Link Crew Welcomes The Class Of 2014

On Tuesday, August 31 from 7:45 a.m. until 12:30 p.m. Hartland High School will welcome the class of 2014 with a mandatory orientation program called Link Crew. This orientation is designed for students only. Parents will have an opportunity to join their student at the conclusion of the Link Orientation.

The Link Crew program "links" junior and senior students with a "crew" of freshmen. For two days prior to the orientation, these junior and senior Link Leaders, from diverse social backgrounds, will be trained to lead small groups, to be role models to others, and to guide the activities for the orientation day. At the heart of the Link Crew program is the belief that these older students are capable of great leadership to the freshmen, as well as other students on campus.

The purpose of the Link Crew orientation day is to give the freshmen a positive experience on the HHS campus. The day will begin with an exciting welcome. After a few warm-up activities, the students will participate in some get-to-know-you activities with their classmates and Link Leaders. Then students will be introduced to their assigned Link Leaders. Each crew will participate in small group activities designed to help the students learn about each other, their school, and their Link Leaders. The small group time will conclude with a brief general tour of the school, pointing out key locations such as the main office, cafeteria and main academic hallways.

Students must attend this orientation to receive a copy of their class schedule prior to the first day of school. The school tour provided during the orientation will not allow the students to walk their individual schedules. Therefore, parents are invited to join their ninth grade student following the conclusion of the orientation program for ice cream. At this time, parents and students may walk through their class schedule in order to feel more comfortable with class locations prior to the first day of school.

Stay tuned because Link Crew continues throughout the entire year with social and academic follow-ups between the Link Leaders and their crews.

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

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



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Financial Gifts to Children and Their effect on Medicaid Qualification . . .

There are so many misconceptions surrounding Medicaid with respect to financial gifts, that we thought we would address some of the more frequently asked questions:

Q: "Is it true that under current Medicaid laws, a parent cannot make financial gifts to their children once they have entered the nursing home?" A: No. In fact, a proper gifting program is agreat Medicaid planning technique. At the time an applicant applies for Medicaid, the state will "look back" five years to see if any gifts have been made. Any financial gifts or transfers for less than fair market value during the five year look back may cause a delay in an applicant's eligibility. A proper gifting program requires calculating the penalties *prior* to making gifts.

Q: "Is \$13,000 per year the maximum my mother can give me if she is going to apply for Medicaid?"

A: No. The \$13,000 per year gift people ask about when discussing Medicaid Planning is a *tax law* figure and not relevant with respect to Medicaid's specific asset transfer rules. The maximum monetary figure Medicaid applicants need to concern themselves with is the "penalty divisor" for their state. The penalty divisor is the state assessed average cost for nursing home care by which the state assesses Medicaid penalties.

The penalty divisor is \$6,362 for Michigan (these figures are subject to change each year, which is why consulting an expert knowledgeable in Medicaid law is imperative).

Q: "What if my mother just gives me all of her money to hold onto for her. Can I tell the state my mother does not have any money and qualify her immediately for Medicaid?"

A: Absolutely NOT. Failure to report gifts made by a Medicaid applicant constitutes fraud. Further, let's say your mother had \$21,000 when she entered the nursing home. If she were to give you all of her money in one lump sum. the gift would result in a penalty (i.e. a period of ineligibility during which time she could not receive Medicaid) in Michigan of three and one half months from the date she entered the nursing home and ran out of money, forward.

Q: "I know that my mother's house is considered 'exempt' under Medicaid laws. Can my mother give me the house without incurring penalties?"

A: No. Any assets which are given away (personal property or real property) are considered gifts. If your mother gave you her home, the state will assess a penalty based on the fair market value of the house at the time your mother transferred the home to you.

There are a number of steps a Medicaid applicant can take to preserve their assets, ranging from gifting strategies, personal care contracts, private annuities, raising the Community Spouse Resource Allowance, etc... What you need to remember is that the laws are constantly changing and the planning you did for your mother-in-law six months ago may not be proper for your mother tomorrow. Consult a knowledgeable elder law attorney for advice.



Our reviews include everything from the installation of a fence to the construction of a large retail center.

At the first hint of warm weather we start to receive phone calls inquiring about the steps needed to get a permit for home improvements, i.e., building a deck, installing fences, re-roofing, etc. The general "rule of thumb" is when you intend to initiate work on the property or change any use of the property it requires a Land Use Permit.

Following are the steps for the typical residential improvement project: (1) File an application with the associated fee with the Township Planning Department; (2) Provide a survey of the property, i.e. mortgage survey showing the location and dimensions of the improvement and measurements from any existing structure(s) and property line; (3) Provide all documents needed to secure a Building Permit with the Livingston County Building Department; and, (4) Take the Land Use Permit and approved documents to Livingston County for a Building Permit. We are excited that you are investing in the community, whether your project is large or small. Please let us know how we may assist you.

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Managing a Disaster at Home

Two months ago I started a series on Emergency Preparedness. If you missed them, or you would like to read ahead, please go to **www.hartlandareafire.com** for more information.

