Superintendent's Message

Amazingly, we are already in the homestretch of the 2009/10 school year. Graduation is around the corner and our high school students are eagerly anticipating prom night just a few days away. Our spring sports calendar is winding down and we are celebrating another successful season for our athletes. We have much to be thankful for in Hartland. While times are difficult for everyone across the state and across the country, Hartland continues to band together



and keep its focus on what is important - family, school, community. With that in mind, I hope all of you will take the time to vote in our annual school election on May 4. Three Board of Education seats are on the ballot along with the 18mill non-homestead proposal. This proposal is a **renewal** of the 18 mills that has been levied on non-homestead properties since the passage of Proposal A in 1994. Principal residences and other qualified property are exempt. This renewal equates to \$4,799,517 in revenue for Hartland Consolidated Schools.

Civil War Veterans get headstones

In honor of two War of 1812 Veterans who are buried in the Hartland Village Cemetery, the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War and the Hartland High School History Club will

be holding a dedication ceremony at 12 noon on Saturday May 15, which is Armed

LTC Paul Scheidler, a Hartland High School teacher, is the History Club Sponsor and also the current Commander of the local chapter of the Sons, which is Gilluly-Kingsley Camp #120 SOUV, based in Howell.

The Camp is the 100+ year old legacy organization of the GAR (Grand Army of the Republic) camps created by the Union Veterans of the Civil War and is similar in purpose to newer more familiar organizations such as the Veterans of Foreign Wars and the American Legion.

The "Sons" was created by the children of Civil War veterans as a way to keep the memory of their fathers alive and ensure that all Civil War Veterans would receive a proper military funeral and government headstone. The "Sons" continue to stand guard, and are constantly researching and discovering missing or forgotten Veterans, not just from the Civil War, but also from earlier wars making sure they are remembered with a headstone and a flag on Veteran's Day and Memorial Day.

 $George\,Buckley\,and\,Warren\,Huntley\,are\,two\,such\,Veterans.\,They\,came\,to\,Hartland\,Har$ long after the war had ended and died here in the mid 1800's. If they had wooden headstones when they were originally buried they are now long gone. Although cemetery records exist there are no markers for these two men buried in the Village Cemetery side by side long ago. The Government has now issued the stones and members of the SOUV, along with high school students from the History Club, will place them when the ground thaws.

The event is meant to take place early in May so it does not to interfere with the Memorial Eve Luminary or the Memorial Day ceremonies themselves. The SOUV want the new headstones to be in place with flag holders when Memorial Day arrives.

The public is welcome and encouraged to attend. The rewill be a short remembranceaccording to the regulations and in accordance with the traditions of their peers, a roll call of the dead, and possibly a volley from some period re-enactors.



Spring is a time of Renewal; not Regret

Now that "spring has sprung" many of us have begun to think of the traditional activities: spring cleaning, running outside, what flowers to plant, should we put in a garden, and the lawn needs so much work! For teens, however, often their thoughts turn to being outside, at the lake, and in general gathering with their friends having a good time. Many times this will involve alcohol and/or other drugs. We have all heard the stories about overdose, accidents, assaults, thefts, fights—all fueled by substance use of teens. Many times the consequences of these drug fueled incidents haunt a teen and perhaps their family for many years or even a lifetime.

What is a parent to do? How can we protect our children? They want to be independent and you want to trust them. However, consider the following:

Be Aware- After a decade of consistent decline in teen drug abuse, the most recent (2009) national studies released in March point to a marked upswing in use of drugs that teens are likely to encounter at parties and in other social situations. Specifically, alcohol, marijuana and prescription drugs are showing a marked increase. This trend has been noted in Livingston County as well as Hartland.

Take Action- According to Steve Pasierb, president and CEO of Partnership for a Drug-Free America, parents must pay closer attention to their kids' behavior-especially their social interactions- AND they must take action just as soon as they think their child may be using drugs or drinking. This resurgence in teen drug and alcohol use comes at a time when pro-drug cues in popular culture- film, television and online- is expanding and funding for anti-drug media is declining.

KnowYour Liability- Understand the Party Host Liability laws. A host of a party at which a minor either possesses or consumes alcohol, or any person, regardless of age, consumes or possesses a controlled substance may be committing a misdemeanor. This offense can be punishable by a fine and/or jail. The law applies to owners, tenants or any other person having control or authority over a premises, residence or property. If you serve no alcohol and a minor arrives with alcohol obtained elsewhere, you still are required to take "corrective action" by contacting police or confiscating the alcohol. You are "allowing" a minor to possess or consume alcohol if you: 1. give written permission as in a flyer or invitation 2. verbally give permission or 3. fail to take corrective action. Actively monitor youth who are gathered at your home or on your property! Offer food, healthy and fun activities, and alcohol free beverages.

Make your Expectations Clear- Make sure that your teen knows that your expectations are that he/she will obey the law and refrain from alcohol until of legal age and that under no circumstances would you accept use of an illegal drug. Convey clear consequences for violating your trust. Have this conversation with caring and concern for your child's welfare and safety. Emphasize open communication. State that, additionally, should a difficult or compromising situation arise that you want to be called so that you can assist your child and secure their safety.

