Happy New Year! I hope everyone had a wonderful holiday season and are ready to face the cold, Michigan winter. We are entering the time of year when inclement weather conditions become a part of life. One of the duties I face as superintendent is the decision to cancel school or events due to the weather conditions. This is not a decision I make without input from several people. We have spotters who drive the roads early in the morning on days when weather



may be a factor. Our Director of Operations and Transportation Supervisor are also out on the roads very early on those mornings. The school districts surrounding us also have the same process. On the mornings when it appears weather may be an issue, the superintendents across the county communicate with each other and report on the information provided by our spotters. There may be days when it is safe for our school buses to be on the road, but there may still be some tricky driving situations for new, inexperienced drivers or vehicles not equipped for hazardous road conditions. I urge the parents of newly driving teens to consider having them ride the bus on such days. Michigan weather can change suddenly and the decision to have or cancel school is made very early in the day. On some days our inexperienced drivers would be better off and safer on the bus. They will have many years to drive on their own! If your child has driven all year and not ridden the bus and you would like him/her to do so, please contact our transportation department to let them know.

Delay of School Start Times due to inclement weather

1 HOUR DELAY

All students will ride the same bus with the same type of pick-up structure as under normal circumstances other than that bus will arrive at the regular pick-up stop approximately one hour later than usual. No structure changes will exist other than the time element. Under a one-hour delay, **<u>A.M. junior kindergarten classes will be held.</u>** There will be no vocational education classes.

2 HOUR DELAY

Under a two-hour delay, all students will be picked up as usual, except two hours later than on a regular schedule.

Under a two-hour delay, there will be **<u>NO A.M. JUNIOR KINDERGARTEN</u>**. There will be no vocational education classes.

The purpose of this alternative plan is to enable the flexibility of delaying school on some mornings due to fog and/or freezing rain. I am hoping that it will help assure that more instructional days can be held, while improving the safety factor for our staff and students.

Under a delay approach, all staff should report prior to the arrival of their students. Below you will find a chart outlining regular starting times and the starting times under a one and two hour delay situation. The chart also shows the time lunch schedules would begin. You will note that no alteration is being made regarding lunch. This will enable all personnel to function as usual.

Hartland Aquatics What are you doing from 8:30-10:30am weekdays?

You may not know about the nice folks who swim during the day at the Hartland pool. Regular users have formed a sense of community and found companionship while taking better care of themselves. Most of us need more exercise, particularly during the cold months. The pool is always warm and sunny, bringing a lift to body and spirit.

You don't have to use the big pool! Many people choose to stay in the 86 degree leisure pool where the water doesn't get deeper than 4'. The natural buoyancy of water takes a load off your joints, making exercise far more comfortable than on land. You can walk in the current channel and use resistance equipment for strength building. You'll find the swimmers and staff are friendly and helpful. A soak in the hot tub is a perfect finish.

Adult Open Swim is \$3.25 from 8:30-10:30 am every Monday through Friday. A 20-visit frequency card purchase brings the price down to \$3.15 per visit. Frequency cards and memberships are often purchased as gifts.

Many adults are uncomfortable wearing a bathing suit in public, so you are welcome to wear a shirt and shorts. Most people who give it a try quickly learn that we all pretty much look the same. We encourage shoes which can be anything from sandals to an old pair of clean tennis shoes. You can walk in to the gradual entry (like a beach) or use stairs. Those who might have difficulty walking can use our aquatic wheelchair for stability. There are handrails all along the trip from the locker rooms.

Preventing Prescription Drug Abuse

Teens are abusing some prescription and over-the-counter drugs to get high. Think about your home. What prescription and over-the-counter (OTC) drugs do you have? Where are they kept? Would you know if some were missing? The good news is that you can take steps immediately to limit access to these drugs and help keep your teen drug-free:

1. Safeguard all drugs at home. Monitor quantities and control access.

Take note of how many pills are in a bottle or pill packet, and keep track of refills. This goes for your own medication, as well as for your teen and other members of your household. If you find you have to refill medication more often than expected, there could be a real problem—someone may be taking your medication without your knowledge. If your teen has been prescribed a drug, be sure you control the medication, and monitor dosages and refills.

2. Set clear rules for teens about all drug use, including not sharing medicine and always following the medical provider's advice and dosages.

Make sure your teen uses prescription drugs only as directed by a medical provider and follows instructions for OTC products carefully. This includes taking the proper dosage and not using with other substances without a medical provider's approval. Teens should never take prescription or OTC drugs with street drugs or alcohol. If you have any questions about how to take a drug, call your family physician or pharmacist.

