The news is full of ideas and initiatives that our new governor and legislature are proposing to heal Michigan's economy. One idea we are seeing quite a bit is the consolidation of services among public entities. I have had some members of our community ask about this. Hartland Schools is involved in many consortiums and alternative purchasing programs to purchase supplies and help keep our costs down. Following are a few examples.



We buy our school buses using a statewide bidding process. We purchase our food/cafeteria products and school supply products through a cooperative bidding process that enhances our buying power. We buy our natural gas through an energy brokerage company that enables us to lock-in future pricing, avoiding some of the vagaries of this volatile market, as well as helping us plan our budget from year to year. We are involved in a countywide consortium for our copy machines and copier costs and we share employees with Livingston Educational Service Agency, our intermediate school district. These things, along with many others, are ways we do business to keep our costs down and help us sustain the educational programming we require to ensure a quality education for our students. We continue to explore ways to make sure we are running the business side of our district in a cost-efficient manner.

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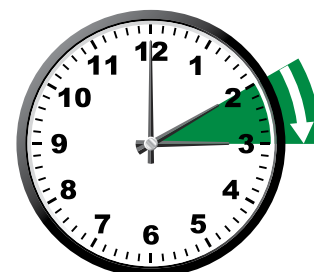

Officials of the Hartland Consolidated Schools have announced that they will be accepting registration for kindergarten enrollments for the 2011-2012 school year. Children are eligible for enrollment in kindergarten in September of 2011 if they will have their fifth (5th) birthday on or before December 1, 2011.

- Original with seal and a copy of the birth certificate
- Original and a copy of the immunization records with proof of DTP, Polio, MMR, Hepatitis B, Chicken Pox shots (or proof of having had the illness), and vision screening.
- Proof of residency copy of one of the following: certificate of occupancy, purchase agreement, builder's permit, rent receipt or agreement, mortgage statement/payment receipt, voter registration card, utility bill, driver's license.
- While we need to see the originals, it will expedite the enrollment process if you also bring copies of the originals.

Kindergarten registration packets will be available beginning February 8, 2011 at the Board of Education office, the Community Education office, each elementary school office and the Hartland Child Care Center (51 building). You can also download the packet from our website: hartlandschools.us.

School Immunization Requirements

Required for all children entering kindergarten, ALL SIXTH GRADE STUDENTS, and all children changing school districts:

- Two doses of Varicella (Var) vaccine or history of chickenpox disease

Required for all children 11 through 18 years who are changing school districts OR WHO ARE ENROLLED IN 6TH GRADE:

- One dose of meningococcal vaccine (MCV4 or MPSV4)
- One dose of tetanus/diphtheria/acellular pertussis (Tdap) if 5 years have passed since last dose of tetanus/diphtheria vaccine (DTap, Td, DT)

Graduation Ceremony = June 9 @ 7 PM at Compuware Arena in Plymouth

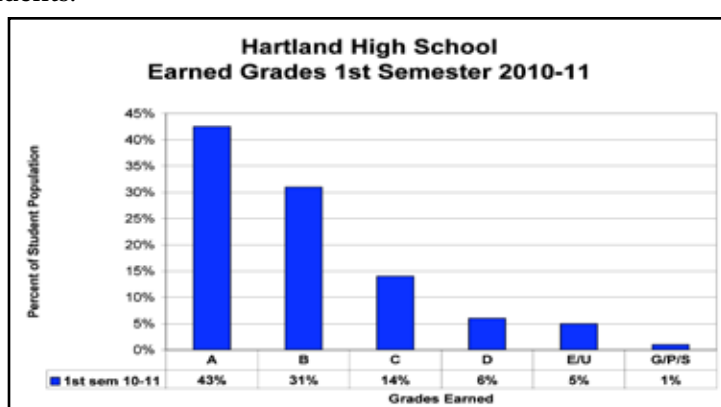

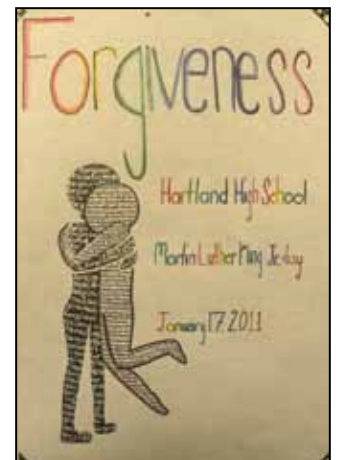
Ore Creek and HHS team up to "Stand up and Speak" at U of M

