Delay of School Start Times due to inclement weather

I HOUR DELAY

All students will ride the same bus with the same type of pick-up structure as under normal circumstances other than that bus will arrive at the regular pick-up stop approximately one hour later than usual. No structure changes will exist other than the time element. Under a one-hour delay, **A.M. junior kindergarten classes will be held.** There will be no vocational education classes.

2 HOUR DELAY

Under a two-hour delay, all students will be picked up as usual, except two hours later than on a regular schedule.

Under a two-hour delay, there will be **NO A.M. JUNIOR KINDERGARTEN** There will be no vocational education classes.

The purpose of this alternative plan is to enable the flexibility of delaying school on some mornings due to fog and/or freezing rain. I am hoping that it will help assure that more instructional days can be held, while improving the safety factor for our staff and students.

Under a delay approach, all staff should report prior to the arrival of their students. Below you will find a chart outlining regular starting times and the starting times under a one and two hour delay situation. The chart also shows the time lunch schedules would begin. You will note that no alteration is being made regarding lunch. This will enable all personnel to function as usual.

Principal's Corner


Chuck Hughes, Hartland High School Principal

It is with great pleasure that I report a wonderful start at Hartland High School. The students have settled in, the brisk weather is moving in, and we are anticipating the Holiday Season. Each year, I marvel at the support that our parents provide in our effort to educate students. The amazing thing is that this support goes well beyond the classroom and the awesome educational environment that I am sitting in right now as I write this article. The effort of parent volunteers who work tirelessly to help support athletic, music, and academic clubs is phenomenal. As the admiral of the "flagship" of this school district I wish to thank the students, staff, Board of Education, administration and community for putting students first in everything we do. We are proud to say that when compared to other schools in the State of Michigan HHS is at the top of the class in the retention and graduation of students.



5 Good Reasons to lose just 10 pounds

Sometimes the difference between what you weigh and what you want to weigh seems impossible to obtain. The average woman has a BMI of 28 which is overweight—nearly obese. Her waist line is 37 inches, 5 inches too wide and she weighs about 165 lbs. In 1960 the average weight was 140lbs. By losing just ten lbs., you can prevent deadly illness (diabetes, cancer, stroke, heart attack), alleviate daily back and knee pain, and improve your quality of life. Listed below is all you have to gain in losing just 10 lbs.

- 1. Lower cholesterol level. Being overweight is linked to high levels of LDL which is the "bad" cholesterol. This is the cholesterol that can lead to heart attack and stroke. Keep a journal to see what types of foods can be replaced with "healthy" foods that produce "good cholesterol" (prevents LDL from depositing on your artery walls). Just 10 lbs. can lower your cholesterol by 10%.
- **2. Lower blood pressure**. BP measures the pressure on your artery walls, so if you have plaque buildup in your arteries, you are more prone to a heart attack because the walls become thick and stiff making the heart work harder. This causes the blood vessels in the kidneys to become damaged which can lead to kidney failure. Losing 10lbs lowers your blood pressure.
- **3.** Reduced risk for dementia. Nearly half of Americans have too much visceral or abdominal fat (big bellies) that surrounds your internal organs. Visceral fat releases inflammation-causing chemicals in the body, which can cause memory loss and increases your chances of developing dementia. It can also lead to high blood pressure & high cholesterol and can put you at risk for a stroke. Some strokes (silent strokes) can occur without symptoms, but each time blood is cut off to the brain it results in dementia-prone brain tissue.
- 4. Reduced risk for sleep apnea. When you are overweight, extra tissue thickens around your windpipe wall, narrowing airway, especially when sleeping, and can cause a life-threatening condition called "sleep apnea". When your oxygen level becomes too low, you brain shocks your body to wake up and you could be waking up several times a night...not getting he proper amount of sleep.
- **5. Reduced joint pain.** Being overweight puts huge pressure on your joints. For each extra pound of excess weight on your body, you add 3X that amount of pressure to your knees. Ouch! This means by losing just 10# you are actually taking 30 lbs. off your knees. Over time, this wears away at our cartilage, leaving an area of arthritis. As you lose weight and reduce the pressure on your joints, your bones will build back up (10 lb. loss could reduce your chance of developing osteoarthritis by 50%).

