Farms started the year with approximately 150 remote learners and now has 80 students learning in a remote setting. Each teacher has set up a Google Classroom for remote learners to access information daily. Through Google Classroom, remote learners can access their assignments, assessments, and can also communicate with teachers through Google Meets and emails to have their questions answered. ELA teachers are using Lucy Calkins videos, which are the same videos that are viewed in class, for reading and writing. Math teachers can teach the curriculum as well as use Prodigy, Xtramath, and Zearn to help students follow the pacing guide set by the district. Science is teaching the normal curriculum as well as using Freckle to supplement the students' learning. Social studies teachers are working together to develop work that can easily be done online. Special education teachers continue to meet with their students online to support their IEPs. Also, a special shout out to our art and physical education teachers who have become quite creative in teaching their curriculum remotely. Not only are teachers going above and beyond for our remote learners to be successful, they are putting this same effort with the students who sit in their classroom daily. What has been most impressive is the dedication our teachers show for all our students, whether it be remote or face-to-face. We could not be prouder of our staff and their patience and perseverance through a challenging start of the year!

Did you know that Village Elementary has a robust social-emotional learning curriculum that was developed by our awesome staff? Last year, all staff members at Village dug into the Michigan State Standards for Social-Emotional Learning and designed a Handbook of activities that they use to track student's progress on these expectations. Additionally, they designed and developed two lessons per month that would be taught school-wide in all classrooms and would reiterate the work that was done in conjunction with Sensei. This year, our staff took that learning a step further, and over the first four weeks of school designed 30-minute lessons to be given twice a week during Wise Time (intervention block). These lessons laid the foundation for our entire building to be able to use the Zones of Regulation language and corresponding strategies for self-reflection and regulation. This learning will continue throughout the year. The Village staff works so hard to explicitly instruct students around social-emotional health and well-being, and it is exciting to continue to watch it grow.

Community Education

Did you know that our pool is open? The Hartland Aquatic Center offers lap swimming, exercise classes and swim lessons in the competition pool. We are looking forward to our leisure pool opening soon! Did you know that Hartland Community Education is offering a Self Defense for Women class with one of our partners, Sanchin Ryu?
