9th Annual DoNut Drink, DoNut Do Drugs Event



On Friday, October 30 the Hartland High School lunch room was an exceptionally festive and uplifting experience for seven parents and all the Hartland High School students!

All students were offered free cider and donut after pledging not to use alcohol or any other drug or engage in unsafe behavior for the Halloween weekend. Parents and students interacted with each other, bright orange DoNut Drink, DoNut Do Drugs badges were placed on students, and cider and donuts were enjoyed by all! Tables with free prevention materials were made available to teens; each table identified by a poster with pictures from last year's event. Halloween bookmarks with a prevention message and web sites for teen access accurate information were distributed.

This popular prevention activity began on Halloween of 2001 after it had come to our attention in the late 90's that teens were celebrating Halloween in the neighborhoods exhibiting alcohol and other drug related behaviors. This included high risk behaviors for themselves and bullying behaviors such as intimidating trick or treaters.

The goals of this Prevention campaign include:

- 1. To foster a social climate among students of disapproval of drug abuse and the freedom to express that disapproval
- 2. To promote and foster a caring atmosphere for all students.
- 3. To engage staff, parents, and students together in a fun, wholesome awareness/ prevention activity
- 4. To provide an atmosphere for students to share concerns about alcohol and other drugs in a non-threatening atmosphere
- 5. To distribute information regarding alcohol and other drugs in an atmosphere that allows students to accept it freely in front of other peers
- 6. Last, but not least, to interrupt or prevent plans for use of alcohol and other drugs on Halloween and thereby reduce incidents of adolescent substance abuse on Halloween.

As pledges were being taken students often expressed thoughts and concerns about substance abuse to the adults taking the pledges. To determine the value of this event, data was collected in a survey after Halloween 2008. Results of the survey indicated that 70+% of students felt the event was worthwhile and appreciated both the parents' and the staff's concern. Most importantly 39% of survey takers who indicated that their plans had been to drink or participate in other drug use changed their minds and stayed sober!

A recent study indicates that "the prevalence of substance use was lower among teens exposed to prevention messages through parental and school sources than among those who were not exposed." In any case, by the end of three lunches, seven tired parents knew that their concern for the safety of Hartland High School students was heard and that many did, in fact, take it to heart!

Another upgrade made to the assessing and tax system for Hartland Township is real time updates to both programs. As changes are made, you are able to view them through either the Assessors or Treasurers page at <u>www.hartlandtwp.com</u>. Information should be accurate and up to date at all times.

Dog licenses are now available at the Treasurer's Office year round. To avoid paying the late penalty they must be purchased no later than February 28, 2010. The State law requires that you provide proof of rabies vaccine and spay or neutering on an annual basis. We will be making copies for dog owners of rabies that expire in 2010 or 2011 to keep on file. The cost for dogs that have been spayed or neutered and puppies is \$7.00 per dog. Males and females are \$25 each. After February the cost is \$30 each.

Fire Safety During the Holidays

Last month I wrote about the two minute drill. It talked about the things you can do around your home to prepare you and your family for the worst. We are getting to that time of the year where we are spending a lot of time indoors. We tend to burn more candles and use accessory heating in those rooms that just don't seem to stay warm enough. Please keep the following in mind during this holiday season so you and your family stay safe.

Christmas Trees – If you purchase a real tree every year, be sure to keep it watered. It makes the tree last longer and keeps those pesky needles out of your feet. A real tree that gets dried out is like having one huge gasoline can sitting in your living room. Then we wrap the tree with as many lights as possible and stick wrapped cardboard underneath it. When you really think about it, it is truly insane. If you do get a real tree, consider purchasing a can of the fire retardant that you spray on before decorating it.

Christmas Lights – When lighting that tree or house, be sure that the circuits you are using on the electrical panel are not overloaded. The prices of the new LED Christmas lights are coming down and they use very little electricity. They are safe and bright. Just be sure that you are not connecting too many. Lots of people think that just because they are using more than one outlet, they are good to go. Use your electrical panel breakers to test before it becomes a problem. That happened to me one year. My wife would use the hair dryer, and we couldn't figure out why we were blowing the breaker. It turned out that for whatever reason, the bathroom was on the same circuit. Then again, it was an older home.

