

Superintendent's Message

Janet Sifferman, Superintendent

It is no surprise that the State of Michigan is suffering a severe economic downturn that affects the revenue public schools receive from the state. As I write this, the state legislature had not yet decided upon the K-12 public school aid budget. We had been told over the summer to expect some kind of deduction in our per-pupil foundation allowance, but it was nowhere near the amount currently being discussed. Over the last several years, as our economy has been suffering,



Hartland Schools has faced budget issues and has planned accordingly. We have cut over \$6 million from our budget by watching our spending, laying off employees, initiating and maintaining an aggressive energy-savings program, and being proactive in the decisions we make. This includes running bond issues to help us ensure our facilities are not neglected. (See the 2010 Bond Issue Timeline below.) We will continue to make conservative decisions and plans while at the same time ensuring that our students receive the best advantages they can through our programs and facilities. Our children are our future and a quality education is imperative.



HCS Flu protocol

HCS will follow the recommendations from the Health Department. Follow and stress universal precautions:

- 1. Wash hands with soap and warm water often
- 2. Practice respiratory etiquette
- 3. Avoid contact with eyes, nose and mouth
- 4. Practice social distancing
- 5. Stay home if you are sick with flu symptoms

Additionally, must be fever-free for 24 hours without the use of fever reducing medication before returning to school or work.



Delay of School Start Times due to inclement weather

<u>1 HOUR DELAY</u>

All students will ride the same bus with the same type of pick-up structure as under normal circumstances other than that bus will arrive at the regular pick-up stop approximately one hour later than usual. No structure changes will exist other than the time element. Under a one-hour delay, **morning junior kindergarten classes will be held**. There will be no vocational education classes.

2 HOUR DELAY

Under a two-hour delay, all students will be picked up as usual, except two hours later than on a regular schedule.

Under a two-hour delay, there will be **<u>NO A.M. JUNIOR KINDERGARTEN</u>**. There will be no vocational education classes.

The purpose of this alternative plan is to enable me the flexibility of delaying school on some mornings due to fog and/or freezing rain. I am hoping that it will help assure that more instructional days can be held, while improving the safety factor for our staff and students.

Under a delay approach, all staff should report prior to the arrival of their students. Below you will find a chart outlining regular starting times and the starting times under a one and two hour delay situation. The chart also shows the time lunch schedules would begin. You will note that no alteration is being made regarding lunch. This will enable all personnel to function as usual. If you have any questions, please contact me.

Let us hope the Promise Scholarship that the State of Michigan adopted for our students who score well on the MME/ACT stays in place for future generations of students.

Please know that the staff at Hartland High School, continue to look at the way we do things and how we can save valuable monetary resources, thus contributing to the success of the Hartland Consolidated School District. One of the things we will begin this year is not mailing out every report card. We will mail the first one to parents and continue mailing the secondary contact report cards. Teen Brains: Still Under Construction -Parents Play Important Role

Many times in frustration parents have been heard to comment about their teen, "What WAS he thinking? Where is his Brain?" The fact is that researchers, including Dr. Jay Giedd, a National Institute of Health scientist, have been studying the biological basis for teens' sometimes peculiar behavior.

One important finding shows that the frontal cortex of the brain that governs judgment, decision making and impulse control-doesn't fully mature until around age 25.

Medically, Dr. Giedd says in terms of cancer, heart disease and other serious illnesses, people in their teens are incredibly healthy. But with accidents as the leading cause of death in adolescents and suicide following close behind, "This isn't a great time emotionally and psychologically. We call it the great paradox of adolescence: right at the time you should be on top of your game, you're not".

Dr. Giedd believes parents need to know that science shows they really can influence their children's brain development. "One thing..the brain is pretty adept at learning by example. As parents, we teach a lot when we don't even know we're teaching, just by showing how we treat our spouses, how we treat other people, what we talk about in the car on the way home, things that a parent says in the car can stick with them for years. They're listening even though it may appear they're not."

FOR PARENTS GUIDING TEENS

- 1. Until age 25, the part of our brain that governs judgment, decision making and impulse control is still under construction, so a parent's job as "foremen" usually is NOT over when teens turn 18.
- 2. Teen emotions and behavior can be unpredictable. Watch for emotional fallout, wear a hard hat and choose battles wisely.
- 3. Be a good model; teach young ones and teens respectfulness by showing respectto them, to others in the family and in the community, and to yourself.
- 4. Assume they're always listening, observing and learning, even when it seems like they're not.