The Michigan football team is not the only team looking to rebuild this season. The forensics program in Ann Arbor is also hoping to revitalize and is actively recruiting future Wolverines at the high school and middle school levels. As part of this revitalization, the university played host to twenty-two programs from around lower Eastern Michigan school districts to host a competitive forensics tournament. Forensics is competitive public speaking with thirteen categories including poetry, dramatic interpretation, broadcasting, impromptu speaking, informative and storytelling.

Ore Creek participants included: Nick Jeffrey in storytelling, Mason Cothran in informative, Kendra Rocha and Sarah Portelli in Extemporaneous speaking. Members of the high school team attending were: Senior Captain Emily Watt in Poetry, Junior Tori Cothran in Broadcasting and Junior Rhianna Dilworth in Extemporaneous speaking.

All participants advanced out of three preliminary, qualifying rounds. In a tournament dominated by seasoned competitors from perennial powerhouses Birmingham Groves and Dearborn Divine Child, Hartland fared well to send all to the semi-finals. Mason Cothran was the team's best finisher, taking home a second place in informative speaking. His piece on origami earned him two first "100" score preliminary rounds.

Ore Creek will travel to Bloomfield Hills in March to take on West Hills Middle school and several other teams as West Hills holds a tournament on March 26.

MME Schedule

On March 1 - 3 the high school will be administering the Michigan Merit Exam (MME) to all juniors and select seniors (who did not take the complete MME as juniors). The schedule for the MME can be found below. Participation in the MME is a Hartland High school graduation requirement. Anti-Bullying Efforts At HMS

Challenge Day — Challenge Day is scheduled for Hartland Middle School for March 15, 16, and 17. The goal of Challenge Day is to help stop the teasing, bullying, and alienation that too many youth experience. Through a variety of games, trust-building activities, and presentations, students and adults will work together to break down the barriers that separate students. Approximately 125 students and 25 adults will be identified to take part each day. Student comments include "Challenge Day was amazing! It made a huge impact on me," and "Challenge Day was a great experience for me. I used to think that I was the only one with the problems I had. As soon as I saw more people like me, I felt better. Thank you for such a great experience." Adult comments include "It was truly an amazing day, and I learned so much" and "...thank you for letting me participate in Challenge Day – this was an awesome event! It was VERY moving and heartfelt! It makes me remember why I'm an educator."

Be the Change Club — A teacher sponsors work with approximately 50-100 eighth grade students (15-20 per day) to promote the lessons of Challenge Day. Eighth grade students who have participated in Challenge Day may be recommended by their teachers for inclusion in the Club. Each day, selected Club members wear their bright red "Be the Change" shirts to school as a visible reminder to all our students. Any student can report an incidence of teasing or bullying by placing a form in one of the many "Be the Changes" boxes located throughout the school. After screening by an adult, "Be the Change" students intervene, reminding students of the messages from Challenge Day. Club members also help to plan and support each Challenge Day, raise funds to support the program, and promote other related events such as "Mix it Up at Lunch" day.

Mix-it-Up-at-Lunch Day — This is a day to encourage students to meet new people at lunch as we actually assign students to new seats. This is facilitated by our Be the Change Club and National Junior Honor Society.

Cyber-Bullying Education — The cyber-bullying group meets once a week with our school psychologist Monday's during homeroom, and includes a great group of students. We started meeting in December, and have focused on a few different things. First, we've defined cyber-bullying, and what it includes and does not include. We've had discussions about which areas the students feel need more attention, or have been a problem for them or others. This group has also begun to form a survey, which will be given to a subset of students at Ore Creek. The information from the surveys, in addition to group discussions and personal experiences are being used to make an educational video to be shown school-wide this school year, and also to identify other activities that would be helpful. The group will be developing a pledge that they and other students will sign agreeing not to cyber-bully.

