



Obituary for

#### A. Arthur Behrmann, PhD

#### Former educator and administrator

Dr. Behrmann died suddenly in Tucson, Arizona on November 8. He was born in Detroit and attended elementary, middle school and Cass Technical High School in Detroit, earning a full scholarship to Michigan Tech in Houghton. After transferring to Wayne State University, he met Loretta (Lorie) Weingarden, the love of his life, and they married in 1956. Five years later, he began his teaching career while continuing his education.

During the next few years, he taught in Southfield, Royal Oak, and Ypsilanti before accepting the position of Hartland Elementary School principal.

For twenty-nine years, Dr. Berhrmann was a respected administrator in the Hartland School District. He started his tenure there as principal of the "Old 21" building and was instrumental in opening two other elementary schools; The Round Building in 1970 and the Lakes Elementary in 1977. He remained principal there until 1984 when he became principal of the Village Elementary.

After receiving his Ph.D. in 1975 from Michigan State University in Administration and Higher Education, he became an adjunct professor at Eastern Michigan University and later at Michigan State University. As an educator and administrator, Dr. Behrmann was highly respected and always put the children first. He was a leader, he was innovative, he was loyal to his students and staff, and for that he earned tremendous respect. Dr. Behrmann took great pride in being an early adapter, bringing computers to the Hartland School District. He always maintained a love for the students and spent his last four years back in the classroom as a fifth grade teacher.

In 1975 travel became an important part of his life. He and his spent many summers traveling around the country seeing most of the United States and Canada. After retiring in 1995, Dr. Behrmann developed a great love of cruising discovering many new places. They spent their winters in Arizona but remained in Hartland for another seven years before moving to West Bloomfield. They left Michigan for full-time residence in Tucson, Arizona only six months ago and had been looking forward to spending their remaining years in their new home overlooking the mountains.

More than anything, Dr. Behrmann cherished his family. He adored his wife and it was obvious to all who knew them that they shared a very special love for each other. Dr. Behrmann took great pride in the achievements and talents of his daughter, his son-in-law (whom he thought of as son) and his two grand-daughters, 17 and 13, watching them grow into lovely, talented young women.




# **Principal's Corner**

#### **Chuck Hughes, Hartland High School Principal**

Welcome to December and all the excitement surrounding the Holiday Season! The staff at Hartland High School wishes you and your family well as you travel and enjoy the time spent with your families.

#### **Attendance Reminder:**

I would like to remind you that attendance is an important variable in the education of your children. While the teachers and supporting staff can ensure that Hartland High School offers a warm and safe learning environment rich in educational opportunity, your child's regular attendance and engagement in learning is needed to gain the benefits. I would like to note that 95% if our students regularly attend school every day. Roughly 5% experience attendance issues that can become statistics in regard to their performance in the classroom, see the chart below:



Parents, please remember that by calling the attendance line at 810.626.2205 or sending an absence note into the office within 48 hours you help our staff to better understand your child's situation. It is also important that absences be noted by a parent because unexcused absences can result in the loss of credit for missing assignments. Please help your son/daughter keep track of their attendance marks by using Parent or Student Connect or by monitoring the phone calls we make each day noting that an absence has occurred. If you have any questions about our attendance process, please contact me at 810.626.2210.

# **Preparation for ACT**

Many of you have heard about or read about how Michigan students are doing in regard to "college readiness." What this means is that when students take the ACT the score they earn is linked to a score established by colleges as one that predicts success in college courses. For example, if a student earns a 22 on the math portion of the ACT then it is predicted that they will earn a passing grade when they take math courses in college. For the purpose of reported "college readiness" scores the State of Michigan has published the percent of students who have earned high enough marks in all the categories of the ACT (math, science, English, and reading) to be considered college ready. What this does not account for is a student that may score well on math but not on English. The student would be considered to be college ready in math but not English and therefore not calculated in Hartland High School's "college readiness" score. Below you will see the breakdown of how well students must score on each tested areas of the ACT to be considered ready to be successful in college:

Math = 22 English = 18 Reading = 21 Science = 24 If a student earned these exact scores they would earn a 21 Composite score on the ACT, however, a 21 Composite score on the ACT does not necessarily mean that the student is "college ready."

# **TELEPARENT up and Running:**

Parents, you may remember a recent phone call and e-mail message reminding you about report cards coming home and Parent/Teacher Conferences. You should also be receiving absence calls through this system. During the year the high school will utilize this tool to help inform you about events and important information. We may also use this system to send out emergency information, if necessary. The system will be used sparingly to ensure that you are not inundated with calls from the high school. If a call is made to your home, please listen to it and mark your calendars or act on the information.