Kitchen Safety During the Holiday Season

Fall has arrived, and as the holidays draw near, it is important for you and your customers to be aware of the increased risk of fires in the home.

Did you know there are more residential fires on Thanksgiving Day than any other day of the year? The National Fire Incident Reporting System (NFIRS) found that from 2002-2003, and average of 5,200 fires occurred on Thanksgiving Day, causing \$21 million in property damage.

Not surprisingly, the leading cause of these Thanksgiving fires was cooking accidents. Most of these fires were started on the stove or in the oven, and a leading factor proved to be residents leaving their food unattended while cooking. The National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) reported that in 2005, fire departments responded to 146,000 home fires that involved cooking equipment, resulting in more that \$870 million in property damage. Read on for tips to help keep your family safe this season.

Stay in the kitchen when you are frying, grilling or broiling food. If you leave the kitchen, even for a short time, turn off the stove.

Keep anything that can catch fire such as potholders, towels or curtains, away from your stovetop.

Have a "kid-free zone" of at least 3 feet around the stove and areas where hot food or drink is prepared or carried.

Always keep an oven mitt and lid nearby when you're cooking. If a small grease fire starts in a pan, put on an oven mitt and smother the flames by carefully sliding the lid over the pan. Turn off the burner.

Never use a wet oven mitt, as it presents a scald danger if the moisture in the mitt is heated

Medication Problems and the Elderly

At 83 years old, Martha still lived in her own home, and enjoyed working in her garden and canning peaches. It was becoming harder for her to motivate herself to get up in the mornings and accomplish the day's tasks. She confided to her daughter that she felt anxious and tired. Her daughter, who was taking medication for her anxiety, took Martha to her own doctor, not Martha's and got her a prescription for Valium. In doing so, the daughter's doctor, who had never seen Martha and who did not have her medical history, was only aware of a few medications they told him she was taking.

Martha in fact, was taking nine different medications as well as herbal supplements.

The addition of Valium to her existing list of prescribed drugs

sent her to the emergency room with respiratory distress. If she had gone to her own doctor, he would have found that a dosage adjustment of her current medications would have solved her anxiety.

Medication errors are common in the elderly. Many seniors take an average 6-8 different prescription as well as over the counter drugs. Many times the elderly will not go back to their doctor to have their dosage evaluated and changed if necessary. Family members should be aware, that elderly parents may tend to take the family's advice over going to their own doctor. Even though children want to help increase the health and stamina of their parents, they may be causing damage by misdirecting their loved ones.

Where a younger person can benefit

from herbal supplements like Ginkgo Biloba, Saw Palmetto and others, in older people, these herbals may cause adverse reactions with their prescription medications.

There are many things family members can do to help monitor medications for their elderly parents.

- Make a list of medicines prescribed and all supplements being taken
- one on hand for emergencies
 Use the same Pharmacy to fill all
 prescriptions. Pharmacies keep a
 record of your prescribed drugs and
 will verify your doctor's instructions.
 They will also tell you if foods or
 over the counter supplements
 will interact with a prescription.

Next meeting November 4-wet felting

Guild member Connie Hydel will give an overview of the process and the materials used along with a demonstration of wet felting at the November 4 meeting. Kits will be available to purchase. Those wishing to try their hand at wet felting will move into another classroom to make a felted piece.

Felting is actually an ancient craft that has become increasingly popular lately. Felting is the process of transforming wool into a dense cloth by bonding and shrinking the fibers together. Technically, there are three types of felting: wet felting, needle felting, and commercial felting. With wet felting, you can create a soft, dense cloth using fibers from sheep or alpacas. The process uses hot water, soap, agitation and cold water to shrink and bond the fibers together.

Our meetings begin at 6:30 p.m. for social time, a brief business meeting at 7p.m. followed by the program. We meet in Room 23 at the HESSC (former high school) on M-59 just a $\frac{1}{2}$ mile west of the US 23 Interchange on the first Thursday of each month (except December) from September through May.
