of a frenzy regarding the Common Core State
Standards. I want to take this opportunity to give some background on this topic and how it affects Hartland Consolidated Schools. For many years the State of Michigan, through the State Board of Education and the Michigan Department of Education, has assessed our students on standards and benchmarks set statewide.
Our local curriculum was written to meet Michigan's



High School Content Expectations (HSCEs) for grades 9-12 and the Grade Level Content Expectations (GLCEs) for grades K-8. Several years ago Governor Granholm felt the need to align Michigan's high school graduation requirements with those of many other states.

At that time Michigan's requirements were far less rigorous than most states. Thus the more rigorous high school curriculum requirements called the Michigan Merit Curriculum were legislated. A short time later, the National Governors Association and the National Council of Chief State School Officers began conversations about having common standards and benchmarks for students in public schools across the United States.

These standards were developed through an intense process involving representatives from various states, researchers, national organizations and community groups across the country. Michigan's State Board of Education adopted the Common Core State Standards on June 15, 2010. The adoption of the Common Core has allowed Hartland Consolidated Schools to take its locally approved curriculum and make alignment adjustments to meet the Common Core, which emphasizes college and career readiness skills.

Mark your calendar for Hartland Consolidated School's Kindergarten Round-Up for the 2015-2016 school year.

Children are eligible for enrollment in kindergarten in September 2015 if they will have their fifth (5th) birthday on or before **September 1, 2015**. A child who turns 5 after September 1 and before December 1, 2015, may enroll if parent/legal guardian notifies the school district in writing no later than August 1, 2015.

A Junior Kindergarten program (half day and/or full day) may be offered on a limited basis. A minimum number of students is required for the program to be made available. Parents may need to provide transportation in order to participate. You may contact Scott VanEpps at 810.626.2111 or scottvanepps@hartlandschools.us for more information.

A 20-minute orientation will begin at 5:30 pm in the Board Room located in the Hartland Educational Support Service Center, 9525 E. Highland Rd, followed by registration in the Performing Arts Center lobby on:

Feb. 17 (Tues) 6-8 pm Last names starting with the letters A-L Feb. 18 (Wed) 6-8 pm Last names starting with the letters M-Z *Please make every effort to enroll your child on the dates provided.

Please bring the following:

- Original birth certificate with seal, plus copy of same certificate
- Immunization records with proof of DTP, Polio, MMR, Hepatitis B, Chicken Pox shots (or proof of having illness), and vision screening, plus copy of record
- Proof of residency-copy of one of the following: certificate of occupancy, purchase agreement, builder's permit, rent receipt or agreement, mortgage statement/payment receipt, voter registration card, utility bill, driver's license

While we need to see the originals, it will expedite the enrollment process if you also bring copies of the originals.

Kindergarten registration packets will be available beginning February 2, 2015 at the Board of Education office, the Community Education office, each elementary school office and the Hartland Child Care Center (51 Building). You can also download from our website at www.hartlandschools.us.

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

A skills and nurturing a child's natural curiosity are the cornerstones of Laura DeRosier's Hartland preschool classroom.

For more than 15 years, Mrs. DeRosier has taught 3 and 4 year olds in Hartland and currently teaches at the Child Care Center location in the village of Hartland.



Focusing on "challenging and not frustrating" her young students to learn, grow and encouraging them to try in every thing they do during their school day is one of DeRosier's biggest strengths as an educator. Patience is the key, according to DeRosier, but the end result for her unlimited patience and understanding is watching her students succeed in something for the first time, their work, their accomplishment.

It's that progress of learning that DeRosier says she enjoys watching the most and is the most fulfilling part of her work.

From simple step-by-step art projects, to picking up their toys to interacting with their young peers, DeRosier's classroom is filled with structure that helps create a productive learning environment.

"Seeing them go from knowing very little to being able to read when they



leave here as 4-year-olds -- it's just so much fun," she said. "A lot of people don't get that instant gratification in their work, but we get it every year."

Bringing new and different educational programs to her classroom is also a priority for the veteran teacher who says after 15 years, she has "learned a few tricks."

From introducing programs such as Zoo-Phonics and Second Step, DeRosier is intent upon giving her students the extra preparation they need as they begin the next phase of their education.

"They are so worth it," DeRosier said. "And they are fabulous programs."

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

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

- Don't get stuck! Open and close bedroom windows once a week. Make sure that when the temperature drops, those windows don't become frozen.
- Snow removal. Make sure that doors can open. If we get snow, keep the secondary doors free from snow so you can open them.
- Don't forget about upstairs windows! Do you have an area of a roof that a family member can stand on right outside the window should a fire occur? When you test the windows weekly, take a broom and push that snow off the edge of the roof while you are at it. It takes only a minute.
- Make sure that all smoke alarms and carbon monoxide alarms are up to date. Did you know that smoke alarms should be replaced once every 10 years? Did you know that hard wired smoke alarms have a battery backup? Did you know that carbon monoxide alarms should be replaced once every 7 years? Make sure your family is protected!
