Hartland High School

Did you know that Hartland High School was accredited by AdvancEd during the month of February? An external review team comprised of seven individuals from all over the state visited HHS for two and a half days. They visited classrooms, conducted interviews of staff, parents, and students, and analyzed our high school data/artifacts. The team noted that HHS is a "home" to students and that "Reason, Respect, and Responsibility" are reflected in our students, who are respectful and prepared to learn. They also noted that some of our "Powerful Practices" relate to the use of our college data, our commitment to Standards-Based Grading, the governance and leadership within the district, and resource allocation.

LEGACY

This past week LEGACY students competed in a basketball tournament hosted at the school. Students from Asher, Allendale, and LEGACY competed in a tournament style competition. These athletic competitions are extremely important for the students at LEGACY as they provide the opportunity to represent the school and show school pride and spirit.
