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Hartland Teacher of the Year

Congratulations to the 2012 Hartland Teacher of the Year, Dotty Selix. Dotty is currently the Reading Recovery teacher at Lakes Elementary School and a literacy coach at Farms Intermediate Schools. Dotty is a life long resident of Livingston County. She attended K-8 grades at Brighton Public Schools and 9-12 grades at Pinckney Community Schools. Dotty holds degrees in Elementary Education and Early Childhood Education from Eastern Michigan University. She is currently working on obtaining an Education Specialist's degree in Administration. Dotty has taught for 14 years, eight in Howell and six in Hartland.

Dotty originally went to college to become an oceanographer. She changed her career plans after a professor mentioned that there was a shortage of teachers, especially in math and science, the two subjects that Dotty was focusing on in her coursework. Once she began going into the classroom to teach lessons as part of her coursework at EMU, she realized that she had found her calling. After graduation, Dotty's first job was a Title I instructor which focused her interest in early literacy instruction. Eventually early literacy became her passion and this led Dotty to her current position in Hartland.

Dotty is a member of the International Reading Association, Reading Recovery Council of Northern Michigan, Michigan Reading Association, Association for Supervision and Curriculum Development, Learning Forward and the American Association of School Administrators. She has worked to bring grant money for Reading Recovery and Early Literacy programs to Livingston County.

Dotty is passionate about reading. Dotty admits that growing up; she herself was not a good reader. Reading was a difficult task and Dotty says she often chose short children's books to do her book reports. Dotty's teachers helped her tap into her strengths; that is how she became a better reader. Dotty believes that helping students focus on their learning strengths will ultimately make them proficient readers.

Dotty lives in Howell and is engaged to Bill Hottum. She has two daughters Ashley and Patty and two grandchildren, grandson Teddy and so to be granddaughter Allie. 

Forensics State Tournament

Every year New York University does a survey that asks people their ten biggest fears. Perennially, "Speaking in front of a group" often comes before "death." For this reason alone, much credit should be given to the students who actually choose to compete in forensics, which is a competitive public speaking team. The Michigan High School Forensics State Competition was held at Western Michigan University with the top high school competitors from classes A, B, C and D vying for top honors. State qualifiers from Hartland were: Senior Rhianna Dilworth, Senior Victoria Cothran, Junior Elizabeth Werstein, Sophomore Connor Cothran, Freshmen John Moraitis, Kendra Rocha, Jerod Clover and Morgan Herrington.

Senior Rhianna Dilworth finished with a sixth place trophy in the category of Oratory, which entails a 10-minute persuasive presentation with no script and no visual aids. Rhianna's speech was on the need to take action against the industry of academic plagiarism. Rhianna was also a finalist in the national tournament qualifier held April 28th in Holland, MI.

Senior Victoria Cothran should also be proud of her competition results as she narrowly missed being a semi-finalist by one point, finishing thirteenth in the category of Poetry. Victoria's poem, "The Art of Teaching" was aptly chosen as she is considering a career in teaching.



DECA at International Conference

The Hartland High School DECA Chapter had 12 students attend the DECA International Career Development Conference in Salt Lake City, Utah, April 27 through May 2. Hartland had some good results with Ryan Clogg finishing Top Ten in the Professional Selling Event. Blair Pellatt finished in the Top 16 in the Business Services Marketing Event, and Sean Virden received a testing medal for having a Top 10 test in the Professional Selling Event. Other students that attended include: Natalie Sulkowski, Anthony Colaianne, Ivey Garner, Tyler Holderness, Josh Maatta, Zach Mixter, Nick Rize, Brandon DePoy, and Kayla Hinkle.

Along with the competition the students attended various activities including: a fashion show that featured a former Hartland student (Justin Pumford), a concert by the Eli Young Band, guest speaker George Zimmer (Men's Warehouse CEO), a performance by the dance group Jabbawockeez, and attended a minor league baseball game of the Salt Lake City Bees.

Students earned the right to attend by qualifying at the State DECA Conference back in March. The DECA Chapter helped to pay for part of the trip, but students also received sponsorships from area businesses such as: Arby's of Hartland, Mexican Fiesta, Troy Clogg Landscape Associates LLC, MDJZ Custom Cutting, Animal Crackers Pet Salon, Hartland Smilemakers, Little Caesar's Pizza, and E.L. Link Crew Welcomes The Class Of 2016

On Tuesday, August 28 from 7:45am until 12:30pm. Hartland High School will welcome the class of 2016 with a mandatory orientation program called Link Crew. This orientation is designed for students only. Parents will have an opportunity to join their student at the conclusion of the Link Orientation.

There will be a parent orientation in the HHS auditorium on the morning of the freshmen orientation hosted by HHS administration from 8 to 9:15am. This parent orientation is intended to provide useful information and tips to make your incoming freshmen successful.

The Link Crew program "links" junior and senior students with a "crew" of freshmen. For two days prior to the orientation, these junior and senior Link Leaders, from diverse social backgrounds, will be trained to lead small groups, to be role models to others, and to guide the activities for the orientation day. At the heart of the Link Crew program is the belief that these older students are capable of great leadership to the freshmen, as well as other students on campus.