Beware the Internet- Make it clear to your child that under no circumstances should it be shared on social networking sites when parents will not be home or when a teen gathering is occurring. This can lead to situations where tremendous property damage occurs and can escalate into many scenarios of personal injury or harm.

Understand Adolescent Physiology- Recent studies show that the human brain; especially the part of the brain that governs judgment, decision making and impulse control is still under construction until age 25. This job is NOT over when a teen turns 18! Medically, for the most part, teens are incredibly healthy. The leading cause of death in adolescents is accidents; with suicide following close behind. Dr. Jay Giedd, a National Institute of Health scientist who has studied the biological basis for teen behavior, calls this the "great paradox". He says that adolescence isn't a great time emotionally and psychologically. "Right at the time you should be on top of your game, you're not!" Dr. Giedd states that the parent's job is still to be the "foreman" of the adolescent youth providing structure, clear expectations, and role modeling for the adolescent youth.

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

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Emergency Preparedness - Creating a Supply Kit

Last month I started a series on Emergency Preparedness. May begins the official Tornado and Thunderstorm season in Michigan. So, this month's topic couldn't be more fitting. We started last month by how to create a basic emergency plan. If you missed it, or you would like to read ahead, please go to www.hartlandareafire. com for more information.

Having a disaster supply kit ready to take with you at a moment's notice ensures that you will have necessary supplies no matter how fast you may need to evacuate. Pack supplies in duffel bags or backpacks and keep them in a designated place. Your kit will also come in handy if you must take shelter in your home. This list will help ensure that your disaster supply kit includes all of the essentials.

Water: Pack at least one gallon per person per day for at least three days. Store the water in tightly sealed, non-breakable plastic. Fiberglass or enamel-lined metal containers are best. Be sure to change your water every 6 months.

Food: Pack enough food to last each family member at least three days. Include canned and boxed foods, because they require little preparation and stay good for long periods of time. Remember to bring a manual can opener or get the food in self opening cans. Pack foods in sealed metal or plastic containers. Replace foods every six months. Include foods for infants and family members with special di-

Tools & Equipment: Battery powered radio. Flashlights and spare batteries. Re-sealable plastic bags. Washcloths and Towels. Paper cups and plates. Plastic tableware. Toothbrushes, toothpaste, shampoo, deodorant and other toiletries. Heavy duty plastic garbage bags. Change of clothing and an extra pair of shoes and socks for each person. Blankets or sleeping bag for each person.

Personal Items: Personal identification. Copies of birth and marriage certificates. Inventory of household goods, bank account numbers and other important documents. Maps. Extra car and house keys, prescription medications. Basic First Aid Kit.

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You May Think You Know Medicaid . . .

After a Medicaid recipient dies, the state has the right to recover any assets remaining in order to reimburse itself for Medicaid benefits paid out. This is called Estate Recovery (ER). Not just confusing for the families - the Attorneys for the States, themselves, find it challenging to interpret ER laws. In order to understand Estate Recovery, you need to read both the federal provisions AND the state provisions side by side to make sense of the ER laws. Michigan is the only state in the US that doesn't have an estate recovery plan – but it is coming!

Recipients Affected

- 1. Recipients who have received medical assistance from age 55 and up
- 2. Recipients who are in long-term care regardless of age. Basically, the only people not affected are those under 55 receiving medical assistance who were never admitted into the nursing home. Some states are only pursuing certain real and personal property that the Medicaid recipient had titled in their name, alone. But many states

are taking advantage of the Federal law's expanded definition of "estate" that allows the states to recover most assets in which the Medicaid recipient had an ownership interest in at the time of their death.

Assets Affected

1. Assets titled solely in the name of the recipient (real and personal property)

2. Assets with a TOD/POD provision (real and personal property) practicality - the banks struggled with this - how would they know when one of their clients was a Medicaid recipient? It is essentially a first come-first serve basis. If the state finds out a Medicaid recipient dies - they have a list of all their assets from the Medicaid app and if they make it to the bank, the money is theirs. They have the right to take the TOD/POD beneficiary to court - but it isn't usually worth their time/effort (which is often the case with non-probate assets). Again, however, the states have become very aggressive and it is a matter for them of how much recovery will they get?

3. Jointly titled property

- 4. Property held in trust
- 5. Life estates
- 6. Life insurance
- 7. Excess funeral plans: a story in our state - a grandfather bought a funeral plan for \$7500 outlining everything he wanted - cas $ket, service, \\ \\ music, \\ plot, \\ headstone, \\ etc... \\ and$ listed the grandson as the residual beneficiary should there be any monies left over. Upon his death - the grandson decided to re-plan grandpa's funeral by way of a cremation with no service - cutting the costs to \$2500 and demanded the excess \$5000. Some states are putting in place laws that state that any excess now goes to the state
- 8. Transfers made for inadequate consideration by someone receiving benefits (for example if a NH resident/Medicaid recipient signs a deed on his death bed, transferring his house to his granddaughter - the state can petition the court to have the transfer set aside as a voidable transfer. Has happened usually what turns into a 3 year civil suit - but the state will most likely be successful.