# **SADD** (Students Against Destructive Decisions)

The Hartland High School SADD group now in its fourth year and 65+ members strong, works hard to send the message to their high school peers that many young people DO make healthy and positive choices in their lives. SADD which stands for Students Against Destructive Decisions sponsors many events throughout the year to educate their peers and encourage them to make good decisions. The kick off event this year was the annual 'Do Nut Drink, Do Nut Do Drugs' campaign in which they served 1700+ Spicer's doughnuts during lunches to their peers after they signed a pledge that they would stay substance free for Halloween weekend. SADD sponsors at least one event per month addressing a variety of decisions that teens face, our next activity, called The Grim Reaper addresses the issue of distracted driving (drinking/texting and driving) and the dangers associated with that decision. SADD is a positive way for students to influence their peers to live a safe and healthy life and to educate our school community to the fact that MOST KIDS DO MAKE HEALTHY AND SAFE CHOICES.

# **Delay of School Start Times due to inclement weather**

#### 1 HOUR DELAY

All students will ride the same bus with the same type of pick-up structure as under normal circumstances other than that bus will arrive at the regular pick-up stop approximately one hour later than usual. No structure changes will exist other than the time element. Under a one-hour delay, **A.M. junior kindergarten classes will be held.** There will be no vocational education classes.

#### **2 HOUR DELAY**

Under a two-hour delay, all students will be picked up as usual, except two hours later than on a regular schedule.


**Under a two-hour delay,** there will be **NO A.M. JUNIOR KINDERGARTEN**. There will be no vocational education classes.

The purpose of this alternative plan is to enable the flexibility of delaying school on some mornings due to fog and/or freezing rain. I am hoping that it will help assure that more instructional days can be held, while improving the safety factor for our staff and students.

Under a delay approach, all staff should report prior to the arrival of their students. Below you will find a chart outlining regular starting times and the starting times under a one and two hour delay situation. The chart also shows the time lunch schedules would begin. You will note that no alteration is being made regarding lunch. This will enable all personnel to function as usual.

If we had a crystal ball and could see into the future, we would not need to prepare ahead for end of life decisions.

James was 62 years old when a stroke made it impossible for him to communicate with his family. Neither his wife nor children knew anything about his financial or medical information. James had always taken care of things himself and left no written directives in his behalf. Besides having to locate important documents, the family was left to make their own decisions about James long term care.

The National Institute on Aging gives three simple, but important steps to putting your affairs in order:

- "Put your important papers and copies of legal documents in one place. You could set up a file, put everything in a desk or dresser drawer, or just list the information and location ofpapers in a notebook. If your papers are in a bank safe deposit box, keep copies in a file at home. Check each year to see if there's anything new to add.
- Tell a trusted family member or friend where you put all your important papers.

You don't need to tell this friend or family member about your personal affairs, but someone should know where you keep your papers in case of emergency. If you don't have a relative or friend you trust, ask a lawyer to help.

 Give consent in advance for your doctor or lawyer to talk with your caregiver as needed. There may be questions about your care, a bill or a health insurance claim. Without your consent, your caregiver may not be able to get needed information have your okay in advance to Medicare, a credit card company, your bank or your doctor."

#### Preparing Advance Directives

Advance directives are legal documents that state the kind of medical care or end of life decision you want made in your behalf. It is a way for you to communicate your wishes to family or health care professionals. Emergency response medical personnel cannot honor Advance directives. They are required to save and stabilize a person for transfer to a hospital or emergency facility. Once at the facility a physician will honor the directives.

The Advance directives gives your consent or refusal for sustained medical treatment when you are not able to give it yourself. If this document is not in place then a physician will decide such things as:

- Resuscitation if breathing or heartbeat stops
- Use of breathing machines
- Use of feeding tubes
- Medications or medical procedures.

Advance Directives are legal throughout the United States; however, some state may not honor other state's documents. Be sure to check with the state you live in for their requirements.

Review your directives periodically. They do not expire, but your wishes may change. A new or revised Advanced Directive invalidates the old one. Be sure your family member or healthcare proxy has a current copy

Choosing a Power of Attorney

General Power of Attorney----authorizes someone to handle your financial, banking and possibly real estate and government affairs as long as you remain competent.

Special Power of Attorney --- authorizes some-

one you designate to handle certain things you cannot do yourself for a period of time. **Durable Power of Attorney**---the general,

special and health care powers of attorney can all be made "durable" by adding certain text to the document. This means that the document will remain in effect or take effect if you become mentally incompetent.

Many people do not know the difference between a general and a durable power of attorney. A general Power of attorney is a document by which you appoint a person to act as your agent.


Agents are authorized to make decisions for you, sign legal documents, etc. Many people are unaware that a General Power of Attorney is revoked when the person granting that power becomes incompetent or incapacitated.

It is the "Durable" Power of Attorney that allows for an agent to continue making decisions on your behalf no matter what happens to you. A responsible adult child of an aging parent would be given a "durable power of attorney" to act on behalf of the parent. This provides broader authority than just adding the child's name to bank accounts and documents.
