Carol Hall currently serves as a District-wide Teacher Consultant for our special education programs. She earned her Bachelor's Degree for Cognitive Impairments, K-12 Self Contained; as well as her Master's Degree for Elementary Reading from Eastern Michigan University. She holds an endorsement for Learning Disabilities K-12, as well as her Teacher Consultant Certificate. She has been an integral member of Hartland's Special Education team for many years. Learn about some of Carol's



history with the district and memorable moments as she relates them:

Wow, it has been 17 years since I was first hired to teach in Hartland! Half of the time was as a Basic Resource Room teacher and the other half has been as a teacher consultant, district wide. I remember when I went to Farms to find out where my classroom was when I was offered the job. The secretaries later told me that I had come to see my class before I went to see Pete Caroselli for my final interview! They thought I was a little crazy but I still got the job!

I have been married for 43 years to a wonderful man. I have two children who live within 5 miles of our home. I am very proud of my children and their accomplishments. They are both coaches in the Byron school district and touch the lives of many children every year. I have nine grandchildren who are the light of my life. They range in age from 10-17. They are in a variety of activities that I attend on a regular basis. I was a para-educator in the Byron school district before I decided to become a teacher. I did not attend college until I was 34. My family was so supportive of me going back to school. My daughter and I went to college at the same time!

During my time in Hartland, I have been involved with helping all teachers find leveled reading materials across multiple grade levels to make the academic match with students in their classes. This helps to build a teacher's capacity and provides a bank of leveled materials they can use in the future. I have mentored teachers. I have run intervention reading groups with students to help increase their reading levels. I have applied for and received matching grant funds to help purchase electronic books for Farms that are science and social studies curriculum-based. I have provided in-service instruction to special education teachers for goal writing and for differentiated learning. I continue to support special education teachers in finding current data and scores for students to help drive instruction and goal writing. I work collaboratively with administrators, parents, teachers, and students to ensure that the students' needs are being met and that the students and teachers are experiencing success in the classrooms.

People that I work closely with affectionately call me the "paperwork queen.", as I work hard to make sure all IEPs are in compliance and contain all the necessary information to help our students be successful. I have worked hard to learn and stay current with new and exciting technology to help students access the curriculum, and to help teachers engage and instruct students.

Winter Bus Safety Tips With the winter months upon us it is always good to review bus stop safety tips to ensure a safe and pleasant trip to school.

At the Bus Stop

- Allow extra time in the morning to get to your bus on time.
- Wear bright clothing so the bus driver and other motorists can see you in the early morning and late evening.
- Stand away from where the bus stops. Buses need extra room to stop when there is snow and ice.
- Dress properly. Winter clothing, hats, mittens and boots will help keep you warm.
 <u>Waiting at the Bus Stop</u>
- Don't play in the snow while waiting for the bus.
- Don't throw snowballs at the bus or others.
- Don't slide on the snow or ice patches in driveways or on the street. You could slide under the wheel of the bus or onto the street and get hurt.
- Don't push or shove around the bus. Someone could fall down on the ice and get hurt.

Boarding and Exiting

• Do use the handrail when boarding or exiting the bus to prevent slipping and injuring yourself on icy road surfaces or steps.

Running Late in the Morning

• Don't try to catch the bus at another stop with your vehicle if your students miss their pickup. Take them all the way to school. The bus driver may not see the car in back of the bus and as the students attempt to run along the side of the bus to board, they may fall underneath the wheels and be injured.

As a consultant, I work hard to have a strong knowledge base so that people feel comfortable asking me questions, and knowing that if I don't know an answer right away, I will find out the information for them. Those that know me well will tell you that I advocate hard and strong for what I believe in. I like to confront issues head-on. I love collaborating and being part of a team, but do not shy away from a conflict when it involves students.

