Superintendent's Message Janet Sifferman, Superintendent

Considering all of the modifications and transformations taking place concerning public education in Michigan and across the country, we had a remarkably uneventful and successful start to the 2011/2012 school year. We arrived back to new technology and many updates to our buildings and classrooms, and welcomed new students to our school family.

October is the month for MEAP (Michigan Educational Assessment Program) testing across the State of Michigan

for students in grades 3-9. The testing window begins on October 11 and ends October 21. Make-up tests take place through October 28. We are required to teach the grade level content expectations the state has established based on national standards. Our curriculum is aligned with these standards. The MEAP test is designed to assess our teaching of these standards and is the benchmark with which we are judged by the state and our public. While the MEAP is by no means the only assessment tool we have, it is the most public. Therefore, it is important that our students do well.

Rest assured our educational practices are not focused solely on standardized testing. We feel it is important to educate the whole child by providing opportunities for reflection, critical thinking, speaking and listening, as well as instruction in the core content areas and the arts. However, because of the importance placed on the MEAP tests, we ask that you help us provide an optimum testing session for our students by ensuring that your child is present, well rested and fed.




HP4K (Hartland Parents For Kids) Learned Lego Robotics

Principal's Corner

This is an incredible feat considering we had 1,800 plus students walk through the door. I wish to publicly recognize Erica Empie, Jodi Wilson, Nicole Schingeck, Heather Borst, Sue Stannard (Secretary), Mary Day (Support Services Coordinator) and Lindsay McClearen (intern) for the job they do in meeting the needs of our students. Thank You!

I think it is important to take a moment and share with you my thoughts on two of the most important job descriptions I have as the Principal of Hartland High School. As the "Principal" my most important role (in my opinion) is to ensure that HHS is a safe and orderly environment for our students to learn. This means that I regularly look for input into policies and procedures that will best help our students make decisions which will benefit them now or in the future. At times this means intervention is taken when poor decisions are made; however most of the time this role equates to simply being present and sharing with students expectations that we have at our school. Curriculum and instruction is an important role which requires that I regularly evaluate and monitor the implementation of Board of Education adopted curriculum. This means that each year I must review what is expected to be taught, monitor the implementation of the curriculum in the classroom, and evaluate the learning taking place. The use of internal common assessments, teacher created checkpoints, and standardized testing results helps us to determine where we are and what we need to improve on in regard to teaching and learning. While I have many other responsibilities on my job description, I truly feel that these two responsibilities are the most critical when it comes to providing our students with a premier public school education.




Big Red Barrel

Teens are inundated by messages everyday, some positive while others are not. Please remember that you are the most important influence on your child's life. If you have prescription medication in your house, lock them up and keep an eye on the contents. If you no longer have need for them, but don't know where to dispose of them safely, the Livingston County Community Alliance would like you to know that there are two sites where you can drop your unused prescription medication. Look for the big red barrels at the Michigan State Police Post on Old US-23 in Brighton (Monday through Friday from 8am-4pm), or the Livingston County Jail (24 hours a day, 7 days a week) on South Highlander Way in Howell. The service is free, and the medication is disposed of in a proper fashion.

Advanced Placement Courses Are Expanding and Proving Successful

Four years ago the District Rigorous Curriculum Steering Committee made a commitment to expanding our AP course offerings as a means to encouraging more students to take challenging coursework. PHONE MESSAGES TO STUDENTS IN SCHOOL



