We had a smooth, successful start to the 2010/11 school year. We welcomed new staff members and new students to our school family. Everyone has settled into their school routine.

October is the month for MEAP (Michigan Educational Assessment Program) testing across the State of Michigan for students in grades 3-9. The testing window begins on October 12 and ends October 20. Make-up tests take place through October 29. We are required to teach the grade level



content expectations the state has established based on national standards. Our curriculum is aligned with these standards. The MEAP test is designed to assess our teaching of these standards and is the benchmark with which we are judged by the state and our public. While the MEAP is by no means the only assessment tool we have, it is the most public. Therefore, it is important that our students do well.

Rest assured our educational practices are not focused solely on standardized testing. We feel it is important to educate the whole child by providing opportunities for reflection, critical thinking, speaking and listening, as well as instruction in the core content areas and the arts. However, because of the importance placed on the MEAP tests, we ask that you help us provide an optimum testing session for our students by ensuring that your child is present, well rested and fed.

Student Handbook Information

All Hartland High School students should have received a 2010-2011 handbook. Please be sure to review these with your child. Some important rules are highlighted below:

STUDENT APPEARANCE

A student's appearance must be neat, clean, decent, and appropriate. Dress or grooming which could constitute a health or safety hazard or which could be considered unkempt, unclean, indecent, or inappropriate will not be allowed. Building principals or their designees are authorized to establish rules and regulations governing student appearance in their buildings and to make judgments of student appearance relative to these rules and regulations.

Appropriate dress for secondary students prevents the wearing of hats, bandannas, any objects or clothing with spikes, cut-offs, mini-apparel, see-through clothing, tube tops, halter tops, half T-shirts or tank tops, and bare midriffs. Mini-apparel shall be understood to be anything that is deemed inappropriate by school administration. Pants or shorts should appropriately cover undergarments to avoid the appearance of "sagging." Any clothing or personal possessions, which have designs, which advocate and/or advertise the use of drugs, alcohol, tobacco or violence of any type, are not permitted in the schools. Students who are in violation of these rules and regulations will be sent to the school office to correct their appearance before returning to class. This policy applies to all school related functions.

ELECTRONIC DEVICE/CELL PHONE POLICY

Cell phones, pagers, or other related electronic devices may only be used before school, during passing time, and during a student's lunch period. These items may not be used at any point during instructional/class time. Electronic devices must be **turned off before entering** a classroom, and cannot be used until a student enters the hallway for passing time.

Any cell phone causing a disruption during instructional/class time will be confiscated and sent to the main office. Disruption can included phone ringing, beeping, vibrating, texting, etc.

EARLY DISMISSAL

Students need to drop off notes in the front office **before** school starts, if they need a pass to leave school early. Passes are written during first hour and students may pick them up anytime after first hour. They must then sign out in the front office when leaving the building and sign back in on their return.

ATTENDANCE

All absences must be verified by a telephone call or a note from a parent within 48 hours of the absence. The attendance phone line (810-626-2205) operates 24 hours a day.

LINK

MEAP

We are writing to remind everyone that MEAP testing is just around the corner, and to ask that parents take a moment to reinforce to their child, that this test is an important measure of their academic achievement. Not only do these results become a part of their permanent records, but they are also used as a tool by which we measure our schools progress toward important school improvement goals. Parents can help by assuring that their child comes to school each testing day well rested and on time, with a healthy breakfast, and with the knowledge that you want them to try their hardest. Your encouragement can have a significant effect on how carefully, and completely, students read and answer questions. Advantages and Disadvantages of Prepaid Plans

One way to plan in advance for the end of one's life is to sign a formal contract called a "preneed funeral plan." With this plan, money to pay for a funeral and/or burial is held in trust, in an escrow account or paid through an insurance policy on the life of the person desiring the plan. Parts of or all of the funeral service and burial are designed in advance and pre-funded in advance and the family has little to do but show up.

This type of planning has become very popular in recent years. A survey conducted by the AARP in 1999 found that two out of five people over age 50 had been approached to pre-purchase funerals and burial goods and services. An AARP survey in 1998 indicates that 32% of all Americans over age 50, roughly 21 million people, have prepaid for their burials (cemetery plot, mausoleum or niche), 18% have prepaid for headstones, urns, caskets, grave liners or vaults, opening and closing of graves and so on and 13% have prepaid for

goods or services from a funeral home or funeral director. The same survey indicates that over 25 billion is being held in preneed trust funds. Roughly another \$25 billion is waiting to be paid out in life insurance benefits. Prepaid or preneed funerals and burials are big business.

