The month of January found us back in full swing after the winter holiday break and starting a new semester. While we are still only half way through the 2009/10 school year, we are already making plans for next year. There are a couple of important dates and activities that are happening soon that will help us plan. Kindergarten Round-up for the 2010-2011 school year is scheduled for March 9 and 10 from 5:30 to 8:00 p.m. at the Hartland Educational Support Services Center. Please refer to the announcement below for further



details. Scheduling for Hartland High School students begins this month and you may contact Hartland Middle School (for incoming freshman) or Hartland High School if you have specific questions regarding this process.

Please remember that February 23 is the special election for our \$28,045,000 2010 Bond Issue proposal. This proposal affects every building in the district and focuses on facilities, energy, technology, and safety. This is an important piece of the puzzle in helping us manage during these difficult economic times. Passage of this proposal will not increase the current tax rate of 7.6 mils on property within the Hartland Consolidated Schools district. ## **Kindergarten Registration 2010-201**

Officials of the Hartland Consolidated Schools have announced that they will be accepting registration for kindergarten enrollments for the 2010-2011 school year. Children are eligible for enrollment in kindergarten in September of 2010 if they will have their fifth (5th) birthday on or before December 1, 2010.

A Junior Kindergarten program may be offered on a limited basis. A minimum number of students is required for the program to be made available. Parents must agree to provide transportation in order to participate. You may contact Scott VanEpps at 810.626.2111 for more information.

#### Please bring the following:

- Original with seal and a <u>copy</u> of the birth certificate
- Original and a copy of the immunization records with proof of DTP, Polio, MMR, Hepatitis B, Chicken Pox shots (or proof of having had the illness), and vision screening.
- Proof of residency copy of one of the following: certificate of occupancy, purchase agreement, builder's permit, rent receipt or agreement, mortgage statement/payment receipt, voter registration card, utility bill, driver's license.

While we need to see the originals, it will expedite the enrollment process if you also bring copies of the originals.

Kindergarten registration packets will be available beginning February 8, 2010 at the Board of Education office, the Community Education office, each elementary school office and the Hartland Child Care Center (51 building). You can also download the packet from our website: hartlandschools.us.

## The Dance Project in the Hartland Schools

In February of 2008, a group of Hartland moms began a movement for positive change in the ways of dancing at Hartland High School. It was clear that students needed alternatives to the typical "bump and grind" found at the school dances.

Students, parents, community and church members began working together as part of an organization called The Dance Project, to plan dances with instruction for area teens. The community dances are student-run, afford-



able, and play clean music selected by the students. The goal then, as now, is to bring about positive change to typical high school dancing.

Now, two years and seven community dances later, a significant number of students have joined in this cultural change. Throughout the summer, and the current school year, more and more Hartland students have participated in weekly dances, where "swing" is the dance of choice for groups of up to 80 teens.

With support from Superintendent Sifferman, the Hartland Board of Education, administrators, counselors and staff alike, The Dance Project is making a difference in the Hartland Schools.

At the High School level, administration, teachers and counselors have worked in cooperation with The Dance Project to survey students, modify standards, integrate dance instruction, and promote positive alternatives for high school dancing. Hartland Middle School at Ore Creek has opened up the school dances to include swing dance instruction as an option for interested students.

With help from Hartland Farms Intermediate Principal, Keenan Simpson, The Dance Project has facilitated lunch time dance instruction/demonstration, presented approximately twice a month for students to participate. A dance with instruction during 5<sup>th</sup> Grade Camp is being considered for the spring.

With Winterfest season upon us there are some suggestions The Dance Project has for community members:

- 1. Contact Hartland High School to chaperone the Winterfest Dance.
- 2. Offer guidance for your teens on appropriate dancing.
- 3. Prepare your teen to defend against unwanted advances during a school dance, and encourage him/her to notify proper authorities when necessary.
- 4. Support school policy and encourage modest dress for your teens.
- 5. Suggest Monday night dancing (with instruction) for your teen (see contact below).

## **Non-School Staff Chaperones:**

Chaperoning dances is considered an important job. The following guidelines must be followed when chaperoning:

- 1. Chaperones must be a parent or guardian of a current Hartland High School student.
- 2. All chaperones must be pre-registered for an event with the dance supervisor and be notified of acceptance as a chaperone. This list will be provided to the building principal for input as to consideration prior to finalization.
- 3. Chaperones must attend a meeting with administration ½ hour prior to the start of the dance. A failure to arrive on time for this meeting will result in the individual being asked to not chaperone on that night.
- 4. All chaperones must wear an official school chaperone badge distributed at the chaperoning meeting.
- 5. Chaperones will be responsible for their assigned responsibility for the entire dance.
- 6. Chaperones will report all student issues to the school administration or school staff.
- 7. Chaperones will turn in their official chaperone badge at the front table prior to leaving for the evening.

