

Superintendent's Message Janet Sifferman, Superintendent

As happens every year, things seem to be moving very quickly. The district is already in full swing, planning for the 2012/2013 school year. There are a couple of important dates

and activities that are happening soon. Kindergarten Round-up for the 2012/2013 school year is scheduled for March 13 and 14 from 5:30 to 8:00 p.m. at the Hartland Educational Support Services Center. Please refer to the announcement in this issue for further details. Scheduling for Hartland High School students begins this month and you may contact Hartland Middle School (for incoming freshman) or Hartland High School if you have specific questions regarding this process.

I also wanted to make everyone aware of the recent changes to the regular school election laws. Beginning this year the election of school board members will take place in November and then will occur every two years, rather than every year. The district will continue to run its annual 18-mill Non-Homestead Millage election in May, however, to ensure the district continues to receive its full distribution of state aid for the coming year. More information will be forthcoming on this ballot proposal over the next couple of months. As always, Hartland Consolidated Schools is extremely fortunate to have fantastic support from our parents and the community. Thank you!



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Kindergarten Registration 2012-2013

Officials of the Hartland Consolidated Schools have announced that they will be accepting registration for kindergarten enrollments for the 2012/2013 school year. Children are eligible for enrollment in kindergarten in September of 2012 if they will have their fifth (5th) birthday on or before December 1, 2012.

A Junior Kindergarten program may be offered on a limited basis. A minimum number of students is required for the program to be made available. Parents must agree to provide transportation in order to participate. You may contact Scott VanEpps at 810.626.2111 for more information.

A twenty-minute Orientation will begin at 5:30 p.m. in the Board Room located at the Hartland Educational Support Service Center, 9525 Highland Road, followed by Registration in the Performing Arts Center lobby on:

March 13 (Tuesday)6:00-8:00 p.m.Last names starting with the letters A-LMarch 14 (Wednesday)6:00-8:00 p.m.Last names starting with the letters M-Z

Please bring the following:

- Original birth certificate with seal, plus a copy of same certificate
- Original immunization records with proof of DTP, Polio, MMR, Hepatitis B, Chicken Pox Shots (or proof of having had illness), and vision screening, plus a copy of the record
- Proof of residency copy of one of the following: certificate of occupancy, purchase agreement, builder's permit, rent receipt or agreement, mortgage statement/ payment receipt, voter registration card, utility bill, driver's license

While we need to see the originals, it will expedite the enrollment process if you also bring copies of the originals.

Kindergarten registration packets will be available beginning February 8, 2012 at the Board of Education office, the Community Education office, each elementary school office and the Hartland Child Care Center (51 Building). You can also download the packet from our web site: hartlandschools.us.

Principal's Corner

Chuck Hughes, Hartland High School Principal

Are those New Year's Resolutions going well for you? I hope so and best wishes on accomplishing your goals. At Hartland High School we continue to be goal oriented in everything we do. Our school improvement goals were changed this year from seeing a 10% increase in content proficiency to seeing our students demonstrate proficiency at a higher level than any high school in Livingston County. In March our juniors will take the Michigan Merit Exam and ACT which are designed to determine proficiency levels in math, reading, English, science, and social studies as well as college readiness. To accomplish this, our staff has been working collaboratively to ensure that students are demonstrating proficiency in these core areas. The staff is also spending time helping students with test taking strategies that can improve their ability to demonstrate proficiency. We encourage all juniors to enroll in an ACT test prep program prior to taking the ACT in March.

March testing for juniors

- March 6 = ACT Test / Writing Prompt
- March 7 = Work Keys (Math, Reading, Locating Information)
- March 8 = MME (Math, Science and Social Studies)

Please remember that a student's best effort on the assessment is a graduation requirement.

Parking Lot Concerns:

Parents, we are experiencing some difficulties in the parking lot with our young drivers. Concerns have come up in regard to the manner in which students are driving. Please help us by reminding your young drivers of the responsibility they have to be safe and courteous drivers. Reason, Respect, and Responsibility is a life long expectation for our students in Hartland and does not end at the school building doors. The following guidelines have been shared with students and should be reinforced:

- 1. Enter, exit, and drive in the parking lot at speeds reasonable to the conditions. Heavy traffic always equates to slow moving.
- 2. It is never acceptable to enter or exit the parking lot by running over the curbs.
- 3. Be courteous by alternating cars when two or more lanes come together.

