### Hartland High School

Did you know that the Hartland High School Energy Technology program received a grant for \$25,000 from the DTE Foundation? The DTE Energy Foundation is an organization that supports initiatives focused on education and employment within the growing energy technology field. The funds will be used to purchase an Electric Distribution trainer/simulator to assist the Hartland High School program that trains Livingston Country students for careers in the energy industry. Students from around the county come to Hartland High School for the Energy-shared time program, taught by Mr. Mike Schmidt. Students who complete the energy program earn their Energy Industry Fundamentals certificate, which sets them up to attend a community college or directly enter training programs to get a job in the commercial energy industry. Careers in this pathway often include overhead linemen, natural gas pipefitters, and underground line splicing.

Lakes Elementary (along with Round, Village, and Creekside) has Mr. Sam Larioza (Sensei of Ohana Karate in Howell) visiting all of our students in small groups (one higher grade level paired with one lower grade level class) throughout the entire school year. *Sensei* is teaching a monthly thirty minute lesson with each group from his "character dojo" curriculum. Two weeks after Sensei's visit, "Sensei" Howerton follows up with a mini-lesson meant to reinforce Sensei's theme. The program is designed to build important character traits to help students understand and

manage emotions, set and achieve positive goals, feel and show empathy for others, establish and maintain positive relationships, and make responsible decisions.

The first training theme this year is **"I always stand up for myself and others!"** The learning objectives with this theme revolve around building confidence and courage in our students, developing an anti-bullying culture by teaching students a basic four step process and words to use, and working on their ability to read social cues.

The second training theme is **"Every time I back away from a fear,** my <u>FEAR</u> gets bigger, but every time I power through a fear, <u>I</u> get bigger!" Students are developing their "courage muscle" by identifying

and not backing away from all of the small fears they face on a daily basis. They've been taught to Notice, Choose, and Act to power through these fears. The staff at Lakes is also using this common language and finding ways to incorporate these themes and language in the classroom so students have a lot of practice to build their "courage muscle"!

#### **Round Elementary School**


Did you know November is Diabetes Awareness month? The RES school collected over \$200.00 to support research for a cure. We wore blue on November 14th to show our support.