9. If you open a probate estate (ie if assets were titled solely in the name of the Medicaid recipient) you must notify the state. Putting notice in the paper is not enough.

Assets Not Affected

1) Any long term care insurance benefits that were paid out on behalf of the Medicaid recipient are credited against the ER "bill" [Ex. Medicaid recipient in NH for 4 years prior to death. LTC paid \$60,000 for the first 2 years and Medicaid paid \$60,000 for the second two years. The estate recovery bill - ZERO dollars!

2) ER cannot proceed with a claim if there is a surviving spouse. ER can, however, go after the estate of the surviving spouse 3) ER cannot proceed with a claim if there

is a minor/blind/disabled child

Avoidance of Estate Recovery







In recent years, the fastest growing means of protecting land has been through the use of conservation easements, a legal agreement between a private landowner and a land trust that permanently limits the scope and type of development while leaving the land in private ownership. LLC funds their land protection activities through private donations, gifts from corporations and foundations, and fundraisers. The organization currently has over 530 acres under protection.


Farmers' Club Seeks Members

widely differing viewpoints and restore order and civility to local government. This was done in a selfless and dignified manner. Encouraging cooperation and fresh ideas from those who had new ideas and approaches while respecting the opinion of those already involved, he helped foster an environment of productive cooperation.

Included here is an excerpt from a letter written by Mr. Joe Petrucci of the Hartland Township Board which was read to the board at a public meeting upon Mr. Rhode's third and final retirement in 2007:

"The people elected you several years ago as their supervisor. Then a few years later the previous Township Board had to find someone to fill the seat of a recalled supervisor. This was not an easy task for that Board because under the circumstances they had to go outside the Board members to fill that seat. They had to find someone who could bring this Township together. They had to find someone with the personality, respect and demeanor that could take charge and bring peace in this Township.

Perhaps on a much larger scale there was similar challenge that was undertaken by one of our Presidents, Gerald R. Ford. He too found himself in the highest office in the land at a very uncomfortable, uncertain and untrusting time. It is not easy to be put in that position, because I'm sure the challenges are far beyond what I can imagine.

Don, you took on that challenge and you did not shrink from the responsibility. You brought calm to this Township that was in a terrible storm. During that short time of our local history, to the world, you may have been one person, but to Hartland Township you were the

She went on to chair two extremely successful Relay for Life events that garnered the Hartland community national recognition from the American Cancer Society for the extent to which Nora was

able to raise.

In January 2010 Nora moved her family to the Upper Peninsula for financial and personal reasons. The Hartland community lost one of its brightest beacons and strongest advocates. She will be forever missed.

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

Hartland Wrestling Club

The Hartland Youth Wrestling Club Elementary Dual Team won the Michigan Youth WrestlingAssociation (MYWA) State Championship held in Battle Creek at Kellogg Arena. The HWC Middle School Dual Team had tremendous success as well with a 3rd place finish. The Elementary Team, with wrestlers from K-6th grades, boast a nearly perfect record on the Myway Dual Tournament circuit for the past 2 years, with the only loss coming in January 2010 to the Holly Elementary Dual Team by 1 point.

At the 2010 Myway Dual Team State Finals, after 65 total matches, Hartland's Elementary team destruction tally totaled **45 wins.** Of those wins **26 were Pins, 2 Tech Falls** (winning by 15+ points) and **9** ended in **Major decisions** (winning by 8-14 points). HWC Elementary wrestlers handily defeated *Dansville 52-7, Dundee 48-15 & Swartz Creek 55-6, Hesperia* in the Semi's *38-27* and *Holly* in the State Finals round *32-27*, crowning them the undisputed 2010 State Champs 2-years in a row.

These wrestlers and many others are part of the 100+ Hartland Wrestling Club trained by HWC Head Coach, Jerry Bommarito and Coach Bob Phifer. The club is made up of beginner/novice to expert wrestlers in and around the Hartland area between the ages of 5-14. The program is designed to introduce new wrestlers to the sport allowing them to earn their way to the Open or Experienced practices and tournaments. Open and Experienced wrestlers are trained with many of the same demands and techniques expected at the high school level. The HWC Open practices are not for the weak minded, it is after all, where Hartland Wrestling Champions are made.

The HWC also qualified 35 wrestlers to the individual Mid Michigan Wrestling Association League Finals, held at Howell High School this season with over 800 youth wrestlers from all over the state of Michigan, placing 15 in the TOP 4 and 5 being crowned League Champions. The Michigan Youth Wrestling Association hosted the Individual State Finals, where 2,400 of the best youth wrestlers from all over the state of Michigan converged on Battle Creek. HWC qualified 12 and all 12 placed in the TOP 6 in the State of Michigan.

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
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Do the Math on Summer Memberships