Parents, you can also help by dropping off and picking up students at the main entrance by the flag pole, just like the drop off lanes at the elementary schools.

Scheduling for 2012-13:

During the month of February and March students in grades 8-11 will be receiving information on registering for 2012-13 classes. We encourage students to be thinking about their future career plans (Educational Development Plans and ACT PLAN information should help guide course selection decisions) when choosing classes. Students in the Class of 2016 will be required to take two years of a world language under the Michigan Merit Curriculum graduation requirements as well. If you have not looked into Dual Enrollment (taking college courses while in high school) or Career Technology Education programs (check out www.latec.us to view all of the county-wide programs) please do so to make the best decisions for the future.

Hartland High School will be offering

two new programs next year to our students.

- A. Emergency Medical Services which will be open to students who have completed Health Occupations I or are currently involved in a Junior Firefighter program or Explorer program. Students who complete the course will be eligible to take the Emergency Medical Technician Exam when they turn 18.
- B. University of Michigan-Flint has teamed with the Livingston County high schools to offer a Business & Economics Professions Program and a Law/ Criminal Justice Professions Program. This will be open to all seniors and be a dual enrollment course (12 college credits) and be held at the former high school. This is a wonderful opportunity to earn 12 transferable college credits. Please note that dual enrollment courses have transportation and additional costs associated with them but can save the student money on long-term college costs.

The staff at HHS encourages students to take as many Advanced Placement courses as possible. These courses prepare students to take the AP Exam which may translate into college credits if a good enough score is earned on the exam. The job market and college entrance is competitive today. Take the opportunity to maximize the high school experience to put you in the best position upon graduation.

High School Marketing-DECA Sets New School Record

On Friday, January 6, 260 Hartland High School Marketing students traveled to Eastern Michigan University to compete in the District 4 DECA Competition. Hartland delegates competed with over 600 students from 12 other school districts for the right to compete with students from around the state at the DECA State Career Development Conference to be held at the Dearborn Hyatt Regency March 16-18. When the day had ended, a school-record 113 Hartland students had earned a spot in the State Finals. These students will join 27 Advanced Marketing students to form a delegation of 140 Hartland students who will travel to the State Finals in March. Good Luck Hartland!

Each year since 1946, students nationwide participate in DECA competitions at the district, state and national level for a chance to earn college scholarships, national recognition and a wealth of real world marketing, management and entrepreneurship experience. The competitive event consists of written test taking and a role play scenario in which students are given 10 minutes to plan a presentation for a judge. Students may chose from 19 career-specific areas of marketing ranging from categories such as Apparel & Accessory Marketing, Sports & Entertainment Marketing, Financial Services Marketing or Restaurant Marketing. Industry professionals from their respective sectors volunteer time to serve as DECA judges, providing a wealth of valuable knowledge to today's aspiring professionals. From a classroom teacher's point of view, this is some of the best feedback a student will ever receive prior to making their way into the "real-world".

If you're fortunate enough to have one or both parents still living, you may have noticed a role reversal taking place in your relationship. Remember the days when Mom shuttled you to the doctor when-ever you were sick? Now, it may be you who's driving her to her medical appointments. Perhaps you've become even more involved in managing her healthcare needs – serving as her healthcare proxy, moving her into your home to care for her, or even having to select a nursing home for her to live in.

Whatever the case, it's natural to feel challenged – and intimidated – in the role you've undertaken. But if you stay positive and proactive, you'll be in a great position to advocate for your parents' optimal care. And, really, what better way is there to say "Thank You" for all they've done for you over the years?

The following six recommendations will help you understand what may be happening to your parents as they age – and what you can do to help.

1. Stay vigilant to sudden changes.

Typically, sudden changes arise from sudden problems. Your elderly father who becomes confused one week but was alert and oriented the week be-fore, or becomes unsteady walking and starts falling, is likely experiencing an acute problem – an infection, medication side effect, or perhaps, a heart attack or stroke.

If you pay attention to your parent's baseline health and behavior, you'll be alert to sudden, and subtle, fluctuations. Being attuned to what's "normal" for your parent is critical in advocating for his care. By informing his physician of these changes, you help ensure that he receives a proper diagnosis and timely treatment–especially important in acute conditions.

