

Delay of School Start Times due to inclement weather

HOUR DELAY

All students will ride the same bus with the same type of pick-up structure as under normal circumstances other than that bus will arrive at the regular pick-up stop approximately one hour later than usual. No structure changes will exist other than the time element. Under a one-hour delay, A.M. junior kindergarten classes will be held. There will be no vocational education classes.

Under a two-hour delay, all students will be picked up as usual, except two hours later than on a regular schedule.

Under a two-hour delay, there will be NO A.M. JUNIOR KINDERGARTEN. There will be no vocational education classes.

The purpose of this alternative plan is to enable the flexibility of delaying school on some mornings due to fog and/or freezing rain. I am hoping that it will help assure that more instructional days can be held, while improving the safety factor for our staff and students.

Under a delay approach, all staff should report prior to the arrival of their students. Below you will find a chart outlining regular starting times and the starting times under a one and two hour delay situation. The chart also shows the time lunch schedules would begin. You will note that no alteration is being made regarding lunch. This will enable all personnel to function as usual.



Student Advances to the National Junior Forensics Tournament

Kendra Rocha represented Hartland Middle School at Ore Creek in the National Junior Forensics League (NJFL) Tournament held June 16-18 in Dallas, Texas. Attending the tournament were more than 470 students from 62 schools spanning 27 states. Those students $constituted \, more \, than \,$ 830 entries across a dozen speech and debate events.



Kendra competed in two categories:

Lincoln Douglas Debate and Extemporaneous Speaking. Lincoln Douglas is a traditional style of debate where students must be prepared to both affirm and negate a value resolution. This type of debate gets its name from the Abraham Lincoln/Stephen Douglas debates on the issue of slavery in the 1800's. The resolution for the 2011 National Tournament was "Resolved: When forced to choose, a just government ought to prioritize universal human rights over its national interests." Kendra debated to a 3-2 win/loss record and finished 15th (out of 65) in speaker points.

After each round of debate, Kendra went directly to draw for a current event topic to speak on in Extemporaneous Speaking. Her knowledge of U.S. and international issues helped Kendra prepare speeches with factual references and sources using only 30 minutes of preparation time before each speech. Kendra placed 16th in speaker points.

Kendra is a member of Hartland Forensics, which supports speech and debate activities for students in grades 5-12. If you would like more information, please contact Doni Dilworth at HartlandForensics@yahoo.com.




Junior Eagle Reading Program

Tips to prevent holiday stress and depression

When stress is at its peak, it's hard to stop and regroup. Try to prevent stress and depression in the first place, especially if the holidays have taken an emotional toll on you in the past. Don't let the holidays become something you dread. With a little planning and some positive thinking, you may find that you enjoy the holidays this year more than you thought you could.

- 1. Acknowledge your feelings. If someone close to you has recently died or you can't be with loved ones, realize that it's normal to feel sadness and grief. It's OK to take time to cry or express your feelings. You can't force yourself to be happy just because it's the holiday season.
- 2. Reach out. If you feel lonely or isolated, seek out community, religious or other social events. They can offer support and companionship. Volunteering your time to help others also is a good way to lift your spirits and broaden your friendships.
- 3. B. The holidays don't have to be perfect or just like last year. As families change and grow, traditions and rituals often change as well. Choose a few to hold on to, and be open to creating new ones. 

Helping Your Elderly Parent with COPD-Related Depression

Experts say that over a million people in the United States have chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD). It is a chronic lung condition that includes bronchitis, emphysema or both.

COPD affects the airways and air sacs within the lungs, which makes breathing difficult and can result in a person becoming less active over time. An elderly person who has COPD will easily become depressed, when dealing not only with breathing difficulties but other age related problems.

One example of COPD related depression is Martin, age 72. Martin had lived a busy lifestyle, playing more at home along with improper diet, golf, volunteering at the community center and working in his garden. Diagnosed with COPD six months previously and uncertain how to manage his breathing difficulty and new medications, Martin stopped all his activities. Giving up the things he loved to do and sitting more at home along with improper diet, he became a victim to depression.

Martin's son Anthony realized that his father could not handle his new situation and depression alone. A trip together to Martin's physician began the steps to dissipating the depression and enabling Martin to return to his social life.

Anthony received instructions about his father's medications from the doctor and how they were to be used and consequently could help his father with medication reminders.

The most common types of daily COPD medicines are:

- Inhalers for daily maintenance— Bronchodilators help relax the muscles around the lungs' breathing tubes. This reduces shortness of breath and makes breathing easier.
- Steroids—Corticosteroids, taken in pill form or inhaler reduce swelling

in breathing tubes to quickly make breathing easier. Not commonly for prolong use.

Oxygen Treatment—Sever COPD will reduce your lungs' ability to put oxygen into your blood to be carried through your body. Martin's oxygen level was measured to determine if he would need prescribed oxygen therapy. Oxygen is usually prescribed if the oxygen in the blood is low during sleep, exercise, or while not active. A respiratory therapist from an oxygen supply company or home health service can help with learning how to use oxygen.

Animportant factor in Martin's depression and COPD management was his diet. Maintaining the right nutrition and taking vitamins not only keeps the body healthy but heals the mind, providing emotional well being. Fad diets or extreme dieting are not appropriate for COPD patients.

Extreme weight loss can be as much a hazard as being overweight. A home care nutritionist can help establish a healthy menu and diet plan.

With the help of mobile services and his son at his side to start with, Martin returned to the golf course and community activities. His new diet and return to previous activity helped Martin overcome his symptoms of depression.

Studies show that the intervention of family and friends in helping and supporting elderly people with COPD results in a decrease of depression and a healthier outcome for the patient. If you are helping an elder parent with COPD related depression there are community and professional services to help you. Start with your parent's physician. You can also find resources for oxygen therapy, homecare respiratory treatment, home nursing, home medical equipment