When I was teaching at Farms, I had a student whose dream was to be a marine biologist. She had a diagnosed reading deficit. We worked very hard at increasing her reading skills so that she might someday achieve that dream. She was with me for two years and we were able to increase her reading to within grade level expectations. She and her parents then moved to Florida to be near her grandparents. I lost touch for a while. One day her mom called me to say that she had been accepted into a program at a Florida college to pursue her dream of being a marine biologist. I still have the letter from her grandparents telling me how much they appreciated my efforts and were so happy that their grand-daughter had been encouraged to pursue her dream. I keep that letter in a frame in one of my offices.

Hartland Schools is the place where I feel at home! I honed my teaching skills here and love that now I am able to share my knowledge with staff at different levels across the district.

I love the way the district has progressed toward supporting all students and helping them to succeed. All students are valued and supported. All staff are treated with respect and encouraged to try new and innovative teaching techniques. I would not want to work anywhere else!







A Special Christmas Story



As we quickly approach this special time of the year I would like to thank the schools, the community and most of all our wonderful families here at Ohana Karate for an amazing year. Please read this with your family.

It's just a small, white envelope stuck among the branches of our Christmas tree. No name, no identification, no inscription. It has peeked through the branches of our tree for the past 10 years or so. It all began because my husband Mike hated Christmas - oh, not the true meaning of Christmas, but the commercial aspects of it; the overspending - the frantic running around at the last minute to get a tie for Uncle Harry and the dusting powder for Grandma - the gifts given in desperation because you couldn't think of anything else.

Knowing he felt this way, I decided one year to bypass the usual shirts, sweaters, ties and so forth. I reached for something special just for Mike. The inspiration came in an unusual way. Our son Kevin, who was 12 that year, was wrestling at the junior level at the school he attended, and shortly before Christmas, there was a non-league match against a team sponsored by an inner-city church, mostly black. These youngsters, dressed in sneakers so ragged that shoestrings seemed to be the only thing holding them together, presented a sharp contrast to our boys in their spiffy blue and gold uniforms and sparkling new wrestling shoes. As the match began, I was alarmed to see that the other team was wrestling without headgear, a kind of light helmet designed to protect a wrestler's ears. It was a luxury the ragtag team obviously could not afford.

Well, we ended up walloping them. We took every weight class. And as each of their boys got up from the mat, he swaggered around in his tatters with false bravado, a kind of street pride that couldn't acknowledge defeat. Mike, seated beside me, shook his head sadly, "I wish just one of them could have won," he said. "They have a lot of potential, but losing like this could take the heart right out of them." Mike loved kids - all kids - and he knew them, having coached little league football, baseball and lacrosse. That's when the idea for his present came.

That afternoon, I went to a local sporting goods store and bought an assortment of wrestling headgear and shoes and sent them anonymously to the inner-city church. On Christmas Eve, I placed the envelope on the tree, the note inside telling Mike what I had done and that this was his gift from me. His smile was the brightest thing about Christmas that year and in succeeding years. For each Christmas, I followed the tradition - one year sending a group of mentally handicapped youngsters to a hockey game, another year a check to a pair of elderly brothers whose home had burned to the ground the week before Christmas, and on and on.

The envelope became the highlight of our Christmas. It was always the last thing opened on Christmas morning and our children, ignoring their new toys, would stand with wide-eyed anticipation as their dad lifted the envelope from the tree to reveal its contents. As the children grew, the toys gave way to more practical presents, but the envelope never lost its allure. The story doesn't end there.

You see, we lost Mike last year due to dreaded cancer. When Christmas rolled around, I was still so wrapped in grief that I barely got the tree up. But Christmas Eve found me placing an envelope on the tree, and in the morning, it was joined by three more. Each of our children, unbeknownst to the others, had placed an envelope on the tree for their dad. The tradition has grown and someday will expand even further with our grandchildren standing around the tree with wide-eyed anticipation watching as their fathers take down the envelope. Mike's spirit, like the Christmas spirit, will always be with us.

May we all remember each other, and the real reason for the season, and his true spirit this year and always.