2. Investigate the source of gradual decline.

Several years ago, I met an elderly woman living in a nursing home. Her family, assuming she had dementia, had moved her there after she had gradually stopped speaking. I asked how she was doing. "I'm OK," she replied.

A miracle? Not exactly. I asked a nurse to look at her ears. She removed bullet-sized pieces of wax from her ears. She'd stopped speaking because her ears were too plugged to hear.

A host of conditions can cause gradual decline. Before jumping to the conclusion that Alzheimer's disease is the culprit, recognize that your parent may be experiencing an altogether different problem: a vitamin B12 deficiency, an underactive thyroid, Parkinson's disease or depression, to name a few.

When discussing your parent's decline with her physician, make sure the two of you consider all the possibilities. To prepare for the appointment, make notes detailing how her decline has manifested itself–loss of appetite, a failing short-term memory and so forth – and how long you've noticed these changes.

3. Know thy parent's medicine cabinet.

Familiarize yourself with the medications your parent takes: what each one is for and how often he takes them. Make sure you notify each doctor your parent visits of all the medicine he takes, including over-the-counter products. Ask what side effects you might observe from each medication and whether it's potentially dangerous if your parent takes them together. You also want to tell the doctor whether your parent drinks alcohol or caffeinated drinks and whether he smokes, as these substances can affect some medications' efficacy and safety. To recognize which medications might cause the symptoms your parent experiences, check out drugscanmakeyousick.com.

4. Discourage ageist attitudes.

Simply put, ageism is prejudice against the elderly. It exists in many forms but can be particularly damaging to an older person's self-esteem when it assumes that all of her woes are age-related. Here are a couple of ways of expressing ageism to an elderly parent:

"What do you expect at your age?"

"You're not getting any younger."

If you're ever tempted to utter something similar, remind yourself that by chalking up everything that ails her to her age, you sell your parent short. If she's depressed, it may have nothing to do with the fact that she's 80 and every-

age, you sell your parent short. If she's depressed, it may have nothing to do with the fact that she's 80 and everything to do with a biological predisposition to depression. And remember that right-knee pain in a 90 year-old can't be just from age if there's no problem with her left knee.

5. Address not just symptoms—but emotions, too.

There is disease and then there is "dis-ease" – that is, a lack ofease, security or well-being. "Dis-ease" can manifest itself as myriad emotions in an elderly person: fear, grief, boredom, embarrassment and sadness among them. The fact is, these emotions can be every bit as debilitating as disease. Take the case of a parent who's incontinent. Too embarrassed to socialize, she cuts herself off from friends. Without companionship, she becomes lonely. Instead of allowing her to become a hermit, discuss with her doctor how to address the incontinence. Together, you can consider different solutions that will ease her embarrassment and reinvigorate her social life.

6. Strive to maximize your parent's quality of life.

No matter our age, we all want to enjoy life to the fullest and have the capability to do the things we want to. Improving the enjoyment of life and a patient's functional ability are the cardinal goals of geriatric care. But you don't need a medical diploma on your wall to help your parent achieve either of those goals.

Being there to solve a problem or provide company are tremendously worthwhile services you can provide – no expertise required. Remember, as your parent gets older, his quality of life becomes more important to him than how much longer he lives. And he doesn't necessarily need medications or surgery to ensure that he's living the latter part of his life to the fullest.

If he enjoys books but has difficulty reading regular-sized type, check out sight-saving titles at the library. If he's grieving the loss of his best buddy, introduce him to new acquaintances at the senior center. If he's living in a nursing home, bring your kids there to share a meal with him. Sometimes, it's the small gestures that have the most profound impact. As the child of an elderly parent, you are uniquely positioned to deliver these life-changing gifts.

Black Sheep Weavers' Fiber Guild Stitch Alchemy - February 2



Donna Borton is in her second year as a member of the Black Sheep Weavers Fiber Guild. She became interested in making paper cloth when trying to find a way to combine painting and sewing skills. Starting from scratch, it was quite a learning experience. However, it was fun to make and there are a lot of possibilities for embellishing and using it in your art.

Please bring a pair of disposable gloves as you will be working with inks and you won't want this on your hands. There is a kit fee of \$3.00 (please have correct change). If you have some tissue paper that has a unique design and want to use it in your sample, cut it into small (no larger than 2 x 2) pieces. You will not need a lot and there will be other tissue paper available. You will be making basic paper cloth and also embellishing a piece that is already prepared. This can be a messy but fun experience.