Funerals and burials funded privately by the family, or paid from an individual life insurance policy and arranged informally through a funeral home or funeral director are generally not subject to state regulation. Any formal arrangement through a second party or involving a contract is subject to state regulation in all states. Each state has adopted different rules as to who can sell these plans, what the plans can provide, what contract provisions must be, how the plan is to be funded and what recourse purchasers might have in the even of fraud or default. All states call these regulated plans "pre-need" funeral and burial arrangements.

Advantages

- · It provides peace of mind knowing these arrangements have been made in advance.
- It avoids the burden on family members to

make decisions when they are most vulnerable **Disadvantages** to manipulation.

- It allows one to virtually control from the grave by determining in advance the funeral products, funeral services, burial products and burial services that one would prefer having for final arrangements.
- It helps the family to avoid taking loans, arranging finance plans, raiding savings or selling assets to pay for a funeral and burial.
- It guarantees (for many contracts) that if products and services currently purchased are not available in the future, equivalent substitutes will be provided at no additional cost.
- It locks in guaranteed prices (available with some contracts) forever.
- It allows for inflation in future costs (for those contracts that do not guarantee prices) by investing money in an interest-bearing account or buying life insurance that increases in value over time.
- Depending on the contract it may allow for transfer to another funeral home or for partial or full refund.

- With some trust fund and insurance funding options there may be no refund if someone wants to cancel the plan in the future.
- If a purchaser moves to another state there may be no transfer options or there may be different rules governing the funding option.
- In some contracts, interest earnings on investments resulting in excess money not need for the plan may be retained by the funeral home or funeral director.
- On installment plans interest may be charged but not credited to the account.
- In certain insurance funded plans, if the insured dies too soon, there may have been a waiting period in which few or no benefits are paid at death, thus forcing the family to pay out of pocket for the funeral.
- Certain unscrupulous provides may have failed to provide an itemized list of services and goods, thus allowing the provider in the future to substitute less expensive items or to leave out services and goods that were originally anticipated in the agreement.

HIP Happenings

ow that the chill of fall is in the air it is time to make a plan to stay active physically as well as intellectually during the coming months. It is sometimes too easy to curl up on the couch and think about spring. Unlike bears we should not hibernate during the chilly weather. Here are some tips on how to keep moving and thinking in the months to come.

1. Get a checkup - Meet with your healthcare provider to see whether you'll need to consider any special modifications before starting an exercise program. If necessary, get a clearance to begin a program.

2. Know your options. Before starting any program, examine your options. Pick a program you know you will enjoy. Some individuals like to go to a gym, senior center, community education and aquatics program and do a structured workout, while others enjoy walking. . Either will help improve your fitness, ability to function and quality of life-but only if you do it regularly.

3. Make a date. Find a buddy to exercise with you and keep you motivated. 5.Make a list. List all the reasons to be physically active-things like decreasing stress or depression, stronger bones, greater strength and flexibility to help maintain independence, increased energy, better sleep, etc. Keep this list in a visible place as a daily reminder of the long-term rewards.

6. Exercise your brain. Try to a variety of puzzles on the puzzle page of the newspaper. Even if you can't complete them at this time, the brain gets exercise by trying to figure them out. If you do the crossword puzzle everyday, add the soduko or another puzzler. Take a class, learn to draw, knit, sing or play an instrument.

7. Be Social. Social connections are good for our emotional well-being. Studies have shown that friendships and social support networks developed at senior centers, churches, clubs not only prevent loneliness but also provide a ready source of intellectual, physical and volunteer activities.

8. Laugh a lot. Laughing increases circulation, immune system defenses and mental functioning while decreasing stress hormones. Watch comedy shows, read humorous books or better yet join a group of friends and let the laughter begin.

Black Sheep Weavers' Fiber Guild

Weaving with the new fibers-Tencel, Soy and Bamboo-October 7

Please join us as for an extremely informative program with lifelong weaver Su Butler who will discuss the "new fibers" Tencel, Soy and Bamboo and share samples of her work. Su earned her B.F.A in Fibers and Watercolor painting in 1977

from the University of Colorado. For 33+ years she has been fascinated with the process of interlacing threads to form cloth. Weave structure, color interaction and surface design continue to keep her spellbound. Utilizing hand dyeing, painting, and/or surface design techniques, she enhances and enriches her yarns, weaving them in simple and complex structures, sometimes embellishing during and after the weaving process.

From plain weave on 4 shafts with hand painted and embellished silk noil yarns, to complex structures on 24 shafts with very fine silk yarn, every aspect of interlacing and creating fabric intrigues Su. Su loves to work with her hands and began weaving at age three. To her weaving is a tactile dialogue. When given limited elements and equipment restrictions, she, as a weaver, is presented with creative questions, each answer leading to another question, each experience helping to push her beyond her limits, allowing her to grow as a craftsperson an artist.

