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


Superintendent's Message

Last spring our students in grades 3-8 and grade 11 participated in the new state assessment called the M-STEP (Michigan Student Test of Educational Progress). The state created this more rigorous test to replace the 44-yearold MEAP (Michigan Educational Assessment Program) test that our students were required to take.

The standards and benchmarks the state sets for our students to learn have evolved over the years to include such 21st century skills as deeper understanding of core subjects, the ability to think quickly and critically to un-





At publication deadline the scores had not yet been released; however, we expect that the results will be lower than the results we saw on the MEAP test due to a number of factors including the advanced rigor of the test and that this was not a "paper/pencil" test.

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Our students were required to analyze and synthesize the questions and their responses using an online format.

As the district and our students work through the challenges of new assessment expectations and online testing, the educational opportunities for our students will improve.

Sherry Osterhoff January 2016

I attended Western Michigan University for my undergraduate degree and received my certification to teach both special education and general education (K-8). I also received my Master's Degree with an endorsement in Learning Disabilities at Eastern Michigan University. Before coming to Hartland, I taught special education for a year at the middle school in Birch Run.



I also taught for four years at Hawthorn Center in Northville. At that time, it was a residential setting for students with severe disabilities.

A friend of mine talked me into going for an interview in Hartland in 1994. I was not ready to go back to teaching because our son was only two years old at the time. I thought I would go to the interview just for the experience. Well, I was totally in awe of all the great things that I heard at that time, so I decided to accept a part-time job as a special education teacher. Mrs. Paxton was so sorry that she only had a part-time job available for me but I was thrilled. I have been at Lakes Elementary ever since accepting that part-time job back in 1994. I became a full-time teacher when our son started first grade, also at Lakes Elementary, which was absolutely the best situation for me.

We moved to the Brighton area 26 years ago. My husband Mike and I celebrated our 25th wedding anniversary last year. We have one son, Mark, who graduated from Hartland High School in 2010. Mark just graduated in August from Saginaw Valley State University with a degree in Exercise Science. He is currently working part-time for the University of Michigan.

I have volunteered for many school and community activities. One of my favorites was when I was involved with the Hartland Community Soccer Association. I was on the board for several years and enjoyed the opportunity to serve and see the program expand.

Sadly, our son was in a terrible car accident, suffered a severe traumatic brain injury and almost died from his injuries in 2008. One of my fondest memories of the Hartland community was how the community rallied to support us with anything that we needed. Mark was at Mott Children's Hospital in Ann Arbor for two months. I don't think there was a day that went by when we did not have a visitor checking in on us to see if there was something they could do for us. Mark's friends from Hartland High School collected money at football games, food was delivered almost every day, and there was even a lacrosse game dedicated to Mark that he was able to attend. To this day, people are still asking about Mark and are genuinely thrilled, as we are, with his progress.

I have had the honor to be involved with a district that believes ALL students "can learn". The staff is constantly giving up their own time to collaborate about students to determine new interventions to help students learn and grow.

KINDERGARTEN ENROLLMENT 2016-17

Kindergarten Enrollment Packets will be Available Beginning February 1, 2016



KINDERGARTEN ORIENTATION

A Kindergarten Orientation will be held on **Saturday, March 12 from 10:00 am to 11:30 am** at the Hartland Education Support Service Center, 9525 Highland Road.

The orientation will provide parents an opportunity to hear from kindergarten teachers about a "typical" school day and the kindergarten curriculum. In addition, administrators will be on hand to talk about school safety, transportation, school attendance areas, student nutrition, and answer questions. This will be a family-oriented event and you are encouraged to bring your kindergarten child.

Hartland Consolidated Schools will be accepting kindergarten enrollment packets beginning **February 1, 2016** at the Board of Education office and each elementary school office during office hours. Enrollment packets can also be downloaded from our website at www.hartland-schools.us

In addition to the enrollment packet, the following documents must be presented when registering:

- Original birth certificate with seal, plus a copy of same certificate for school records
- Immunization records with proof of DTP, Polio, MMR, Hepatitis B, Chicken Pox vaccines (or proof of having illness), and vision screening, plus copy of same for school records
- Proof of residency using one of the following: certificate of occupancy, purchase agreement, builder's permit, rent receipt or agreement, mortgage statement/payment receipt, voter registration card, utility bill, driver's license.

