## Superintendent's Message Janet Sifferman, Superintendent

Amazingly, we are already in the homestretch of the 2011/2012 school year. Graduation is around the corner and our high school students are eagerly anticipating prom

night just a few days away. This is a time of high spirits, particularly for our high school students, and I would ask that you, as parents, stress the importance of responsibility and caution as our students enter prom and graduation party season. Our spring sports calendar is winding down and we are celebrating another successful season for our athletes. We have much to be thankful for in Hartland. While times are difficult for everyone across the state and across the country, Hartland continues to band together and keep its focus on what is important – family, school, community. With that in mind, I hope all of you will take the time to vote in our special school election on May 8 on the 18-mill Non-Homestead proposal. This proposal is a renewal of the 18 mills that has been levied on non-homestead properties since the passage of Proposal A in 1994. Principal residences and other qualified property are exempt. This renewal equates to \$4,483,329 in revenue for Hartland Consolidated Schools. Please don't forget to vote on May 8!


# **Principal's Corner**





And not only pre-retirees, but individuals already in retirement need to be wise to the changing economic environment. The good news is there are trained professionals who keep abreast of changes in the current economy, changes in laws and changes in government programs for the elderly. Professionals in this field are equipped to handle everything from help with retirement savings accounts, investment advice, guidance on government programs, estate planning or even new funding options such as reverse mortgages. A little planning prior to retirement will allow you to maintain your current lifestyle; whereas, a lack of planning may require you to live on an extremely tight budget. For those already retired, taking time right now to deal with financial problems instead of waiting for a crisis to happen is well advised.

A large number of retired individuals feel that they have planned well for the future only to find that rising medical costs, damage done to in-vestment portfolios (by the current economy) and many other factors have caused them to go into debt. Ac-cording to an article in "USA Today" seniors are racking up debt like never before. Elderly individuals who are in debt live with a constant burden over their heads. Most of these people are on fixed incomes and have no way of paying off credit cards and home equity loans that continue to mount to cover household budget deficits. In order to meet ongoing payments, seniors often forego purchasing medications and skimp on food budgets. Reverse mortgages - A Home Equity Conversion Mortgages (HECMs), also known as a reverse mortgage, is a risk-free way of tapping into home equity without creating monthly payments and without requiring the money to be paid back during a per-son's lifetime. Instead of making payments the cash flow is reversed and the senior receives payments from the bank. Thus the title "reverse mortgage". For those seniors who are less fortunate financially but own a home, a reverse mortgage can allow them to remain in the home by creating extra income.

Life settlements - A life settlement enables older individuals, businesses and other organizations to sell life insurance policies they currently own - but no longer want or need - for an amount greater than the cash

surrender value. In some cases the value can be 2-3 times the cash surrender value. Even some term life insurance policies with a conversion option to permanent coverage can qualify for a life settlement.

GovernmentPrograms-Somegovernment programs such as food stamps provide temporary financial help for food. Other programs provide subsidized housing, help with medical expenses and provide tax credits. For veterans there is free health care, inexpensive prescriptions and disability income. Area agencies on aging offer individual counseling, legal help and advice with Medicare costs.

For some, living on a fixed income and dealing with debt can be an overwhelming burden. There are knowledgeable professionals and debt relief strategies that can assist in easing this burden. ## Hartland Township approves new Park site plan on M-59 property

Hartland Township is excited to announce that it has approved a site plan for the development of its park property on M-59 at its January 17 board meeting. This property was purchased by the township in 2001. The first phase of this plan will provide several multiuse athletic fields as well as associated parking that are desperately needed for the Hartland community. The Township is pleased to be moving forward with this plan which will provide exciting outdoor athletic opportunities.

"We have worked diligently to secure partnerships with HAYAA, Community Soccer, and Lacrosse for maintenance and field improvements along with Community Education for assistance in administering the use of the fields" Supervisor Bill Fountain said. "We have existing relationships with several of these groups and have found them to be beneficial in saving taxpayer dollars." Without the assistance of these organizations, it is doubtful the project would have launched.

This park construction is scheduled to start in April of 2012 with a planned opening in the Spring of 2013. The park will consist of 4 soccer fields and 7 practice fields that will be available for youth football and lacrosse practices. Future phases may include a pavilion, a playground area for young children and additional parking if necessary.

The construction schedule of the park will allow the fields to have an entire year to establish before use so they should be in good condition when they actually have events next year.

The number of fields and uses was determined by gathering of all associations through a Township wide assessment study done in 2008. At that time most of the fields were located on Hartland Consolidated Schools property. The finished project will provide the correct amount of playing fields determined for all of the organizations and the park will provide a safe environment for future events.

The Township would like to offer a special thank you to HAYAA, Hartland Soccer, Hartland Lacrosse, Hartland Consolidated schools, Hartland Community Education and its consultants and staff in working together on this exciting project. There will also be opportunities in the future for sponsorships on future phases of the park.
