PARENT, TEACHER, EMPLOYEE NOTIFICATION OF THE AVAILABILITY OF THE MANAGEMENT PLAN FOR ASBESTOS

According to AHERA 763.93 (g) (4) "... at least once each school year, the LEA shall notify in writing, parent, teacher, and employee organizations of the availability of the management plans and shall include in the management plan a description of the steps taken to notify such organizations, and a dated copy of the notification. In the absence of any such organization... the LEA shall give written notice..."

The procedure and plan that the LEA has adopted for the notification listed above is as follows:

- In writing, notify the presidents of each of the three above organizations of the availability of the asbestos management plan.
- In the event that there is no organization representing any of the above three groups, individual letters will be sent out, or notice will be given in a newsletter of the availability of the management plan.
- The Designated Person will be responsible to update the management plan as needed, and annually by March 30th of each school year.
- The Designated Person will be responsible to ensure that a copy of the following or similar notification will be sent to the above organizations and/or individuals by April 30th of each school year and copies of the notices are filed in the management plan.





Hartland LEGACY Alternative Education "Working to develop a community of learners who are prepared to live, work and contribute to an ever-changing society and world."

What is LEGACY? As LEGACY celebrated its 30th anniversary, its role in educating Hartland youth is changing. However, the program's primary focus, demonstrated by its acronym Let's Educate, Graduate and Care for our Youth, remains.

LEGACY offers students an alternative method to earn their high school diploma. Class sizes are small, with a 20 to 1 student/teacher ratio. Teachers are able to meet individual academic needs. In addition to academics, LEGACY provides instruction in support of other key areas including: healthy choices, parenting, substance abuse awareness and career planning. The program boasts on-site counseling, group support, academic tutoring and planning for successful futures.

When are classes? Classes follow a traditional school calendar. Students attend on a daily, reduced-hour schedule. Time away from the classroom allows for greater involvement in career planning, work experience and community volunteerism. Correspondence classes provide non-traditional course options. Student responsibility initiatives are also part of the credit-earning process.





MEDICAID FACTS AND MYTHS

MEDICAID FACTS

- Proper Medicaid planning allows your loved one to qualify for Medicaid and preserve their life savings.
- Through proper planning, money can be set aside to be used by the nursing home resident to purchase items not covered by Medicaid, such as clothing, barber or beauty salon services, perhaps a big screen television.
- Proper planning allows you to use assets to protect a disabled or special needs child's future, while still qualifying for Medicaid.
- Proper planning may allow you to qualify for Medicaid while still leaving an inheritance for your children and grandchildren.
- A Medicaid patient receives the same level of care as a private pay patient in any nursing home that accepts Medicaid.
- It is almost never too late to do effective Medicaid planning, but the earlier it is done the more

options are available.

- While Medicaid is a "spend down" program, with proper planning using various strategies and techniques, it is possible to keep certain assets and techniques, it is possible to keep certain assets and transfer or gift other assets without disqualification for Medicaid.
- Medicaid limits the transferring of assets for less than fair market value, so don't transfer or gift your property without proper legal advice to avoid Medicaid disqualification.
- Medicaid rules are constantly changing, and the rules that applied to your family members or friends in the past may not apply to you now or in the future.

MEDICAID MYTHS

 I have to spend all my money before I will qualify for Medicaid. False. While Medicaid is a "spend-down" program, you don't have to be destitute, or leave your spouse destitute, to qualify for Medicaid.

- You can gift up to \$14,000.00 a year without affecting your Medicaid.
 False. The \$14,000.00 is the amount you can gift without taxes under the tax code, it is NOT an allowable transfer under Medicaid.
- I put my child on my bank accounts as a joint tenant years ago so at least half is protected from Medicaid.
 False. Generally, non-real property assets such as bank accounts and brokerage accounts held in joint tenancy with a child are considered 100% assets of the Medicaid applicant, unless you can show that the child provided deposits of the child's funds into the account.
- My assets are in my Living Trust and therefore are not

considered for Medicaid. **False.** Assets held in your Revocable Living trust are considered your assets for purposes of Medicaid eligibility.

- I can only spend down my assets on medical and nursing home bills. **False.** While some nursing homes would have you believe this, with the assistance of an Elder Law Attorney the money can be spent down in ways of greater benefit to the applicant, applicant's spouse or family.
- I can hide my assets and qualify for Medicaid. **False**. Intentional misrepresentation on a Medicaid Application is a crime and can result in criminal liability for both you and the person to whom the asset is transferred. Proper Medicaid planning uses the provisions of the law itself to achieve the applicant's goals and everything is fully disclosed as part of the application.

Troop 381 Honors Eagle Scout Bryan Peterson



Over \$30,000 IN SCHOLARSHIPS FOR HARTLAND HIGH SCHOOL ARCHERS!

The Hartland High, Middle and Elementary School Archery Teams competed at the National Archery in the Schools Program's (NASP) National Tournament this past weekend in Louisville, KY after qualifying for Nationals by winning all three State Championships earlier this year at CMU.





Not only did Hartland reach the Top 10, they beat their personal best record and walked away with a 2nd place finish! Best ever showing by Hartland High and missed a National Championship by ONLY 6 points! The Hartland High School Team came in second place and the Middle School team also came in second place. Then the score that the High School Team shot was not only the second highest in the HS Divi-

sion, but it was also the second highest score out of ALL Divisions – which earned all of the HS 3D Varsity Archers a \$750 Scholarship! That is came to \$9,000!

Chris Bee and Brendan Dziobak from the HS team and Garet Fyke from the MS Team all had Top 5 individual scores in 3D. Chris Bee was in a three way tie for first and he had to go into a shootout. With over 3,000 spectators watching he finished one point behind the high score and came out with a 2nd Place Overall finish and another \$750 Scholarship for himself – bringing his winnings to \$1,500!

The most exciting day was when Sydney Vivian, a freshman on the HS Varsity Team, shot her way into a Top 5 finish (3rd overall) in the 10 Ring Event. The Top 5 males and Top 5 Females in the 10 Ring event all shoot in a Scholarship Shootout. Sydney and two other girls tied for first after the first round shooting a 49 out of 50. So these three girls had a one arrow shootout again (closest to the center wins). Sydney shot second, after the first girl shot a low 10, and buried her arrow dead center in the 10. With her perfect shot – Sydney won the Top Scholarship Award of \$20,000!



Hartland walked away with over \$30,000 in scholarships and prizes! It is truly amazing how far this group has come. Every year they have to overcome the conflict of Prom on Friday night, and most of the Juniors and Seniors leave at 2 am or 3am Sat. morning after being up all night at Prom and make the 6-7 hour drive to Louisville.
