile in life it will probably be hard and take a lot of time. The only way you can consistently succeed is to have the ability to sustain your drive, energy and attitude. Never stopping until you succeed. Remember "Failure is temporary but quitting is permanent!"
- 2. The second one is a sneaky one. Without really know it, many people are lulled to sleep in life. They go through most of their life settling for good enough, average or mediocre? It is easy to see why. Society tells us to fit in. Don't rock the boat. When an employee or student starts to work hard and excel her peers say "What are you doing?! You are going to make us look bad?!" So from a very early age we are rewarded for fitting in and staying average. Not at this dojo. Here is an important black belt attitude and habit "If I am going to do anything worthwhile I always strive to

be the very best. Not just the best at my school or dojo or job. Not just the best in the U.S.. Not just the best in the world. I will be the best ever!!!!!!!!!!"

3. The third one is "Don't Let Your Child Dabble". We have ruined a generation by giving them some bad advice on life and success - "Don't take that first job. Wait and follow your passion!" At 25 or 30 they are following their passion right to their parent's basement! The reason why? They have it all backwards! Passion is not what comes first. First you work really hard on something. Then you get really, really good at it. Then you fall in love with it. Then finally the passion is found. The secret to success? Don't become a dabbler especially in your 20's. But it starts when you are young. It is easy to spot the dabblers. When they are young they try a lot of different sports or activities but never stick with any of them. Later in college they change majors a dozen times. They often have difficulty staying in a committed long term relationship. When they enter the working world they cannot hold a job. Help your child stick with one or two things early, work hard for a long time, and become the best . . . ever!

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