3. Be a good role model by following these same rules with your own medicines. Examine your own behavior to ensure you set a good example. If you misuse your prescription drugs, such as share them with your kids, or abuse them, your teen will take notice. Avoid sharing your drugs and always follow your medical provider's advise.

4. Properly conceal and dispose of old or unneeded medicines in the trash. Unneeded prescription drugs should be hidden and thrown away in the trash (learn how to properly dispose). So that teens or others don't take them out of the trash, you can mix them with an undesirable substance (like used coffee grounds or kitty litter) and put the mixture in an empty can or bag. Unless the directions say otherwise, do NOT flush medications down the drain or toilet because the chemicals can pollute the water supply. Also, remove any personal, identifiable information from prescription bottles or pill packages before you throw them away.

5. Ask friends and family to safeguard their prescription drugs as well.

Make sure your friends and relatives, especially grandparents, know about the risks, too, and encourage them to regularly monitor their own medicine

cabinets. If there are other households your teen has access to, talk to those families as well about the importance of safeguarding medications.

Talk to your teen about the dangers of abusing prescription and over-the-counter drugs. These are powerful drugs that, when abused, can be just as dangerous as street drugs. Tell your teen the risks far outweigh any "benefits."





Brain and Heart Health

Start the New Year off right by making a few lifestyle changes that will help your brain and your heart stay healthy in 2011. Here are five of steps, based on the latest research, that have proved effective in keeping both our mind and body healthy: WORK OUT. Regular physical activity protects the cardiovascular system that feeds oxygen-rich blood to the brain and muscles. Chose an aerobic activity such as brisk walking, biking or aerobic exercise class. Gradually build up to at least 30 minutes a day, 5 days a week. Check with your doctor if this will be a new activity for you. **STAY CONNECTED.** Close relationships with others might protect the mind by reducing stress and stimulating the brain. Make time to see family and friends regularly. Consider volunteering, joining a club or church group.

EXERCISE YOUR BRAIN. Several recent clinical trials have shown that memory training and other mental exercise can preserve or improve specific cognitive skills in older people. Memorize poems or songs, learn to recognize birds, work crossword puzzles or play computer-based brain games.

CURB STRESS. Stress triggers the release of hormones that can impair memory and damage brain cells. Set aside some time each day for a stress-reducing activity such as yoga, exercise or listening to music. Take a meditation class.

GOOD NUTRITION. Numerous studies suggest that fruits, vegetables, fatty fish and other foods might help preserve mental and physical agility by protecting blood vessels. Aim for at least five servings (1/2 cup per serving) of produce a day, including some leafy greens and cruciferous vegetables. Avoid trans and saturated fats.



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The 4 Steps of Long Term Care Planning

The Importance of Planning for Eldercare

According to some sources, 60% of us will need long term care sometime during our lives. It is important for all of us to prepare for that day when we will need to help loved ones with care or we will need long term care for ourselves.

We may prepare financially for unexpected disasters by covering our homes, automobiles and health with insurance policies. But no other life event can be as devastating to an elderly person's lifestyle, finances and security as needing long term care. It drastically alters or completely eliminates the three principal retirement dreams of elderly Americans.

- 1. Remaining independent in the home without intervention from others
- 2. Maintaining good health and receiving adequate health care.
- Having enough money for everyday needs and not outliving assets and income.
 Yet it is our experience that the majority of

the American public does not plan for the

devastating crisis of needing eldercare. This lack of planning also has an adverse effect on the older person's family, with sacrifices made in time, money, family lifestyles and even affecting the family's or caregiver's medical and emotional health.

What is Long Term Care?

The need for long term care arises when an individual requires, from someone else, assistance with medical care, daily living activities, comfort, supervision or advice. - Completing a survey to determine necessary financial agreement for legal arrangements to be made

- Assigning a care coordinator and determining the role of other family members, friends or advisers involved in care giving.
- Holding a planning meeting and drawing up a written agreement for involvement between all those who are willing to participate in future care giving for you or a loved one.

Below are the four crucial steps necessary for long term care planning

Step 1: Understanding the nature of Care, Care Settings, and Government Programs (Knowledge and preparation)

Step 2: Funding the Cost of Long Term Care (having funds to pay for care greatly expands the choices for care settings and providers) **Step 3:** Using Long Term care Professionals (using professional help relieves stress, reduces conflict and saves time and money) **Step 4** Creating a Personal Care Plan and Choosing a Care Coordinator (Success is assured with a written plan accepted by all involved)

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
