Hartland High School

Hartland High School wrapped up another extremely successful World Language Week March 31 – April 4. This year's international theme was music: "Tune in, take note, find harmony." LEGACY High School

Legacy High School receives grant money each year from Michigan WORKS through the Workforce Investment Act. This is a federal program created to provide financial support to help unemployed people with proper training and connect them with job opportunities. In Livingston County, Hartland is the only youth provider and therefore we are very fortunate to have these funds available to support our students with employment skills and job opportunities. This grant is housed in our Career Center and is directed by Ms. Sue Silver. Sue has assembled a team of professionals to assist her in supporting young people as they transition from high school to the work force. The Career Center also provides academic support, counseling and other career building skills. The students of Hartland are very fortunate to have these funds under the care and direction of Ms. Sue Silver.

<u>Hartland Middle School</u>

The Hartland Middle School student group "Students Taking a New Direction" (STAND) and Mrs. Storey's EBCE students recently planned and implemented a school-wide campaign called "Most Teens Don't". A survey of Livingston County high school and middle school students shows that most teens don't use alcohol, tobacco, and other drugs. Sponsors Denise Terry, Vanessa LeBlanc, Christine Rutkowski, and Peggy Storey worked with students to publicize this throughout our school. They partnered with Livingston Community Prevention Project (LCPP) to highlight that MOST teens are making smart decisions about alcohol, tobacco, and other drugs. Students placed posters around the school, made daily announcements, and distributed free items such as buttons and pencils with the slogan "Most Teens Don't".

Farms Intermedíate School

Our Farms staff participated in our first ever Walking Challenge. Staff members wore a pedometer and formed teams to log how many steps they walked each day. As a school, we walked 6,843,193 steps, which equated to 3,422 miles. For each mile walked, Farms donated \$1.00 to Relay for Life. Our grand total was \$342.20. Creekside Elementary School
