

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Kindergarten Registration 2012-2013

Officials of the Hartland Consolidated Schools have announced that they will be accepting registration for kindergarten enrollments for the 2012/2013 school year. Children are eligible for enrollment in kindergarten in September of 2012 if they will have their fifth (5th) birthday on or before December 1, 2012.

A Junior Kindergarten program may be offered on a limited basis. A minimum number of students is required for the program to be made available. Parents must agree to provide transportation in order to participate. You may contact Scott Van Epps at 810.626.2111 for more information.

A twenty-minute Orientation will begin at 5:30 p.m. in the Board Room located at the Hartland Educational Support Service Center, 9525 Highland Road, followed by Registration in the Performing Arts Center lobby on:

March 13 (Tuesday) 6:00-8:00 p.m. Last names starting with the letters A-L March 14 (Wednesday) 6:00-8:00 p.m. Last names starting with the letters M-Z

Please bring the following:

- Original birth certificate with seal, plus a copy of same certificate
- Original immunization records with proof of DTP, Polio, MMR, Hepatitis B, Chicken Pox Shots (or proof of having had illness), and vision screening, plus a copy of the record
- Proof of residency copy of one of the following: certificate of occupancy, purchase agreement, builder's permit, rent receipt or agreement, mortgage statement/payment receipt, voter registration card, utility bill, driver's license

While we need to see the originals, it will expedite the enrollment process if you also bring copies of the originals.

Kindergarten registration packets will be available beginning February 8, 2012 at the Board of Education office, the Community Education office, each elementary school office and the Hartland Child Care Center (51 Building). You can also download the packet from our web site: hartlandschools.us.

Plastow Awarded Scholarship

Jessica Plastow, a student at Hartland High School, was awarded a competitive scholarship from The University of Findlay's Scholarship Day on December 3.

Plastow is the daughter of Debbie and James Plastow. Her activities include Junior Optimist Club, National Honor Society, Horse's Haven volunteer and she has received academic and athletic awards. Plastow was one of 191 students from around the country who competed for merit scholarships worth up to \$5,000. High-ability students were selected based on high school grade point average and ACT or SAT scores. Only 12 students from this group were awarded a scholarship. Students completed a written essay and were interviewed by University representatives.

What's for Lunch?

With all the press about school lunch the Hartland Food Service staff would like to assure parents that we are offering your students healthy choices. With the release of the new Nutrition Standards for school lunch that came out last week we are proud to state that we have very little to do to meet these new guidelines. We have been offering students fresh fruits, vegetables and whole grains, for many years. Starting in the 2006/07 school year we transformed our Elementary Salad Bars into Fruit & Veggie Bars, which offers 5 different fresh vegetables, 2-3 fresh fruits which may includes:



pears, watermelon chunks & grapes, canned fruits packed in juice or lite syrup, and only 100 % Fruit juice. In addition we have offered several new hot vegetables with our meals such as Sweet Potatoes, Acorn Squash, Brussel Sprouts, Asparagus and most recently Parsnips. Our K-12 Whole Grain program started in 2008 w/95% of our bread selections meeting the USDA Whole Grain criteria. Milk offered for the past eight years has been 1% White & Chocolate along with White Skim Milk. This year we have 1% & Fat Free White along with Fat Free Chocolate (don't tell the students).

Get the Nutritional Facts about the elementary lunch choices at the Hartland Consolidated Schools Web page under the Food Service Link, and then choose Elementary Nutritional Information.

If you are in the buildings check out the New My Plate posters promoting healthier choices located in all cafeterias with the burning question of "What's on Your Plate?" As always if you have any question about what is offered for lunch contact the Food Service Department directly. Parents are encouraged to come and join their student for lunch. Elementary parents can enjoy a school meal by calling into your students' building by 9:15am with your lunch choice.


Principal's Corner

I ask that parents take note of the following information pertaining to the Michigan Merit Exam and ACT testing schedule as it impacts all students.

On March 6-8 the high school will be administering the Michigan Merit Exam (MME) to all juniors and select seniors (who did not take the complete MME as juniors). The schedule for the MME can be found below. Participation in the MME is a Hartland High school graduation requirement. Students who take the MME will receive a free ACT score that can be reported to colleges. See www.act. org for study resources and tips to help prepare for the MME.

Seniors Shine at Poetry Event

High school students and lovers of language gathered January 31 at the Cromaine Library to compete in the national poetry recitation contest known as "Poetry Out Loud". The contest involves students in grades nine through twelve who choose two pieces of poetry from the Poetry Out Loud Anthology. Each participant then recites the two pieces as a panel of judges rates on the criteria of performance, voice, level of difficulty and accuracy of the recitation.

