Melissa J. Brucker, a 1995 graduate of Hartland High School, earned her Doctorate of Philosophy from the Department of Physics of the University of Oklahoma, Norman, OK, in August 2009. Dr. Brucker participated in the annual commencement ceremony in May 2010. She has previously earned a BS in Mathematics from Alma College and a Masters in Physics from the University of Oklahoma.



Dr. Brucker's area of research, which took her to Lowell Observatory, Flagstaff, AZ, focused on the sizes and reflectivities of small bodies in the outer solar system. She has been working as an instructor of astronomy and physics at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln since the completion of her Doctorate.

Principal's Corner

Chuck Hughes, Hartland High School Principal

Welcome to the great month of December. It is my hope that this article finds you well and looking forward to the holiday season. This month I would like to highlight an area of concern that schools address on a regular basis. The area of concern is student response to bullying and what we call "drama," also know as the rumor mill. We have heard about horror stories related to bullying and unsubstantiated rumors in the media and are sensitive to immediate intervention when information is shared with us. This year, more than in any previous year, I have witnessed students choosing to be aggressive. While we continue to stress the 3R's of Reason (pro-active and positive effort at addressing issues), Respect (for self, others and property), and Responsibility (ownership of actions) I feel the need to reach out to ask for help on this issue from all of our stakeholders. At HHS I have asked the staff to address these issues in the classroom whenever they arise. Our staff has worked with these topics through persuasive writing assignments in class. The staff has also been asked to be present in the hallways during passing time. Our counselors have been visiting classrooms to share positive intervention strategies and to offer mediation or group counseling opportunities. The administration has been addressing negative chanting and cheering at athletic contests as we feel that allowing this sends the wrong message to our students.

I believe that it is important for parents to be aware that the school can and will address these issues if you contact us immediately upon learning that something may be going on with your child. With immediate intervention we can address the issues at the core of the problem. I am asking that parents also take an active interest in their child's use of text messaging, blogging, and social networking (Facebook, MySpace, etc...) as many times the issues arise from these areas. When we all work together we can help young adults to Stop, Think, and Act (yes, taken from the Stop, Drop, and Roll slogan for fire defense) in a way that does not hurt others or themselves in the long run.

Please know that we take bullying and rumor-spreading seriously. This means that if outside activities interfere with the educational process for students or staff at school, we have an obligation to address them. While you may hear about "zero tolerance" on a regular basis and have your own thoughts about what this means, it is important for the community to know that zero tolerance to us means that we must fully investigate the situation and make decisions in regard to addressing the issue that is fair to the students and the entire student body. In the case of aggressive behavior, we will remove students from school. If you have any thoughts on this issue or wish to contact me please e-mail me at chuckhughes@hartlandschools.us.

Reading Apprenticeship

Reading Apprenticeship is a program that targets adolescent literacy. There are over 60 teachers across Hartland Schools, grades 5-12, who are involved in this program. Reading Apprenticeship is a sustained metacognitive framework for literacy instruction woven throughout all content areas. Teachers utilize Reading Apprenticeship in science, social studies, foreign language, art, and English classrooms. Teachers also collaborate with one another at various meetings throughout the school year. All of the efforts are paying off for our students. In one classroom at the High School, all students were proficient on their first common assessment. Another classroom teacher at Legacy reported that test scores are elevated from previous years. A number of teachers throughout Hartland High School and Legacy report that students are more thoughtful and critical thinkers and readers. Reading Apprenticeship has changed how Hartland teachers are addressing adolescent literacy in Hartland Consolidated Schools.

Award-winning Author visits Creative Writing Classroom

Hartland High School students learned that becoming a published author is within their grasp. Mrs. Keskes' great-aunt, Janet Sinke, visited her Creative Writing classes to share her experiences with Parkinson's disease and how it actually inspired her to write and start her own publishing company, My Grandma and Me Publishers. Many of her children's books have won prestigious awards and her latest book, Priscilla Asks Why? teaches children not to bully and to accept one another for who they are.