Children are eligible for enrollment in kindergarten in September 2016 if they will have their fifth (5th) birthday on or before September 1, 2016. A child who turns 5 after September 1 and before December 1, 2016 may enroll if parent/legal guardian signs a waiver and is supported by the school district.

A full-day Junior Kindergarten program may be offered on a limited basis. A minimum number of students are required for the program to be made available. Parents may need to provide transportation in order to participate. You may contact Scott VanEpps at 810-626-2111 or scottvanepps@hartlandschools.us for more information.

How Do I Get Financial Aid To Help Pay For College?

In order to request financial assistance for community colleges, technical schools and four-year universities, you must submit the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA).

This free application allows you to apply for federal and state financial aid. Many colleges and universities, especially public institutions, also require the FAFSA to be considered for any scholarships they offer, regardless of financial need. You must submit the FAFSA every year that you want aid. This year the FAFSA will become available on January 1st, 2016. You will complete the application by going to www.fafsa. gov.

Parents are strongly encouraged to apply no later than mid-February so your student can be considered for the most financial aid options.

Additional information and advice will be offered at the high school's **Financial Aid Night on January 13, 2016 at 6:30pm** in the high school auditorium.

I will never forget the first time I volunteered at Cromaine Library. I walked in wearing my




Livingston Land Conservancy January meeting

WHAT IS HOLDING YOUR CHILD BACK?

You can help them reach their full potential in school, sports and socially.

In actuality we are all held back by something aren't we? The biggest limitations that most of us face are self-imposed. Things like the fear of public speaking or failure. Shyness. Lack of discipline or self control. Poor work ethic. Negative attitude. If we really look closely most of these started when we were young.

What if you could identify these obstacles early in your child and eliminate them? Can you imagine how much more successful and happy your child would be (let alone your happiness or even sanity)?

After years of working with hundreds of area children and parents we have discovered that almost everything that holds children back can be fundamentally traced back to three basic areas: fear, impulsive/lack of control behaviors and social awkwardness. I hope these help you and your family:

<u>FEARS</u> - From birth to kindergarten this surfaces as separation anxiety or difficulty trying new or hard things. The "I can't" syndrome. In elementary school it may show up as shyness or fear of making mistakes. We also see many children that are debilitated by a constant state of fear, worry or anxiety. As teens it comes as bad/negative attitude, never able to complete things, or too easily influenced by and caving into peer pressure.

<u>LACK OF SELF CONTROL</u> - This is a really important area for preschoolers, often called "Self Regulating" skills, the ability to

control their impulses. A good example are boys that "cannot keep their hands to themselves". Later in life they are "Self Control" skills like listening and focusing. As teens this can develop into lack of self-discipline showing up as failing to turn in homework, poor grades, poor worth ethic.

<u>SOCIAL</u> - Early childhood development experts refer to this as "social fluidity". This is their ability to read social cues, play with others and share. In elementary school they have difficulty making and keeping friends. In high school they can be isolated, and are either bullies/being bullied or just hanging around the wrong kids.

Once you have identified these they are actually simple to correct. Simple, but it does take work, consistency and patience. The biggest thing that holds most parents back is "denial". This is most often expressed as "He is normally not like that!" or worse yet "He will outgrow it!"

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

On December 5th, 2015 the Rising Eagles, a Hartland Robotics Team, won the Champion's Award (Top Honors) at the Nexteer Ready, Set, LEGO! Tournament in Freeland, MI.

In addition to winning the Champion's Award, they also took top honors in the robot game competition (Robot Performance Award) with a score of 622, with their



closest competition having 562 and 407 points. They will be competing in the Michigan North and West State Championship on December 12th at Carmen Ainsworth Middle School in Flint.