Su is also a published author. Her first book Understanding Rayon Chenille was released in December 2002 and re-issued as a CD in August 2009. She has published articles in Handwoven and Weavers magazines and the Complex Weavers Journal. She is currently working on a new book on Tied Weaves. In addition, Su has taught throughout the country and most recently at the MLH Conference in Holland, MI this summer. Su has won many awards for her work. She belongs to many professional fiber organizations such as HGA and Complex Weavers as well as local weaving guilds in Illinois.

This program will be of interest to all fiber artists. You will glean important information that will transfer to any fiber media you are currently when incorporating the use of color, surface design, embellishing and more.

Our meetings begin at 6:30 p.m. for social time, a brief business meeting at 7p.m. followed by the program. We meet in Room 23 at the HESSC (former high school) on M-59 just a $\frac{1}{2}$ mile west of the US 23 Interchange on the first Thursday of each month (except December) from September through May. OCTOBER IS FIRE PREVENTION MONTH!

Commemorating a conflagration

Fire Prevention Week was established to commemorate the Great Chicago Fire, the tragic 1871 conflagration that killed more than 250 people, left 100,000 homeless, destroyed more than 17,400 structures and burned more than 2,000 acres. The fire began on October 8, but continued into and did most of its damage on October 9, 1871. According to popular legend, the fire broke out after a cow - belonging to Mrs. Catherine O'Leary - kicked over a lamp, setting first the barn, then the whole city on fire.

The 'Moo' myth

Like any good story, the 'case of the cow' has some truth to it. The great fire almost certainly started near the barn where Mrs. O'Leary kept her five milking cows. But if a cow wasn't to blame for the huge fire, what was? Over the years, journalists and historians have offered plenty of theories. Some people have speculated that a fiery meteorite may have fallen to earth on October 8, starting several fires that day - in Michigan and Wisconsin, as well as in Chicago.

The biggest blaze that week

While the Great Chicago Fire was the best-known blaze to start during this fiery twoday stretch, it wasn't the biggest. That distinction goes to the Peshtigo Fire, the most devastating forest fire in American history. The fire, which also occurred on October 8, 1871, and roared through Northeast Wisconsin, burning down 16 towns, killing 1,152 people, and scorching 1.2 million acres before it ended. Historical accounts of the fire say that the blaze began when several railroad workers clearing land for tracks unintentionally started a brush fire. It was the small town of Peshtigo, Wisconsin that suffered the worst damage. Within an hour, the entire town had been destroyed.

Eight decades of fire prevention

Those who survived the Chicago and Peshtigo fires never forgot what they'd been through; both blazes produced countless tales of bravery and heroism. But the fires also changed the way that firefighters and public officials thought about fire safety. On the 40th anniversary of the Great Chicago Fire, the Fire Marshals Association of North America (today known as the International Fire Marshals Association), decided that the anniversary of the Great Chicago Fire should henceforth be observed not with festivities, but in a way that would keep the public informed about the importance of fire prevention. The commemoration grew incrementally official over the years. In 1920, President Woodrow Wilson issued the first National Fire Prevention Day proclamation, and since 1922, Fire Prevention Week has been observed on the Sunday through Saturday period in which October 9 falls. According to the National Archives and Records Administration's Library Information Center, Fire Prevention Week is the longest running public health and safety observance on record. The President of the United States has signed a proclamation proclaiming a national observance during that week every year since 1925.

Absentee voter ballots are available for the November 2 general election as a convenient method for casting a ballot when you are unable to attend the polls on Election Day. As a registered voter, you may obtain an absentee voter ballot if you are:

- age 60 years old or older; or
- unable to vote without assistance at the polls; or
- expecting to be out of town on election day; or
- in jail awaiting arraignment or trial; or
- unable to attend the polls due to religious reasons; or
- appointed to work as an election inspector in a precinct outside of your precinct of residence.

A person who registers to vote by mail must vote in person in the first election in which he or she participates. The restriction does not apply to overseas voters, voters who are handicapped or voters who are 60 years of age or older.

Your request for an absentee voter ballot must be in writing and can be submitted to the clerk at the address listed above. Your request must include one of the six statutory reasons stated above and your signature. Youmustrequest an absentee voter ballot by mailing the application available on the Township website, with a letter or post card, or you can obtain a pre-printed application form at the clerk's office. Requests to have an absentee voter ballot mailed to you must be received by no later than 2:00pm the Saturday before the election.
