How quickly this year is flying by! It seems like only a few short weeks ago we were welcoming our students for the 2010/11 school year and here we are, already planning for 2011/12. There are a couple of important dates and activities that are happening soon. Kindergarten Round-up for the 2011/2012 school year is scheduled for March 8 and 9 from 5:30 to 8:00 p.m. at the Hartland Educational Support Services Center. Please refer to the announcement in this

issue for further details. Scheduling for Hartland High School students begins this month and you may contact Hartland Middle School (for incoming freshman) or Hartland High School if you have specific questions regarding this process.

Also the annual school election is really just around the corner on May 3. We will have one four-year-term position on the Board of Education as well as the renewal of the 18-mill Non-homestead ballot proposal, which ensures the district continues to receive its full distribution of state aid for the coming year. More information will be forthcoming on this ballot proposal over the next couple of months. The deadline to apply to be on the ballot for the annual Board election is Tuesday, February 8, and the necessary documents can be picked up at the county clerk's office in Howell. As always, Hartland Consolidated Schools is extremely fortunate to have fantastic support from our parents and the community. Thank you! More information can be found on page 4 of this issue.



### **Kindergarten Registration 2011-12**

Officials of the Hartland Consolidated Schools have announced that they will be accepting registration for kindergarten enrollments for the 2011-2012 school year. Children are eligible for enrollment in kindergarten in September of 2011 if they will have their fifth (5th) birthday on or before December 1, 2011.

A Junior Kindergarten program may be offered on a limited basis. A minimum number of students is required for the program to be made available. Parents must agree to provide transportation in order to participate. You may contact Scott Van Epps at 810.626.2111 for more information.

- Original with seal and a copy of the birth certificate
- Original and a copy of the immunization records with proof of DTP, Polio, MMR, Hepatitis B, Chicken Pox shots (or proof of having had the illness), and vision screening.
- Proof of residency copy of one of the following: certificate of occupancy, purchase agreement, builder's permit, rent receipt or agreement, mortgage statement/payment receipt, voter registration card, utility bill, driver's license.
- While we need to see the originals, it will expedite the enrollment process if you also bring copies of the originals.

Kindergarten registration packets will be available beginning February 8, 2011 at the Board of Education office, the Community Education office, each elementary school office and the Hartland Child Care Center (51 building). You can also download the packet from our website: hartlandschools.us.

### What are you doing from 8:30-10:30am weekdays?

You may not know about the nice folks who swim during the day at the Hartland pool. Regular users have formed a sense of community and found companionship while taking better care of themselves. Most of us need more exercise, particularly during the cold months. The pool is always warm and sunny, bringing a lift to body and spirit.

You don't have to use the big pool! Many people choose to stay in the 86 degree leisure pool where



the water doesn't get deeper than 4'. The natural buoyancy of water takes a load off your joints, making exercise far more comfortable than on land. You can walk in the current channel and use resistance equipment for strength building. You'll find the swimmers and staff are friendly and helpful. A soak in the hot tub is a perfect finish.

Adult Open Swim is \$3.25 from 8:30-10:30 am every Monday through Friday. A 20-visit frequency card purchase brings the price down to \$3.15 per visit. Frequency cards and memberships are often purchased as gifts.

Many adults are uncomfortable wearing a bathing suit in public, so you are welcome to wear a shirt and shorts. Most people who give it a try quickly learn that we all pretty much look the same. We encourage shoes which can be anything from sandals to an old pair of clean tennis shoes. You can walk in to the gradual entry (like a beach) or use stairs. Those who might have difficulty walking can use our aquatic wheelchair for stability. There are handrails all along the trip from the locker rooms.

### **Principal's Corner**

### **Chuck Hughes, Hartland High School Principal**

This month I thought it important to highlight ways in which the staff at HHS is held accountable for educating our students. Below I have highlighted a student achievement accountability measure, a student perception process and a school improvement process that when combined will create a realistic picture of how we are doing with the responsibility of educating students.

#1: You will find in this edition of Community Life the 2011 Michigan Merit Exam/ACT testing schedule for our students. In an effort to create a testing environment conducive to our student's ability to demonstrate their academic skills, we have adjusted the daily schedule and bussing schedule for the student body. Thank you for understanding that student performance data is a key indicator of how well we are doing our job at HHS and becomes extremely important to families looking to relocate to the Hartland community.

#2: The Class of 2005 Follow-up Survey will be conducted this year to help our school district assess how well we prepared graduates for post secondary experiences. I would like to request that parents of former students help the survey company get in contact with our graduates (the last phone number of the former student is where they generally start the process) for this important survey opportunity. The survey is used to help our staff reflect on areas in which we can better prepare our students for post-secondary life.

#3: In March, Hartland High School will host a Quality Assurance Review visit by Advanced Ed., which is the institution that we work with to earn accreditation. The visiting team will be looking at documentation and interviewing district and high school staff, parents, and students on the following topics: Vision and Purpose, Governance and Leadership, Teaching and Learning, Documenting and Using Results, Resources and Support Systems, Stakeholder Communications and Relationships, and Commitment to Continuous Improvement.

