I attended Wayne State and Eastern Michigan University and am certified to teach art and special education. I graduated when the big push to mainstream students began and I thought it would be nice to know something about the students that would be coming into my classroom. Before coming to Hartland I taught at St. Agatha High School in Redford Township and high school completion/ adult education for Redford Union Schools.



I began teaching in Hartland in 1998 when art was brought into the elementary schools on a full-time basis. I remember being overwhelmed by staff and parents who were so pleased to have an art teacher back in their building.

We moved to Hartland 21 years ago. My husband Tom and I celebrated our 30th wedding anniversary last year. We have three sons: Rob, Stephen, and Marc, who all graduated from Hartland Schools. They all attended the University of Michigan (Marc is in his junior year). Our oldest son got married over a year ago, so now we have a beautiful daughter in our family.

Even though I volunteered for numerous school and community activities, organizing "Art Day" was my first experience working with the entire staff at Lakes. I was a little apprehensive when Mrs. Paxton invited me to a staff meeting to explain that I was planning to invade their classrooms and disrupt their entire day doing messy art activities. What I found were teachers, para educators, and parents willing to do whatever was necessary to make this event a meaningful experience for their students. To this day, I still have some of the letters staff and students wrote telling me what that experience meant to them. Hartland is truly a special place to live and work.

I am very fortunate in that I see my students from kindergarten through the fourth grade. I tell them the best part of my job is not only seeing what they create, but being able to see how they grow throughout the years – not only in their artistic skills, but what kind of person they grow into. When I attend the high school art show, the first thing I do is pick out all my "Lakes Kids". The art room is sometimes messy, noisy, and may even appear to be chaotic, but it is inspiring to watch students actively engaged in the creative process. I love that each day brings something new. Even after 18 years, I am still in awe of what my students are capable of accomplishing. It surprises me a little that not every teacher would want my job!

Hartland Schools is a great place to work. I am surrounded daily by dedicated, caring teachers and supportive parents. Although it is not always easy, we have administrators and school board members committed to making the arts an essential part of each child's education.

IS YOUR CHILD BEING BULLIED?

PARENTS OFTEN NEVER KNOW!

Dear Fellow Parents,

Bullying can range from severe physical abuse to very mild "silent treatment" or exclusion by friends. Both can have long lasting and devastating affects on children. Many parents never know about the mild and moderate bullying of their child.

According to the book, *Bullies and Victims in Schools*, 96% of children will be bullied at least once in their lifetime. 46% of those children will suffer poor grades or will abstain from extra curricular activities because of the bullying. 2% of those children will commit suicide because of constant harassment from classmates.

Is your child being bullied? Look for these signs in your child:

1. Bruises, cuts, scratches, torn clothing that cannot be explained and complaints about not feeling well.

2. Reluctance to go to school or requests to change school.

3. Books, money, lunch or belongings stolen, damaged, scattered around or "lost".

4. Excuses to avoid going to school, or insistence that you take him/ her to school even though you live close by.

- 5. Insomnia or bed-wetting.
- 6. Frequent requests for money.

7. A sudden, unexplained deterioration in class work, and/or homework.

8. Lack of participation in school activities, staying near the teacher during breaks.

9. Anxiety, insecurity, distress, unhappiness, secretiveness, mood changes and anger.

- 10. Claims of "I'm okay" when questioned about obvious unhappiness.11. Low self-esteem.
- 12. Unhappiness at the end of weekends or school vacations.

13. Few friends or no friends in class and is not invited to birthday parties or other social activities.

14. Teasing or being laughed at by his/her peer group.

Bullying is a very difficult problem to stop. Our mission at Ohana Karate is to ensure every child has the right to feel safe and develop to their full potential. I feel that it is our responsibility to be a community leader and center for the fight against bullying. Can this crisis be stopped?

First, we must develop an ethos in which bullying is always unacceptable and will not be tolerated. Second, it takes a whole community to save our children. We must arm the victim, bully, bystander, parents, schools and community with the anti-bullying tools and systems. Please contact us if we can help you or your family.





Hartland Area Youth Athletic Association (HAYAA) Proudly Recognizes September As Childhood Cancer Awareness Month

On Sept. 26, the Hartland Area Youth Athletic Association (HAYAA) came together to support and recognize Child-hood Cancer Awareness Month with an event that raised money to support one local family and also to support cancer research.

With the entire event planned in only nine days, event organizer Kathy Farhat-Tomaszewski was thrilled when HAYAA Cheer-Pom Commissioner, Brenda Blush, agreed to co-sponsor the evening lighting ceremony "A Night of Gold Lights."



During the ceremony, football and cheerleading fans held gold candles, honoring one of HAYAA's very own cheerleaders, **Lauryn Howard** (pictured above) who is battling neuroblastoma, as well as cancer warriors worldwide.

The cheer-pom teams also sold 50-50 tickets, with 50 percent of the earnings benefitting the cheerleader's family. The event was a huge success. In just a few hours, both initiatives raised \$2,000. \$1,000--for research--and \$1,000 for Lauryn.

"It's inspiring to witness this level of support from the families and businesses in our community," Farhat-Tomaszewski said. "I hope to expand our efforts to neighboring cities, so that one day, everyone will know September as Childhood Cancer Awareness Month. With awareness comes funding, research and hope for a possible cure!"

Childhood Cancer is the number one cause of death by disease for children in our country. Every three minutes worldwide, a child is diagnosed with cancer. One out of every five children diagnosed with cancer, do not survive. Today, alone, there were 480 children diagnosed with some form of cancer, and 7 children who won't survive.

Farhat-Tomaszewski also knows firsthand, the challenges a childhood cancer diagnosis presents. Her daughter, Madison, 19, was diagnosed with stage 4 hepatoblastoma, a childhood form of liver cancer, just one month after her third birthday. It had spread to her lungs, right atrium, inferior vena cava and gall bladder. "Fortunately, my daughter was able to endure the harsh, toxic treatments for childhood cancer. Sadly, for other children, that is not always the case."

It was the frustration by the lack of newer treatments, funding and awareness over the years, which prodded Kathy and her family to spearhead an awareness initiative, in conjunction with HAYAA Football, her son's athletic association.

Her goal for the Sept. 26 event was two-fold, to bring much-needed attention to the cause, while selling baked goods, with all proceeds to benefit Alex's Lemonade Stand, a childhood cancer research foundation.

The event also included a duck pond, face painting and a raffle, with donations from participating businesses in Hartland, Brighton and Fenton. Thank you to the Hartland Community and everyone who came out and supported the cause and dontated and/or volunteered their time.



On October 15, 2015, the Hartland Deerfield Fire Authority shared a new life saving device with our Rotary Club. Captain Jake Thompson (pictured left) shared the only AutoPulse Resuscitation System in Livingston County with our group. This device provides high-quality automated CPR to victims of sudden cardiac arrest. The AutoPulse squeezes the patient's entire chest to improve blood flow to the heart and brain. This is the only device of its kind that automatically sizes to the patient.



Seeing it in action was so inspiring. We in Hartland are fortunate to have this device available for our residents.

If this experience was not enough, Fire Marshal, Mike Bernardin, arranged for the University of Michigan Health System Survival Flight to land at the Main Station on Hartland Rd., in Hartland Township.

The flight crew gave us a tour of the Eurocopter AS365 Dauphin. It is hangared in the Livingston Co EMS and U of M Life Flight Hangar Facility located on Tooley Road next to the Livingston County Airport.