Although you may not be asked to evacuate-and even if you are-disasters can isolate you from outside help and make it necessary for you to care for yourself for days at a time. Your disaster supply kit will contain many of the tools and supplies you need. Power Outages: Practice energy conservation to help your power company avoid rolling blackouts. Always keep your car's fuel tank at least half full because gas stations use electricity to operate pumps. Know how to manually release your electric garage door. Protect your computer with a surge protector. If the power goes out, check your fuse box or circuit breaker, or contact a neighbor to see if the outage is limited to your own home. Avoid opening the refrigerator and freezer doors. If you plan to use a generator, operate it outside only, never in a basement or garage. Make sure to follow mfg. instructions accordingly.

What to do after a disaster: Whether returning home or venturing out for the first time, beware of new dangers that may have arisen because of the disaster. You may experience washed out roads, downed power poles, contaminated drinking water or other hazards. Report problems promptly to local officials so that corrective measures can be taken.

Inspect your home for damage. Look for structural damage, loose or damaged electrical wires, and gas leaks before re-entering your home. If you doubt the safety of the structure, contact a professional before entering. Do not enter a fire damaged house until authorities have inspected it. Check the refrigerator and discard spoiled food. Contact your insurance agent.

Having an emergency plan and a disaster supply kit will help you manage in almost every kind of crisis, whether natural or caused by humans. However, each situation requires specific kinds of preparation and action. Educate yourself based on the type of situations you are likely to encounter.

Everybody have a safe and enjoyable summer.

Remember slow down for kids that will no longer be in school.

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



Outreach/Resource Advocate

The Hartland Senior Center is a federally recognized focal point for senior services in the northeast corner of Livingston County. We provide information and assistance to anyone in the community on subjects including: housing, in-home services, homechores and repairs, legal and medical services, transportation, nutrition, care-giving, health insurances, tax assistance, Medicare and Medicaid, and long-distance caregiving. Our Resource Advocate, Carol Ringle, meets with individuals in her office and can also meet with individuals in their own home. The Outreach office is truly the "heart" of the Hartland Senior Center. If you would like to schedule an appointment with Carol please call her Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursdays at 810.626.2139.

Financial Fraud: The Senior Brigade from the Atty. General's Office did a presentation at the senior center on Financial Fraud and here are a few guidelines:

- Beware of Investment Seminars They try to get you to attend by offering you a free dinner. They are trying to sell you investments and often use phony qualifications and similar names of well-established financial companies.
 - When investing in any products make sure they are the right thing for you, i.e., Annunities are not always the best choice for a senior investor - because you can't draw any money out for a certain period of time without a penalty. Plus the tax implications.
- Be wary of anyone who uses the language "Guaranteed -No Risk". Often will offer you other services if you buy the Product, i.e., a "free" will or trust plus tax service. Nothing is for free – the cost will be hidden in membership fees, broker fees, handling fees, etc. They also try to get you sign up today in order to get a special deal. Remember you have 3 days to break a contract you have signed. Never wire money.
- Affinity Fraud These are scams that prey upon members of an identifiable group. They often pretend to be members of your church, club, etc. and exploit the trust and friendships that exist in groups of people who have something in common. They will lead you to believe other savvy investors have already invested and you better get on the bandwagon. They often create a false sense of security-Remember the higher the return the greater the risk of the investment.

How to find out if a company is legitimate is by calling the Better Business Bureau or Atty. General's Office in Lansing to see if there are any complaints against the company. Follow your feelings, if you suspect something is wrong and the explanations you receive aren't satisfactory, don't get involved. Always BE AWARE of investment scams, avoid making a bad decision by protecting yourself from fraud, and TAKE ACTION if you become a victim by contacting the Consumer Protection Division, toll-free, at 1.877.765.8388 or at www.michigan.gov/ag.

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



For the main part of the project, the girls chose to make blankets to donate. Each girl was required to shop for and purchase blanket material. Using sewing machines the girls completed the Sew Simple Badge by learning to thread a machine and sew patches on their own vests. Additionally, in the preceding 2 years, each girl earned the Junior Aide award by mentoring younger troops and completing the Sign of the Sun project.

Just a few days after the girls completed the blankets, the ARC Disaster Relief Truck paid a visit to the school. On that afternoon, Colleen taught the girls the "Red Cross Ready Program.". These blankets will be given to disaster victims in Livingston County. The girls visited the ARC Livingston Campus building to assemble Kids care packs. These care packs are specifically made for children involved in disasters. The girls donated supplies, made encouragement cards, and assembled the care packs. The girls also assembled dog and cat care packs at home, and donated them for pets involved in disasters. The girls were given a tour of the facility which improved their understanding of the process and mission of the ARC. ARC returned to the Farms Intermediate School where Colleen presented the First Aid program, completing the requirements for the badge.

On April 19, each girl fulfilled the requirements to receive the Bronze Award, and on June 11 received this award at Camp Linden. The leaders and the girls would like to thank the American Red Cross and Colleen Brothers for helping them achieve this award. Additionally, the leaders would like to thank the parents for their ongoing support of the troop. The troop is lead by Jennifer Allen, Denise Cooper, and Stacie Hogan.






Daisy Troop 41689 earn patch
