Superintendent's Message

It is estimated that by the year 2025, 70% of all Michigan jobs will require a credential beyond a high school diploma. Hartland students must be prepared to pursue post-high school education or training to be ready for 21st century employment. To meet this need, the Hartland High School Counseling Department has implemented a trio of senior programs. College Application Week is designed to help all seniors complete an application to an



apprenticeship, trade/technical school, community college, or four-year college program. The College Cash Campaign supports students in applying for financial aid and scholarship dollars. Finally, Senior Signing Day is a celebration of all of the future educational plans of our senior class. All three programs include school-wide activities to help students in grades 9 through 12 think about post-high school education. In addition, activities have been designed for the elementary and middle school students to help plant the seed that post-high school education is important for every Hartland student.

A Post-Secondary Advisory Council has also been established. This group, comprised of counselors, principals, superintendents, school board members, and parents, is charged with the task of making sure that the importance of post-high school education is addressed in all buildings.

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Through education, outreach, and program design, this committee is focused on ensuring that all Hartland graduates are prepared to obtain a credential beyond the high school diploma.

This group will be working hard to help create a culture in all of our buildings that stresses the importance of post-high school education to both our students and their parents.



School Bus Safety DANGER ZONES AROUND THE SCHOOL BUS

- The "Danger Zone" is the area surrounding the bus where it's difficult to see children in the bus mirrors
- 20 feet in front, 10 feet behind and 10 feet on each side of the school

LOADING / UNLOADING SAFELY

- STAY on your own side of the road 10 feet from the roadway, in a single row
- WAIT until the bus has come to a complete stop, the red overhead lights are activated, and the DRIVER DISPLAYS THE YELLOW SAFETY SIGNAL
- When crossing the road, CHECK traffic both ways /then check again and walk 10 feet in front of the bus
- NEVER stop to pick up anything on the ground

KINDERGARTEN ENROLLMENT 2016-17

Kindergarten Enrollment Packets will be Available Beginning February 1, 2016



KINDERGARTEN ORIENTATION

A Kindergarten Orientation will be held on **Saturday, March 12 from 10:00 am to 11:30 am** at the Hartland Education Support Service Center, 9525 Highland Road.

The orientation will provide parents an opportunity to hear from kindergarten teachers about a "typical" school day and the kindergarten curriculum. In addition, administrators will be on hand to talk about school safety, transportation, school attendance areas, student nutrition, and answer questions. This will be a family-oriented event and you are encouraged to bring your kindergarten child.

Hartland Consolidated Schools will be accepting kindergarten enrollment packets beginning **February 1, 2016** at the Board of Education office and each elementary school office during office hours. Enrollment packets can also be downloaded from our website at www.hartland-schools.us

In addition to the enrollment packet, the following documents must be presented when registering:

- Original birth certificate with seal, plus a copy of same certificate for school records
- Immunization records with proof of DTP, Polio, MMR, Hepatitis B, Chicken Pox vaccines (or proof of having illness), and vision screening, plus copy of same for school records
- Proof of residency using one of the following: certificate of occupancy, purchase agreement, builder's permit, rent receipt or agreement, mortgage statement/payment receipt, voter registration card, utility bill, driver's license.

Children are eligible for enrollment in kindergarten in September 2016 if they will have their fifth (5th) birthday on or before September 1, 2016. A child who turns 5 after September 1 and before December 1, 2016 may enroll if parent/legal guardian signs a waiver and is supported by the school district.

A full-day Junior Kindergarten program may be offered on a limited basis. A minimum number of students are required for the program to be made available. College Savings Plans, Not Just for the Wealthy


One of the misconceptions about 529 college savings plans is it takes a lot of money to open an account. While data shows most families who save in 529 accounts tend to be wealthier, there are still a lot of middle-class and lower-income families using the plans.

Experts say, the minimum contribution to open an account is lower than what it used to be. Michigan's prepaid 529 plan—Michigan Education Trust (MET) now allows purchasers to buy in credit hour increments. The new Pay-As-You-Go option allows parents, grandparents, and others to purchase a contract by paying for one credit hour to begin with and then make contributions as low as \$25 a credit hour. The Michigan Education Savings Program (MESP) can be started with as little as \$25. Both plans offer Michigan residents tax advantages.