SAFETY IN THE PARKING LOT







Carol's Corner: Successful/Healthy Aging

- 1. **Coping successfully with disease.** As we age, we will all face the disease process. How we deal with it is what's most important.
- 2. Cultivate a sense of humor! It relieves stress and provides perspective.
- **3.** Neurologic plasticity (in other words, stretch your brain). Seniors need to learn new skills (chess, language, writing memories, painting, instrument). Even people with cognitive impairment can express their creativity. Don't become a couch potato. Use it or lose it!
- 4. Maintain close ties. Loneliness and social isolation are associated with depression and health problems. Coming to the senior center and making new friends helps you cope with some of the problems that you'll have to face. Grandchildren can bring a lot of happiness in your life. The most vulnerable seniors are those that are disabled, alone, childless and cognitively impaired.
- 5. Civic Engagement. Did you know that volunteers are the healthiest! Volunteer at a job you would enjoy but still allow time for yourself.
- 6. **Practice spirituality!** Evidence shows that as we age, religion becomes more important. In my experience seniors that have a strong belief seem to be more optimistic and find purpose, hope and comfort in their religion.
- **7.** Adapt to the environment. Due to health problems, etc. we may need to leave our home and go into an assisted living facility, small apt. or even live with one of our children. People that can adapt do much better and live longer.
- **8. Stay Active.** It's never to late to begin an exercise program. Exercise increases oxygen flow to the brain, lowers cholesterol/BP, etc. Talk to your Dr. before you begin to find out what type of exercise is best for you.
- **9.** Eat Well/Maintain a healthy weight. Eat lots of fruits and vegetables, avoid empty calories, limit alcohol, drink plenty of water and cut down on your portion of meat.
- **10.** Take medications as directed. People are living longer because of the medications that can prevent heart attacks and strokes. Be sure to see your doctor regularly and take the meds as prescribed.







There are many decisions to be made when imminent death is approaching for a loved one. Questions regarding what type of care, medical assistance and even physical location for their last days confront us.

If care at home has been given, should loved ones be moved to a facility or remain at home? If in a care facility should they be moved home for their last days? Will 24-hour care become necessary and more medical assistance be required?

If you are asking these questions, a Hospice service might be a good solution. Hospice can be provided to a person who has a life-limiting illness wherever that person lives. A nursing facility or long-term care facility can receive visits from hospice personnel in addition to the other care and services provided by the facility.

Hospice care is a special way of caring for a patient who is in the last stages of life. Hospice provides a team of professionals who aid the patient and family caregivers. This could include nurses, social workers, physicians, clergy and aides who all work together to plan and coordinate care, 24 hours a day or as needed. The Hospice Foundation of America outlines the following services of hospice:

- Hospice is a special concept of care designed to provide comfort and support to patients and their families when a life-limiting illness no longer responds to cure-oriented treatments.
- Hospice care neither prolongs life nor hastens death. Hospice staff and volunteers offer a specialized knowledge of medical care, including pain management.
- The goal of hospice care is to improve the quality of a patient's last days by offering comfort and dignity.
- Hospice care is provided by a teamoriented group of specially trained professionals, volunteers and family members.
- Hospice addresses all symptoms of a disease, with a special emphasis on controlling a patient's pain and discomfort.
- Hospice deals with the emotional, social and spiritual impact of the disease on the patient and the patient's family and friends.

• Hospice offers a variety of bereavement and counseling services to families before and after a patient's death.

To be eligible for hospice a physician must certify the patient to be terminally ill with a life expectancy of six months or less and treatment for a cure is no longer provided. The focus for the patient has to changed to supportive care and quality of remaining life.

Hospice is paid for by private insurance, medicare or Medicaid Hospice benefit or personal funds.

Here are the conditions that apply for Medicare hospice benefits:

- You are eligible for Medicare Part A (Hospital Insurance)
- Your doctor and the hospice medical director certify that you're terminally ill and have six (6) months or less to live if your illness runs its normal course.
- You sign a statement choosing hospice care instead of other Medicare-covered benefits to treat your terminal illness.
 You get care from a Medicare-approved
- You get care from a Medicare-approved hospice program

You understand that Medicare will still pay for covered benefits for any health problems that aren't related to your terminal illness.

Special benefit periods apply to Medicare hospice care and some services do not apply. Be sure to understand the rules and requirements of Medicare payment before you commit.

Hospice is available to anyone, regardless of age or illness. If Medicare or private insurance is not available hospice services may be available for low income individuals through grants or charitable donations. Many hospices are non-profit and will provide services to anyone in need.

The days leading up to the moment of death of a loved one can b rich with meaning and expressions of love. Family and caregivers should allow others to help with the care and daily responsibilities. They need to free themselves from the details of caregiving and instead need to use hospice to all more time to reminisce, gives thanks for a life shared and say goodbye.




items. Richard also collected \$675.00 in monetary donations.