Special Assemblies and Guest Speakers — The "Gabe & Izzy" assembly for all seventh graders talks about the negative effects of bullying and teasing. Detective Matt Shutes, from the Livingston County Sheriff Department, presented to students last year; he also worked with targeted classes this school year. His presentation focuses on internet safety and cyber-bullying. We added another speaker this year, Ronnie Bachman, who had his legs amputated at age 4. He speaks about the devastating effects of bullying at a very personal level.

Spreading the Message in the Community — Participants in Challenge Day have included adults from the Howell Education Foundation, the Hartland Optimists Club teachers from other schools, and Catholic Social Services. We also were asked to make a presentation to the Howell Education Foundation, a community group looking to help fund Challenge Days in the Howell, Michigan school district. We have also included more parents as adult volunteers in the program.

Teen Leaders — Hartland High School students and selected HMS eighth grade students participate in Challenge Days as Teen Leaders. HHS students then can become Link Crew leaders; these are trained senior students supervised by adult sponsors who link up with small groups of freshmen to ease the transition to High School.

- One dose of meningococcal vaccine (MCV4 or MPSV4)
- One dose of tetanus/diphtheria/acellular pertussis (Tdap) if 5 years have passed since last dose of tetanus/diphtheria vaccine (DTap, Td, DT)

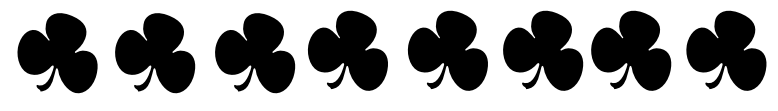

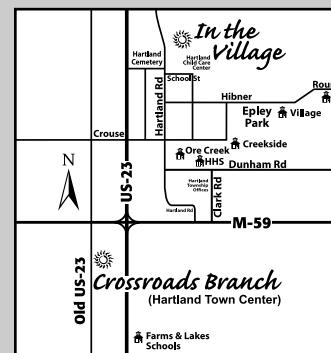

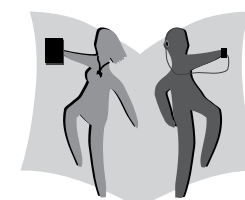

Mindful Journeys

As our bodies age, so do our brains. But we don't have to accept a loss of our mind's edge as a natural part of getting older. In fact, recent research by Cindy Lustig, assistant professor of psychology at the University of Michigan, diminishes the long-held belief that the brain grows dimmer as it ages; "Think of it more as a "reorganization," during which time older people simply use different parts of their brains to do the same tasks as younger people. And research show that diet, physical activity and mental exercise can all help the brain age gracefully – keeping those memories of summers at the lake in sharp focus.

One of the most important things a person can do to keep the brain healthy and honed is to continue "wiring" it throughout a lifetime. Just as a baby's or young child's brain constantly creates new connections between neurons, using the brain in the new ways throughout adulthood can keep the brain young. On the other hand, when existing connections aren't used, the brain "prunes" them away. We've heard the logic games, crossword puzzles and math problems are good for our brains but we also need to do things to stimulate are senses – smells, sights, sounds, taste and touch. Eating something new at a favorite restaurant and taking time to savor each new flavor and smell, visiting a botanical garden and inhaling the aroma of exotic flowers, and studying interesting paintings and sculpture at a museum are all ways to give the brain the varied experiences it needs to stay sharp.

Socializing may provide the same brain-stimulating benefits as a crossword puzzles or listening to classical music. Getting together with friends or making new friends seems to correlate with better brain function.

There is a growing body of knowledge that diet can have a drastic effect on the brain's health. A study conducted by Harvard University and reported that women between the ages of 30 – 55 with diets high in leafy-green and cruciferous vegetables like broccoli, cabbage and Brussel sprouts scored higher on cognitive tests than women with less vegetable –rich diets.

