# Meet Your 2015 Memorial Day Parade Grand Marshals 

In 1967 young Alan Spicer left his hometown of Linden and bought a farm in Hartland. It had last been used as a diary farm when he purchasedit. He had always worked at his parent's apple orchard in Linden, so it was only logical that he began planting apple trees at his recently purchased farm. A year later he married his wife


Wanda and Alan Spicer, 2015 Memorial Day Grand Marshals Wanda, also from Linden, and they made the old Victorian farmhouse at Hartland Road and Clyde Road their home.

Today that farm has grown to 300 acres, and includes a winery they opened in 2009. To explain what Alan and Wanda have done for Hartland and the surrounding area over the last 47 years would not be possible in just one short newspaper article. Wanda was a second grade teacher in the 1951 Building from 1968-1971. Alan served on the Zoning Board for Hartland Township. The Spicers have been very involved in the 4 H
Rangers, and to this day their son Mark drives the tractor in the Memorial Day Parade to pull the 4 H float. This has been a Spicer's Orchard tradition for over 30 years.

Both Alan and Wanda were quite active in the Jaycees when Hartland had a local chapter. Spicer's Orchards has been a common field trip destination for many area schools through the years. Wanda says that between 10,000-15.000 students visit the working orchard each year. Because of the longevity of Spicer's Orchards, children and even grandchildren of the early field trips of decades past enjoy the same cider, donuts, and apples every year. The orchard, during the fall season, will employ over 50 people. Many area students have had their first "real job" experience at the orchard, and like the field trips, second and third generations are having the same experience.

The Spicers are constantly giving "behind the scenes" help in the Hartland Community. The Senior All Night Party, Relay for Life, Boys and Girls Scouts, sports teams at all levels, Special Olympics, and the Hartland Schools are just a few of the beneficiaries of their generosity.

Wanda and Alan have three children. Matthew works full time at the farm. Son Mark also works at the farm in addition to another job. Their daughter Shannon Rowe works as the bookeeper, in addition to her job as a teacher at Ore Creek Middle School. Even some of the older grandchildren are employed at the orchard in some capacity.

Wanda and Alan refer to Hartland as "their town." Hartland is very appreciative that almost 50 years ago you made Hartland your town. In recognition of your involvement in the community for so long, the Hartland Community Council names Alan and Wanda Spicer as Grand Marshalls of the 2015 Memorial Day Parade.

## Is It Time for Mom and Dad to Move?

As we get older our parents become more frail and aren't safe at home alone. It's a difficult time for them too. They must come to terms with the fact that they are no longer able to live independently at home and maintaining the home has become a huge undertaking.

These changes can frustrate the adult children who are worried about their parents or another elderly relative's safety and well-being. The adult children begin to provide more assistance and spend more time trying to take care of their parent's issues. These working caregivers have higher rates of unexpected absenteeism, workday interruptions, supervision cost, and unpaid leave.
According to an extensive study by Metlife, reported in 2011, the cost impact of care giving on the female caregiver in terms of lost wages and Social Security benefits equals $\$ 324,044$. Not to mention that these caregivers also report poor health. Whatever plans established for eldercare can quickly unravel with a change in health status or unexpected absence of a paid caregiver.

10 Tips for Caregivers on How to Approach this Topic with your Mom or Dad:

1. Assess your parents' needs. Can they maintain their home? Are they eating regular, nutritional meals? Are they active or stay home and watch TV all day? Are they safe to drive? Do they pay their own bills?
2. Discuss options. The earlier you start discussing what your parent's want the easier it is to transition them when needed. Talk about what they would like to have in their new lifestyle such as activities, restau-rant-style meals, amenities, etc. Once you know what they want then when the time comes you are prepared to move them quickly and they'll be more accepting of the change.
3. If a crisis occurs---move quickly. If your parent gets sick and ends up in the hospital use the situation to help them see that it is time for a change.
4. Don't give up. Keep talking about the future and what they want. This will help them think about the
future and any objections they have. Most of their concerns will be about change. Change is scary. They may be afraid of losing their independence, losing their memories, or even think that their friends and family will forget about them and not visit.
5. Discuss your own feelings and concerns about their aging your limitations. Respect the fact that they have their own opinion and they are scared. Be open about what help you can provide and what help you cannot. Be understanding but firm when presenting your concerns. Talk to them as adults-they are not your children.
6. Start touring senior communities early. Tour communities at the level your parents are at. Reduce the search to two that you thin fit their personalities and then take your parents on tour. They will be less resistant if they see what's out there. Take them to lunch at the senior community and maybe participate in some of their activities.
7. Have them try a respite stay. A respite stay is a short-term stay to see if they'd like the community. Some communities have a minimum
of one week stay and others have a three month minimum. "Try it to see if you like it" and typically the unknown becomes familiar and they are more apt to move.
8. Moving is easy when you have help. Let them know you can help with the move. Moving is overwhelming and if there isn't anyone to help the move wont' happen. Senior move managers can help with the transition from start to finish.
9. Free referral services help seniors, their family and professionals find senior housing, care and support services. Senior Care consultants work closely with the family to determine the best senior housing options based on the person(s) being helped. This saves hundreds of hours and a lot of stress.
10. No one likes being told what to do. Even if your parent has cognitive disabilities they should be part of the process.