Escape routes during the winter – Be sure that decorations do not hamper your escape routes. Be sure to practice them and keep those walkways shoveled. Make sure that the patio door remains free from snow and ice. Even though you don't use it much during the winter, it may become the difference between escaping a fire or not.

Holiday Party's – Drinking and Driving don't mix. Use a designated driver or call a friend or family member. It just isn't worth it. D&D incidents are up, so be sure to always buckle up every time you get into a vehicle.

Finally, have a safe and happy holiday season this year. Check your smoke detectors monthly and look for my January article. Merry Christmas & Happy New Year from the Hartland Deerfield Fire Authority!

On the occasion of its first performance in England on March 23,1749, at the words of the Hallelujah Chorus, "For the Lord God omnipoteth," the audience was so transported that, led by the King, they all rose to their feet and remained standing until the chorus ended. This practice has become as much a part of succeeding performances as the Christmas date.

The Messiah continues to be performed yearly and is dedicated as a living memorial to Mr. J. Robert Grouse, Sr. (January 1, 1874-July 18, 1946). Mr. Crouse was the Hartland born philanthropist and founder of the Hartland Area Project.

Your Duties as a Financial Power of Attorney

One of the most important legal documents an adult can put into place is a Durable Power of Attorney for Finances. This document, which can be signed by anyone age 18 or older, allows individuals to name someone to handle all of their financial decisions if they are ever unable to make them for themselves.

Most people mistakenly assume a spouse or adult child can step in and take care of these decisions if an accident or debilitating illness leaves their loved one without capacity. In fact, there are only two ways to obtain the right to handle the finances of another. One involves petitioning the courts for the right to act on behalf of a loved one and then providing the courts with an annual accountings of how funds were handled. The other is simply signing a Durable Power of Attorney before capacity is lost.

As simple as a Power of Attorney is to sign, the document should never be taken lightly. The person granting this power (the "Principal") gives the recipient (the "Agent") broad and sweeping power to handle their financial affairs. So, it is extremely important that the "Principal" really trust their Agent.

Someday, that person may be making all of their decisions about their money and their property. This means an Agent can sell real estate or spend and invest the Principal's money without notifying the Principal or getting their approval. Depending on the way they are drafted, these powers can be used as soon as the document is signed or they can be withheld until after the Principal becomes incapacitated.

Laws in Michigan do allow for what is known as a "springing" Power of Attorney. This document does not grant the agent any authority until one (or two) doctors declare the agent incompetent to make decisions for themselves. While this does have some advantages in certain situations, there are pitfalls. An individual who is bedfast, confined to a nursing home or even away on a long vacation quickly realizes the advantages of having someone with the legal authority to handle financial matters, make trips to the bank or oversee and authorize home repairs.

You have the right to limit your Agent's powers. You also have the right to revoke or take back a Durable Power of Attorney at any time as long as you are of sound mind. But, again, it is important to select an Agent you trust.

So, what are the responsibilities of an Agent? Anyone who takes on this role for a loved one has a duty (called a "fiduciary duty") to exercise prudence and caution when dealing with he Principal's assets. The Agent act in their best interest at all times.

The Agent can be held liable for any damages resulting from a breach of their duties. That means an Agent should keep very concise and accurate financial records. An Agent must not take any actions with regards to the Principal's finances unless clearly authorized to do so. An Agent is not entitled to use the money for their own benefit nor can they make gifts of the Principal's money unless the Power of Attorney document specifically authorizes this. So, it's important that the Agent always be clear when signing any document that they are acting on the principal's behalf. For example, sign "Jane Doe, by her attorneyinfact, John Doe." This avoids personal liability for the agent.

The power of an Agent ends upon the death of the Principal. The Agent does not have the authority under a Durable Power of Attorney to handle the estate of their loved ones. This power must be granted in a Last Will and Testament or by the Probate court.

Before signing a Power of Attorney, it is important to consult a knowledgeable estate planning attorney to make sure the proper language is put in place to best suit your particular needs.