Recipe for a healthy brain – Stay or get physically active, work- up a mental sweat with puzzles and games, staying connected to friends and the community, eat a healthy diet of fruits and vegetables and low in fat and sugar. 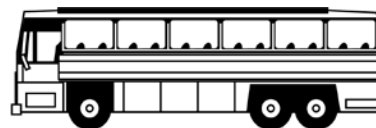

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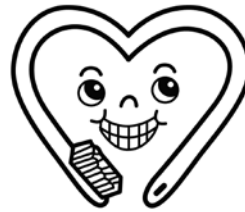
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Revocable Living Trust

Most people have heard about Revocable Living Trusts but very few actually understand what they are. A Revocable Living Trust is a legal document that includes instructions regarding what should be done with your assets when you die. Now, you may be thinking--isn't that what a Will does? Yes, that's exactly what a Will does, however the key difference between a Will and a Trust is that a Trust prevents the assets in the Trust from being probated (tied up in the court system) at your death—a Will doesn't.

Revocable Living Trusts are not the only way to avoid probate. Jointly titling your assets or designation beneficiary designations are two other commonly-used methods of avoiding probate. While joint ownership and/or beneficiary designations may be appropriate in certain cases, there are other situations where having your assets in a Trust is the best course of action.

Trusts are not nearly as complicated as many people believe them to be. The first step is to meet with an attorney who is experienced in drafting Revocable Living Trusts and who can explain the process to you. You will become the Grantor of the trust—meaning the Trust belongs to you and only you can make changes to your Trust. You will also need to name someone as Trustee to manage the assets in your Trust. You can be your own Trustee or designate someone else (a family member, friend, or corporate trustee like a bank) to serve as Trustee.

Finally, you will designate beneficiaries—people or organizations who will receive your assets when you die. This is where a Trust is extremely useful. For example, you may have three adult children and you may want all of your assets to pass in equal share to the three kids upon your death—and should one of your children die before you do, you want his

share to go to this kid. This can be easily accomplished with a Trust but would not be possible by naming the three kids as joint owners on your assets nor would it be possible by naming the three kids as beneficiaries.

This is just one potential benefit of using a Revocable Living Trust to avoid probate. Revocable Living Trusts are also helpful should your desired method of distribution be more complicated. For instance, you may want a portion of your assets to go to your grandchildren but perhaps they are all teenagers right now. You could set up your Trust such that your grandchildren won't receive their share of the assets until they reach the age of 25. On the other hand, you may have an adult daughter with a developmental disability who wouldn't be able to manage her share of the assets upon your death. In that case, you may choose to have her share of the assets continue to be held by

the Trust after your death so the Trustee can manage her share for her. Situations like the two just mentioned can only be handled through a Revocable Living Trust—they cannot be accomplished through joint tenancy or beneficiary designations.

One last point—a Trust by itself is worthless unless the Trust has been funded. Once the Trust document is drawn up according to your wishes and has been signed, you must transfer your assets into the Trust. This means you will need to re-title your assets, such as real estate, stocks and CD's in the name of your Trust.

Though having a Revocable Living Trust in place can help you simplify the administration of your financial affairs after your death and ensure your wishes are carried out, there are a lot of issues to consider when deciding if a Trust is right for you. A good elder law attorney can help you with this decision.

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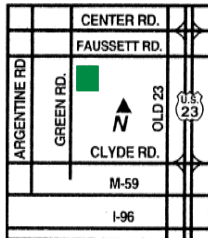
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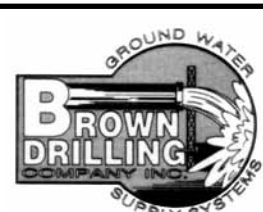

For the elite athlete, to those severely de-conditioned from injury, illness or just plain old inactivity, we offer classes that can help you toward your fitness goals.

The Hartland pool has water exercise classes on Mondays and Wednesdays at 4:30, 5:30 and 6:30, a schedule designed to accommodate working people.

These 50-minute classes are held in the 86-degree, 4-foot deep leisure pool. It's not necessary to register for a specific class. The drop-in rate is \$6.25 for adults or \$5.25 for seniors (over 55 and retired). You can reduce the cost further by purchasing a frequency for any 20 exercise classes within 6 months of purchase.