#### **Dress Code for Dances:**

Parents, please remember that Hartland High School continues to utilize appropriate dress code expectations for all dances. The school district dress code applies to all dances. However, the administration understands that the clothing purchased for dances is subject to style and fashion. Administrative discretion will be used for individual situations as they arise. Students choosing to alter their dress while at the dance shall be subjected to discipline such as removal from the dance and future dances. ## **Editors redesign "The Eagle"** Ellen Regorrah, Editor in Chief of The Eagle

The High School newspaper staff had the unique opportunity this past month to learn design techniques from Cheryl Pell, Director of the Michigan Interscholastic Press Association (MIPA). Each year The Eagle newspaper sends in the papers they have published throughout the year to be judged at MIPA. Every fall the staff travels to Lansing to a MIPA conference to attend workshops on design and writing. This fall however due to the cost of registration, the staff was unable to attend. To make up for the workshops students missed out on, Pell traveled to Hartland to share tricks and tips on designing pages. "She was a big inspiration to the design for my page this quarterly," Entertainment Editor Nick Piper said. Editors of the paper were excused out of fifth hour to get extra time with Pell. Pell critiqued past issues of the paper and gave ideas on how to improve. "For our next issue we will be using bigger pictures, smaller fonts and opening up the page to increase readability," Executive Editor Tom Mann said.

During sixth hour, normal meeting time for the staff, the writers were able to meet and learn from Pell. During that time, editors used the techniques learned to improve their page. She gave many ideas and suggestions that were utilized for the December 18 issue.

## **School Leadership Conference**

On November 18, ten students from Hartland High School participated in the Kensington Lakes Activities Association's Annual Leadership Forum. The event, held at 59 West Banquet Hall, offered students an opportunity to collaborate with students from ten other local high schools on current issues including dances, pep assemblies, energy saving practices, school spirit, and many others. The students first heard from Stu Saunders, a nationally recognized speaker on leadership. Stu's message reminded students the potential individuals have as leaders and organizers, beyond just being part of groups and clubs. Following Mr. Saunders's address, students created coloring packs for children at Mott Children's Hospital in Detroit. The packs included several coloring pages and crayons for patients and young family members to help pass the time during and between treatments. The students participating in the forum also made a large donation to Mott Children's Hospital's "snow pile" of gifts for the holiday season and basic toiletries and clothing donations. For those individuals who are already in a nursing home, despite the harsh new rules, elder law attorneys are continuing to help them qualify for Medicaid benefits while maximizing the amount of money they are able keep.

## Here are just a few examples of families we were able to assist post DRA enactment:

Frank\* came into our office in June. His wife, Betty,\* had entered a nursing home which was costing the couple over \$6,000 each month. Not including their home, their assets totaled roughly \$100,000 at the time Betty entered the nursing home in April. Frank was told by the state that he could keep the couples' home as an exempt asset and then once they spent down to

approximately \$51,000, Betty would qualify for Medicaid.

We advised Frank that he could stop spending down immediately and he could create a "solely for the benefit of a spouse" trust" with her portion of the assets, so long as the terms of the trust conformed with the provisions under the new law.

The same month of our initial meeting, we put a Medicaid application on file. Shortly after filing the application, we received word that Betty was approved for benefits retroactive to the date of application. Not only did Frank save over \$59,000, but their co-pay to the nursing home is just \$510 per month!

Before establishing a trust, it is imperative that you consult with someone who understands the new criteria for this type of trust under the DRA. If structured improperly, the same trust established by Frank could have resulted in a 9 month Medicaid penalty during which Betty would be ineligible for Medicaid! Patty\* met with our office in March to discuss the situation with her mother, Thelma. Patty\* moved in with her mother, Alice, a few years ago to help care for her. Last year Alice had a stroke and Patty quit her job to assist her mother full time. When Patty came to our office, it had gotten to the point that Alice needed more help than Patty could provide. The doctor told Alice it was no longer safe for her to live at home, even with Patty's assistance. Alice, the doctor said, needed nursing home care.

Patty and Alice were was concerned that Alice would have to sell her house to pay for her care and Patty would have no place to live. It was very important to Alice that she give her home to her daughter as a way of saying thank you for the care Patty had provided. But, both Patty and Alice had heard that gifting the home would cause her to be ineligible for Medicaid (and under the new DRA, the penalty wouldn't even start until Alice applied for Medicaid and was otherwise eligible!). Through some planning, we were able to transfer the home to Patty, without causing any Medicaid penalties for her mother. The same month Alice went into the nursing home, we applied for Medicaid, included the transfer of the home on her application, and Alice was approved for benefits!

Gifting an applicant's residence to a caretaker child continues to be available under the new DRA so long as the requisite proof is provided, including a doctor's statement. Again, if the transfer is made improperly, the result could be up to five years of Medicaid ineligibility!

Please keep in mind that Medicaid planning is very fact-specific and not all of the above planning techniques work in every situation. Before spending down all of your assets, we recommend contacting an elder law attorney knowledgeable in the area of Medicaid laws.