The purpose of the Link Crew orientation day is to give the freshmen a positive experience on the HHS campus. The day will begin with an exciting welcome. After a few warm-up activities, the students will participate in some get-to-know-you activities with their classmates and Link Leaders. Then students will be introduced to their assigned Link Leaders. Each crew will participate in small group activities designed to help the students learn about each other, their school, and their Link Leaders. The small group time will conclude with a brief general tour of the school, pointing out key locations such as the main office, cafeteria and main academic hallways.

Students must attend this orientation to receive a copy of their class schedule prior to the first day of school. The school tour provided during the orientation will not allow the students to walk their individual schedules. Therefore, parents are invited to join their ninth grade student following the conclusion of the orientation program to walk through their class schedule in order to feel more comfortable with class locations prior to the first day of school. Doing this is highly recommended.

Stay tuned because Link Crew continues throughout the entire year with social and academic follow-ups between the Link Leaders and their crews.

****NOTE**** Ninth grade registration will be held on August 21. This is a separate event from orientation, but it is mandatory that students and parents attend. At registration parents and students can expect to turn in emergency cards, get school pictures taken, pay for school pictures, athletic passes, etc.


Extemporaneous Speakers Dominate at State Tournament





One might say that for an elder person a little forgetfulness or confusion is normal, but when do you know if there is a serious problem, such as dementia?

An online article from FamilyDoctor.org outlines some common symptoms in recognizing dementia.

"Dementia causes many problems for the person who has it and for the person's family. Many of the problems are caused by memory loss. Some common symptoms of dementia are listed below. Not everyone who has dementia will experience all of these symptoms.

• **Recent memory loss**. All of us forget things for a while and then remember them later. People who have dementia of-ten forget things, but they never remember them. They might ask you the same question over and over, each time forgetting that you've already given them the answer. They won't even remember that they already asked the question.

• Difficulty performing familiar tasks. People who have dementia might cook a meal but forget to serve it. They might even forget that they cooked it. Problems with language. People who have dementia may forget simple words or use the wrong words. This makes it hard to understand what they want. • Time and place disorientation. People who have dementia may get lost on their own street. They may forget how they got to a certain place and how to get back home.

• **Poor judgment.** Even a person who doesn't have dementia might get distracted. But people who have dementia can forget simple things, like forgetting to put on a coat before going out in cold weather.

• **Problems with abstract thinking**. Anybody might have trouble balancing a checkbook, but people who have dementia may forget what the numbers are and what has to be done with them.

• **Misplacing things.** People who have dementia may put things in the wrong places. They might put an iron in the freezer or a wristwatch in the sugar bowl. Then they can't find these things later.

Changes in mood. Everyone is moody at times, but people who have dementia may have fast mood swings, going from calm to tears to anger in a few minutes. Personality changes. People who have dementia may have drastic changes in personality. They might become irritable, suspicious or fearful.
 Loss of initiative. People who have dementia may become passive. They might not want to go places or see other people.

Dementia is caused by change or destruction of brain cells. Often this change is a result of small strokes or blockage of blood cells, severe hypothyroidism or Alzheimer's dis-ease. There is a continuous decline in ability to perform normal daily activities. Personal care including dressing, bathing, preparing meals and even eating a meal eventually becomes impossible.

What can family members do if they suspect dementia?An appointment with the doctor or geriatric clinic is the first step to take. Depending on the cause and severity of the problem there are some medications that may help slow the process. Your doctor may recommend a care facility that specializes in dementia and Alzheimer's. These facilities offer a variety of care options from day care with stimulating activities to part or full-time live-in options. Sometimes if patients tend to wander off, a locked facility is needed.

In the beginning family members find part time caregivers for their loved one. At first, loved ones need only a little help with remembering to do daily activities or prepare meals. As dementia progresses, caregiving demands often progress to 24 hour care. Night and day become confused and normal routines of sleeping, eating and functioning become more difficult for the patient. The demented person feels frustrated and may lash out in anger or fear. It is not uncommon for a child or spouse giving the care to quickly become overwhelmed and discouraged.

Family gatherings provide an excellent op-

portunity to discuss caregiving plans and whole family support. It is most helpful if everyone in the family is united in supporting a family caregiver in some meaningful way.


"The first step to holding a family meeting, and perhaps the most difficult one, is to get all interested persons together in one place at one time. If it's a family gathering, perhaps a birthday, an anniversary or an-other special event could be used as a way to get all to meet. Or maybe even a special dinner might be an incentive.

The end of the meeting should consist of asking everyone present to make his or her commitment to support the plan. This might just simply be moral support and agreement to abide by the provisions or it is hoped that those attending will volunteer to do some-thing constructive. This might mean commitments to providing care, transportation, financial support, making legal arrangements or some other tangible sup-port." The Four Steps of Long Term Care Planning

Professional home care services are an option to help families in the home. These providers are trained and skilled to help with dementia patients. Don't forget care facilities as well. It may be the best loving care a family member can give is to place their loved one in a facility where that person is safely monitored and cared for.





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