After two rounds of poems and scoring, Senior Lexee Barrera took top honors from the judges, which included two Hartland English teachers, a librarian and a theatre director. Lexee will go



PARENT, TEACHER, EMPLOYEE NOTIFICATION OF THE AVAILABILITY OF THE MANAGEMENT PLAN FOR ASBESTOS

According to AHERA 763.93 (g) (4) "...at least once each school year, the LEA shall notify in writing, parent, teacher, and employee organizations of the availability of the management plans and shall include in the management plan a description of the steps taken to notify such organizations, and a dated copy of the notification. In the absence of any such organization...the LEA shall give written notice..."

The procedure and plan that the LEA has adopted for the notification listed above is as follows:

- * In writing, notify the presidents of each of the three above organizations of the availability of the asbestos management plan.
- * In the event that there is no organization representing any of the above three groups, individual letters will be sent out, or notice will be given in a newsletter of the availability of the management plan.
- * The Designated Person will be responsible to update the management plan as needed, and annually by March 30th of each school year.
- * The Designated Person will be responsible to ensure that a copy of the following or similar notification will be sent to the above organizations and/ or individuals by April 30th of each school year and copies of the notices are filed in the management plan.







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
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Elder Law Attorneys Specialize in Helping the Elderly

Many elderly persons rely entirely on their children, family members or other trusted individuals to help them. This dependence upon caregivers or family members makes an older person more vulnerable to abuse and financial exploitation. Legal arrangements and protective actions by family may be necessary to shield loved ones from making bad decisions or from being taken advantage of.

Though you wouldn't think a child could take advantage of his or her mother or father, there is no way to know what someone will do who is desperate for money or who feels entitled to an inheritance. For example:

David's parents' health was failing and living alone in their home was becoming a concern. His sister Jill wanted to look into assisted living for them. David immediately became upset at Jill for wanting to spend their money. He packed up his parents and brought them to his home. Being single and working, he was not available to them during the day, but left food and water on the table to sustain them until he returned home in the evening. Jill lived over 300 miles from David and when she could get to his house to visit; she found her parents' care was not acceptable. They could not remember if they took their medications or if they had even eaten a meal that day. David was also draining their savings account and when confronted about it, became angry and complained that he needed

their money to pay expenses for their care. Clearly Jill felt her brother's care of their parents was abusive, but David's defense was he provided a home for his parents in which he could care for them. This family needs a professional advisor to help them understand and clarify the issues concerning their parents' care.

Making legal decisions about property, finances, power of attorney, and final wishes are important tasks to complete for the final years of life. Having legal documentation for a will, for medical treatment and for the person designated to be responsible for parents' welfare can avoid family disputes and financial abuse, and help to conserve assets that are needed for care. Elder law attorneys specialize in legal issues affecting the elderly. They are knowledgeable about Medicare and Medicaid programs. They work with the elderly in assisting them and their families with all aspects of estate planning and implementing necessary legal documents for the final years of life. In addition, they help individuals to apply for and possibly accelerate coverage from Medicaid. An elder law attorney can also help with disputes with Medicaid. Below is a partial list of what an elder law attorney might do:

- Preservation or transfer of assets seeking to avoid spousal impoverishment when a spouse enters a nursing home
- Medicaid qualification and application and Medicaid planning strategies

- Medicare claims and appeals
- Veterans Benefits claims
- Social security and disability claims and appeals
- Disability planning, including use of durable powers of attorney, living trusts and living wills
- Help with financial management and health care decisions; and other means of delegating management and decision-making to another in case of incompetence or incapacity
- Probate
- Administration and management of trusts and estates
- Long term care placements in nursing homes and assisted living
- Nursing home issues with patients' rights and nursing home quality
- Elder abuse and fraud recovery cases

Most elder law attorneys do not specialize in all of the areas iterated above. When considering an attorney you will want to find one who has experience in the area you need help.

Ask lots of questions before selecting an elder law attorney. You don't want to end up in the office of an attorney who can't help you. Start with the initial phone call. It is not unusual to speak only to a secretary, receptionist or office manager during an initial call or before actually meeting with the attorney. If so, ask this person your questions.

- How long has the attorney been in practice?
- Does his/her practice emphasize a particular area of law?
- How long has he/she been in this field?
- What percentage of his/her practice is devoted to elder law?
- Is there a fee for the first consultation and if so, how much is it?
- Given the nature of your problem, what information should you bring with you to the initial consultation?

A good way to choose an attorney is by referral from friends, family, clergy or other associations. Before you meet for your initial consultation, prepare the items you want discussed and taken care of. Bring pertinent documents and questions. Be sure you get clear answers and that you understand what your attorney is proposing.

Two-way communication is the best way your attorney can understand your needs and concerns. Does the attorney listen to what you say, appear to really care about your concerns or return your phone calls? If not find another attorney. Most Elder law Attorneys sincerely want to help make you or your parent's elder years a well planned for, peaceful experience for all involved.



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
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Chronic Disease Self-Management: The Key to Better Health is in Your Hands