News Flash Parents Are Needed by Teens!

In general, according to a Spring 2009 NSDUH report (National Survey on Drug Use & Health), adolescents who reported having been exposed to substance use prevention messages in the past year were less likely than those who were not exposed to have used cigarettes, alcohol and illicit drugs in the past month.

This report analyzes data about sources of prevention messages and their impact, but the bottom line is that "the prevalence of substance use was lower among adolescents exposed to prevention messages through parental and school sources than among those who were not exposed." (*Source Citation: SAMHSA, Office of Applied Studies (April 2, 2009). The NSDUH Report.)*



Parent Parking No Parking areas as well as Handicapped Parking areas at FIS are clearly marked and are enforced 24 hrs a day, seven days a week. This has come as a surprise to several parents who have returned to their vehicle to find that the Police have issued them a ticket. The circular drive that surrounds the flag is primarily the area of concern. People seem to think that this area is free to park in as long as the busses are not present. This is not true and if you park illegally in that area, or any other marked area, you do so at your own risk and may well be ticketed.

Morning Drop Off Procedure When dropping your child off in the morning it is suggested that you drop them at the

curbside rather than in the parking lot. Students dropped in the parking lot must cross lanes of traffic to get to the sidewalk, and it is much safer to drop them next to the curb. Also, if you must come into the school, do not park your car at the curbside this area is for dropping and moving on. Parking at the curbside blocks other parents who are attempting to drop and leave. If you must park and leave your car please use a regular parking space in the parking lot.

Handicapped Parking Issue There has been a persistent problem involving parents that drop their children off in the

morning or pick them up after school. That problem is the lack of respect for the parking areas that have been designated for handicapped use. These areas are clearly marked with blue paint and/or signage. Please be aware of these areas and leave adequate room for those who need this special consideration. This also applies to the curb ramps designed to allow wheelchairs access to the building. Please do not block these areas !

WCC Welder Joe Young **Takes Silver in International Competition**

Last fall state welding champ and Washtenaw Community College student Joe Young (Hartland High School 2006 graduate) missed the cut to compete for a world title when he placed fifth in the SkillsUSA national welding competition. Though he felt that his welds had hit their mark and were worthy of at least third place, the Las Vegas judges saw it differently.

It was the kind of experience that would break the spirit of any competitor, and Young admits he was upset at the results. But when the call came in early March that one of the U.S. qualifiers had dropped out and he had a chance to compete, he went straight to the welding lab and got to work.

Young won that competition and the right to represent the United States at the World-Skills International Competition in Calgary, Alberta Sept. 1-6. He returned to the U.S. and WCC triumphantly with a silver medal.

In Calgary, Young competed against 21 of the world's best welders from countries as far away as Iran, Korea, New Zealand and Brazil. In the end, only five points separated him from gold medal winner of Thailand.

Before heading to Calgary, Young spent several weeks in Atlanta, GA training with the American Welding Society and with former U.S. competitors now working out of United Association Local 72. With the competition behind him, Young will work in the WCCW elding Department as a technician while he completes his Associate's Degree in Welding Technology. After WCC, he is likely to transfer to Ferris State University or Georgia Tech, where he will apply the \$40,000 scholarship he earned for his first place finish at the International Pre-Trial Competition.

The Two Minute Drill

Last month I wrote an article that gave you 12 tips about preparation in the event of a disaster. Hopefully you were able to take a few of those tips and get them accomplished. If you have not, now is the perfect time to get started on those. By now, I am sure that your youngster came home and told you that I visited their classroom and talked about fire safety. Have you forgotten already? I hope not. Did you check your smoke detector? Have you practiced your escape route recently? Remember you should always know two ways out.....

This month's article is an important one. Did you know that by the time that you got to this portion of the article, approximately 25 seconds has already passed? Now, let's consider the following: It is o' Dark Thirty in the middle of the night. You hear the smoke detector sound off. You and your family only has 1 minute 35 seconds left to safely exit your home! The national average is only 2 minutes. It sounds like a lot of time, but it really isn't. By the time that you are awakened by the detector, get out of bed, find some clothes to put on and investigate what you believe is a nuisance, a minimum of 45 seconds has already passed....And that's if you are fast. Firefighters are good at it. We (or at least I) firefighters tend to leave a set of clothes on the floor (to my wife's demise) because I get called out of bed a few times a week for fire calls. Did you know that almost a minute has passed while you have read the first two paragraphs? You only have a minute left!