At the conclusion of their visit we will be presented with a final report which will include accolades and areas where improvement can continue to occur. The purpose is to ensure that we continue to reflect on our practices of educating students. The process is designed to be positive and informative to all stakeholders whom work with our school

As you can see, accountability is intertwined into much of what we do at HHS. A recent buzz word in education is "Unbundling." This refers to the ability to assess, reflect and implement change that is essential for preparing students for the post-secondary experience. As the lead educator I strive to keep the staff updated on the educational research and schooling strategies that seem to be supporting student learning. It is my hope that you, our partners in education, continue to seek to understand what we are doing and from time to time contact me (Chuck Hughes) with suggestions or concerns at chuckhughes@hartlandschools.us or 810.626.2210.

### **Michigan Merit Exam Schedule**

On March 1-3, the high school will be administering the Michigan Merit Exam (MME) to all juniors and select seniors (who did not take the complete MME as juniors). The schedule for the MME can be found below. Participation in the MME is a Hartland High school graduation requirement. Students who take the MME will receive a free ACT score that can be reported to colleges. See www.act. org for study resources and tips to help prepare for the MME.

Tuesday March 1	Only juniors will be attending school on Tuesday. Testing will finish at approximately 12:30 and students will be free to leave or stay at the school until the buses arrive at 2:15. Wednesday March 2	Only juniors will be attending school in the morning. All students will be attending starting at 11:11. There will be a normal bus schedule for juniors in the morning and a 3 ½ hour delayed schedule for 9th, 10th and 12th grade students. A la carte breakfast will be available for purchase in the morning and lunch for juniors only will be available in the cafeteria.
Thursday March 3	Only juniors will be attending school in the morning. All students will be attending starting at 11:11. There will be a normal bus schedule for juniors in the morning and a 3 ½ hour delayed schedule for 9th, 10th and 12th grade students. 



Whether you're turning 30, 40, 50, 65, or 90, there's no reason to assume you're doomed to decline after a certain age, especially if you're doing everything you can to stay healthy and active. Milner offers the following "E-tips" to help you extend a healthy life, or embark on one if you haven't yet done so.

**Expectations:** If you've been following a healthy lifestyle up until now, simply keep going; if you need to make changes, anticipate succeeding, not failing and don't let age be a barrier. Research has shown that thinking positively about getting older can extend your life by as much as 7.5 years.

**Enthusiasm:** Few people are thrilled with every aspect of their lives, but many have at least one area--family, friends, work, avocation they feel good about. Identify an activity or connection that sparks your enthusiasm and make it your lifeline; try to extend that enthusiasm to other areas of your life.

**Energy:** Having the energy and motivation you need to age well are hallmarks of healthy living. If you're fatigued all the time, don't let apathy and lethargy drag you down; get a checkup to try to determine the cause and the solution.

**Eating:** Eating a balanced diet and attaining/maintaining a normal weight are keys to physical and mental health; if you need to lose weight or make changes in your diet, keep your expectations high. You can do it.

**Exercise:** Staying physically active fuels the body and mind. If you're already exercising regularly, keep it up; if you're getting started, know your skill level, set goals, progress at your own pace, and be consistent.

**Engagement:** Volunteers have higher levels of well-being and life satisfaction than those who don't volunteer; volunteering and other forms of civic and social engagement can play an important role in maintaining good health in later life. "Get involved."

**Emotions:** Everyone feels down at times, but full-blown depression is a major cause of disability. If you're feeling out of sorts for two weeks or more, talk with your doctor or take an online screening test at www.mentalhealthscreening.org/. In many instances, simply exercising and eating right can change your mood.

**Education:** Life-long learning is important to living an independent and fulfilling life. Start now to learn a new area of knowledge or physical activity. It's good for the brain.


**Effort:** Changing expectations and embarking on new behaviors take energy and effort, but the results are well worth it.

**Enjoyment:** A healthy life generally is a joyous one. "Savor the process of being or becoming active, engaged, and truly alive," Milner enthuses. "The new year is a great time to take stock and ask yourself, 'where do I want to go from here?'

"Emphasize the positive and don't let your age, or anyone else, deter you."



### The Financial Health of Aging Seniors

With our current economic challenges, those of us looking forward to retirement need to be well informed about our financial needs in coming years. **Government Programs**—Some government programs such as food stamps provide temporary financial help for food. Other programs provide subsidized housing, help with medical expenses and provide tax credits. For veterans there is free health care, inexpensive prescriptions and disability income. Area agencies on Aging offer individual counseling, legal help and advice with Medicare costs.



Felting is actually an ancient craft that has become increasingly popular lately. Felting is the process of transforming wool into a dense cloth by bonding and shrinking the fibers together. Technically, there are three types of felting: wet felting, needle felting, and commercial felting. With wet felting, you can create a soft, dense cloth using fibers from sheep or alpacas. The process uses hot water, soap, agitation and cold water to shrink and bond the fibers together.