Janet Sinke's visit was meant to inspire the students to write their own children's books. After completing their original works, the high school students then sent their stories to elementary teachers Ms. Mitchell, Ms. Reed, Ms. Cone, and Ms. Eichhorn to be illustrated. In the process, the students have communicated through letter to share





HIP Happenings

Carol's Corner: *Medicare/PPD Update for 2011*

It's that time of year again when we review our medical insurance/ RX Part D. Enrollment began November 15 and ends December 31. There has been some changes in Medicare 2011 that you need to be aware of:

- 1. There will be no *C.O.L.A. increase* in your Social Security check for next year.
- 2. There will also be no *Part B premium* increase if this amount (\$96.40) is taken out of your Social Security check, BUT, if your income is over \$85,000/ year(single) or \$170,000(couple) or you are new to Medicare in 2011 or you don't have Part B deducted from your SS check, your premium will change to \$120.20 (estimated).
- 3. *Preventive Benefits-2011*: There will be \$0 cost sharing for prevention/ screening and \$0 cost sharing for your annual wellness visit.
- 4. *Medicare Advantage:* You will be notified by letter if your MA plan is being dropped or if there are any changes. MA enrollment period can only be done during Part D enrollment from November15 thru December 31. If you plan to drop a Medicare Advantage plan and go into a Medigap plan you need to allow 45 days in order to be sure you have coverage starting January 1 (needed to apply by Nov.15)
- 5. *Closing the Donut Hole-Good News!* Drug manufactures will provide 50% discount on name brands, 7% discount on generics only for those that fall into coverage gap. Also there will be another \$250.00 rebate for those that fall into the donut hole.
- 6. *Low income subsidy (2011)* Low income subsidy is extra help that provides assistance with Medicare prescription drugs (Part D): costs for people with limited incomes and assets:

Income eligibility for (2010): Full subsidy is \$1,218/month (single) and \$1,639.13/month (married). Partial subsidy is (up to \$1,353.75/month (single) and \$1,821.25/month if married.

Resource/Asset eligibility (2010) - (Applies to bank accounts, CD's, Pension plans, annuities or any other investments.) Can't exceed: Full subsidy: \$8,100 single/\$12,910 married or partial subsidy: \$12,510 single/\$25,010 married. These numbers include \$1,500/per person burial allowance. (The government checks on this!)

Those who qualify for the full subsidy in 2011 pay: No premiums, no deductible. Copays of \$2.50/generic and \$6.30/ brand name drugs on plan's formulary (based on income – see above). There is no coverage gap and no copay for drugs on their plan's formulary after hitting the catastrophic limit(total drug costs of \$6,447.50).

Those who qualify for partial subsidy in 2011 pay: No premiums or a sliding scale premium (based on income): \$63.00 deductible, 15% co-insurance for drugs on their plan's formulary, no coverage gap, copays of no more than \$2.50 generic/\$6.30 for brand name drugs on plan's formulary after hitting the catastrophic limit (total drug costs of \$6,447.50).

7. *Prescription Part D* – There are 32 Part D plans. The lowest premium is HumanaWal-Mart@\$14.80/month. The lowest premium with \$0 deductible is \$31.70. The donut hole begins at \$3,607.50 this year.

I know a lot of this can be confusing! I will be making appointments to discuss your insurance questions. This Counseling service is provided by AAA 1-B and the Hartland Senior Center at no charge, but donations to the Resource Advocacy program are gladly accepted.

Fire Safety During the Holidays

We are getting to that time of the year where we are spending a lot of time indoors. We tend to burn more candles and use accessory heating. Please keep the following in mind during this holiday season so you and your family stay safe.....

Christmas Trees - If you purchase a real tree every year, ensure to keep it watered. It makes the tree last longer and keeps those pesky needles out of your feet. The real reason....having a real tree that gets dried out, is like having one huge gasoline can sitting in your living room. Then, we humans decide that we are not living on the edge enough, so we wrap that thing with as many lights as possible and then stick wrapped cardboard underneath it. When you really think about it....it is truly insane. If you do get a real tree, consider purchasing a can of the fire retardant that you spray on before decorating it.