So, now you only have one minute left and here is my plea to you. We spend a lot of time in the yard and garage during the fall. We are winterizing and getting stuff put away for the winter and getting geared up for what always appears to be a long cold winter. Some of us are out in the woods already chasing that elusive big buck, and some spend their Saturdays and Sundays enjoying their favorite beverage and snack watching college and pro football, I am not knocking you, I just want you to ask yourself the following: Are you preparing your family for the worst?

In about two hour's time, you can have all of your smoke detectors vacuumed, and new batteries installed in them. You can fix those sticky windows, and make sure that your family can get out of that back door even in the winter time. With your remaining hour, you can install fire escape ladders for your kids if their bedrooms are located on the second floor, or if their window faces the walk-out side of the house. Once you have all of those installed and fixed, practice your escape plan using the second way out, and make sure that EVERYBODY in the household knows where the meeting place is. Don't have a meeting place? Now is a great time to establish one. Is your family's safety worth an hour of your time? Of course!

Guess What? Your two minutes is up! In the time that it took you to read this article, that small fire has now grown to a large fire. The toxic gasses produced by that fire is now approximately 800 degrees F hotter than it was when you started reading this article. Time is crucial when it comes to fire. Making sure that your family knows what to do can be the difference between life and death. It's a fact.



Scouts Bring Honor to Hartland on Mackinac Island

On August 22-29, Boy Scouts Cory Carmack, Cameron Comeau and John Moraitis from Hartland Troop 380 and seventh grade at Ore Creek Middle School joined host Troop 125 from Rochester Hills to serve on the Governor's Honor Guard and Scout Service Camp on Mackinac Island. 

Continuing Care Retirement Communities (CCRCs) are communities that provide a full continuum of care for its residents. They have flexible accommodations designed to meet their resident's health and housing needs as their needs change over time, offering independent living, assisted living and nursing home care, usually all in one location.

As a requirement for admission to most CCRCs, residents are required to pay an entrance fee or a lump sum "buy-in" which, in addition to other things, guarantees the resident's right to live in the facility for the remainder of their lifetime. In addition to the entrance fee, residents also pay a monthly service fee.

The entrance fee is often, but not always, reimbursable (at least partially) if the individual moves from the facility, if they pass away while a resident at the facility, or if they otherwise terminate the contract. Many contracts also contain a provision wherein an individual is able to use a portion of their entrance fee toward their monthly resident charges if the resident exhausts his resources and becomes otherwise unable to pay.

Prior to the new Medicaid law (the Deficit Reduction Act of 2005, hereinafter "DRA"), the entrance fee was generally not considered an available asset for Medicaid eligibility purposes. However, in February of 2006, that all changed. Under the new DRA, an entrance fee is considered an available or "countable" asset if: (1) the contract provides the entrance fee may be used to pay for care should the resident run out of money and become unable to pay their monthly

charge; or (2) the individual is eligible for a refund of any remaining entrance fee when the individual dies, leaves the community or otherwise terminates the life care contract; and (3) the entrance fee does not confer an ownership interest in the CCRC.

Furthermore, under the new law, CCRCs are given the authority to include in their contracts a provision which requires residents to spend all of their resources on their care prior to applying for Medicaid benefits (essentially disallowing any Medicaid planning or asset protection once the contract is signed).

Basically, when an individual applies for admission to a CCRC, the application requests full disclosure of an individual's resources. Prior to the new law, regardless of the amount of resources an individual declared, the CCRC could not prohibit the individual from doing any longterm care planning or asset protection planning and then applying for Medicaid. As stated above, however, CCRCs can now contractually require a resident to spend down all of their assets they declared at the time of admission before applying for medical assistance. This new provision will greatly limit the ability of CCRC residents to protect their assets once admitted to the community.

It is a good idea to consult with an experienced elder law attorney prior to entering into a contract at a Continuing Care Retirement Community to ensure you are aware of the effects your entrance fee/"buy-in" agreement may have on your financial long term care plan.