It is often recommended for purchasers to make recurring payments into the 529 account, but it is not required. Parents can use milestones as an opportunity to contribute—if you have a toddler who no longer needs diapers take a portion of that money and put it into college savings. Friends and relatives can also use holidays and birthdays as an opportunity to contribute.

Even saving a little for college is better than nothing. Every dollar saved is a dollar the student, or parent, isn't going to have to borrow later. According to a Washington Post article, Americans now owe a record \$1.3 trillion in student loans. "Some 50 million people in the U.S. hold a student loan, slightly more than the number of people on Medicare and almost as many as those receiving Social Security benefits."

Here is how to get yours:

- 1. Send an email to pc@hartlandschools.us, preferably from the email account you provided Hartland Schools upon registration of your child.
- 2. In the subject line, type Parent Portal PIN & password request.
- 3. List all your children currently enrolled in Hartland Schools, by their legal
- 4. After each child's name, indicate the building in which he or she is enrolled.
- 5. Be sure to indicate your legal name as the parent making the request.
- 6. Send the email.

A personal PIN and password will be emailed to you within 1 or 2 school days. We recommend you keep the PIN and password in a safe place. You have the ability to change your password but if you do forget it, you can always email and request a password reset.

Hartland High School is Recommended for Accreditation!


AdvancED is the global leader in providing continuous improvement and accreditation services to over 32,000 institutions serving 20 million students worldwide.





Flash from the Friends of the Cromaine District Library



IS YOUR CHILD STRUGGLING?

How often do they say "I can't!"

<u>I love Nunchuks</u>. They are MAGICAL!!!!!!! (*Nunchuks are martial arts weapons comprised of two wooden sticks held together by a rope, made famous by Bruce Lee).

Here is why - they teach children a critical life lesson better than almost anything else we do!

How? Just watch your child on the floor. They are sooooooooo excited when we first hand them a nunchuk. But very quickly most find out that spinning a nunchuk correctly is not as easy as it looks. They will try...and try...and try. Fortunately these practice nunchuks are made of soft foam so when they hit themselves in the head, the pain is more from embarrassment than actual physical injury.

But, with the instructor's gentle urging and encouragement they keep trying. Still they find they just cannot get it. We see them struggle. We see them get frustrated. We see them want to stop. We see some wanting to get a different pair of nunchuks because they think there is something wrong with the pair they have. We see many almost in tears. We have some that even want to walk off the floor. At first they say "Why can't I get this?" which gradually turns into "Why are the other kids getting it?", then eventually to "I WILL NEVER GET THIS!" Finally they just want to give up. They want to quit. **GOOD!!!!!!!!**

You may be shocked to hear me say "Good" but this is where the valuable life lesson begins! What nunchuks do better than almost anything else is to duplicate the process that typically and naturally happens when learning anything difficult. There is a Law of Nature when it comes to learning - most kids (and parents) think and expect learning to be "linear". In other words, as you put in 10 pieces of effort or practice you get rewarded with 10 pieces of results or reward. But no, that is not the way the world or learning works! It is more like that "ah ha" moment or the "light bulb going off". You go from not being able to spin the nunchuks at all to where you instantly get it and it is easy. In life, most kids (and adults) quit just before they are about to succeed!

We can only learn through "experiences". The very best learning experiences are mistakes, failure, struggle and hardship. Yet, unknowingly we find that many young parents are too quick to rescue, bail out, protect or shelter their children. We know you mean well but let them struggle...and struggle OFTEN. Make them do things they do not want to do - OFTEN! Make them wait for things - OFTEN! Make them work for and earn things - OFTEN! Make them do hard things - OFTEN! And, don't allow them to quit or even think of quitting - OFTEN!

In today's instant gratification world, technology works against us as children today get almost everything they want instantly. So I hope this helps a little to maybe change your thinking and mindset when it comes to struggle and hardship. The next time your child says "I can't!" or wants to quit, you should get a big smile and say - **GOOD!!!!!**