Christmas Lights – When lighting that tree or house, be sure that your circuits that you are using on the electrical panel are not overloaded. The price of the new LED Christmas lights are coming down, and they use very little electricity. They are safe, and bright. Just be sure that you are not connecting too many. Lots of people think that just because they are using more than one outlet, that they are good to go. Just be sure that you are not on the same circuit....Use your electrical panel breakers to test before it becomes a problem. That happened to me one year....My wife would use the hair dryer, and we couldn't figure out why we were blowing the breaker. It turned out that for whatever reason, the bathroom was on the same circuit. Then again, it was an older home.

Escape routes during the winter – Be sure that decorations etc do not hamper your escape routes. Be sure to practice them and keep those walkways shoveled. Make sure that the patio door remains free from snow and ice. Even though you don't use it much during the winter, it may become the difference between escaping a fire or not. Holiday Parties – Drinking and Driving don't mix. Use a designated driver or call a friend or family member. It just isn't worth it. D&D incidents are up, so be sure to always buckle up every time you get into a vehicle.

Finally, have a safe and happy holiday season this year. Check your smoke detectors monthly, and look for my January article.

If you are a primary caregiver for a loved one, you are well aware of the daily stress and emotional and physical impact it can have on your health.

Susan learned this firsthand when she and her husband, Tom, brought his Mom home to live with them. Mom suffered from dementia and had to be watched constantly. In order to enjoy those moments and sustain your caregiving momentum, a little respite is essential. Be on the lookout for caregiver burnout. It can creep up on you without your noticing it. Caregiver burnout symptoms can include:

- Depression
- Anxiety, irritability, or anger
- Feelings of exhaustion
- Self-criticism

- Withdrawal from usual activities
- Trouble with handling caregiving responsibilities
- Substance abuse

Adult Day Care to the Rescue!

Adult Day care respite is two-fold. It gives the caregivers much needed to time to themselves and gives their loved ones social and interactive therapy with their peers. Many adult day services offer such things as:

- Social activities; music, movies, crafts, excursions
- Meals
- Fellowship support

 - Medications

- Physical therapy
- Transportation

Finding an Adult Day Services provider takes a little investigating on your part. It is important to know what you are getting and that your loved one is comfortable with his or her new surroundings.

Fourth: Find out the cost and payment requirements



Archers Take on the World

Hartland Archery Teams led by Mr. Jellison, 7th grade science teacher at Ore Creek Middle School, attended the 2010 National Archery in the Schools Program World Archery Tournament at Disney October 7-9. All of the archers who attended this event qualified for it at last years National Tournament in Louisville KY on May 8-10. The World event brought in the top 1000 archers and 124 teams from Nationals, and had 21 states and 4 countries being represented. There were more than 40,000 arrows shot by all of the attending archers who were shooting as individuals and some also shot as a team.

All of the archers shoot 15 arrows from 10 meters and 15 arrows from 30 meters. The archers shoot at 80 cm FITA targets that have scoring rings. The rings score from the 1 ring on the outside to the 10 ring in the middle. A perfect individual score is 300. A school district that has at least 12 archers competing may combine these archers to form a team. Archers may shoot up divisions, not down. Hartland took some elementary and middle school archers and moved them all up to form one high school level team.

Hartland finished in 4th place as a team in the high school division shooting a 3203 out of a possible 3600. The team was ONLY 70 points from 3rd place and a spot in the awards ceremony! Hartland had 5 archers place in the Top 25 and almost all of the archers finished in the Top 100! Chris Bee finished in 6th place shooting a 287 out of 300 and missed the individual awards (5th place) by ONE POINT!

All in all it was a great trip and many of the archer's goals and team goals were met. This was the final wrap up for archery that carried over from last year. The winter tournament team tryouts will be later in December and we will try to collect our 8th State Championship in 4 years! Hartland Archers continue to improve each year and we will be gearing up for this year's events later this winter.




